Ben Barnes Will Be Candidate for Governor

Lieutenant Governor Ben Barnes Monday announced that he will be a candidate for Governor of Texas in next year's elections.

Barnes announced his decision at a news conference at the State Capitol. The announcement ended speculation whether Barnes would seek the Governorship or run for the United States Senate.

Barnes, at 33, has more than ten years of experience in public office in Texas. He first won election to the Texas House from DeLeon in 1960. He was elected Speaker of the House in January, 1965 and was re-elected to that post in 1967, thus becoming the youngest Speaker in Texas history to serve two consecutive terms.

In his first bid for statewide office, Barnes was elected as Lieutenant Governor in November of 1968, and became the first candidate in the history of Texas to poll more than two million votes. He was re-elected to a second term in November of 1970.

His statement is as follows: At an appropriate time before the filing deadline for the 1972 Democratic primary election, I will announce my candidacy for the Office of Governor of Texas.

Many people throughout the State have urged me to enter the Governor's race and I do greatly appreciate their support and encouragement. But in final consideration, this has

been a very personal decision, based upon how I believe I can best serve Texas in these times.

It has become increasingly apparent in recent months that our State must have new leadership in the Governor's office and fresh, enlightened, vigorous approaches to the critical problems of the 1970's.

It is just as apparent that confidence in our State government must be renewed and also maintained if these responsibilities are to be carried out.

I accept this as a principal challenge of the 1972 campaign.

My intention is to run on my own record of public service and my own positive program for Texas. I believe I have the experience and the enthusiasm to be an active and progressive Governor, and I also believe that I have demonstrated — as Speaker of the House and as Lieutenant Governor — that I can work with people fairly and effectively regardless of differences.

To me this is extremely important in these times of dissent and division.

It is going to take this kind of leadership to reform our welfare system before it wrecks us financially;

—to protect our environment and keep our cities from becoming choked by crime, disorder and decay;

—to solve the constant crisis in State finances and the burden to higher and higher

taxes; —and to maintain modern, flexible government that can deal with issues such as these without bogging down in 19th Century restrictions and excuses.

In this decade we may very well reshape our present concept of the federal system. For several years I have devoted much of my time working and planning with officials of other states and the federal government. The next Governor of Texas should play a major role in assuring more effective State and local government and a better balance with national government. I welcome this opportunity.

As for the Democratic Party my aim is to make it an energetic force for sound government — not just a political tool to be used briefly every two years and then discarded. I want Texas to be strong in national affairs. We should not take a back seat in the political system and let other people make our decisions for us. We must build a broad-based Democratic Party in Texas in which people will be proud to participate for the progress of our state and nation.

I earnestly hope I can contribute toward bringing our people together in support of needed change, so that Texas may truly fulfill its promise in the coming years. My pledge is to do my best to bring new leadership and fresh confidence to the highest office of our State.

Some Children Live In A Blurred World

When you're six years old, the world can be a wonderful place — if you can see it.

Tommy couldn't. He lived in a world of blurred images. School is tough enough when you're six. But it's ever worse when your friends are learning to read, and you can't keep up.

To Tommy, letters were just blurs; so were baseballs and faces. Because Tommy's father had long been out of work glasses were simply out of the question — until this year.

The boy's glasses were paid for by a volunteer organization hundreds of miles away, called New Eyes for the Needy, Inc., of Short Hills, New Jersey.

New Eyes, as it is familiarly known, has earned the reputation of being one of the most effective sight-saving charities in the world. It has helped many thousands of needy people obtain glasses — here and abroad — and it has never asked for a cent in donations.

Since its inception, almost 40 years ago, New Eyes has asked only for used eyeglasses and precious metal articles such as old watches, jewelry (real, or costume and antique), good or damaged silver and dentures.

The eyeglasses and glittering clutter are sent to New Eyes for the Needy, Inc., Short Hills, New Jersey 07078. Thousands of packages from all over the United States arrive in the neat stucco headquarters every year. There, volunteers, mostly housewives, sort out the glasses, separating those in plastic frames from those in metal frames.

Many of the 250 workers have learned to operate complex optical grading and testing equipment. They help fill specific orders from missions and hospitals in foreign countries where plastic framed glasses and sunglasses are sent.

The metal framed glasses have their uses, too. Through refining, they yield precious metals that are sold, along with the jewelry, to finance New Eyes funds in over 100 hospitals and health agencies throughout the United States. The money in these funds buys

glasses for people who have no where else to turn.

In addition to these funds, arrangements have also been made in 48 states through the health and welfare agencies whereby New eyes purchases glasses for carefully screened persons, to whom no other private or public funds are available.

Last year 8,000 people were helped under this program. Tommy was one of them.

But, as public response has grown throughout the years, so has the volume of requests. Therefore, New eyes needs more discarded jewelry and eyeglasses to do its job. As one New Eyes volunteer put it:

"The wonderful thing about New Eyes is that we can ask people to send us things they no longer need."

And these gifts can bring vision to a little boy, like Tommy.

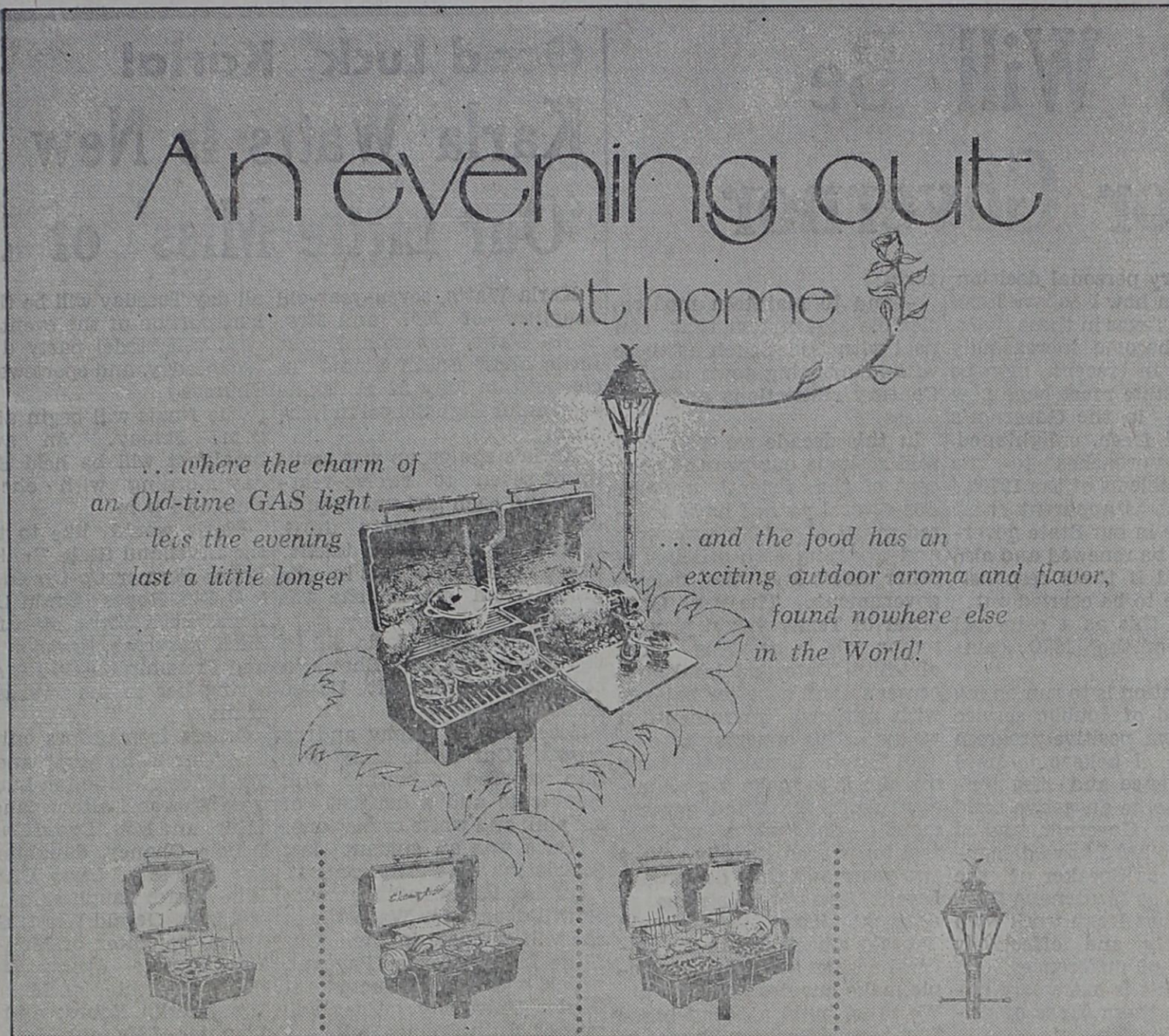

PARKS AND WILDLIFE

AUSTIN — A House Resolution authorizing the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department to move its headquarters to the new McKinney Falls State Park near Austin highlighted legislative activity affecting the department during the 62nd Legislature's regular session.

The resolution, signed by Gov. Preston Smith on April 20, authorizes the move and directs the State Building Commission to provide assistance.

The McKinney Falls site, which is not yet open to the public, is a 632-acre tract located seven miles from the State Capitol and just southwest of Bergstrom Air Force Base.

Legislation already signed into law ranged from establishment of a white-winged dove stamp fee to issuance of falconer's permits and authorization of the Parks and

Wildlife Commission to allow hunting on certain state parks and other Department property in accordance with sound biological management practices and other considerations.

Following are only a few of the basic provisions of House Bills signed into law:

H.B. 209 — Relating to the repeal of limitations of Wildlife Regulatory Act in Colorado County. Requires public hearing regarding deer season in Colorado County. (Effective immediately).

H.B. 357 — Prairie dogs declared a public nuisance. (Effective in 90 days).

H.B. 377 — Prohibits hunting from any type of aircraft and provides that game animals and non-migratory game birds may be hunted from an automobile on private properties. (Effective in 90 days).

H.B. 396 — Providing that armed forces personnel may purchase resident hunting licenses when on duty in the

state for a period longer than 30 days. (Effective immediately).

H.B. 428 — Amends fish farm license law, changing definition of private ponds by deleting "not connected to any stream carrying public waters nor subject to overflow from any public waters." Reduces fee for Fish Farms and vehicles from \$25 to \$5. Duplicate license available for \$1.

Also, grants for federal funds may be used for individual fishery projects upon approval of the Parks and Wildlife Commission. Provides for deposit of fees in Fund 9. (Effective Sept. 1, 1971).

H.B. 586 — Prohibits use of dogs in hunting deer in Liberty County. (Effective in 90 days).

H.B. 738 — Provides that any person hunting white-winged dove in the state must purchase a white-winged dove stamp, fee \$3, and stamp signed by owner. Provides that one-half of fees collected may be used for management and protection of white-winged doves and one-half of the funds may be used for acquisition of white-winged habitat

in the state. (Effective immediately).

Early Settlers Reunion

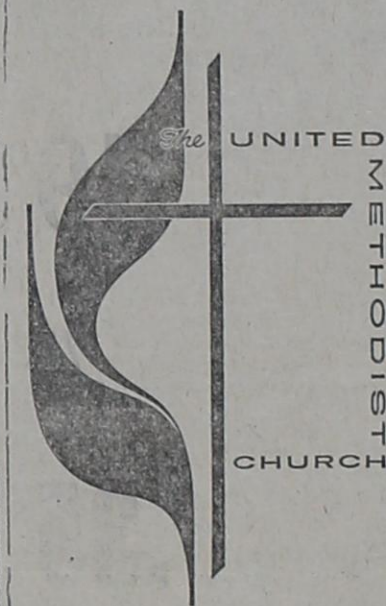
