WHATSOEVER THINGS

A story in the newspaper the other day caught my eye. It was the story of a young man, in his thirties, who committed suicide. It stood out on the page over all the other stories because it was the third suicide story that I had seen in the last few days. I guess it should be common-place by now and not too shocking. But it isn't common-place and it is shocking. A person finds nothing to make his life worth living and comes to the point where he would rather be dead than alive. It is a sad story, but it is a true one.

Our world that we live in today fosters suicide. Suicide is the third major killer, below cancer and heart trouble, for people in their fruitful years between 30 and 50. And if the trend doesn't change it will eventually become the number one killer. You see, our world fosters suicide because our world lies to people. We make the impression that fame and fortune are the things that should be sought at all cost. We picture money as having the answer to all our problems. We keep saying the thing that is wrong with most people is that they don't make enough money, have good enough jobs, or live in decent enough houses. This may or may not shock you, but the majority of people who commit suicide have plenty of those things.

What our world has forgotten, and what our world needs to remember, is that we have got to give people something to live for. And that something that we have to give has got to be higher, and bigger, and better than man himself can ever be. The Creator alone fits that description. Paul knew that this was the secret key to a meaningful life when he wrote to the Followers at Rome: "For those who live according to the flesh set their minds on the things of the flesh, but those who live according to the Spirit set their minds on the things of the Spirit. To set the mind on the flesh is death, but to set the mind on the Spirit is life and peace."

We make a great show with our material wealth, we Americans. We are proud of our industry. We are proud of our success. We show ourselves and our world what living the "good" life is like. But we very seldom show ourselves and never show the rest of the world the result of our "good" life. Divorce is on the increase. Every area of crime is on the increase. Mental institutions are bulging at their seams. The moral fiber of politics is breaking down. Sexual morality is a thing of the past with many. The name of the Creator is used on the public screens in vain and is seldom used in our schools in reverence.

This is what we have made for ourselves, Americans. This is what the new materialism has gotten for us. But those of us who follow the Galilean have not given up. He will not let us. We are trying to say — desperately — to a world that does not seemingly want to hear, that we must give ourselves to Someone greater than ourselves in order to find ourselves.

Until we do that we will read of more and more senseless suicides.

Boy Scouts Are At Camp Post This Week

182 Boy Scouts and leaders from 12 different Scout troops in the South Plains Council, Boy Scouts of America are in summer camp this week at Camp Post, near Post, Texas, according to Camp Director Warren Green. This is the first week of the summer camping season for Scouts at this site.

Upon their arrival Sunday, the Scouts were given a medical re-check and a classification swim tests. They set up their troop campsites and prepared for a week of tentliving.

During the week they will engage in swimming, rowing, canoeing, life-saving instruction, cooking, hiking, pioneering, conservation, rifle marksmanship, skeet shooting, archery, bait casting, fishing and the outdoor skills required for a Scout to achieve his second and first class ranks. The troops' Scoutmasters will be supported by a twenty-four man central camp staff, Green said.

Evening activities will include several different kinds of campfire programs with an Order of the Arrow tap-out of new candidates, scheduled for Thursday night.

On Friday, parents are invited to eat supper at Camp Post with their sons at 7:00 p.m. They can do so by making paid reservations by noon on Thursday either at the camp or at the Boy Scout Service Center, 30 Briercroft Office Park in Lubbock. Following supper the closing camp fire will be conducted at which time a court of honor will be held to recognize the awards and achievements earned by the Scouts during their week in camp. The Scouts and leaders will return to their homes on Saturday.

6.4 Miles of Road Will Be Developed

The Texas Highway Commission today announced plans for development of 6.4 miles of Farm to Market Roads in Hockley County as part of the 1968 Texas Farm to Market Road Program.

District Engineer O. L. Crain of Lubbock said the estimated cost of the work is \$166,000.00.

The Texas Highway Department engineer in charge of the work will be Herbert E. DeShazo, of Lubbock.

The work is part of 326 miles of Farm to Market road development included in the program.

The 1968 Farm to Market

addition of 545 new miles, bringing the designated mileage of the Texas FM-RM systems to almost 39.5 thousand miles.

Of the new mileage 377 miles or 69 per cent are school bus routes and 344 miles or 62 per cent are rural mail routes. Impetus for the modern Farm to Market system was afforded by legislation passed in 1949 to "get the farmer out of the mud" — to enable farmers and ranchers to get their produce and livestock to market and to provide adequate, safe highway for school buses and mail routes.

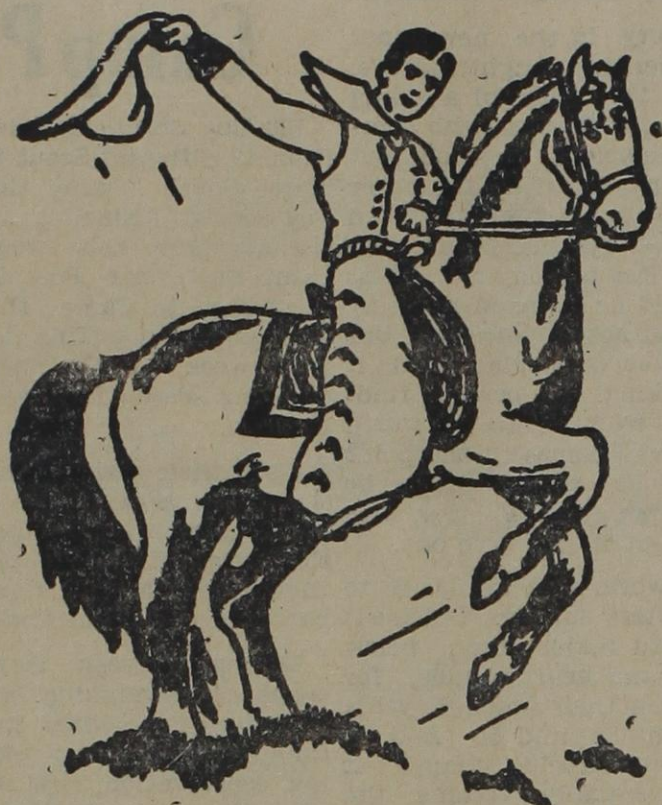
