First steps to attack the drouth problem in Texas were taken by the Senate Conservation Committee on Tuesday when it recommended passage of the \$200,000,000 water financial aid bill.

The bill would work in hand with a constitutional amendment allowing the state to issue bonds. It would loan money to local communities, which would use it for constructing reservoirs.

Other action by the 55th Legislature continued smoothly and rapidly, as the House and Senate alike kept one attentive eye on the upcoming election of a U. S. Senator.

A strong drive has been underway in the House to force a run-off in the April 2 election for the U. S. Senate position now held by William Blakley, of Dallas.

Old-timers here in the capitol are still wondering when all the fireworks will break loose on segregation questions.

Finance subcommittees in both the Senate and the House continued to hack away at their assignments during this week. They moved on schedule through the long series of public hearings that must be held before the \$100 million spending bill can be put into final shape.

Senate and House members joined in Gov. Daniel's pledge to support constitutional amendments which would allow the use of state funds to advertise the advantages of Texas.

At present, the Texas constitution prohibits the use of state funds for advertising to lure new business and industry and more tourists to Texas.

UNTAGGED DOGS TO BE KILLED . . . DOCTOR HERE MONDAY NITE

Mayor Gene Pierce stated Tuesday night, in a regular meeting of the City Council, that after Monday night of next week all untagged dogs will be shot.

"A doctor," said the Mayor, "will be here Monday night of next week, for the purpose of vaccinating dogs against rabies. After giving the shots he will furnish a tag which can be put on the dog's collar. Dogs found without these tags will be killed."

"This step is brought about by the fact that we have a large surplus of dogs, and also that rabies are breaking out over the state."

At this meeting a city election was ordered to be held on April 2nd for the purpose of electing aldermen to the city council. At that time the terms of three aldermen expire:

Clyde Loveless, place no. 4; Sid Price, place no. 3; and Everett Wallace, place no. 2. Wallace is serving out the unexpired term of Walt Fraley, who resigned from the council some months ago.

THURSDAY'S MEETINGS GROW IN IMPORTANCE

New changes make the information meeting more important than ever for young men who are over 18½ years of age. Up until a very few days ago, a man must be between the ages of 17 and 18½ years of age to take advantage of the six months active duty period in military service. Now, older men may take advantage of this, but it must be before they are ordered to report by the Draft Board. Draftees will still have to serve two years on active duty, plus reserve after active service.

A full explanation will be given at the Ropes High School auditorium on Thursday, February 7, 1957, at 7:30 p.m. Members of the regular army, and air force will be present to give the information, and answer any questions any interested persons may have.

Young men above 16, and their parents are especially urged to attend. The meeting is open to all, and is intended to give up-to-the-minute information as to obligations and opportunities for men who are of military age, or who are approaching military age.

Voting will be in the City Hall with Mrs. Bob Whitlock judge of the election, and Gert Brown and Mrs. Tyree Martin assisting.

It was also ordered at this meeting that all permits in the future for the building of new houses or for moving in a building would have to be referred to the City Council. The zoning ordinance of the City of Ropes require a permit for all buildings and moving in of any type of house.

Another item brought before the Council was the fact that in several places two houses or two business places are tied onto the city water system through one meter. In these instances, in the future, each place being served will have to pay the minimum charge of \$2 per month.

It was stated that in cases of this kind the City was losing the minimum charge, and that to keep the water system going it is necessary that all users pay the minimum charge. Where there are two users, 6,000 gallons of water will be allowed instead of 3,000 gallons.

Mayor Pierce pointed out that this would save the users the expense of laying new pipe and also save the City the expense of installing meters at this time.

However, in the future no two places will be permitted to tie onto the same meter.

**JUNIOR COLLEGE AT
LEVELLAND APPROVED
BY EDUCATION BOARD**

AUSTIN—The State Board of Education approved on February 2 plans for a new junior college district in Hockley County at Levelland.

Actual establishment of the college is dependent on an election to be called in the county.

If finally approved by Hockley County voters, the college will be the 32nd public school junior college in the state and the first approved in 10 years.

The last junior colleges authorized were at Carthage and Alvin in 1947.

The board said also it was reconsidering its recommendation to the Legislature that school districts having fewer than 500 average students, except in sparsely settled districts, be declared "inactive school districts". Board members said that particular attention was being given to whether 500 or some other figure should be used as a criterion for an adequate school district.

The board approved a state plan for the extension and improvement of practical nurse training which will be submitted to the U. S. Office of Education. Under a 1956 congressional act on allotment of \$99,608 was made to Texas for widening and improving practical nurse training.

The board invested \$2,497,000 in bonds purchased for

the permanent school fund, which now totals \$346,322,297.

In Levelland, Orlin Brewer, chairman of the committee which has been working toward establishment of the junior college there, said it is hoped that an election can be called soon to determine whether residents of the county want to form the junior college district.

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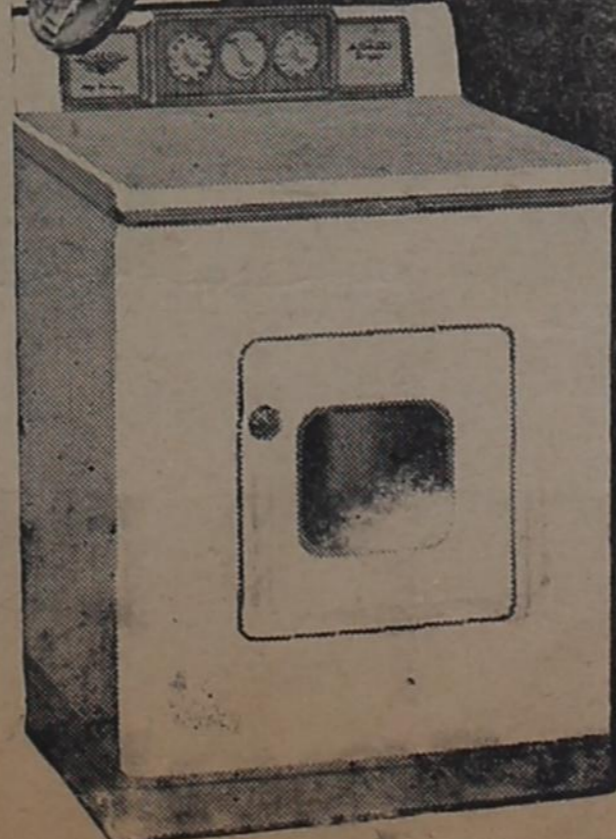
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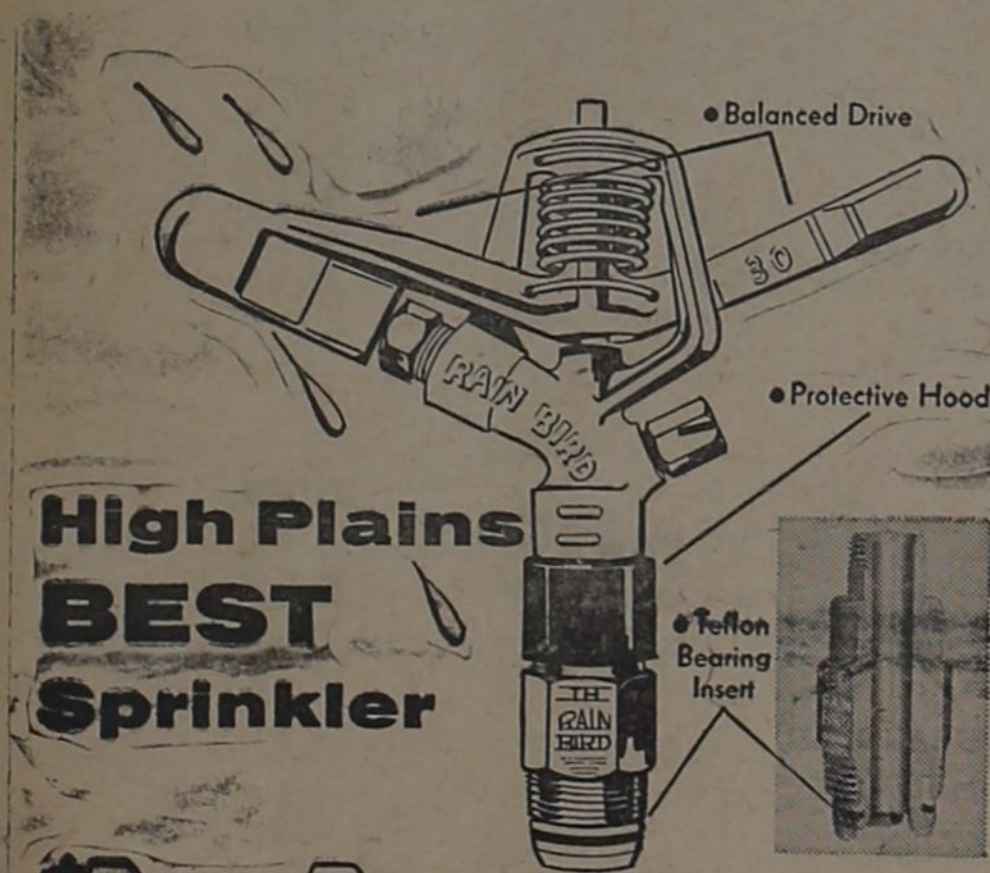
