is effectively performing his duties is not readily available to the general public. Persons accused of violating our laws are certainly not going to complain if they are not prosecuted, therefore we, who are not directly involved, never know if we are getting the full benefit of our tax dollar from our County Attorney.

Many businessmen of this County have shown me literally hundreds of "Hot" checks which they have presented to the County Attorney for prosecution, but which received no official action whatsoever. The alarming part is that the majority of these checks are written by only a very few people. These people are parasites on the citizens of this community and threaten to weaken the financial stability of our County. When the local grocer loses \$10.00 on a bad check, he must raise the prices of his goods to compensate. So you see, it is you and I who eventually pick up the tab for the one who writes the bad check. A change in this "no prosecution" policy is desperately needed.

There are other fields of criminal violations where only a half-hearted attempt is evident. One notable example is in the case of Liquor Law Violations. Since my return to Levelland from the University of Texas Law School, there has not been one person, to my knowledge, convicted of a liquor law violation who has received a jail sentence. The reason for this is simply that our County Attorney has not asked for a jail sentence. Each violator manages to escape with a fine of a few dollars. You cannot stop the illegal sale of alcohol if the only penalty for the crime is a fine. If each time a person convicted of the illegal sale or possession of alcohol is required to serve a jail term of sixty days or more, the liquor traffic will cease in Hockley County.

It is time for energetic, impartial, and effective enforcement of the law. I promise to pursue that task immediately upon being elected.

Wildcat Oil Well Now Drilling Near Ropes

You Are Urged to Vote Nov. 6th Election in Community Building

Each man and woman in the Ropes community is urged to vote on November 6th.

This is not a cut and dried election as it has been in the past. This time you have two sets of candidates to select your county and state officers from — Democrats and Republicans.

It is thought that in the election Tuesday the Republicans will show a strength that will have to be reckoned with in the future. In fact, it may have to be reckoned with this year, as we have a

couple of county races which are drawing a great deal of attention.

Mrs. Sycily Lattimore, Republican candidate for county judge, is said to be strong in some parts of the county, and Harold Phelan, candidate for county attorney, is attracting a great deal of attention.

Of course, no one can predict what will happen in an election, and especially in a county which has been predominately Democratic since it was organized, but there is

a chance that more folks will vote for Republicans than at any other time in the history of the county.

It is being pointed out that you can split the ticket. Vote for a Democrat for one office and a Republican for another. However, there is something else about splitting the ticket that should be known: Be sure you mark out all the names in all the columns that you do not intend to vote for, otherwise your ticket will be thrown out.

Drilling operations started this week on a wildcat oil well on the S. B. Berry farm, one mile west of Ropes. This is on the outer edge of the present field west of Ropes.

From the reports we have, there seems to be a good chance that a well will be developed.

Geological surveys made some years back showed the entire city of Ropes as being on top of a vast pool of oil. It is possible that this survey is correct and that the Berry well will strike this pool.

Work on this well will be watched with great interest.

I believe that the office of county school superintendent in Hockley County should be abolished. I have made a careful study of this project

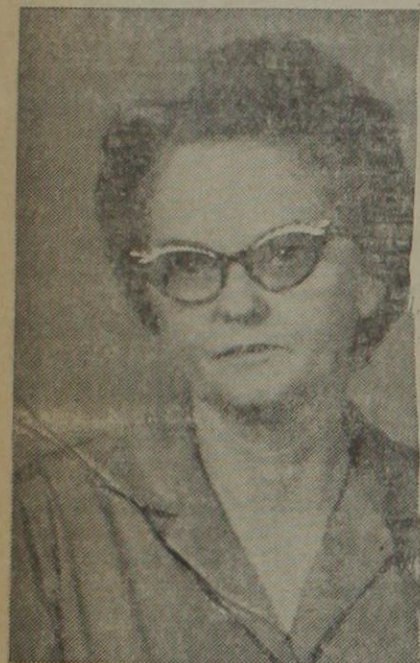

LUBBOCK - Representative George Mahon has returned to West Texas following the adjournment of Congress and reopened his Lubbock office. Mahon said that he would not remain in his Lubbock office regularly, but would visit about the 20-county Congressional District as much as possible.

In commenting on the recent Congressional session, Mahon said: "The International situation continues to be of major concern.

"The President under our constitution, not Congress, is responsible for the conduct of foreign affairs. Through the defense bill which I handle in the House, Congress has provided for a sharp increase in our military

strength. We are in a position of unquestioned military superiority and the President can deal from a position of strength," Mahon said.

Mahon noted that in hindsight the errors of former President Eisenhower and President Kennedy in handling the Cuban situation are obvious, but "the fixing of blame does not solve the problem.

"Congress did about all it could do in dealing with Cuba short of a declaration of war."

"Castro must be eliminated," said Mahon, "and I voted to authorize the President to use all necessary force, including the armed services, in dealing with Cuba."

The President has announced that he will not permit Cuba to become a dangerous military base, Mahon pointed out.

"I shall continue to do all I can toward a policy of strength and firmness in dealing with Cuba, Berlin and other trouble spots. Such a policy involves risks, but it is safer than a policy of weakness, Mahon pointed out.

The Trade bill which Congress passed was, according to Mahon, a necessary reaction of the U.S. to the European Common Market and it should be helpful to this heavy cotton exporting area.

Mahon said he had renewed his protest over the proposed 10 percent cut-back in the cotton allotment for next year. "It is my opinion," said Mahon, "that through legislation or otherwise, a way will be found early next year to prevent all or most of the decrease."

Mahon, without going into detail, said that in Congress this year he had continued his opposition to such proposals as federal aid to education, the federal medical care program, the Department of Urban Affairs.

"Major issues in the Congress were hard fought," Mahon said, "attesting to the vitality of the American system of government." He asserted that he had great faith in the strength and future of our country.
