## 1963 FEED GRAIN PROGRAM DETAILS TO BE EXPLAINED TO GROWERS SOON

The Agriculture Department soon will ask local farmer committeemen to explain to growers the complicated feed grain program for 1963.

Details were disclosed on Wednesday by Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman. The program follows the general outline of those for 1961 and 1962. But details differ considerably. It, like the others, offers price supports and payments to farmers who retire at least 20 per cent of their feed grain acreage.

The purpose of the program is to help reduce feed grain surpluses.

Under the 1961 and 1962 programs, price supports were offered as loans or purchase agreements on grain withheld from the market or use. But in 1963, the price support will be a combination of storage loans or purchase agreements and payments.

The full amount of the 1963 price support is the same for corn and barley as this year—\$1.20 and 93 cents a bushel. But the sorghum grain support was set at \$1.91 a hundredweight, down two cents from this year.

But under the new program, 18 cents of the corn support, 14 cents of the barley and 29 cents of the sorghum grain support will be made in direct payments to participating farmers. The support payment will be made on the normal production of the acres kept in production even though the farmer does not take advantage of the storage loan.

Some farmers feed their grain to livestock and some sell it to other feeders or the grain market. Others store grain under the loans.

These payments are not to be confused with those made on grain land diverted from production. As was the case this year, farmers must idle at least 20 per cent of their feed grain acreage. ## FUNERAL SERVICE FOR M. W. MARTIN HELD

The community was stunned Saturday morning when it was announced that M. W. Martin had been found dead in his home just across the street from the back of the lumber yard.

Mr. Martin had been on the streets most of the day before and stated he was feeling better than usual. He went home early and evidently turned on the TV set. When he was found Saturday morning no lights were on but the TV was running.

When he didn't show up at Walt's Cafe for breakfast Slim Weatherly became uneasy about him and asked Loyd Wall to go and see if he was ill. No one answered his knock and Loyd went in. Mr. Martin was laying just inside the kitchen, it appeared that he had started from the living room after a drink or to close the back door and had dropped dead.

Sheriff Weir Clem and Justice of Peace Minton Roberts held the inquest and a verdict of death from natural causes was returned.

Some two or three days before he suffered a blackout at Walt's Cafe but on going to the doctor in Lubbock he was told he was in good condition.

Funeral services were held from the Ropes First Baptist Church Sunday at 3 p.m., of which he was a member, with Revs. Wayne Perry, pastor, and Horace Hitt of Wolf-forth officiating. Interment was in Ropes cemetery beside his wife who passed away in

1951. Pallbearers were Buford Moore, Jess Gregg, Billy Carter, Winston Jones, Billy Watson and T. J. Redman.

Mr. Martin was born August 20, 1883 in Tarrant County near Grapevine. He was married in 1902 to Mamie Mozell Churchman at the Lonesome Dove Church. To this union were born three children, Ray of Ropesville, Mickey of Hobbs, N. M., and Mrs. Wilma Longshore of Odessa, all who were present at the funeral. Other survivors include 11 grandchildren and 14 great grandchildren.

Mr. and Mrs. Martin moved to Ropes in 1945. Mrs. Martin passed away August 30, 1951, and since that time Mr. Martin had resided alone.

Mr. Martin was a man without enemies—he was respected and loved by all who knew him. Although 79 years of age, he moved with the agility of a man of fifty. He lived a Christian life, being converted when 17 years old, and those with whom he came in contact were better for the meeting. He will be greatly missed.

We have known Mr. Martin ever since he moved here and have held him in the highest esteem. Friday morning, before he passed away that evening, he sat in the Plainsman office and talked to us more than an hour. He was in good spirits and said he was feeling fine, but that he was going to take better care of himself in the future.

## TELEPHONE SERVICE TO BE IMPROVED

General Telephone Company of the Southwest has announced commencement of a project designed to improve and modernize the facilities of its telephone exchange in Ropesville.

Switching equipment now in operation in the Ropesville central office will be replaced prior to May 1, 1963, according to the phone company's district manager, Paul Farrar of Brownfield.

All telephone numbers in Ropesville will be changed prior to the conversion date, Farrar said. The new numbers will be composed of seven digits, in keeping with the telephone industry's nationwide change to a seven-digit, All Numerical Calling (ANC) Plan.

Several other cities on the South Plains have been converted to all-number calling, with Brownfield scheduled to get seven digit dialing next spring.

Farrar said new numbers would be assigned and made available to customers around March 1 of next year.

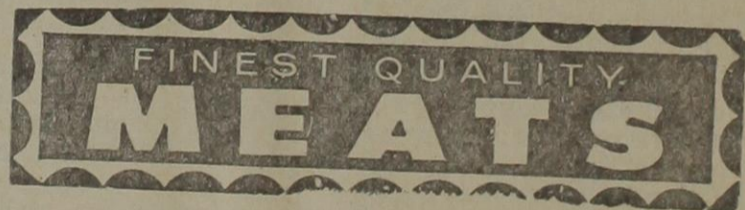
