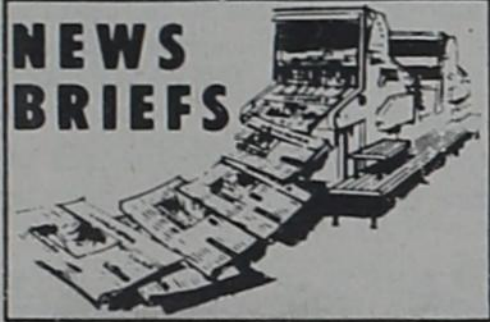

U. S. - Norwegian Officials Sign Grain Trade Agreement

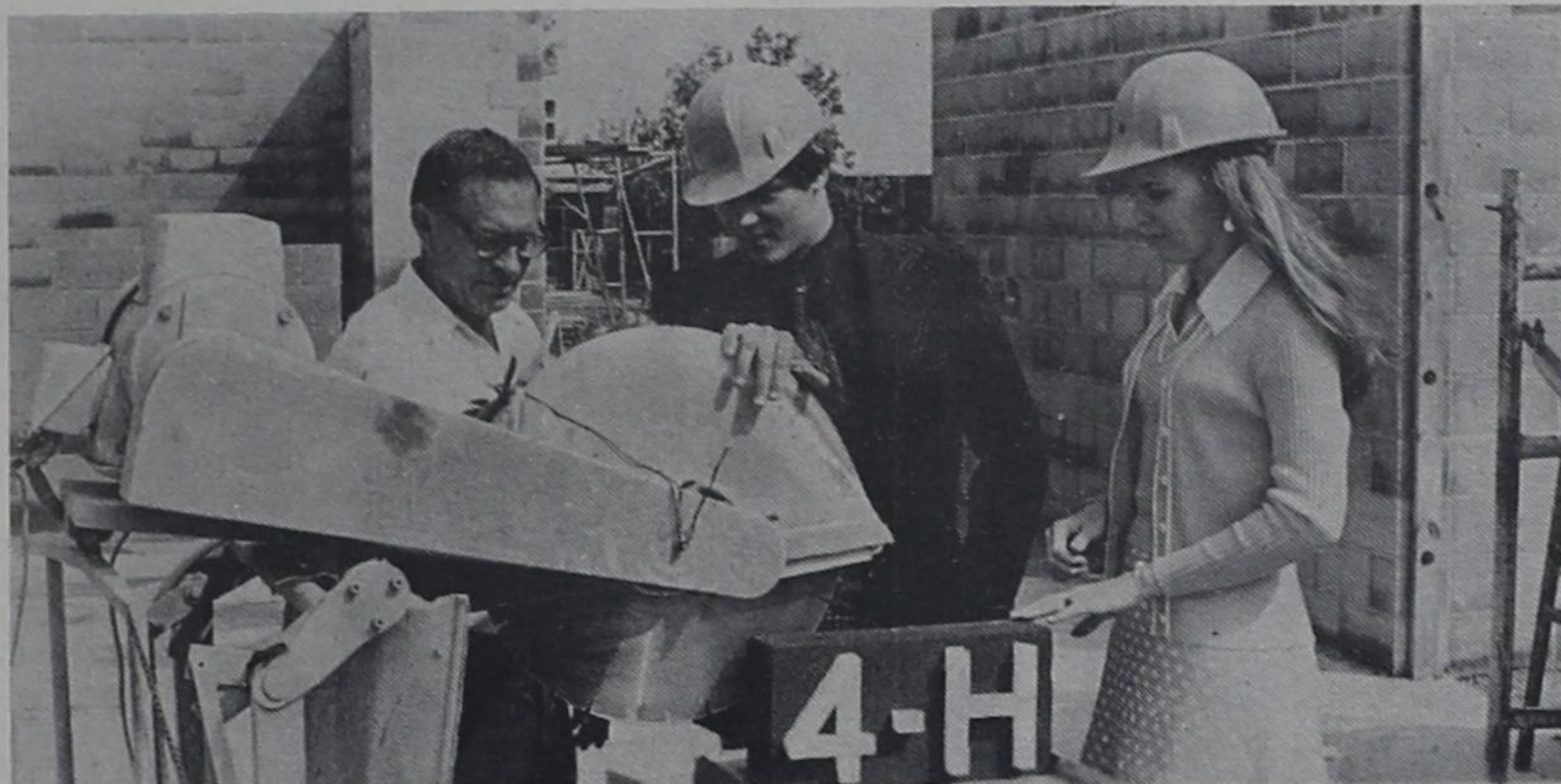
The Norwegian Grain Corporation, Statens Kornforretning, Oslo, Norway, has announced the signing of a three year grain trading agreement with six U.S. grain exporting firms.

The agreement was signed Wednesday, Oct. 16 in New York City by Norwegian officials and the U.S. exporters.

Among witnesses for the signing were officials of the U.S. department of Agriculture, Great Plains Wheat, Inc., and the U.S. feed Grains Council, represented by its chairman, Elbert Harp of Lubbock.

Harp is also executive director of Grain Sorghum Producers Association and the Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board, both headquartered in Lubbock.

The three year agreement, which becomes effective Oct. 1, 1975, represents a sale of at least 500,000 tons and a maximum of one million tons of U.S. grains including wheat, rye, corn, sorghum and barley. All purchases will be done on a competitive tender basis.

Texas Tech finally put it altogether last Saturday—only in reverse. For the first time this season, BOTH the offense and defense turned in poor games. As a result, wait 'til next year.

The offense could do little. In fact, 48 yards total offense the first half pretty well tells the story. The Raiders weren't able to complete a pass, had only two first downs. They were impotent beyond belief. It sounded worse than the A&M game.

As for defense, the Raiders had one bright spot—the goal line stand. That was the mark of a championship ball club. Unfortunately, it was almost the last championship type defense in the game.

Rice, with an offense that was rated among the lowest in the league, picked the Raiders apart. They made first downs on both third and fourth down efforts. They ripped holes in the line, swept the ends. They completed passes with too much authority.

It would be easy to nitpick and ask trite questions about the lack of offense, why the need to continually throw the bomb, why pass deep in your own territory.

It would be easy to second guess—as a lot of persons were doing Sunday. Why toss a freshman quarterback into the fray deep in your own end of the field? Why hasn't the offensive line developed eight games deep into the season? Why is the trap block up the middle still so effective? Why . . . oh, shoot. Forget it, the season's over.

Yes, friends, the Cotton Bowl dream is being put in moth balls—to be resurrected next year when Tech wins two games back to back. A conference title also has been laid to rest for 1974.

What's ahead? Well, for one thing, three games that could give Tech a respectable 8-2-1 weason. Bowls? Chances that would have to rate in Dizzy Dean's category of slim and none. Aside from the Texas game, the Raider offense has been less than impressive.

Leave out the Texas game and the offense has sputtered this season. There was a long drive against SMU, then touchdown opportunities on which Tech couldn't capitalize.

Looking back on it, the New Mexico game could well have been the clue to the Tech season. The Raiders have not had the killer instinct. The Raiders also have not been a good road team with a 1-2-1 record. Apparently the two go hand in glove.

Now, with the title and Cotton Bowl out of the picture, it might be a good time to play a lot of young players. Give these youngsters some good game experience and have them ready for next year.

Of course, make an honest effort to win with the proven players, but work some of the younger players longer. It's obvious that the offensive line needs the most work. And have at least one man ready to replace Ecomet Burley.

The fight for the league crown settles down, once again, to the monotonous quest of Texas, along with A&M and Baylor, which still has an outside chance of winning.

But now it looks more and more as the A&M-Texas tilt the day after Thanksgiving will decide the crown. The Aggies would appear to have the best chance of toppling the Horns for the first time in seven years. But don't go out and bet the family groceries on it.

Texas came back from the adversity of the Tech loss to play impressively and with the same formula it has used for years. The wishbone still is alive and well in Austin, and Texas runs it well.

The Aggies have size and speed. They have a tough defensive line. Their pass defense has been good. They don't throw much, but they throw pretty well. And, obviously, they have a tough ground game that eats up yardage and controls the clock. It should be a heckuva game.

Baylor has only one loss, to A&M, and maybe only one more tough game—against Texas this Saturday. No, I'm not forgetting Tech, but Jim Carlen says his team is so beaten up by injuries that it's a miracle he can put 11 players on the field. Ergo, Baylor should win.

Anyway, Grant Teaff has done a great job bringing the Bears along and they definitely are in contention. And he's done a superlative task of bringing his young players along following a disastrous 1973 season.

Muhammed Ali, just as he said he would, returned the heavyweight crown to his head and demolished George Foreman. It would be interesting to know if he was that good, or whether he psyched Foreman with all his prefight mouthing.

At any event, there was no question about the decision. Foreman received a boxing lesson and it should help him in the future when he fights, as you know he will, Ali again.

Some of the baseball trades recently were almost unbelievable. Bobby Murcer, for instance, was the probable successor to Mickey Mantle. But the Yankees finally gave up on the Oklahoma phenom. In Bobby Bonds they may well have bought a pennant.

And Hank Aaron's departure as a designated hitter to Milwaukee was not unexpected. Aaron, although a tremendous star, couldn't win a pennant in Atlanta, nor could he draw out the fans. The trade gives him a chance to prolong his career and add to the gate in the Beer City.

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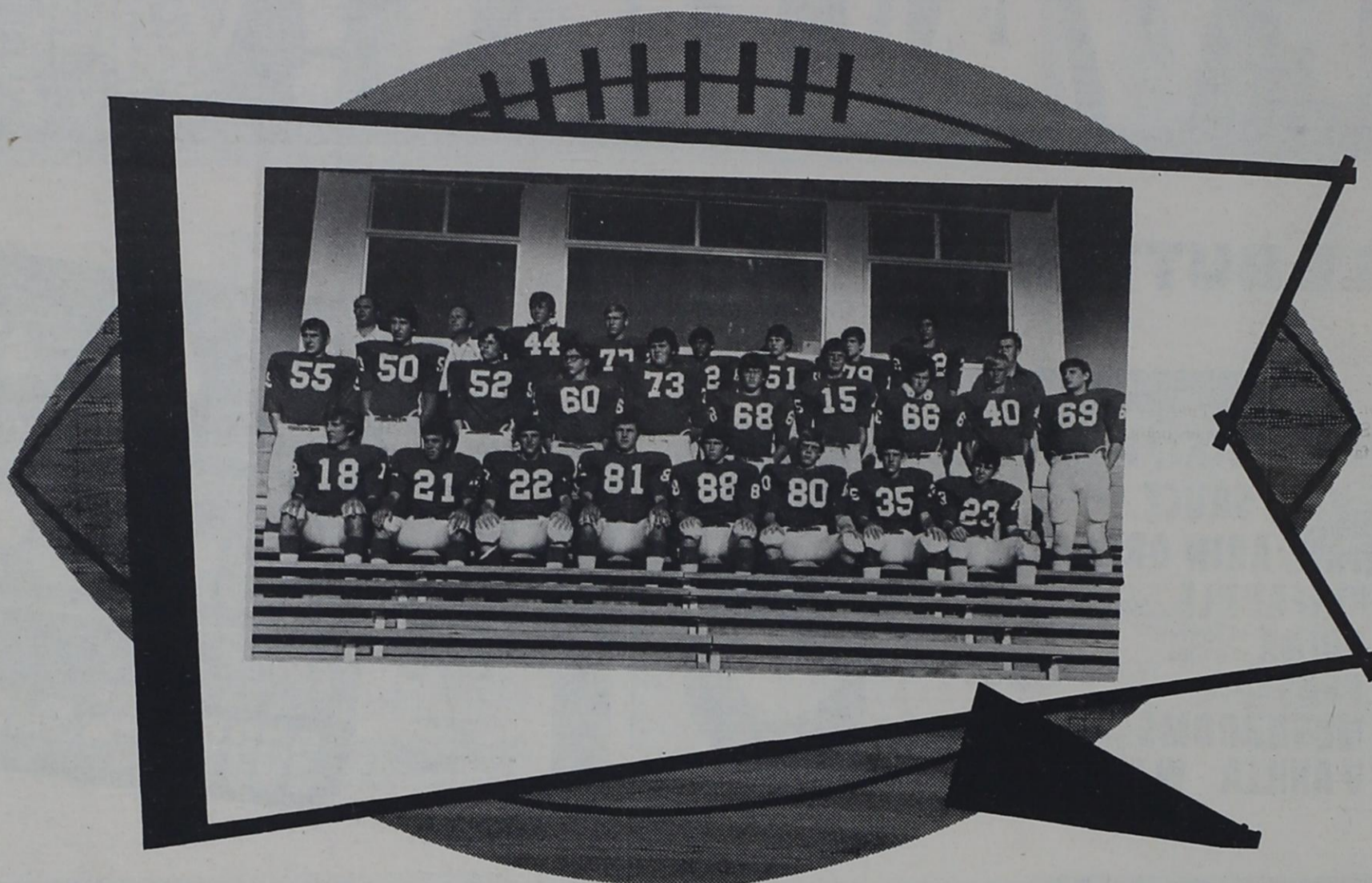

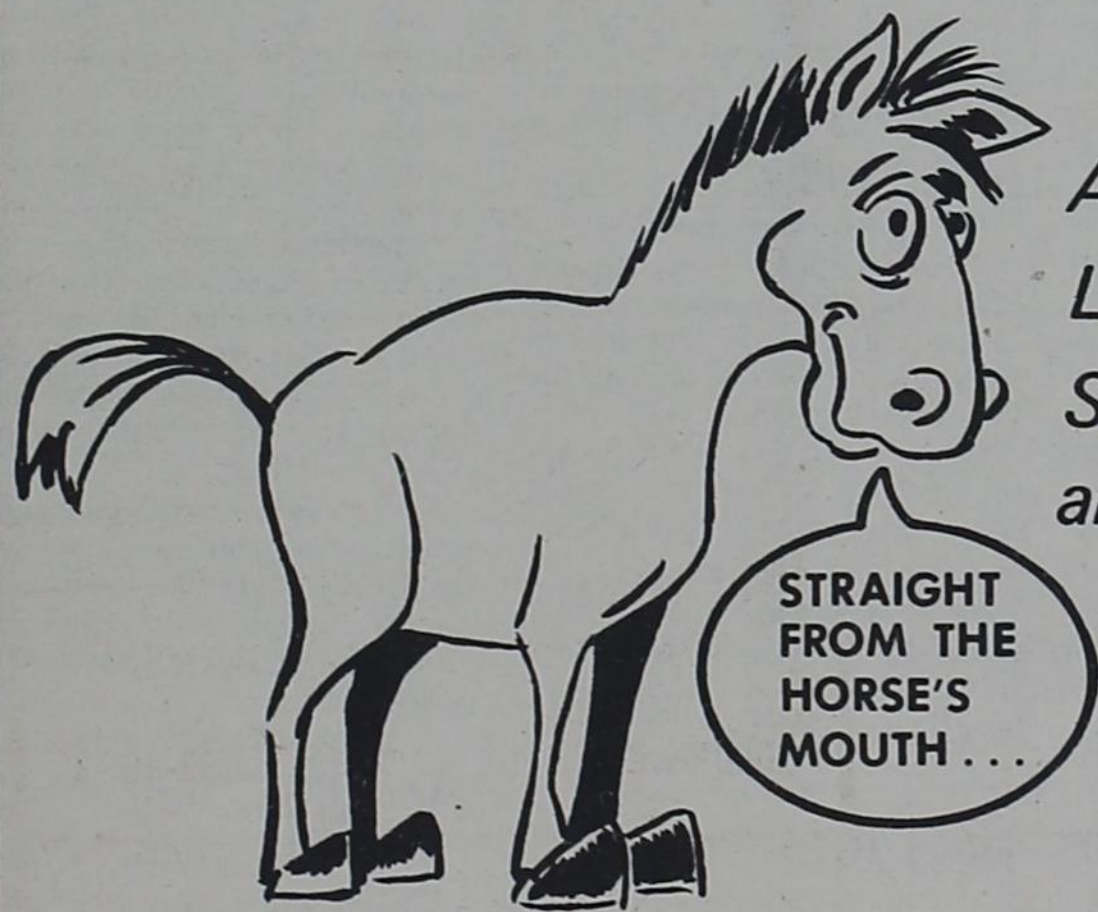

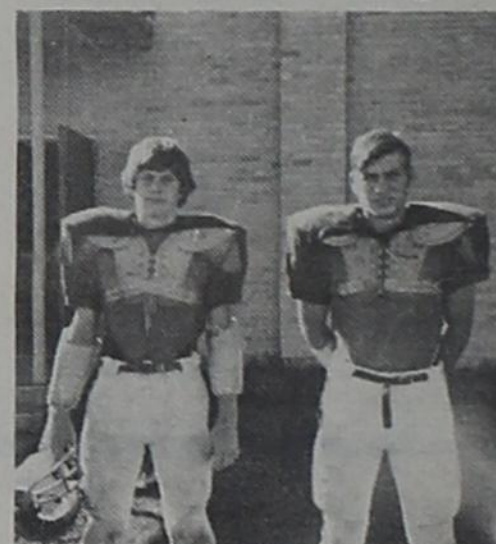

Together with my friends, I can walk down the street without

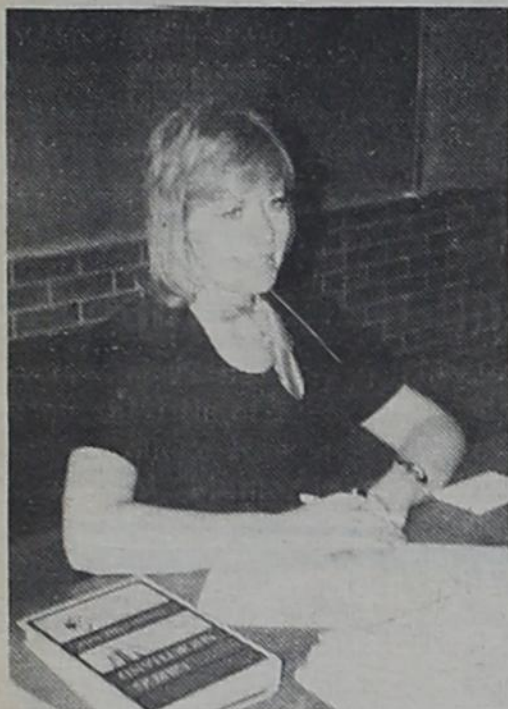
being afraid of being kicked out of my home and on to the street.
