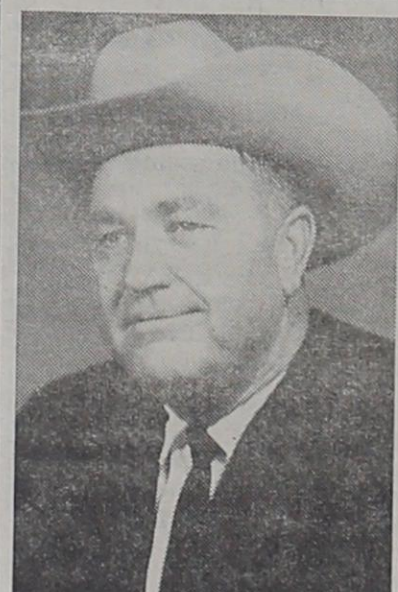

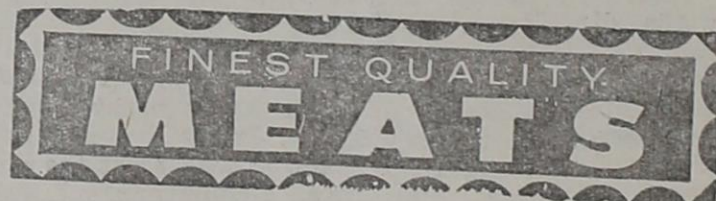

TEXAS DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC SAFETY

Region No. 5, Lubbock

Motor vehicle inspections are lagging behind with less than thirty per cent of the required vehicles in Region 5 displaying a 1964 inspection sticker, according to Captain Alan Johnson, Motor Vehicle Inspection supervisor of this area for the Texas Department of Public Safety.

"With the deadline for obtaining inspection stickers drawing near only 30 percent of the vehicle in Hockley County have been inspected," the Captain said. "If this trend continues, vehicle owners can expect to have to wait in line in order to get their vehicles inspected by the April 15 deadline."

Some 5,000 official inspection stations over the state are ready and capable of handling the inspection of Texas registered vehicles with no delay if owners will not wait until just before the deadline.

DRY AS A BONE

While floods and tornadoes are raking the eastern part of the United States, the South Plains remains as dry as a bone—and, if there is anything we need right now it is moisture.

The weather for the most part is springlike with an occasional norther, such as the recent one which left a trace of snow, but not enough to be counted.

FILING REQUIREMENTS

A Federal income tax return must be filed by every citizen or resident of the United States, including minor children, who had gross income of \$600 or more in 1963. Ellis Campbell, Jr., Director of Internal Revenue for the Dallas District, reminded today.

A taxpayer who is 65 or over is not required to file unless his gross income in 1963 was at least \$1,200, Mr. Campbell said.

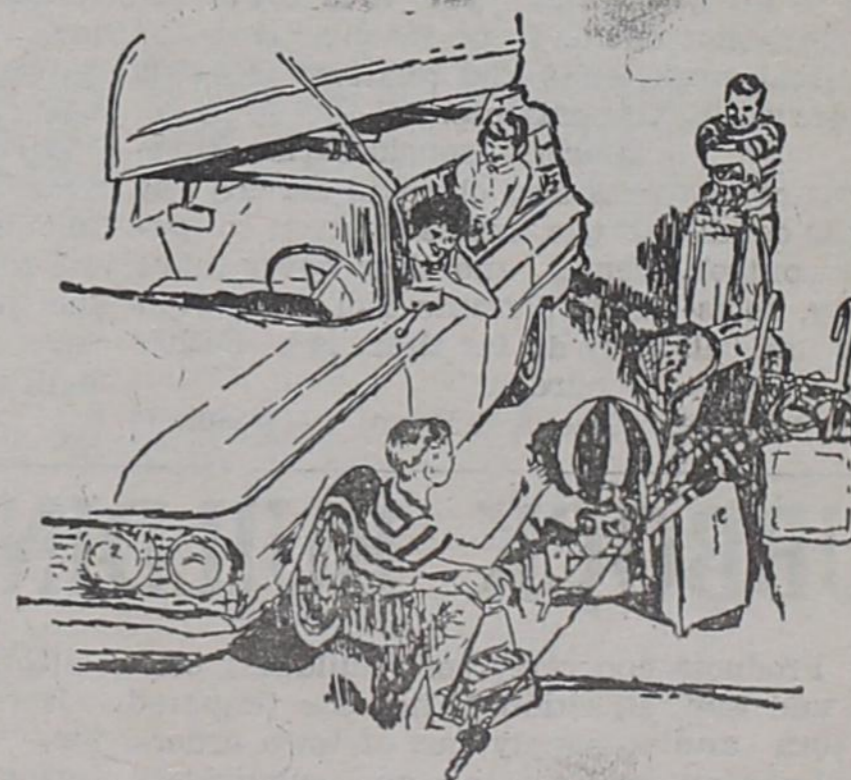
