## Atkisson Replies

### To J. Cordell

In the August 11 issue of the Plainsman, there was a reply to an article I had written "Why We Oppose A Roman Catholic for President of the U. S." This reply was signed by J. Ronald Cordell, Odessa, Tex. Many have asked me to reply to Mr. Cordell's letter.

First, I want to commend Mr. Cordell for writing and expressing his desires and belief. We admire any individual, however wrong they may be, for standing up for their convictions. I also want to thank Mr. Morris for printing Mr. Cordell's reply. Controversy is a good thing: it will bring out facts and condition on both sides of an issue. By doing this, people can weigh the facts and conditions in the light of truth and human welfare and make honest decisions.

I presented nothing but facts in my first article, concerning the power and influence of the Catholic church. I am prepared to add a multitude of others at the proper time. We know a tree by its fruit. That is the reason we are concerned about the future of the United States, if we elect Catholics to be our law-makers and national leaders.

Mr. Cordell stated in the first paragraph of his letter, that if I truly believed what I was saying I had nothing to fear, but if I doubted God would look down on me. If I had been in doubt I never would have written a single line. Judging the future by the past and also what is happening in Catholic controlled countries today, we know what will happen in the U. S. if men of Catholic faith gain control.

Mr. Cordell said the Catholic church would not oppose me from the pulpit. I wonder when the Catholic Priests have changed their ways? I have an abundance of evidence that the Catholics are opposing Protestants in the pulpit and in the press. I refer Mr. Cordell to my first article and the remarks of the Catholic priest taken from the Amarillo, Texas, Register, Catholic Weekly. The Catholic hierarchy has always opposed any and everyone that was pro-Catholic. There is no evidence they have ceased. Mr. Cordell presents a question, "What would God do if He were posed with the prospect of a Catholic president for the United States?" It is not for me to say what God will do, it is a question before the American people, "What are we going to do? Guided by the teaching of God's word with respect to the freedom for all men and the principles of the Constitution of the United States, we as a free people, better stand up and be counted, or the time will come when we will have no voice to lift in protest to church - controlled government.

In his letter, Mr. Cordell states, "The Roman Catholic Church is a Church of God and will call upon God for defense against ridicule." I have been studying the Bible for many years and this is news to me that the Roman Catholic Church is "a church of God". Not one time is the Catholic church mentioned in the Bible, even the Catholic Bible. There are a very few of the Catholic doctrines that are even in harmony with the teaching of Christ. We urge this man to study his Bible more carefully. He states again, that all that I say Turn to Page 2

**Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT**

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1960.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 6 proposing an Amendment to Section 11, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, so as to give the Legislature authority to classify loans and lenders, license and regulate lenders, define interest, fix maximum rates of interest, and provide for the right of appeal and trial de novo in the event any regulatory agency cancels or refuses to grant any permit; providing for the necessary election and the form of the ballot; and providing for the necessary proclamation and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 11, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 11. The Legislature shall have authority to classify loans and lenders, license and regulate lenders, define interest and fix maximum rates of interest; provided, however, in the absence of legislation fixing maximum rates of interest all contracts for a greater rate of interest than ten per centum (10%) per annum shall be deemed usurious; provided, further, that in contracts where no rate of interest is agreed upon, the rate shall not exceed six per centum (6%) per annum. Should any regulatory agency, acting under the provisions of this Section, cancel or refuse to grant any permit under any law passed by the Legislature; then such applicant or holder shall have the right of appeal to the courts and granted a trial de novo as that term is used in appealing from the justice of peace court to the county court."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday, in November, 1960, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment giving the Legislature authority to classify loans and lenders, license and regulate lenders, define interest and fix maximum rates of interest; and providing for a maximum rate of interest of ten per centum (10%) per annum in the absence of legislation fixing maximum rates of interest."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment giving the Legislature authority to classify loans and lenders, license and regulate lenders, define interest and fix maximum rates of interest; and providing for a maximum rate of interest of ten per centum (10%) per annum in the absence of legislation fixing maximum rates of interest."

Section 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for the said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

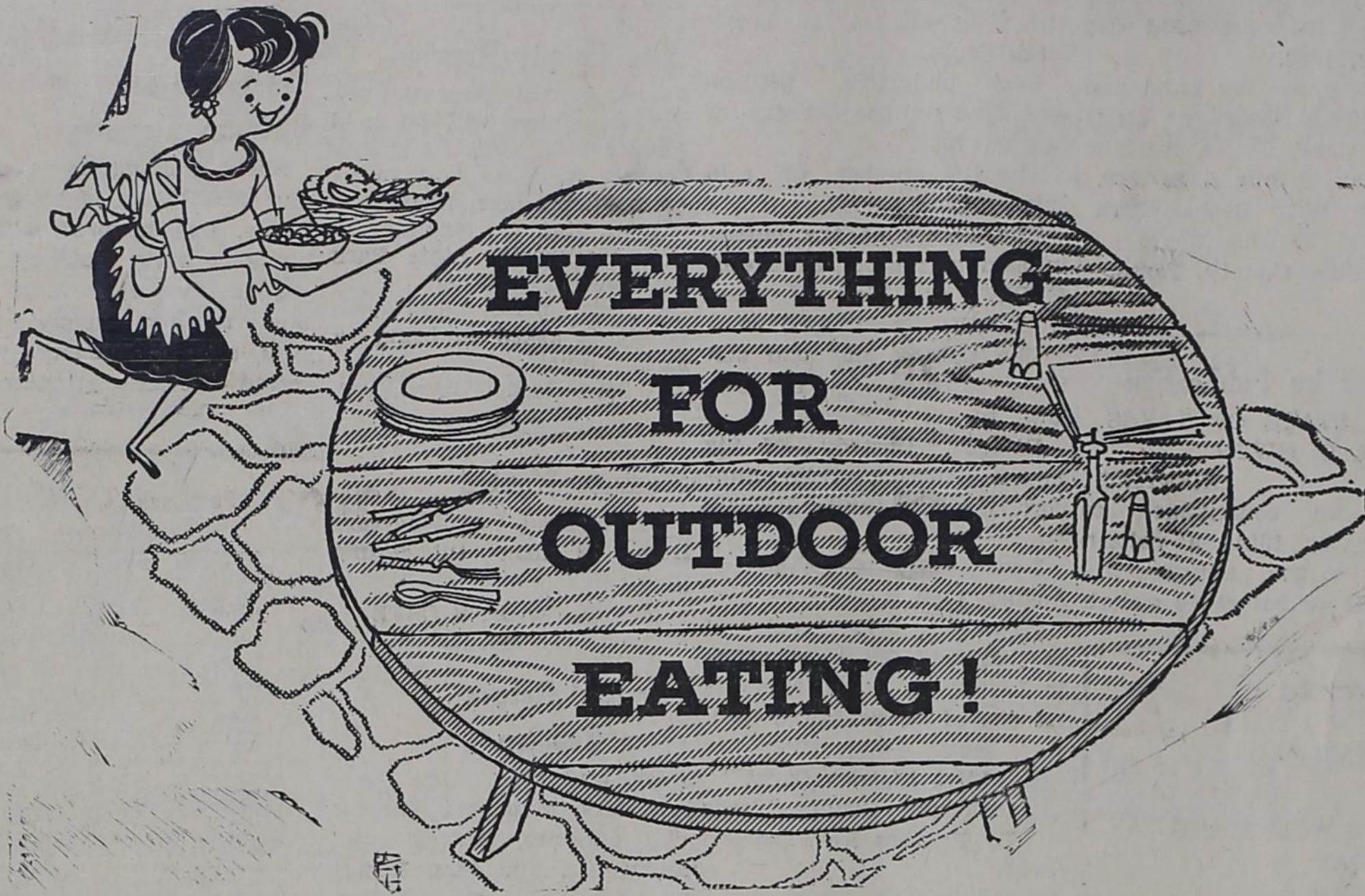
