## CoOp Members Receive Allocations

Ropes Farmers Coop members received allocations in cash this past week of \$42,480.42. These earnings came from the Plains Coop Oil Mill and Farmers Coop Co-op. Both of these regional associations showed good earnings for this past year. This amount plus cash allocations paid at our annual meeting in March of \$97,217.11 makes a total of \$139,697.53 received by our membership this year. We feel that this income will help our farmers stay in business as each year the price on cotton and also the acreage is cut. The new cotton program is sure to pass and this will put more pressure on the farmer. Not only the farmers but also the gins will feel the effects of this new legislation. National Cotton Council predicts if the bill goes through as is that 440 gins will go out of business the four years it will be in effect. Dividends from the Plains Cotton Cooperative Association will be received later this year.

## MRS. STILL-ROBERTS RETURN FROM VACATION

Mrs. W. H. Still accompanied Mr. and Mrs. M.L. Roberts on a vacation trip which covered parts of New Mexico, Colorado, Wyoming, Idaho and Utah.

Mrs. Still said, "I believe it was the most enjoyable trip I ever took. I enjoyed every minute of it, and I didn't get tired. I saw the most beautiful flowers in the world, and the largest and tallest trees I have ever seen."

They visited Clayton, New Mexico, and Denver, Colorado and into Wyoming where they stayed all night in Jackson City, and West Thumb, and from there to Yellowstone National Park.

"I saw the bears," said Mrs. Still, "and we visited Old Faithful. It was raining, but near the geyser was a glassed in house and Mr. Roberts drove the car up under a canopy and I went inside and watched through the glass. Old Faithful shot a stream of steaming water into the air every hour on the hour."

Mr. Roberts told us they are building a new ski and winter at Jackson, Wyoming, and that it is costing four million dollars. They have real mild winters in that section—the temperature drops down to 60 below zero and stays there. In the Yellowstone National Park they said they noticed a large number of dead trees. It was explained to them that the trees could not stand the cold winter, the very roots of them being frozen.

Over in Idaho they found the prettiest country of all. It is a rolling country—a plains terrain—and that here they grow potatoes as we grow cotton in Texas. They saw thousands and thousands of acres of them. The potatoes are gathered and placed in a kil, a large round building with a sod roof, and here they are stored and cured. ## Oil-Gas Roundup

Hockley County's producers and royalty owners are marketing some \$28.9 million in crude oil and natural gas a year, according to statistics released by Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association this week.

Ranking 38th among Texas oil and gas producing counties, Hockley County in 1963 received some \$27 million from wellhead sales of oil and an estimated \$1.9 million from natural gas. County production of oil was approximately 9.1 million barrels; natural gas, 15 billion cubic feet.

Farmers, ranchers and other mineral owners share in a \$3.6 million distribution of oil and gas royalty payments annually.

The Association based its annual study of this county's oil and gas output on statistics compiled by the U. S. Bureau of Mines for 1963. Production data for 1964 would be approximately the same.

Statewide, Texas oil and gas wells produced an estimated \$3.6 billion in income: \$2.9 billion from oil, \$730 million from gas.

Data from the Texas Employment Commission indicate direct employment in oil and gas industry jobs for more than 530 Hockley County citizens with a payroll of approximately \$3.5 million a year. Because oil operations require a large number of service contractors and supply firms, which are not included in this figure, direct employment figures are only part of the story of local economic impact.

An important indicator of activity is the amount expended on drilling of wildcat wells seeking new fields, and those wells drilled to develop fields already located. The Association estimates that in 1964 approximately \$2.8 million was risked by Texas oil and gas operators on drilling ventures in Hockley County. About 11.1 per cent of this expenditure, or \$309,000, went into dry holes.

A tabulation by the Oil and Gas Journal shows 36 wells were drilled in the county in 1964: 32 oil, 4 dry holes. A total of 207,000 feet of hole were drilled—158,000 for development wells and 49,000 for wildcats.

In addition to local school and county property taxes by oil and gas operators, taxes on production from Hockley County flowed into the State Treasury at the rate of about \$1.4 million a year.

An upgrading of the county's gross economic output is contributed by the operation of three plants which can process some 148 million cubic feet of natural gas a day to remove liquids such as butane and propane.

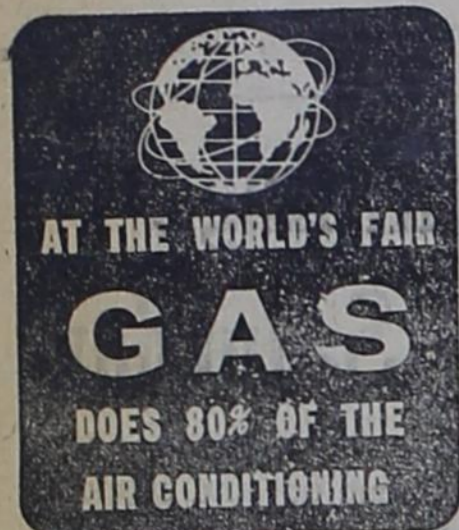

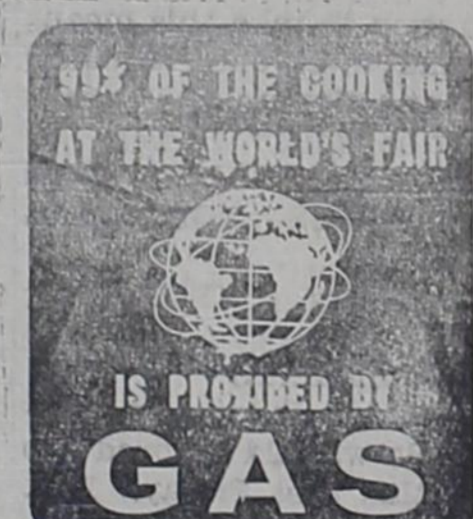
