Steadily Falling Sky Juice Turns South Plains into Sea of Water

What can be termed a deluge of water has swamped the South Plains with rain continuing to fall. From Monday afternoon to Wednesday morning rain in this vicinity ranged from three inches to the east to as much as seven inches to the west. All lakes are full, with some measuring forty to fifty acres, with other lakes joining to form vast bodies of water.

So far, we're told, the rain has failed to damage crops—most of it falling without high winds—but for the fact that part of the water is running off, crops would be completely covered.

As M. M. Collins stated, "It's a fine country in which to grow rice."

Tom Price, eleven miles west, called Tuesday morning to tell us three and nine-tenths inches had fallen in his community. Since that time more than three inches have fallen which makes almost seven inches. Tom said it was the most rain he had ever seen on July 4th. He stated there was no damage to the crops.

East of Ropes the rain was not so heavy, but on Tuesday a report from the Ryals Grocery Store at Busterville said one and a half inches had fallen, and moisture continuing to fall, which will likely bring the total to about three inches.

Tom Peterson, north of Ropes, says more than three inches fell at his place.

Mrs. Wilson Campbell, nine miles west, reports three and eight-tenths of rain on Monday afternoon and night. The first cloud, she said came from the southeast about five o'clock, accompanied by high wind and blinding sand before the rain fell. She said they examined their fields and found them washed, but little damage to growing crops. She reported two and a half inches fell Tuesday night.

M. L. Roberts reported a sweeping rain late Monday but crops suffered no damage.

In Ropes proper two and eight-tenths had fallen up to Tuesday night. Perhaps more than an inch has fallen since then.

Dalton Redman reported Tuesday three and a half inches had fallen at his place and with the rain of Tuesday night and Wednesday the total may be five inches.

E. E. Nix, west of Ropes, reported almost four inches doing little or no damage.

M. M. Collins, some four miles west, reported four and a half inches Monday night, and the rain Tuesday night brought the total to above six inches. He said that during the rain his fields, seen when lightning flashed, appeared to be great lakes of water.

At Meadow more than three and a half inches of rain fell Monday night, and according to Roland Evans great gullies were washed in the fields and some crops destroyed.

Charley Ward told us that this rain should effectively shut off the irrigation wells saying, that unless something happened, we probably have enough moisture to mature the crops. He

also pointed out that such rains as this are unusual at this time of year—that we are having fall weather.

George Whitten, who lives some seven miles northwest said that Monday and Monday night they received four and three-quarter inches—that all lakes are full and at the corner just east of the Barney Thompson place the water lapped against his pickup doors as he crossed it. Of course, the rains of Tuesday night and Wednesday have boosted his total. Jess Dozier, who lives southeast of Ropes, stated that he received an inch and a half of rain Monday, and thought the rain of Tuesday night would bring his total up to near three inches.

There are no dry spots in the Ropes territory.

At least, after some two or three months, in which there was not enough moisture to wet your shirtsleeves, we can say the drought has been broken and, if anything, too much water.

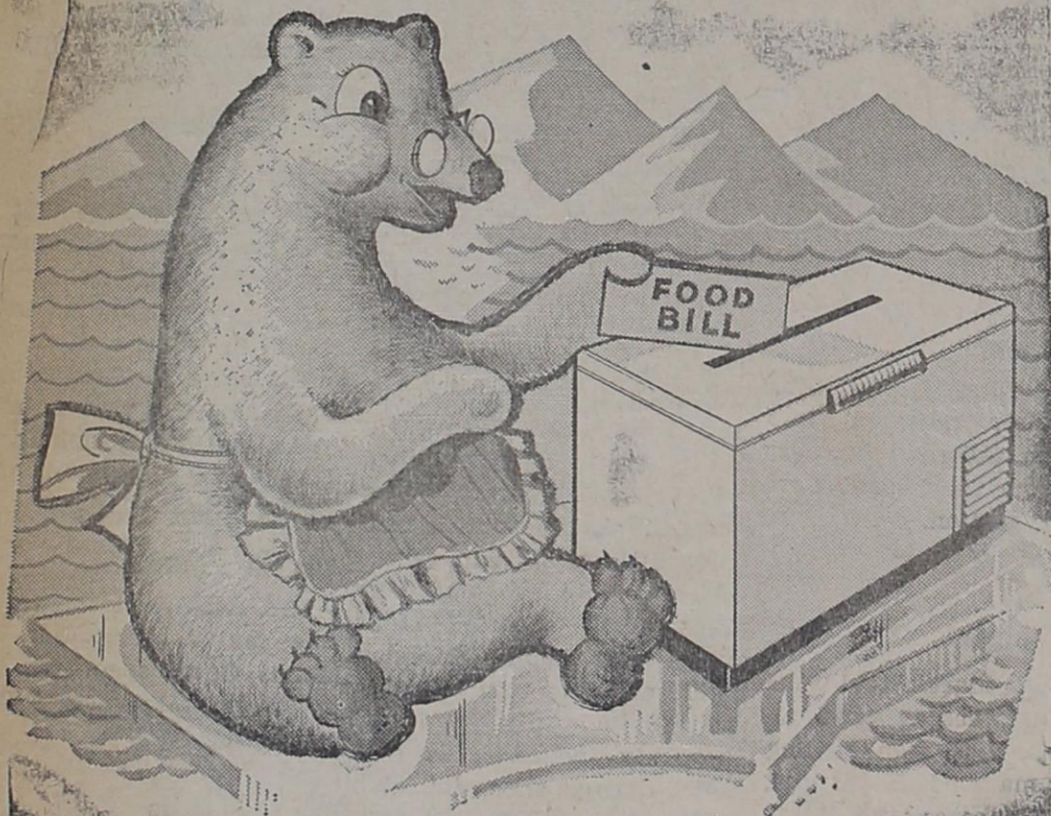

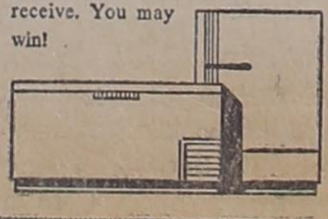

**George Mahon
Sends News**

WASHINGTON, D. C. —
A busy Congress, heading for
a recess until after the na-
tional conventions of the
two major political parties,
early this week cleared sev-
eral important measures and
sent them to the White
House for the signature of
President Eisenhower.

One of the most impor-
tant and far-reaching of these
bills was the \$40 billion De-
fense measure, handled in
the House by George Mahon
of the 19th Congressional
District of Texas. Speaking
of the Defense bill, Mahon
said:

"I think we produced a
good bill. We kept politi-
cs out of the bill, as
attested to by the fact
that all Republicans and
Democrats on the Ap-
propriations Committee
except one supported it.
"We exceeded the bud-
get in order to make up
for certain deficiencies
in the defense program.
Many significant chang-
es were made in the
President's program in
order to add needed
strength to the defense
effort. Congress took the
position that this was no
time to let down our
guard."

Just prior to the recess,
after heated debate, a wheat
and feed grain farm bill
was voted down in the House
by a vote of 171 to 236. Accord-
ing to Mahon, the defeat of
this measure means that no
major farm legislation will be
enacted at this session. Ma-
hon said that the atmos-
phere was unfavorable and
the conflicts were so great
between Congress and Sec-
retary Benson and among
the farm organizations that
it would be much better to
consider the farm problem
under the changed atmos-
phere of the new Adminis-
tration, Democratic or Re-
publican, which will take
over next January, following
the November elections.

The House passed a bill
extending the Bracero farm
labor bill for two years.
Favorable Senate action is

expected in August.

Final action on most of
the appropriation bills for
the session was taken prior
to the recess. Indications
are that appropriations in
the over-all will approximate
the amount of money re-
quested by the President in
his January Budget, but ma-
jor readjustments, both up
and down, were made, the
Defense addition accounting
for the major increase.

Indications are that the
granting of obligational au-
thority other than appropria-
tions by Congress will be
decidedly over the Presi-
dent's Budget.

Final decisions as to what
will be done on such major
issues as federal aid to edu-
cation, minimum wages, and
social security will be made
when Congress resumes. On
these programs, as well as a
number of others, either the
House or Senate or both
have taken preliminary ac-
tion.

Mahon predicts that the
Congress will be in session
"from four to six weeks"
when it reconvenes after the
political conventions. The
House is due to return to ac-
tion August 15th, while the
Senate has voted to convene
a week earlier, on August 8.

"I am hopeful," Mahon
said, "that members of
both political parties will
refrain from turning the
remainder of the session
into a partisan show. The
times demand serious, re-
sponsible attention to the
legislation that will come
before us."

Most Members of Congress

were disappointed that final
adjournment was not achiev-
ed prior to the conventions,
but sustained controversy
over many key bills slowed
action and prevented the
wind-up of legislative busi-
ness.

Mahon will attend the
Democratic National Con-
vention in Los Angeles be-
ginning July 11th, and, as a
delegate, will join all other
Texas delegates in working
for the nomination of Sena-
tor Lyndon B. Johnson for
President.
