ELECT DON HANCOCK YOUR STATE SENATOR

An Editorial

It is seldom the Plainsman takes sides in politics, but we have a feeling we should say a few words concerning the race for State Senate.

We want to point out to the people of the Ropes community that but two candidates for this office have made announcements through the Plainsman—the rest have completely ignored the community with the thought, perhaps, that the vote here and the people living here do not count.

We want you to note that Don Hancock, democrat, and county judge of Yoakum County, has through the Plainsman asked for the support of the people of this community. Don Hancock is not only qualified, but he realizes the importance of the smaller communities of his district. Don Hancock is not connected with a big city political machine who hopes to steam roller their candidates into office by the overwhelming vote in the metropolis—he is close to the grass roots and his interest is for the whole and not the chosen few. Don is making the race to serve the people and not special interests.

The other candidate announced here is a Republican—we recommend him to the Republicans, if there be any in the community.

It is our studied opinion that we do not need a man in office who does not try, at least, to let the people know he is in the race for public office. It is true they will buy time on television and radio, in Lubbock, and thru these mediums they are seeking the Lubbock vote. The only voice of the community in such places as Ropesville, is the newspaper, and candidates actually wishing for the support of the smaller communities use this medium to tell the people they want to serve them.

Don Hancock is the only Democrat that has shown an interest in this community.

Don Hancock by education and experience is fitted to serve this district—he will go into office without strings attached—he lives in a small town and hence knows the problems of small towns, and they will receive the same consideration as the larger towns. In fact the whole of Hockley county will be better represented than if a man from a large city is elected to serve in the State Senate.

We want you to think about this. We are calling it to your attention—we're not telling you how to vote, but stating what we honestly believe—and we believe Don Hancock is the man for the senate. We'll state further Don Hancock has not paid us to write this—he doesn't even know that we favor his candidacy—but we're for him one hundred percent.

In the race for Governor we lean toward Marshal Formby. We don't know what chance Marshal has of being elected, but we think that in as much as he is a West Texas man West Texas would

EASTER

Easter is a season of hope. It is a season of budding life. The greenery of leaves and buds begins to take the place of the deadness which has covered the face of nature through the winter. On Easter Sunday throngs will come out in their finery, there will be the feeling of newness, hope, and life. Churches will be filled, triumphant songs will be sung, and sermons on victory and hope will be delivered. All of this is illustrative of that great event which has inspired more courage and hope in human hearts than any other event in earth's troubled history, the resurrection of Jesus Christ.

It can be truthfully said that our generation faces a more uncertain future than any generation of the past. Liberty and freedom seem to be passing away to be replaced by the chains of atheistic oppression which now bind over one half of the people on the earth. Atomic and hydrogen weapons could annihilate millions and destroy our civilization are held in readiness to be hurled toward their targets at a second's notice. Crime and immorality sweep our nation like a flood and threatens to reach uncontrollable proportions.

Is there a faith for our times? Can the youth of this day have hope for the future? Is there a foundation for faith and hope? There is, and may we realize it anew during this Easter season. The real basis for this faith and hope is the resurrection of Jesus Christ. The Bible teaches that we may be, "... begotten again unto a lively hope by the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead." 1 Peter 1:3. The Bible also states that, "... He (God) hath given assurance unto all men, in that He raised Him (Jesus Christ) from the dead." Acts 17:31.

There was never an enterprise which seemed more completely at an end than did that of Jesus on the last Old Testament Sabbath. Christianity died with Christ, and was laid with Him in the sepulcher. When He was buried there was not a single human being that believed He would ever rise again.

The breakdown of the disciples was complete. When he was arrested "they forsook him and fled." Jesus had foretold His death and resurrection, but they had never understood His sayings. They forgot them and gave them an allegorical turn which after His death, yielded them no comfort whatever. The women came to the tomb on the first day of the week, not to see it empty, but to embalm His body for its long sleep. When the disciples met together "they mourned and wept." There never were men more utterly disappointed and dispirited.

How is it that in a few days these very men were full of confidence and joy, their faith in Jesus had revived, and Christianity had a far greater vitality than ever before? The disciples said that the reason was that Jesus had risen and that they had seen Him. Were their stories of the resurrection credible? They might not be if they stood alone. But their reports of the resurrection were accompanied by the indisputable resurrection of Christianity. And how is the latter to be accounted for except by the former? The influence of this event has affected every generation down to this day and will continue to do so.

There are three ways in which posterity may be affected. The influence of great teachers has had its effect through the centuries. The influence of example has swayed millions. The third, and more far reaching is the effect of continued life. It is through the power of His continued, resurrected life that Jesus Christ has influenced more lives than all other leaders and teachers combined.

God grant that this continued life of the living Christ may inspire new hope and courage in us. In a world environment of despair, fear, and the threat of destruction may the Spirit of Christ renew a lively hope for the future.

YOUNG FARMERS TO MEET TONIGHT

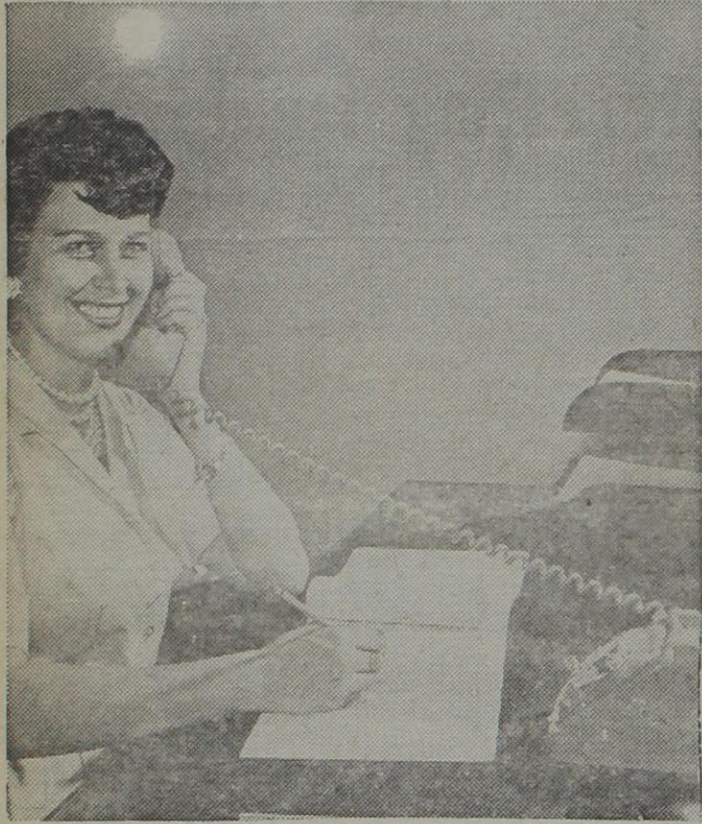
The Young Farmers are to meet tonight (Thursday) to see if enough young men want to organize a Young Farmer Chapter at Ropes.

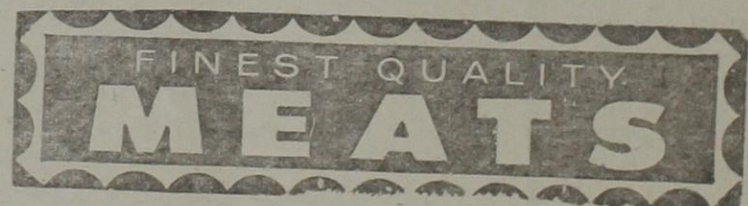

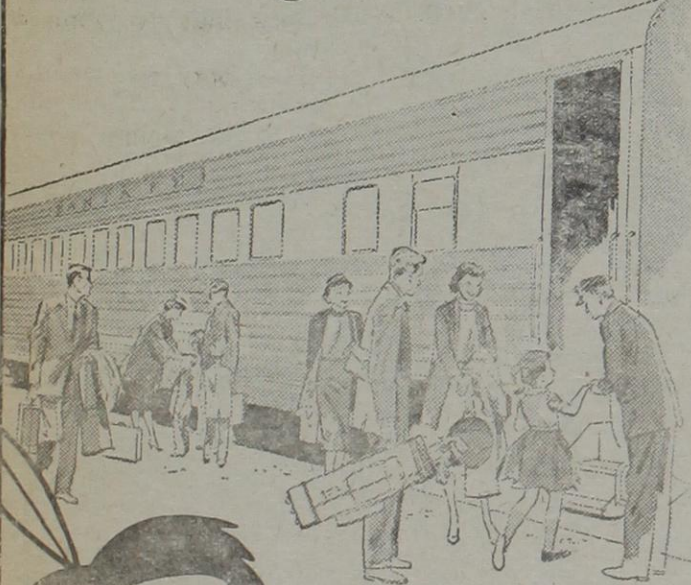

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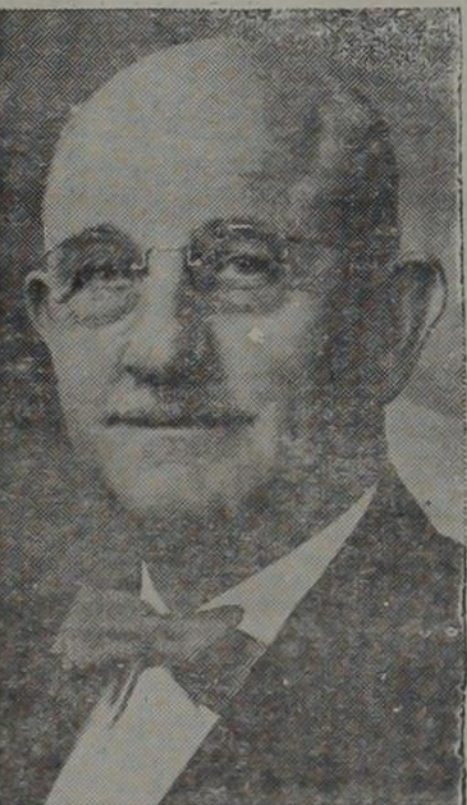
