MARRIAGE

When a couple contemplates marriage, there are a great many factors that must be taken into consideration—money, in-laws, housing, ceremony, church attendances, etc. But even more than such considerations as these must be viewed by the couple. The couple must consider differences. Each one of us is different from each other one of us. We are also different in the way we express our faith.

In the Old Testament and in the New Testament it is indicated that the man and the woman, the bride and the groom, shall become one. (see Genesis 2:24 and Matthew 19:5) Thus, the one great consideration in marriage is that the two shall unite their differences so as to become one. Marriage is occasioned when two different people are united and a new thing is created, namely, a marriage.

My denomination requires that I counsel with each couple before I marry them. I am supposed to try and discover whether or not their differences?

We are all different from one another and our ability to live together hinges on our ability to create a new thing out of our differences. The way we work toward creating a new thing out of our differences is to see, to understand and to accept the differences we see arising in our partner. And by accepting a partner's differences, I do not mean that you condone or agree to them, for they may be bad. Acceptance has to do with love and with remaining open even when someone's differences offend you. Or, stated negatively, acceptance is not rejecting those who have differences disagreeable to you.

Divorce is the great blight and shame upon our society today. Divorce is the admission that a couple will not creatively unite their differences. Divorce means that one or both of the parties to the marriage did not hear the words of the Old Testament and of the New Testament: "the two shall become one."

Only when we are one, through the creative uniting of our differences, are we in the state of marriage.

On the Austin scene, the oil and gas forced pooling bill, H.B./S.B. 2, has passed both the House and Senate after a somewhat heated floor skirmish. This bill, defeated in the last session of the Legislature, was one which after considerable study, I could not conscientiously support. The bill abrogates landowners' rights to deal with their property as has been done heretofore and gives greater powers and discretions to the Texas Railroad Commission in these matters. Our district is composed of more than 53,000 residents, many of them are farmers and/or landowners, and every landowner could be affected by the provisions of H.B. 2 and S.B. 2. The real test of this bill to several landowners may not be realized until they are personally faced with the provision of the bill some months or years later. Under the bill, landowners will be faced with forced pooling of up to 160 acre-spacing for oil wells and up to 640 acre-spacing for gas wells and be forced into drilling units against their wills. Unless landowners pay their share of drilling costs at the time of drilling, they cannot share in the proceeds of production until the operator has received back 100 percent of the costs of drilling and up to another 100 percent, at the discretion of the Railroad Commission, of these costs as a "risk factor." There is no provision in the bill for the minimum one eighth royalty, but rather the Railroad Commission will determine what is fair for landowners and in reality what will be offered by those seeking to lease his minerals. Time will tell if my misgivings on the forced pooling bill are valid ones, and for the sake of our small landowners, I hope the measure does not prove to be detrimental to them.

H.J.R. 6, the constitutional amendment which states that "Equality under the law shall not be denied or abridged because of sex has failed to receive the necessary 100 votes or final passage in the House of Representatives. This measure, which upon passage would have been submitted to the people for a vote, was opposed by the State Bar of Texas on the grounds that "equal treatment of the sexes under the law should be achieved by legislation directed specifically to the solution of each of the problems involved, and not by a constitutional amendment that would invalidate many existing statutes without providing new statutes to replace them."

Urging passage of H.J.R. 6 was the Texas Federation of Business and Professional Women's Clubs who stressed that "special rights" are inconsistent with equal rights and that it is under the guise of so-called 'rights' or 'benefits' that women have been treated unequally and denied opportunities which are available to men.

The measure was defeated on Third Reading by a vote of 91 to 25.

I am most appreciative of the efforts exhibited by the Hockley County Legislative Community Council for its tremendous co-operation and recommendations regarding legislation before the Texas Legislature. Your efforts are truly meeting our goal of better communications and understanding of issues between Austin and the 90th District.
