## SAINTS and SINNERS

It is one thing to call a man a saint and another thing to call him a sinner. Why? What marks the difference?

In the Roman Catholic Church one is called a saint, if the church bestows the title upon him. The church will bestow this title only after it seems apparent that a particular man or woman has become transparent to the will of God for all men. Saint hood is the church's way of saying, 'God is revealed here'.

In the Protestant churches no system exists as such, to bestow sainthood upon anyone. Yet in our liturgy and writings and our scriptures (for example Matthew 27:52) we find the word in use. As is the case in all areas of life, when no clear cut definitions exist about certain concepts, the concepts take on erroneous meanings and distortions. Such is the case in Protestantism as regards the use of the word 'saint'.

A saint is a sinner who understands that, in spite of his sin, he belongs to God. God has accepted him. A saint is a sinner who is struggling to overcome his sin. He may not be having much luck at it, but he is struggling.

Now, what is a sinner? A sinner is one who wants his way instead of God's way. The sinner is one who thinks he could figure out a better world structure than God. The sinner is one who loves his own way of doing things, of thinking, better than he loves God.

And again, what is a saint? A saint is one who wants his way and not God's way but who knows that God loves him and therefore seeks to quit wanting his way and instead to want God's way.

This is why Jesus said, and it is recorded in Matthew, Mark, and Luke, "I came not to call the righteous, but the sinners." It is sinners who are called to be followers of Jesus, to be members of the church. Jesus tells we sinners, "God loves you in spite of your sin and He wants to help us struggle against it."

The point is this: the saint is not perfect. He is struggling against selfishness. The sinner is not perfect. The only thing that is different about the two is that the saint has a conscious knowledge that he belongs to God. Not even his sin can separate him from God. Being a saint does not make him less a sinner.

So, in the end, to call a man a saint or a sinner is not to make any distinction as to more or less sin. They may have the same amount of sinfulness. The only difference is that the saint has heard the good news that God loves him, and he is responding to that good news.

## Rise In Postal Rates

Increases in money orders, insurance, registry, certified mail and C.O.D. rates will become effective March 26, 1966. Acting Postmaster Flora M. Martin said today.

The cost of operating these five special services now exceeds revenues by \$60 million annually. The fee increases will narrow the cost-revenue gap by \$36 million, based on business handled in Fiscal Year 1965.

Fees for money orders, registry and C.O.D. were last changed in 1961; insurance and certified mail in 1957.

The fee changes, announced in the January 11th Federal Register and confirmed in the register on February 25th are put into effect under the existing administrative authority of the Postmaster General.

The increases include:

Money Order Fees: Domestic and international money order fees will be increased by 5 cents.

Insurance Fees: Minimum Fee

\$ 0.01 - \$15	20 cents
15.01 - 50	30 cents
50.01 - 100	40 cents
100.01 - 150	50 cents
150.01 - 200	60 cents

Registry Fees: The present 60 cents and 75 cents fees will be combined into a single fee at 75 cents for values up to \$100.

C.O.D. Fees: The present 40 cents and 50 cents fee brackets will be combined into one fee bracket at 60 cents for amounts up to \$10. There will be no change in the fees covering items valued above \$10.

Certified Mail: The fee will be increased 10 cents from the present 20 cents per item to 30 cents.

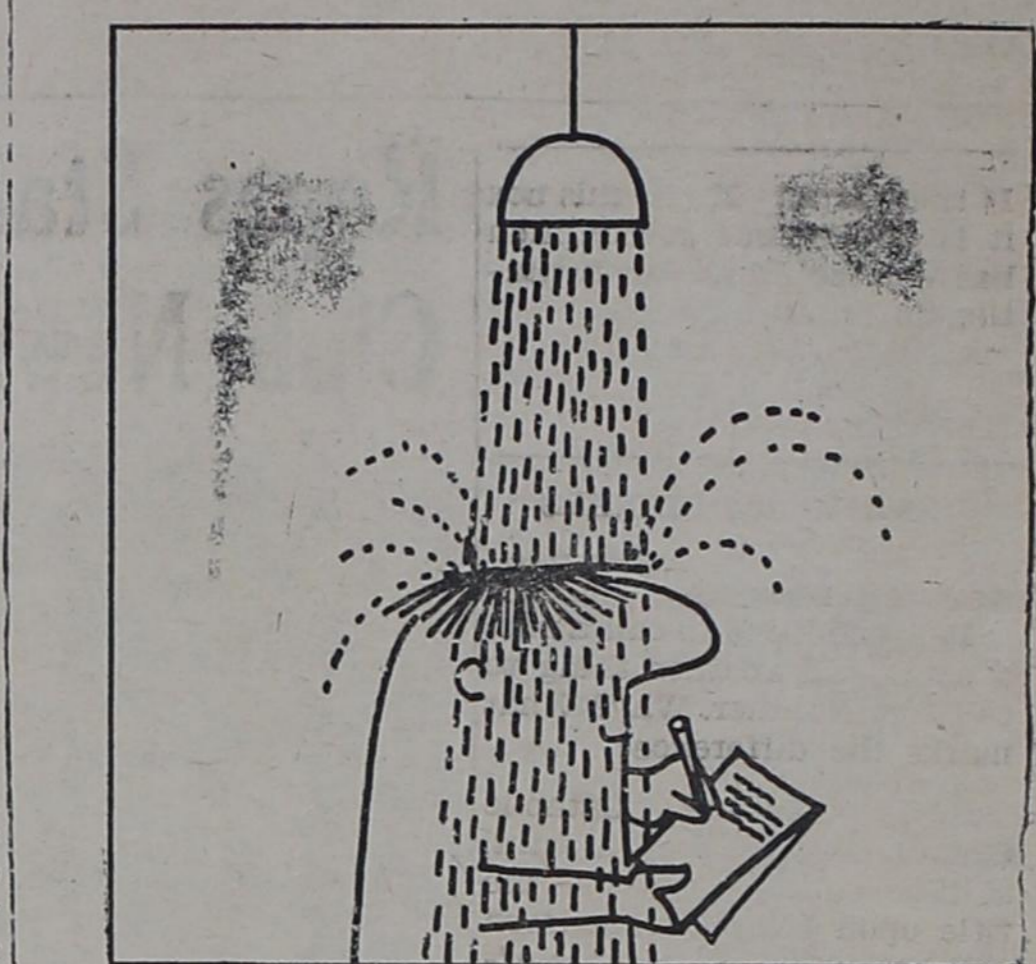

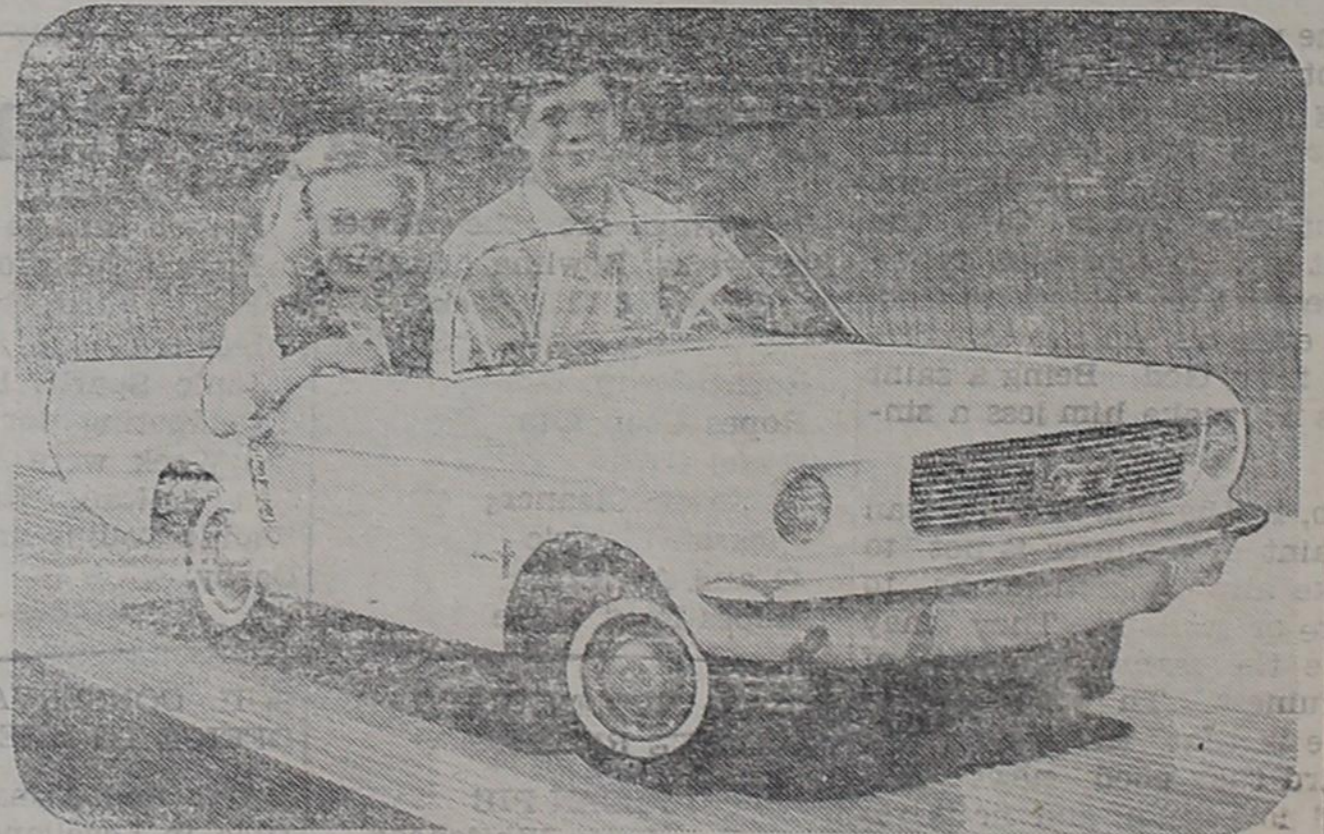
