Lot moved his tent as far as Sodom (Gen. 13:12) The old version says "LOT PITCHED HIS TENT TOWARD SODOM". Lot had traveled with his Uncle Abram, he was a good man, but he made a wrong choice. Was it wrong to choose? Certainly not. The greatest gift to all humanity is the free will to choose. There comes to you and me every day and every hour, yes each moment, when we must make a choice on things and conditions that govern our lives. That is the dignity of the human life, if it were not so the romance of life would not be there. Yes, we must choose, but our choice should not be selfish as Lot's. ## FALL DRAFT CALL

Austin - If draft calls remain high, Texas draft board will be inducting a 'considerable number of 19-year-olds' by fall, Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service director, said Wednesday.

'We will induct mostly 21-year-olds in August,' Colonel Schwartz said. 'Those we'll examine in September for future induction will be mostly 20 years old.'

By October, he predicted, 'we will be examining a considerable number of 19-year-olds. If calls remain high, we'll be inducting them soon after. We likely will be ordering a few 19-year-olds in September.'

The forecast followed receipt of an amended September quota for Texas of 1,459 men and an estimated October call of 1,780. Recent monthly quotas have been around 700 to 900.

The state draft director said that the 'declining age of involuntary induction during recent months has focused increased attention upon the classification of college students.'

He said draft boards were advised the day after President Johnson told of doubling of the draft that, when they question a student's progress, they should request him to supply additional information to support continued deferment.

Colonel Schwartz also announced that local boards were instructed to mail current information questionnaires to all married men - 9 to 26 years old who have no children, except in cases where current information is in the files. This action was also taken the day after the

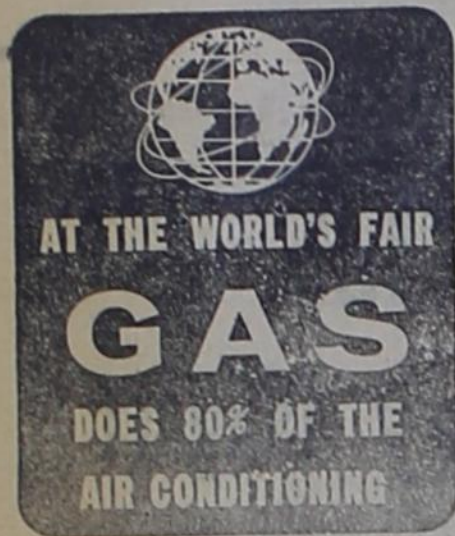

Infant deaths are rising in a number of Texas cities. Although infant mortality rates declined in the nation as a whole in the decade of 1950-1960, they rose in 7 of 10 of the nation's largest cities—including two in Texas. Rates also have risen recently in a number of other Texas cities, says Patsy Reynold, Extension family life education specialist at Texas A & M University. While there are many causes, a major factor is lack of good prenatal care for the expectant mother. All mothers—especially teen age girls—need to understand how necessary this care is to the health and very life of their babies, she emphasized.

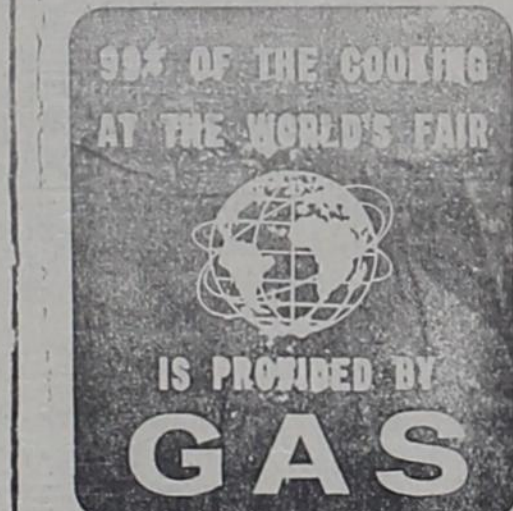

Create A Cheese-Cream Cobbler



Cobblers confined to desserts only? Why, of course not. Here's a robust main course one developed by the Borden Kitchen: Classic corn bread made with buttermilk is topped with a creamy mixture of shredded American cheese and sour cream. All are such welcome and needed foods when a meatless meal is desired. To kindle real interest in eating, prepare a fresh vegetable accompaniment—cucumber slices, celery, carrot sticks and curls. Or pair with pan-fried or broiled fish.

- Main Course Cobbler (Makes 6 generous servings)
- 1 cup flour, sifted
  - 2 teaspoons baking powder
  - 1/2 teaspoon baking soda
  - 1/4 cup sugar
  - 3/4 teaspoon salt
  - 1 cup yellow corn meal
  - 1 tablespoon dehydrated instant minced onions
  - 2 eggs
  - 1 cup buttermilk
  - 1/4 cup soft shortening
  - 1-1/2 cups (8-slice 6-oz. pkg.) Vera-Sharp pasteurized process American cheese, shredded
  - 1 cup sour cream

Into a medium-size bowl, sift flour, baking powder, soda, sugar and salt. Stir in corn meal and onions. Add eggs, buttermilk and shortening; beat with rotary beater about 1 minute. Do not overbeat. Pour mixture into well-buttered 9 x 9 x 2-inch pan. In small mixing bowl, combine shredded cheese and sour cream; mix well. Drop by tablespoonsful over top of corn bread batter. Bake in hot (400° F.) oven about 25 minutes, or until firm.

Clock-Watchers' Casserole



Who wouldn't be willing to take pot luck with attractive Tuna Almondine? No one, not even the cook. The Borden Kitchen certainly had career girls and working wives in mind when it starred tuna in this casserole. If sauce and noodles are cooked ahead, it takes a scant 30 minutes to do the combining—generous chunks of tuna with olives, slivered almonds, nonfat dry milk and very sharp cheese slices. Bake until sauce bubbles and top's lightly browned. Top, if you like, with almond halves, so texture as well as taste's intriguing. Complement with a crisp green salad and hot rolls made from ready-to-bake packaged dough, spread with plenty of sweet Danish-style margarine.

- Tuna Almondine (Makes 6 servings)
- 4 cups cooked noodles (one 8-oz. package medium egg noodles)
  - 3 tablespoons butter
  - 3 tablespoons flour
  - 1 teaspoon salt
  - 1/2 teaspoon pepper
  - 2 cups liquefied Starlac nonfat dry milk
  - 1 (6-oz.) package Vera-Sharp cheese slices, cut into strips
  - 1/2 cup sliced pimento-stuffed olives
  - 1/2 cup toasted, slivered almonds
  - 2 (7-1/2 oz.) cans flaked tuna fish, well-drained

Cook noodles according to package directions. Drain. In a small saucepan, melt butter over low heat. Stir in flour, salt and pepper until well blended. Remove from heat. Gradually stir in nonfat milk and return to heat. Cook over low heat; stir constantly until mixture becomes thick and smooth. Add cheese strips; stir until melted. Stir in olives, almonds and tuna fish. Turn into a well-buttered 1-1/2 - 2 quart casserole. Bake in a moderate (350° F.) oven about 20-25 minutes, or until sauce is bubbly and top is lightly browned. If desired, garnish with almond halves.

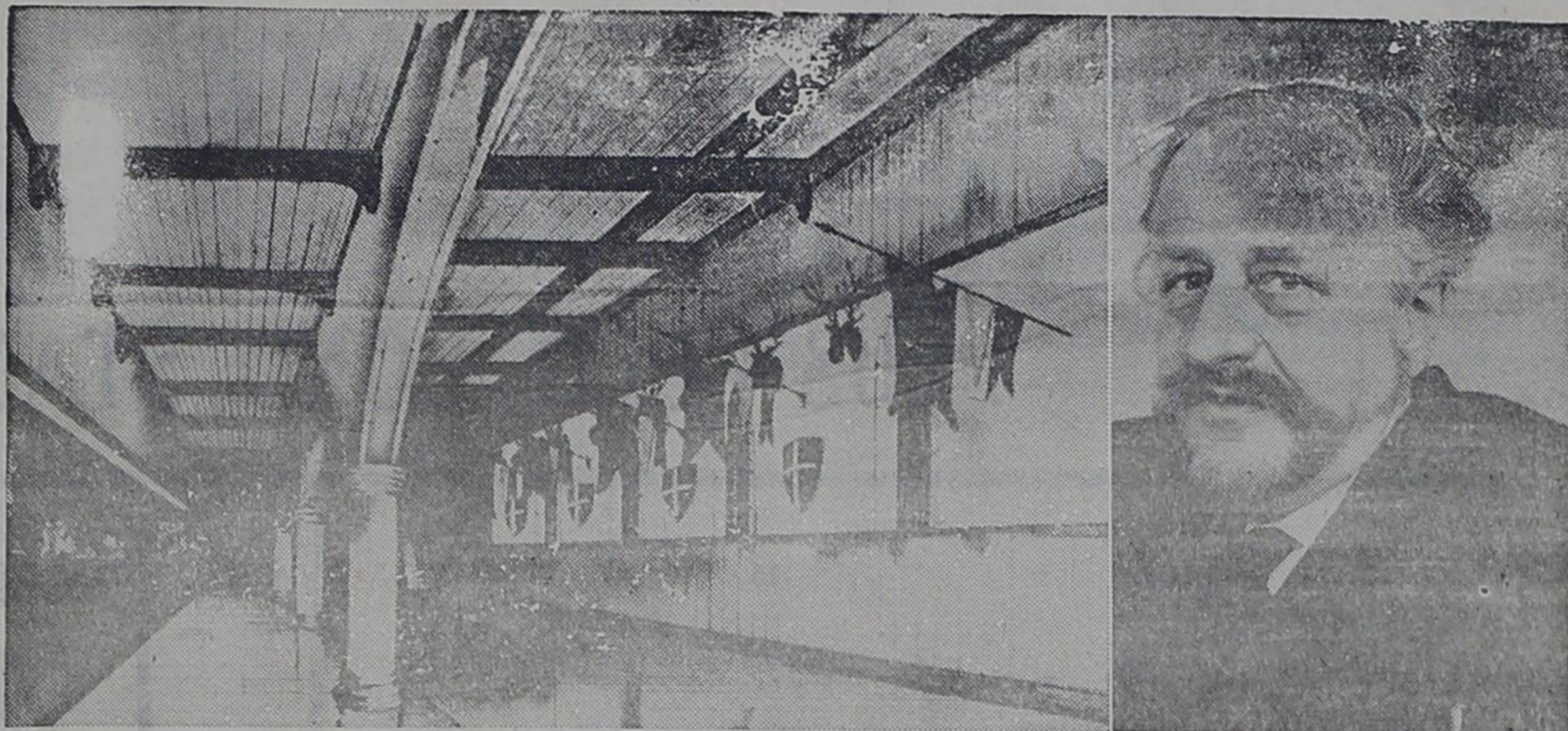
