### PROBATION OFFICER MAKES REPORT


During the year of 1957 SOUTH PLAINS we had a total of 57 cases of Juvenile delinquency in Fourteen or our county. these were official cases and forty-three (43) were unofficial. Official cases are those where the offender has committed an act which constitutes a felony. These, of course, always appear in our Juvenile Court with our low as 26 during the early Juvenile Judge presiding. In our county our Judge is our County Judge, Paul A. Williams. In the unofficial cases, in most instances, they are handled in the Juvenile Probation Office, unless it is deemed because of the gravity of the case that an official hearing may help the offender. NUMBER OF

JUVENILES INVOLVED:

There were 57 cases but only 53 juveniles involved. This means that some of these were in our Juvenile Court more than one time. NUMBER REFERRED

MORE THAN ONE TIME:

There were only four juveniles who appeared in our Juvenile Court more than one time. These were before the Court twice each, which made the number of cases total 57 with 53 juveniles involved.

The 43 unofficial cases were counselled with privately and in company with their parents and returned to the custody of the parents. Where damage was done to other people's property, restitution was required when possible. SUMMARY:

## SNOW AND ICE BLANKET THE

Following a siege of "shirt sleeve" weather, an ice tipped wind from the northeast on Sunday brought with it an overcast which, during Sunday night, gave off a freezing drizzle, icing over highways and streets, and making travel dangerous.

The mercury dipped as hours of the morning.

Farther north, in the Panhandle of Texas, snow fell and roads became hazardous, with several fatal and near fatal accidents occurring. One of the accidents involved an airplane, piloted by a Lubbock man, which crashed in a snowstorm and killed the pilot.

This has been one of the most severe winters we have had in several years. \ The weather has remained colder on an average, and the snow and rain have been far above average.

#### CHERRY PIE SUPREME

1/2 cup PET Evaporated MILK 3 Tablespoons cornstarch 3/4 cup sugar 1-lb. 4-oz. can sour, pitted

1-lb. 4-oz. can sour, pitted cherries 2 Tablespoons butter or margarine

1 Tablespoon lemon juice Few grains salt 1 cup sifted, powdered sugar Have ready a baked 9-inch pastry shell. Chill milk in ice tray until almost frozen around the edges. Meanwhile, mix in 1-qt, saucepan the cornstarch and sugar. Drain cherries, saving syrup. If necessary, add water to syrup to make 1 cup. Stir cherry syrup into cornstarch mixture. Cook and stir over medium heat until very thick and clear, about 7 min. Cool thoroughly, then add drained cherries. Take out 18 cherries to decorate pie. Put rest of cherry mixture into pastry shell. Melt butter in small saucepan. Take from heat and mix in until smooth the lemon juice, salt and powdered sugar. Cool thoroughly. Put ice-cold milk into a cold 1-qt, bowl. Whip with cold rotary beater by hand, or with electric beater at high speed, until stiff. Whip in cooled powdered sugar mixture just until mixed, about 1/4 at a time. Do not overbeat. Arrange around edge of pie. Decorate with the 18 cherries. Chill an hour before serving.


