J. D. NICHOLS IS INJURED

J. D. Nichols suffered severe injuries to his right leg last week in a tractor accident on the place farmed by D. Strickland.

Mr. Nichols told the us that he had been plowing and was turning the tractor around when the axle broke, pinning his leg and foot. He managed to get his leg loose, but his shoe was so wedged that he had to remove his foot from it.

He was rushed to Brownfield for treatment. X-rays failed to show any broken bones, but he did suffer severe bruises and was laid up in bed for two days. Now he is able to get about on crutches.

TERRY REDFORD BACK ON JOB

Terry Redford, principal of Ropes Elementary School who suffered severe injuries to his face when he slipped and fell on an icy strip of concrete in Levelland last week, is so far recovered he is back at work.

He told us he had been attending a teachers meeting at South Plains College, and after it was over he went out to his car, thinking his wife was there. The ditch beside the curb was full of water which had frozen, and when Mr. Redford stepped on it he slipped and fell forward, his hands missing the curb and going into the ditch with his face hitting the concrete. All the bones in one side of his face were crushed.

The week of George Washington's birthday is designated as National FFA week. The Future Farmers of America became a National organization in the year 1928. Since that time Texas has become the leading state in number of members.

The Future Farmers of America is composed of members who are, or have taken, Vocational Agriculture in high school. Membership is entirely voluntary. Boys are bound together with a common interest. While Vocational Agriculture and FFA are designed to teach boys the skills and knowledge required in farming, this is not the most important goal of the organization. The FFA tries to take over where vocational training leaves off and teach the boys leadership, citizenship, and cooperation.

The Ropes Chapter of the Future Farmers of America was founded in 1935. Herbert Davis was the first Vocational Agriculture Teacher in

To take care of any snow which might arise this year, Myrl has two snow plows, and stated he would be prepared to take them to any point where they might be needed—they will be used in clearing the roads and for rescue work.

"No matter how deep the snow gets we will be able to plow through it," he told the Plainsman. "If a school bus should become stranded we will be able to reach it. In case of trouble of any kind all the people will have to do is call my home in Levelland and my wife can reach me by radio—I will be driving one of the plows."

Myrl pointed out that the maintainers were of little use when there is deep snow, but said that while the snow plows were at work he would also have the maintainers doing what they could.

Such conditions have prevailed in this section. It was no more than two years ago that the roads around Ropes were closed and, it is likely, the time will come when they will be closed again and the snow plows will be needed. Myrl is to be commended for the preparation he has made.

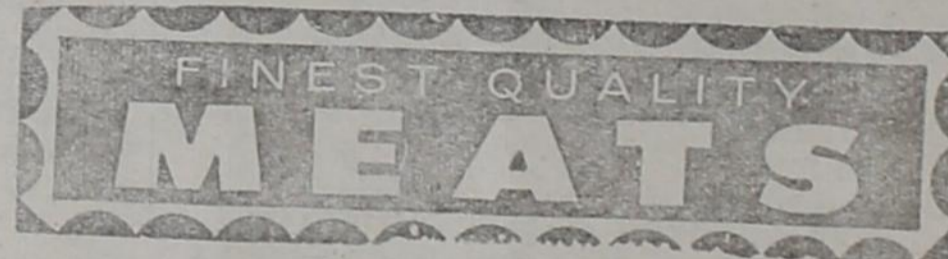

A Federal income tax return must be filed by every citizen or resident of the United States, including minor children, who had gross income of \$600 or more in 1963. Ellis Campbell, Jr., Director of Internal Revenue for the Dallas District, reminded today.

A taxpayer who is 65 or over is not required to file unless his gross income in 1963 was at least \$1,200, Mr. Campbell said.

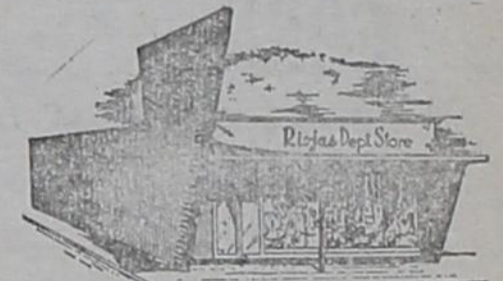

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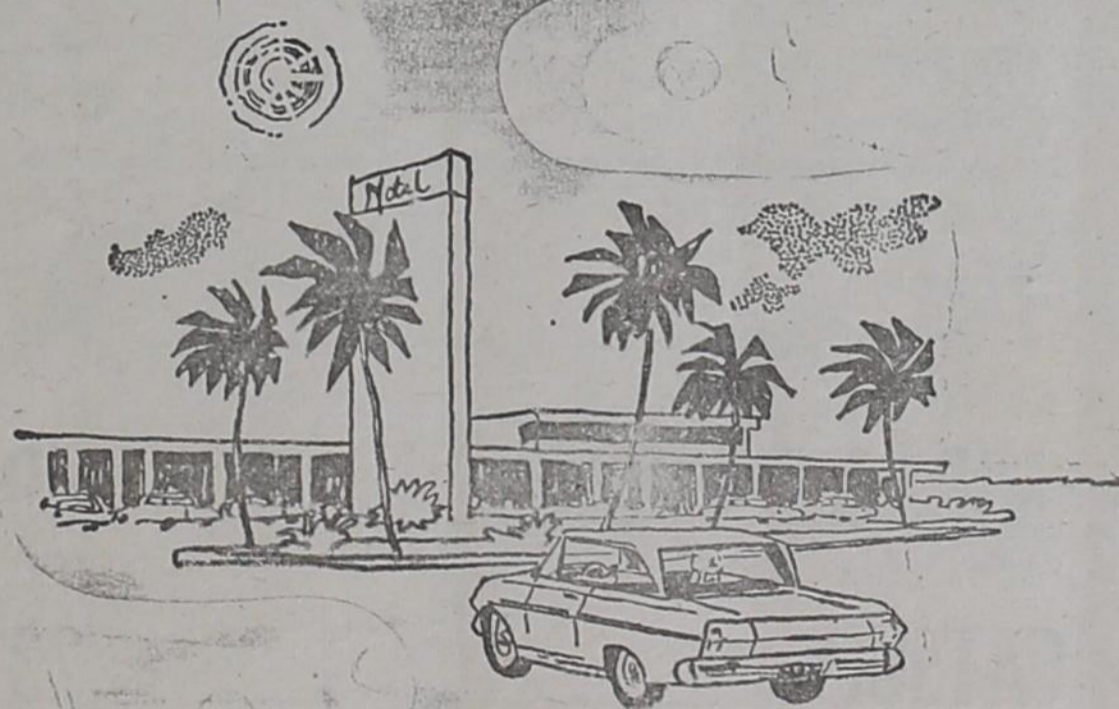
