(Editor's Note—Since John Kennedy was nominated as a candidate for the presidency of the United States, we have been asked by numerous people why a Catholic would not make a good president. In attempting to answer this, below is the first of a series of articles that will appear in the Plainsman from time to time between now and the General Election.)

Since Senator John F. Kennedy has been nominated as the Democrats' choice for the presidential election in November, there has been much protest. Many have stated they will not vote for a Roman Catholic for President of the United States. I have been requested to state some of the reasons why we cannot vote for a Catholic to be head of the nation.

First, let me say we do not oppose the Catholic Church because of its religious convictions. In this country of ours the Catholics have as much right to believe and worship as anyone else. We would fight for their right to worship as they feel they want to.

We oppose a Catholic being president because of the political influences and aspirations of the Catholic hierarchy. We recognize the fact that no man can be loyal to the United States and to the Vatican State at the same time.

The Vatican State is a political government. The Head of the Vatican State, who claims to be infallible when he speaks officially has said of the Catholic Church, which cannot be separated from the Vatican State:

She (the Catholic Church) has the right to exercise her power without permission or consent of the state.

She has the right to employ force.

She has the right to deprive the civil authority of the entire government of public schools.

She has the right to require that the Catholic religion shall be the only religion of the state, to the exclusion of all others.

She has the right to prevent the state from granting the public exercise of their own worship to persons immigrating into it. (Pope Pius IX Syllabus of Errors).

After reading the above you can see that the Catholic church has power to influence state officials.

Now let me give you one more quotation. The "Catholic Principles of Politics" by Msgr. John R. Ryan and Fr. Francis J. Boland (1958 edition) teaches,

"The state should officially recognize the Catholic religion as the religion of the commonwealth". . . that the Protestant religion is 'false doctrine' . . . and that "Since no rational end is promoted by the dissemination of false doctrine, there exists no right to indulge in this practise. . . Error has not the same right as truth."

These statements are from Catholic writers and gives their teaching concerning the influence the Catholic church would have over our government. They not only preach this doctrine but they practise it. Study the spiritual

life in Italy and Spain, and the town of Aprilla, south of many other countries where Rome. They began a gospel meeting. The first night the Catholic church is strong. From the above quotations we have learned the Catholic church covets to control the government and is intolerant toward other religions. Let me give you further evidence of this. On May 19, 1960 the New York Times quotes from the Vatican newspaper Osservatore Romano, "the Roman hierarchy has the right and the duty to intervene in the political field to guide its flock." The paper made it clear that its stern pronouncement was valid for Roman Catholics everywhere. It deplored "the great confusion of ideas that is spreading, especially in some nations and also among Catholics, with regard to the relations between Catholic doctrine and social and political activities and between the ecclesiastical hierarchy and the lay faithful in the civil field."

Since the Catholic hierarchy has the right to intervene in the political field, it can control the man in the President's chair, or the senate or house of Representatives.

Some of our friends may contend, Mr. Kennedy has said he would not be influenced by any one in making his own decisions. It is difficult for us to hear Mr. Kennedy for remembering what he has done.

In an AP article, headed New York, Dec. 5, we have the record of a banquet to be held on the Temple University campus in Philadelphia for the purpose of memorializing the four chaplains, two Protestants, a Catholic and a Jew, who joined arms in prayer as they went down on the U.S.S. Dorchester in World War II. Mr. John Kennedy was invited to speak, and "graciously accepted". Two days before the banquet Mr. Kennedy telephoned from Washington, and said "he would have to cancel his appearance", that Cardinal Dougherty had asked him not to take part. He was informed the banquet was a civic occasion, that all faiths were participating, and they were meeting in a hotel. "The Congressman replied that he understood all this and that he had done every thing he could to change the Cardinal's position."

From this you can see that the Senator DID submit to the church authority that was exercised over him. Mr. Kennedy is between a rock and a hard place if he gets to be President. If he submits to the voice of the Catholic hierarchy he will not be a good President. If he does not, he will not be a good Catholic. Judging the future by the past, we are fearful he will listen to the voice from Rome, instead of the voice of the Constitution. I shall now cite briefly three examples of the attitude of the Catholic church toward other religions, in Catholic dominated countries.

(1) A few nights ago I heard a preacher speak who spent about four years in Italy. About five years ago he and two other preachers went to

place where they were meeting was filled with interested people, and many standing on the outside. One of the preachers began to preach. He had only talked a short while when about fifteen half-drunken ruffians entered the building, set off "stink bombs"; the light wires were cut and the building placed in darkness. Then they began to throw rock through the windows. The windows were broken and the people fled. The three preachers had to be protected by two policemen in order to get home. Similar instances could be multiplied in Catholic controlled Italy.

(2) Dr. Ramsey Pollard, President of the Southern Baptist Convention, on May 19, 1960, stated in an address before the Convention in Miami, Florida, "that in his recent trip to Spain he has seen thirty Baptist and other Protestant churches in Madrid padlocked because of the alliance between the Roman Catholic church and the Spanish Government." As you read this just remember that about a year ago a Spanish Catholic Mission was opened in Ropes. There was no one that tried to break up their meeting. I forgot to mention that the ruffians I spoke of in Italy were led by "the men of cloth". We are thankful for the freedom we have today to worship as we please, but if we continue to let our government become dominated by Catholic influence our grandchildren and great grandchildren may not enjoy the freedom we do. (3) I now quote an article taken from the Amarillo, Texas Register, Catholic Weekly, Official Newspaper of the Catholic Diocese of Amarillo Sept. 19, 1952: "Here in West Texas, which has a minority of Catholics, the church of Christ can hire an ex-priest to talk about the Catholic church and get away with it. But the same can not be said of Catholic Italy. Thumb your nose at the Holy Father in Italy and you are liable to get your head bashed in. If the Church of Christ missionaries, mostly sponsored by the Church of Christ in Brownfield, Texas, in this diocese, had any Texas horse sense at all, they would fold up their tents and quietly steal away before the Italians really get mad."

Good people, judging the history of the Catholic church since the year of about 606 A.D., we are fearful of what will happen in the United States if our government is controlled by men of the Catholic faith. It is not the individual we are afraid of by the Roman Hierarchy. Putting a Catholic in the President's chair, the Senate or House of Representatives is a step toward a loss of our freedoms.

A report Wednesday morning states he is no better but is holding his own.

Kelly has hundreds of friends in the Ropes community who are hoping for his rapid return to normal health.

RAINS SWEEP THE SOUTH PLAINS

What was termed a surprise storm—it was neither sighted nor predicted by the weather bureau—struck the South Plains Sunday night.

To the north, around Littlefield and Plainview, there was a deluge of rain, and some highways closed because of high water.

In Ropes there was four-tenths of an inch, while on the Lockettville Farms there was seven-tenths of an inch of rain. Going by the figures kept at the Farms, this makes 23.05 inches of moisture that has fallen since the first of the year. It tops 1959 by more than seven inches, with the total last year being 15.10. While there was wind with the rain, it was stated little or no damage was done to the growing crops.

In the section starting at the Bill Foster General Store, four miles west, and to the north and northwest, the downfall ranged from a half-inch to nearly an inch in spots.

In the neighborhood of N. G. Ryals grocery store at Busterville and the Bill Patman and Alvin Ryals places, the moisture ranged to three-fourths of an inch. Coming in ahead of this rain was a heavy sandstorm which for a time cut visibility to zero. The Ropes section seemed to be just in the edge of this storm.

While the Ropes territory did not have rain on Monday afternoon, a heavy thunderstorm south of Brownfield slung marble size hail stones at the crops, and according to reports, beat them into the ground.

For, perhaps, the first time in the history of Hockley County, names of candidates for local office will appear in the Independent column on the general election ballot.

This was brought about when Mrs. Grace Clingan the incumbent, married and resigned, and it was decided to fill the post by election. At first it was thought that the names of the candidates would have to be written in but, a ruling from the Attorney General, received this week by County Judge Louis Owens, stated that the candidates could have their names placed on the ballot in the independent column if they would present a petition with five percent of the number of voters in the last election. In this instance, the number is 85. The petitions have to be in the hands of Judge Owens by the 15th of August.

Already, Raymond Dennis and Myron Fietz, two candidates seeking the office, are passing petitions among the voters.

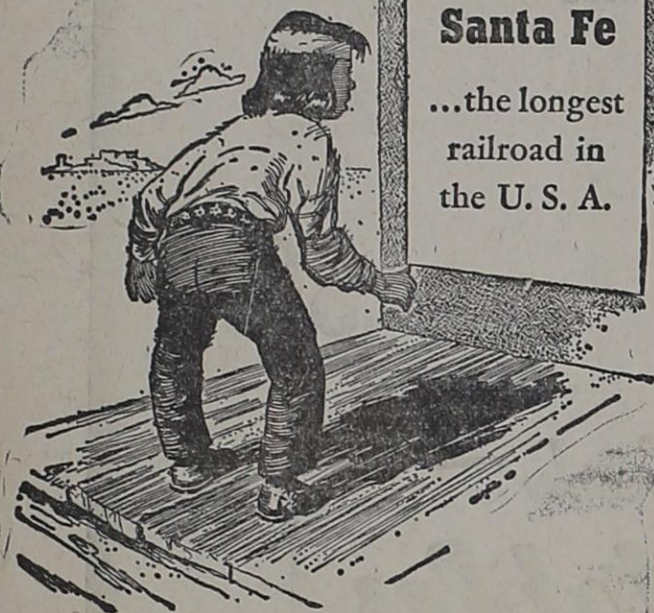
Needle Club News

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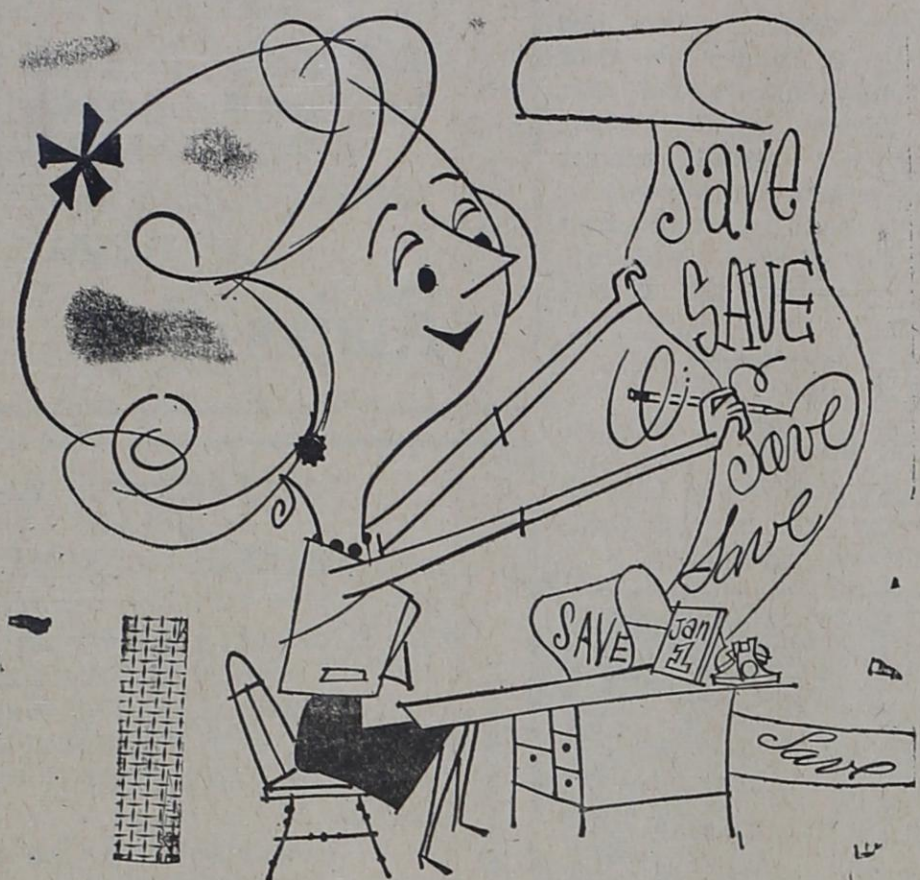
