LOAN ON MILO MAIZE

Rep. George Mahon of the 19th District this week commended officials of the Department of Agriculture for announcing a special distress loan on milo. The loan had been urged by farmers and farm groups, and Mahon had presented the request to the grain branch of the Department of Agriculture early in September.

The distress loan will provide milo producers with a special loan equal to 80 per cent of the regular loan. It is designed to aid producers who are unable to take advantage of the regular loan by reason of the lack of storage facilities. The producer would have 90 days or not later than March 31 of next year to locate storage and convert his distress loan into a regular loan. Details of the program are available through County ASC Offices.

The distress loan is necessary by reason of the very heavy milo production, limitation of elevator capacity and the critical shortage of boxcars to transport the milo to available storage.

Mahon said that it was his hope that the distress loan would tend to stabilize the marketing of the milo crop. He said that he hoped the new program would not have to be used in a very big way as it had certain disadvantages and was primarily meant as an aid to a more orderly disposition of the crop.

At the same time the distress loan was announced, a 3 cents per hundred weight increase in the loan rate was announced. The previous rate was an interim rate. The new rate is the final rate for the 1957 milo crop.

COTTON CROP STARTS TO ROLL

With weather continuing favorable up to Tuesday when this is written, cotton over the Ropes territory is now opening and the gins have received their share of the staple, with six gins reporting a total of 380 bales.

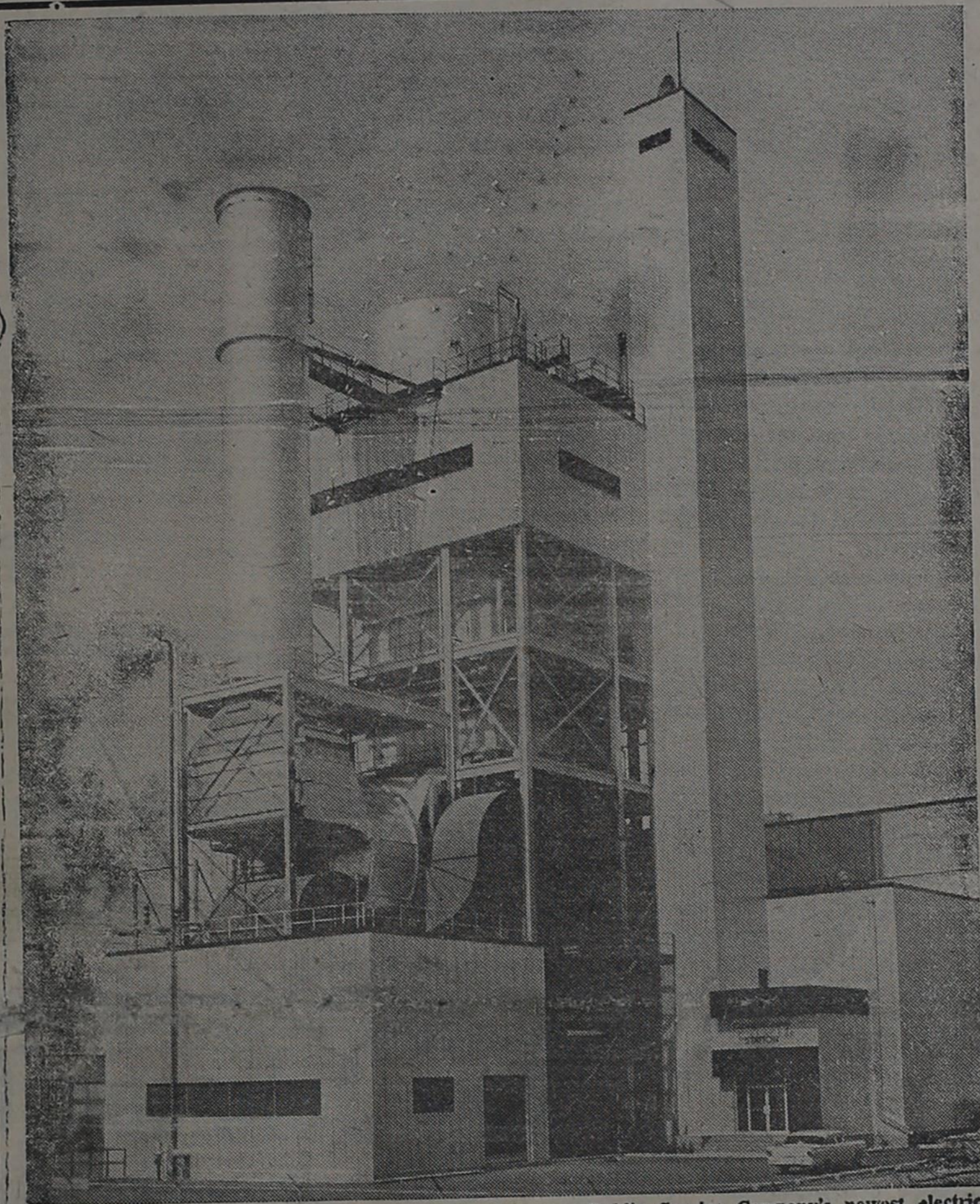
We now have in prospect one of the largest cotton crops, according to acreage, that has been grown on the South Plains in several years. But, most of the crop is late, and we always have the possibility of an early norther or freeze, which if it should come as early as the one in 1950, October 25th, much of the cotton would be ruined.

If frost and the freeze holds off until the average date of November 6 or later, most of the crop will be matured.

FARM BUREAU TO HOLD COUNTY MEET

We are requested to announce that the Hockley County Farm Bureau will hold its annual county-wide meeting on October 15th in the Women's Building on the fair grounds in Levelland at 1:30 pm.

At this meeting resolutions will be adopted for agriculture to be presented to the Texas Farm Bureau which will meet in November.

The feature speaker of the meeting at Levelland will be John C. White, Texas Commissioner of Agriculture. Mr. White, named one of the outstanding men of the United States by Life Magazine, was elected to his present office in 1950 at the age of twenty-five, and is one of the youngest men in the United States to hold State office.

He is nationally recognized for his farm legislative program, and has worked closely with the Farm Bureau in the legislating of beneficial farm laws.

SCHOOL PLANS TO EXPAND MILK PROGRAM

Plans are now in progress at the Ropes Schools to expand the sweet milk program. To encourage children to drink more milk, it will be served either in the morning or afternoon at 2 cents per carton.

This program will be especially promoted in the elementary schools.

COLORED SCHOOL TO DISMISS

The Negro school will dismiss on the 11th for five weeks during the cotton harvest. It will reconvene on the 18th of November.

This is done for the purpose of allowing the students to help in the harvest.

SLOW DRIZZLE STOPS HARVEST

What is termed a slow drizzle of rain put a stop to the harvest in the Ropes territory Wednesday, moisture starting to ooze from the sky during the night.

A mild cold front at about noon Tuesday caused thunder showers in different places, then Tuesday night the skies became overcast and Wednesday morning it was too damp to cut grain or gather cotton.

MARCY HAS GINNED 8 BALES

J. M. Marcy was in Ropes Tuesday and stated that he had already ginned eight bales of cotton and that his cotton is opening rapidly.

While here he was taking a great deal of interest in the thunderstorms hopping about the country and hoping they do not visit his place.

The Volunteer Fire Departments of Ropes Anton and Sundown have been granted a compensation of \$25 for each rural run made for the next twelve months.

The Department in Levelland had been granted such pay sometime ago.

In the voting of this compensation the vote was a tie, and County Judge Paul Williams broke it in favor of the Departments. The vote, as recorded by the court, was:

Hulon Moreland, of this precinct, made the motion, which was seconded by Jim Prueit. The vote was Prueit and Moreland for, and Hulse and Reid against. Williams broke the tie.

This will come as good news to the fire departments of the county, as well as the municipalities. Heretofore the incorporated towns have furnished the equipment and paid the bills for fighting such fires, while the firemen have given their time, and they have answered calls day or night and were glad to do so.

Judge Williams stated to the Plainsman sometime ago that it was his opinion that the county should finance the runs into rural areas.

DEPUTY SHERIFF FOR ROPES

In conversation with Judge Paul Williams on Wednesday morning he stated that at the Monday meeting of the Commissioners Court that the Court had allowed the Sheriff's Department \$300 per month to hire a deputy sheriff to be stationed in Ropes for the next 90 days.

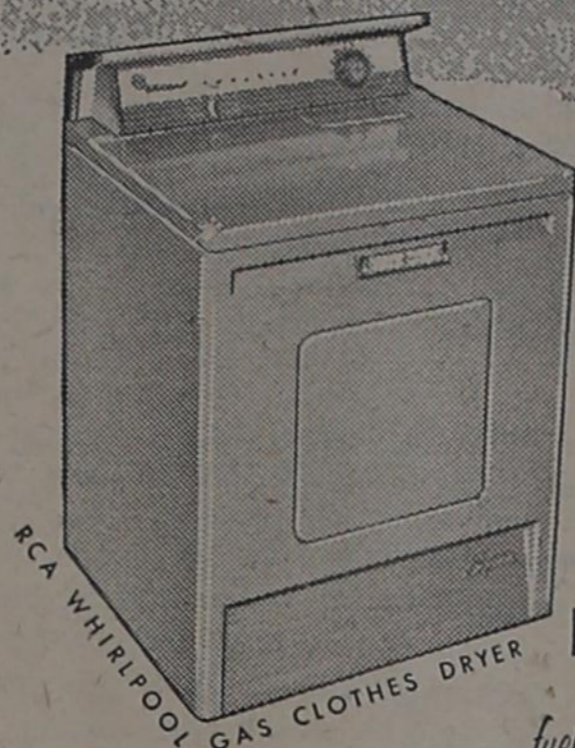

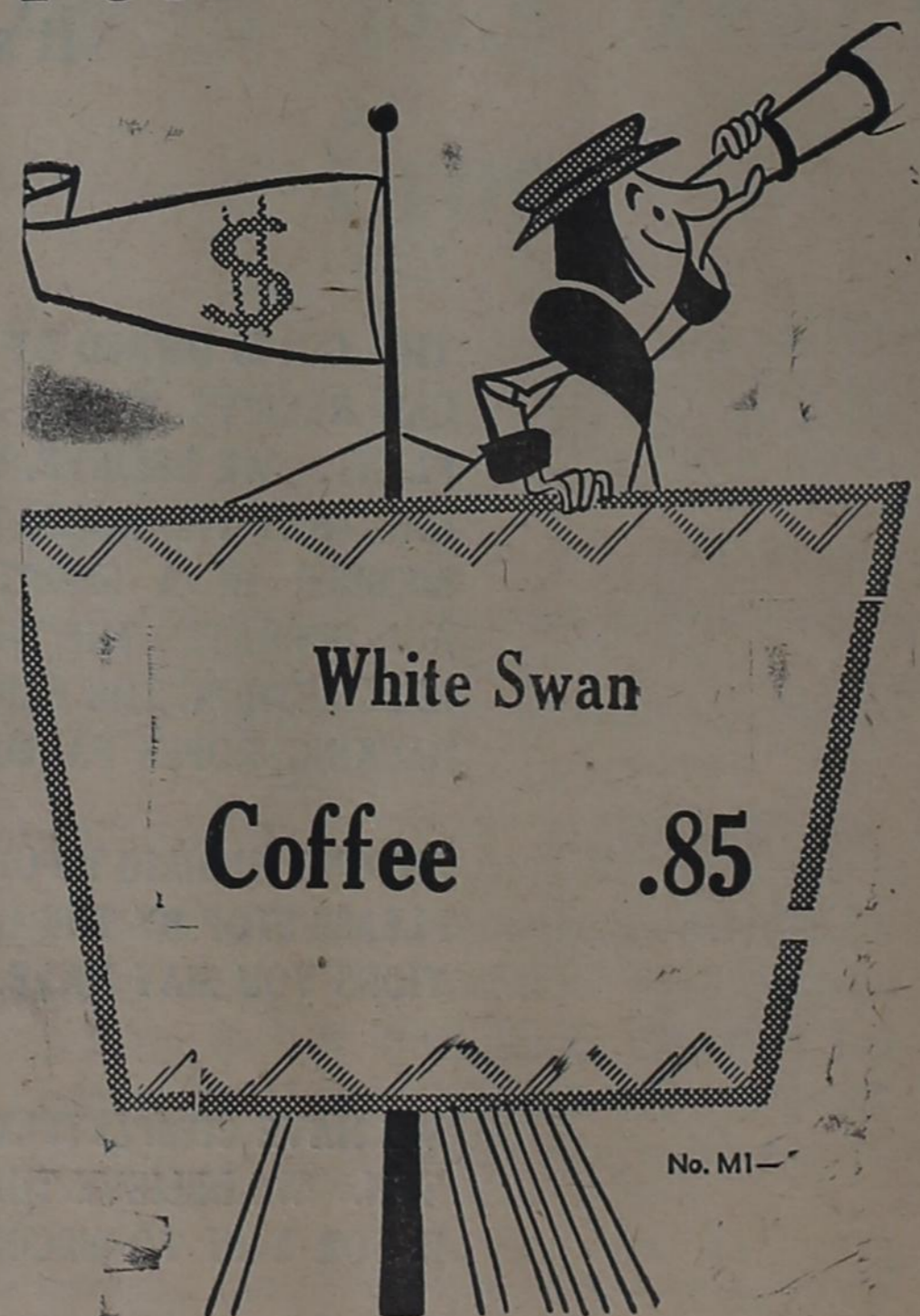
