You Must Register In Order To Vote

Everyone, regardless of age, must now register in order to vote, and you may do so at Tyree's Insurance Agency in Ropes.

We clipped the following editorial from the Levelland Daily Sun News:

Beginning this week, every adult resident in Texas is eligible to register to vote. No longer are poll taxes necessary to get yourself approved for voting. And even those who move from one part of Texas to another will be allowed to vote in national and statewide balloting.

Thus the last obstacle is removed from our disgraceful voter turnout. Or is it?

We rather suspect that our total vote won't go much higher than it has in the past, when a 50 per cent vote is considered good and 60 per cent is outstanding. This is the nation which cherishes the freedom to vote without fear, and prides itself on peaceful elections.

Yet our voting count is far less than the 75 per cent that voted in South Vietnam's first national election. And those folks over there had no tradition of free balloting. They were threatened, terrorized, often bombed, leaders were executed, reprisals were promised. But still they came, to mark their ballots and choose their own leaders.

Many nations surpass America's usual voting record. For they realize what a precious thing it is to choose their own leaders. They have not always been allowed this privilege and responsibility.

In Texas, many have cried out against the poll tax. The poll tax now has been abolished by law and annual registration is all that is required.

The last obstacle has been removed, no other excuse remains. If you fail to register and to vote from this point on... you have only yourself to blame.

Absentee Voting

Absentee voting started Monday, October 23, in the County Clerk's Office, and will continue through 5:00 o'clock P.M. November 7, 1967 on the Proposed Constitutional Amendments Election and the Special Election to fill the unexpired term of State Representative, from the 75th District.

Persons who are qualified to vote in the Clerk's Office during this Absentee Voting period are those persons expecting to be absent from the County on Election Day (November 11, 1967), and those persons

having lived in Hockley County less than six months and otherwise qualified to vote in a State Wide Election.

If a person has lived in the County less than six months and formerly lived in either Bailey, Cochran, Terry or Yoakum Counties they will be qualified to vote in the Special State Representative's Election, provided they register with the Tax Assessor-Collector of Hockley County prior to voting Absentee. This applies to the Amendment Election as well.

Cemetery Board Has Regular Meeting

The Ropes Cemetery Association met at its scheduled quarterly meeting Thursday, October 19.

The meeting was called to order by vice-president Tommy Littlefield. Members present were Leon Young, Celeste Thomas, Eugene Lewis, and the secretary-treasurer Tyree Martin.

It was voted to begin a fund drive for Cemetery maintenance to begin November 1st.

The cemetery depends entirely on donations for upkeep. It is supported by neither the City nor County. Donations may be made to any

Board member, or at Tyree's Insurance Office. Collection boxes will be placed in difference business firms for your convenience.

Motion was also made and carried to increase the prices for burial plots to \$200.00 for each 12 foot by 24 foot plot (this space contains four lots) and \$75.00 for each single burial plot. It is hoped that with this increase that in the future the Cemetery will be able to supply care and purchase needs from interest drawn on the money for plots, which will be deposited in a savings account.

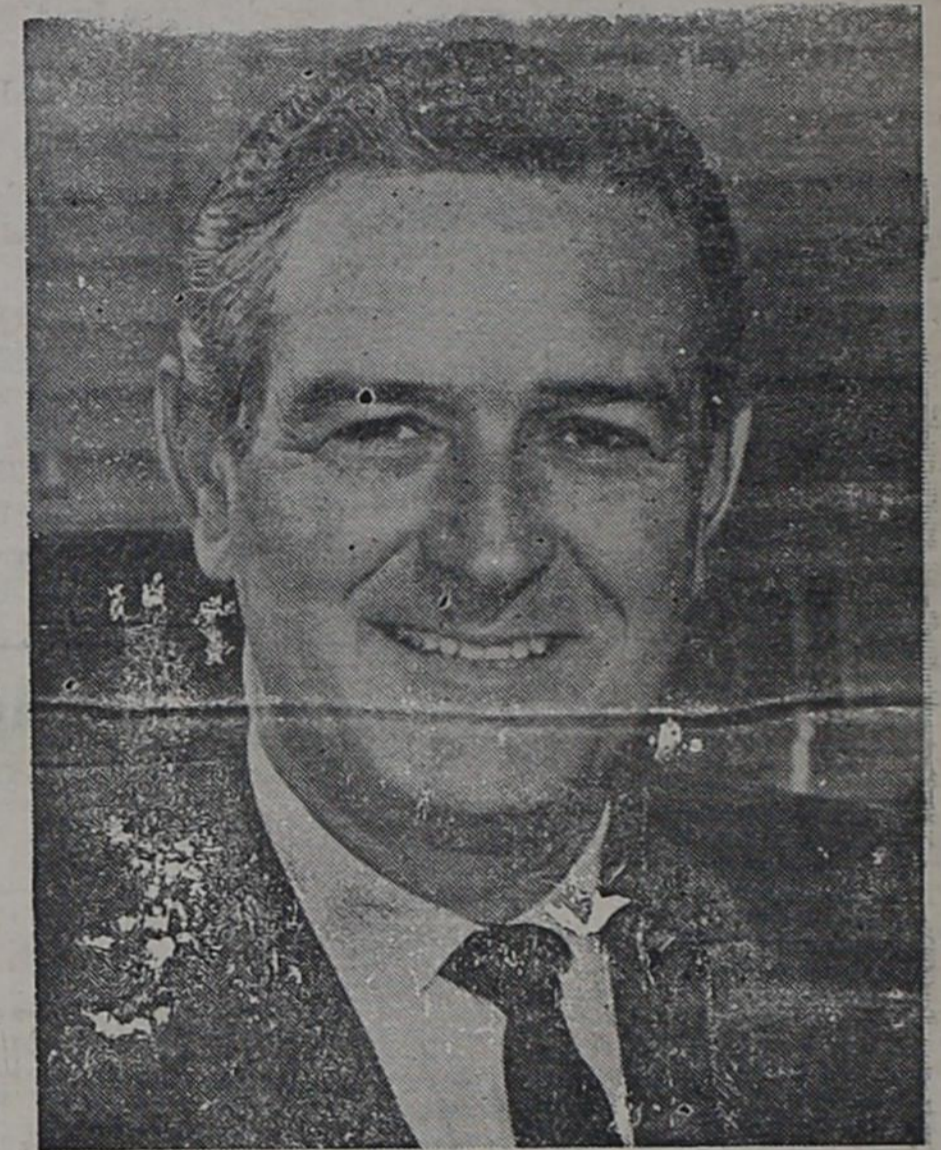

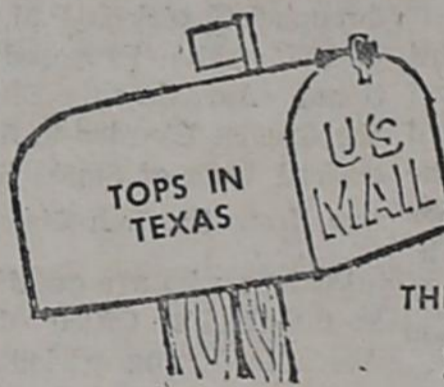
