Tuesday night rain and hail spotted the Ropes territory, with the fall of moisture ranging up to half an inch, which amount was reported at the Wilson Campbell place some nine miles west of Ropes.

Mrs. Campbell told the Plainsman, "It is raining and hailing here, with lots of lightning. Call us back, as I am afraid of the telephone when it is lightning." It turned out that Mrs. Campbell had a solid basis for fearing the telephone during an electric storm, as several years ago lightning came in through the telephone consuming her plastic curtains, as well as doing other damage.

At the Tom Price place, some three miles further west, heavy rain was falling and the same was happening at Lockettville.

Bill Foster, at Foster's General Store, reported only a light sprinkle, while a report from the Ernest Whately place stated it was raining. At New Deal, south of Lockettville, heavy hail and rain were reported.

At Levelland, a wind up to 35 miles an hour velocity, was blowing, and the rain was coming in showers.

At one time during the storm the Highway Department thought a tornado had been sighted near Tahoka, but this was never confirmed.

These reports were taken during the storm.

In Ropes proper there was little rain, and no wind to speak of. The cloud passed from east to west, which in itself is unusual.

ROPES BOYS SET NEW RECORD IN 440 RELAY---GO TO AUSTIN

In the region field meet held at Lubbock this past Saturday Buford Moore, Jehue Price, Clinton Abney and Ronnie Ayers won the 440 yard relay and set a new record, their time being 45.4. The old record of 46.1 was set by Matador in 1959.

Ropes also took 3rd place in the mile relay with Junior Wilson, Howard Timmons, Jehue Price and Buford Moore, turning a record time of 3:34.9, which broke the old record.

Ronnie Ayers took third place in the 220 yard run, and Bob Bevers took sixth place in the mile run.

Ropes ended up second in the meet with 39 points behind the leaders.

The 440 relay team qualified for State and will go to Austin to enter races there on May 6 and 7.

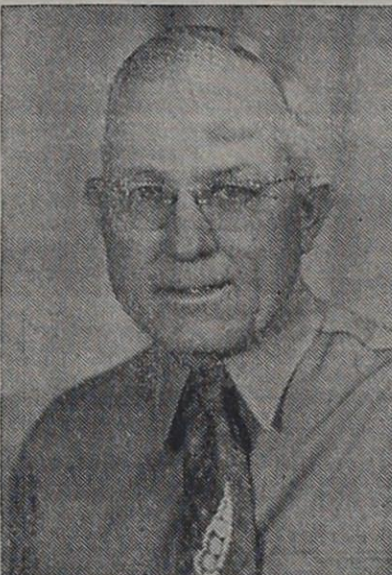

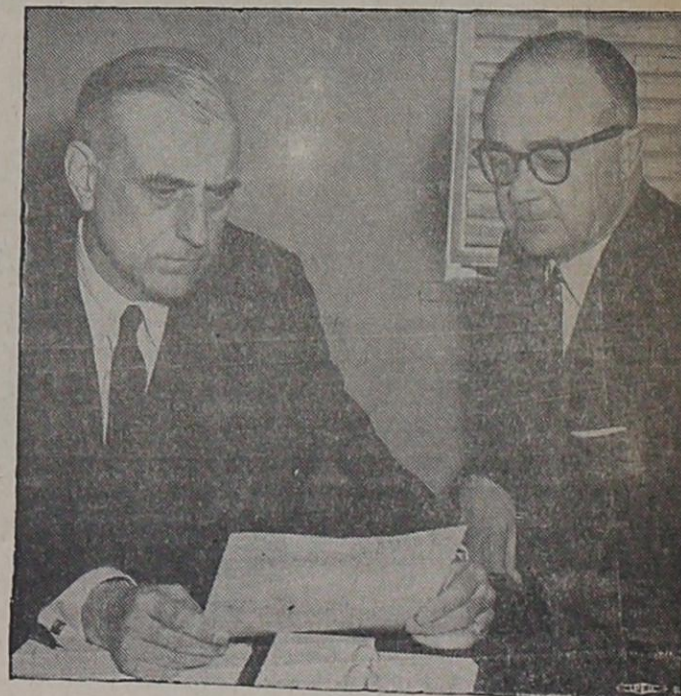

RANDOM THOUGHTS ON THE AMERICAN SCENE

Seems to me we get some funny ideas about fame here in America. Someone gets to be a sports champion and the first thing we ask him is his advice on political matters. It's the same thing that makes Premier Khrushchev an authority on dancing. They say he didn't like the dancing in "Can-Can." Too racy. Sat smiling while they made one whole scene, though.

If Fidel Castro thinks maybe we're jerks, sometimes it seems easy to agree. Here we are paying more for Cuban sugar than all the rest of the world, yet Castro can thumb his nose at us whenever he wants. But every dictator has to have a scapegoat, and Castro doesn't have Batista any more — so it looks like the United States is taking Batista's place as a whipping boy. To get back to that sugar — we pay Mr. Castro a price that makes him many millions a year more than we need to pay him at the regular world-price. His attacks make a body wonder how he'd react if we paid just what Russia pays, for instance — if the United States was only paying just what it had to pay for sugar?

As far as most countries in the world are concerned, we're rich old Uncle Sam. Maybe they even call us Uncle Sap behind our backs. But it's interesting to see how many countries want us to invest in all kinds of businesses there. They're all smiling when they talk to us about investing. But all this smiling gives us something to wonder about — how long after Invest-

ment comes Expropriation?

When President Eisenhower meets Premier Khrushchev at the Summit, there's bound to be a lot of surface good will. And that's fine. Of course, if there's any agreement signed, that's something else again. What can you expect from an agreement when it's signed with a man who has a lifelong record of breaking his word — who, when he doesn't like an agreement he's signed, simply tears it up?



Used to be that the smaller countries of the world found peace and continuing prosperity in getting along with their bigger neighbors. It made for a happy world, that's for sure. But times have changed. Nowadays our smaller neighboring countries, when they feel things aren't going to suit them at home — their officials start shouting about how badly the big United States has been dealing with them. Well, a map of Europe brings a good question to mind—what would hap-

pen if Finland, for instance, raised its voice to huge Russia? It makes you wonder what would happen if some of our smaller neighbors today, who seem to be so anti-American, were to do their complaining about Russia! Wonder if the Premier would be as tolerant about it as Ike is?

Way back in the Bolshevik days, there was no question about people in the Soviet being poor, and a great many of them hardly having enough to eat. But it comes to light now, in the newspapers, that from the very first, the Russians have kept millions of dollars stashed all over the world, simply for the purpose of converting people in every walk of life to the Soviet, Communist idea. The working-propaganda fund, they tell us, is bigger today than it ever was. Just makes you wonder how many people in Communist-dominated countries are going around, poorly-clothed and ill-fed.

Came on a wonderful thing the other day, how lots of companies in America are starting programs, or already have them, to teach their employees about politics. Time was when politics was a dirty word in business, and the change is a good one. Because today politics touches our everyday lives all the time. And the more we all know about politics these days, the better citizens we're bound to become. And where better to learn about politics than among the people we work with?

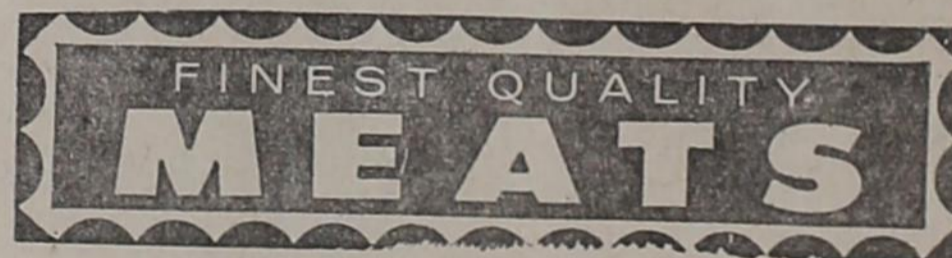

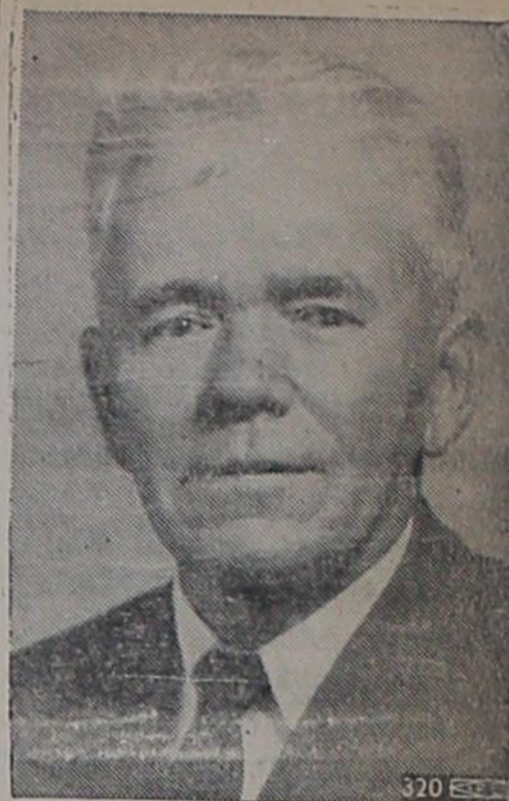

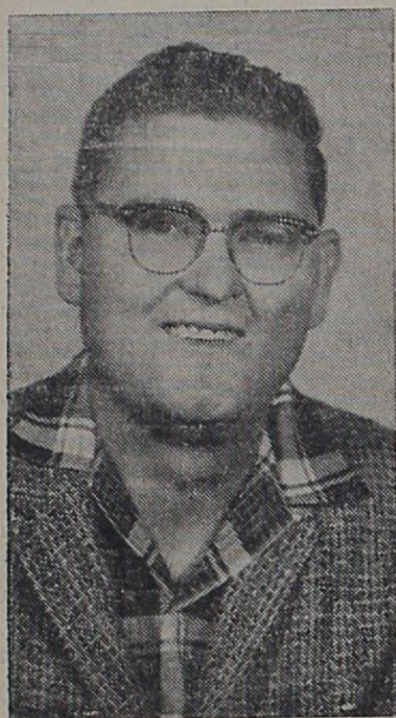

May God bless the little Cubs, as they did not sell all their ticket. I think their parents ought to help their boy to come up to \$12.50 as the other boys. I, myself, Mrs. J. D. Nichols, am giving \$5.00 to start it off to help those boys get suits as they can't do good unless we help them. My grandson, Dennis Baxter, sold all his tickets. His grandfather took him around and he sold all of them. But if we parents don't help these Cub Scout boys as they start out, there'll be no need to help after they get downhearted. It is a good club for our boys, and Mrs. Alice Thetford has a responsibility on her. Parents, let's don't let these boys down.

'Let's Build a Shack'

That's been a watchword ever since boys were invented. Every boy wants a room of his own at home. Every neighborhood play group wants some sort of hangout that can call its own. It's one of those natural boy urges which you just can't knock out of boys' heads.

If you deny them the privilege of a home base, it's likely that they'll go out and develop an undesirable one. So it's much better that you have a part in helping them to satisfy this urge than attempt to smother it. The best way is to let your boy become a Cub Scout.

Cub Scout of America, a member of an organization of boys founded Feb. 8, 1910. To promote good citizenship by creating in boys a spirit of civic duty and of usefulness to others, and by training them in handicrafts, woodcraft, and so many other things.

Cub Scouting is something far more than giving boys a good time. The truly big ideas of Cub Scouting are the deeper values that equip boys for a richer and finer life. This is not always easy, but no task in Cub Scouting is more important. These ideals are the things which set Cub Scouting apart as something more than mere recreational activity for boys, Cub Scouting is a program for families and not merely a program for boys. The thing which most determines what your boys will get from his Cub Scouting experience is the amount of interest and cooperation which he receives from you, his parent. Through working with him, you will learn to know him. You will be influencing his attitudes toward you and

his home. That is important enough to be worth the sacrifice you must make. He will not get the full value from the Cub Scouting program unless you, his parents, take an active part. Cub Scouting is a device for you to use in helping your son develop physically and mentally, and have fun while he is doing so. It will also help him toward other people. This is necessary as a foundation to good citizenship.

Cub Scouting also provides a means of giving your boy the recognition he needs so much. Boys often develop behavior problems in seeking recognition. If he receives proper recognition he may not have to do so many exasperating things in seeking it.

A Cub Scout motto is "Do your Best". A parent motto should be "I will help my son do his best. The cooperation of parents is absolutely necessary for the Cub Scouts advancement and growth.

The promise is written in boy language, short and simple, so every boy of Cub Scout age can grasp its meaning. It is something which any boy can understand. It is up to the parent to help him to see that it is not always easy to be fair to the other fellow. Sometimes fairness requires unselfishness and placing himself second to some one else. To "be square" the Cub Scout must treat other peo-

ple as he would like them to treat him. There are many adults who seem to have attained the dignified state of manhood or womanhood without having first passed through the undignified state of childhood. Or at least many adults seem to have forgotten a great deal about their own childhood. Childhood memories dim with the passing of years until finally all that was left are those of the somewhat idealistic side. It just doesn't seem possible that we in our own childhood would have been quite the problems that we find our boys of today to be!

What all parents really need is a bridge between themselves and their sons. Cub Scouting is that sort of bridge. Through doing things together, parents learn to understand the boy's point of view and to deal more sympathetically with his natural urges and desires.

Yes, boys are fun. The only true sad thing about boyhood is that it's so short. Boys become quiet and manly far too soon.
