## The South Swings Away From the Democratic Party

(An Editorial)

The solid South no longer exists—during a matter of almost a hundred years any Democrat could count on the solid South, but those days are over. The Democratic party which, at one time, was all out for State's Rights as advocated by Jefferson, has now swung to the other extreme, a king as their doctrine, centralized government as advocated by Madison and Hamilton.

Mr. Kennedy is not slow to state that he believes in centralization of government; that he believes the government in Washington should rule the states and, in short, that the people of the United States are no longer capable of governing themselves. What he advocates smacks of dictatorship, wherein the central government cracks the whip and the people jump; where in the actual fact of ruling is turned over to the president who dictates what should be said and what should not be done.

As an example, under such a government FBI agents would become the counterpart of the gestapo, and the home of the individual would no longer be free from search and seizure; freedom of speech, freedom of the press and freedom of religious worship could be nullified. As a matter of fact, the freedom of the individual to seek out his own path would no longer exist for, along with that and advocated by Kennedy, is the closed shop, which would give the labor unions power to tell any man or woman that he or she would have to belong to a certain union if they are to work and earn a living.

We ask you—is that freedom? If that is possible under the Constitution of the United States, it would also be possible to tell a people where they should live, what they should do, the wages to expect, and where to spend those wages. And, that would be possible, they could also tell you how, when and where to worship, what to say and how to say it.

Given those conditions, a government of the people and by the people would disappear from the face of the earth and the great common people would become but serfs—slaves to centralized government that would be swung hither and thither by the whims of one man—a dictatorship in every sense of the word—its almost reached that under the administration of Franklin D. Roosevelt.

Remember, in this election, you are not voting for Lyndon Johnson, but for an avowed Catholic, Jack Kennedy, to fill the White House, and to bring into the White House for the first time Catholic ideals; Catholic teachings, and a man who looks on the Pope as infallible.

And, get a load of this: John Kennedy, who promises integrated schools by 1963, does not send his children to public schools but to private schools where

## First Bale Is Ginned

On Tuesday of this week the first bale of 1960 was ginned in Ropes by the Ward Gin.

The cotton was brought in by the Means brothers and was gathered off fourteen acres of cotton. The snapped cotton weighed 1530 pounds and turned out a bale weighing 400 pounds.

Tuesday was the 6th of September, which made the first bale two days later than the first bale of last year, which was gathered by Ditch Sullivan and ginned by the Farm Center Gin on September 4.

The Ward Gin bought the Means bale, paying fifty cents a pound for the cotton, and donating the ginning.

We understand there may be several bales before the week is over as several farmers are said to be pulling.

## Second Bale Cotton Ginned

As we go to press Buster McNabb called in and told us he had ginned his first bale of cotton, gathered on his own farm. The cotton was ginned at Buster's gin at Busterville.

There was 2020 pounds of snapped cotton which turned out a 540 pound bale of cotton. This cotton was gathered from approximately twelve acres.

they will not have to rub elbows with the common people. And, those of you who have been crying Kennedy has an agricultural program, note: Mr. Kennedy is noted for his non-attendance of sessions in

Congress, but the few times he has been in the House when the roll was called he has voted against price supports for agriculture, viz, in 1952 he voted against support at 90 percent parity; in 1956 he did the same. In the same year he voted for a bill to require farmers to

put a portion of their land in the soil bank in order to receive price supports, and he voted to delete from a farm bill calling for return to 90 per cent parity. In 1959 he announced for a limit of \$35,000 price support loan to any person per year.

That is how Mr. Kennedy favors agriculture—his record is open for you to examine. In the first place, Kennedy has no more idea about the problems of agriculture than a dog has about Sunday; he has no more sympathy and understanding of the masses of the people in this nation than a cat has of a mouse it is about to devour.

And, to give you some idea of how Kennedy thinks he would, by law, make it impossible for a man to get a job unless he belonged to a union—that smacks of Communism, where you belong to the party or starve. Better think about these things—it is your neck they are fixing to wring.

**Freedom in Truth**

"Ye shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free"

Jno. 8:32

The church in Thessalonica was concerned about the immediate return of the Lord. The apostle Paul wrote them, "it will not be, except the falling away come first, and the man of sin be revealed, the son of perdition, he that opposeth and exalteth himself against all that is called God or that is worshipped; so that he sitteth in the temple of God, setting himself forth as God". II Thess. 2:3-4. Paul taught Christ would not return until there had been a falling away from God. In this falling away "a man of sin" . . . a man of transgression of God's will, would arise. This "man of sin" would oppose God — exalt himself against God — he would sit in God's temple (the church) and set himself forth as God. Paul, in writing to Timothy, states more of the power of this

"man of sin". He states "that in later times some shall fall away from the faith, giving heed to seducing spirits and doctrines of demons . . . forbidding to marry, and commanding to abstain from meats, which God created to be received with thanksgiving by them that believe and know the truth. For every creature of God is good, and nothing is to be rejected. . . ." I Tim. 4:1-5. To all who are acquainted with religious history, it is not difficult to understand who Paul was writing about—the "man of sin, or the Pope of the Catholic church". PROOF: (1) The Pope was declared infallible in 1870 — "setting himself forth as God". (2) Celibacy—forbidding to marry, established in 1015. This is in direct opposition to what God has commanded . . . man should marry. This is enough evidence to cause all of us to THINK on these things.
