Texas size Mosquitoes invade the Ropes community--town is sprayed

C. T. McCORMICK CAMP WOLTERS

Charlie T. McCormick, a major in the Army Reserve and a citizen of Ropesville left Sunday for Camp Wolters, Mineral Wells, Texas, and two weeks' summer training with the 413th Civil Affairs Company of Lubbock. McCormick, an economics officer in the unit, is one of the two members of the unit who have been to every encampment since the unit was activated in 1951. The other is Major Arthur E. Walkowiak of Lubbock.

The Lubbock unit, consisting of 60 officers and enlisted men, will be joined in camp by units from Dallas, Corpus Christi, San Antonio and Albuquerque.

During the two weeks of training the reservists will put into practice the lessons learned during weekly hometown classroom periods. The first four days at camp will be spent in the field working on civil affairs problems. The second week will consist of classroom instruction and a command post exercise dealing with various related problems.

The two-week training is mandatory for all active reservists and is part of the general program to build up America's military strength to a maximum peak of efficiency.

The unit is scheduled to return August 18.

Tuesday night the mosquitoes in the Ropes community went into mourning for their dead. Thousands of them perished when the city cut loose with a dense fog of DDT. Up to that time the invading "biters" had been having a picnic and were making the entire population of the town unhappy.

Following the big rain of the last few days the insects hatched out by the millions. They were not just a few, but swarms of them, and still are where it has not been sprayed. If you want to get bit all over, all you have to do is step into a bunch of weeds and they swarm all over you by the hundreds.

Not little, weakly mosquitoes, but mosquitoes larger than flies with a bill all of a quarter inch long—if they can't find a naked spot they bite right through your clothes.

J. D. Nichols told us that he and his granddaughters were chopping cotton west of town when a bunch of Latin Americans were sent into a low spot to cut weeds. The mosquitoes rose as a black cloud and it was not but a few minutes until the laborers took to their heels, but not until they were bitten all over their bodies.

Mayor T. J. Redman called at the Plainsman office Wednesday afternoon and stated that the town will be sprayed again tonight—Thursday—and again next week. He said he wanted to extend thanks to the county for allowing the City of Ropes to use their dusting machine. The county furnished the machine and the City furnished the dust.

At no time, in the twenty-five years we have lived in Ropes, have we seen so many mosquitoes. They are a danger to the health of the community, and we are fortunate that we do not have several cases of sleeping sickness. It is our opinion that weeds should be cut and other breeding places treated to destroy the insects before they destroy us.

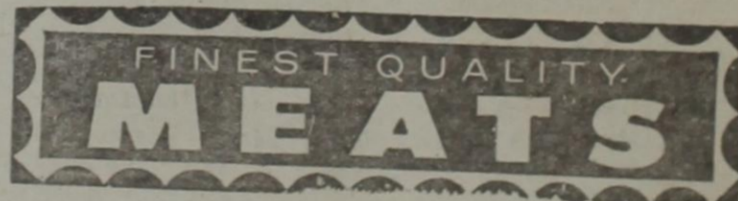

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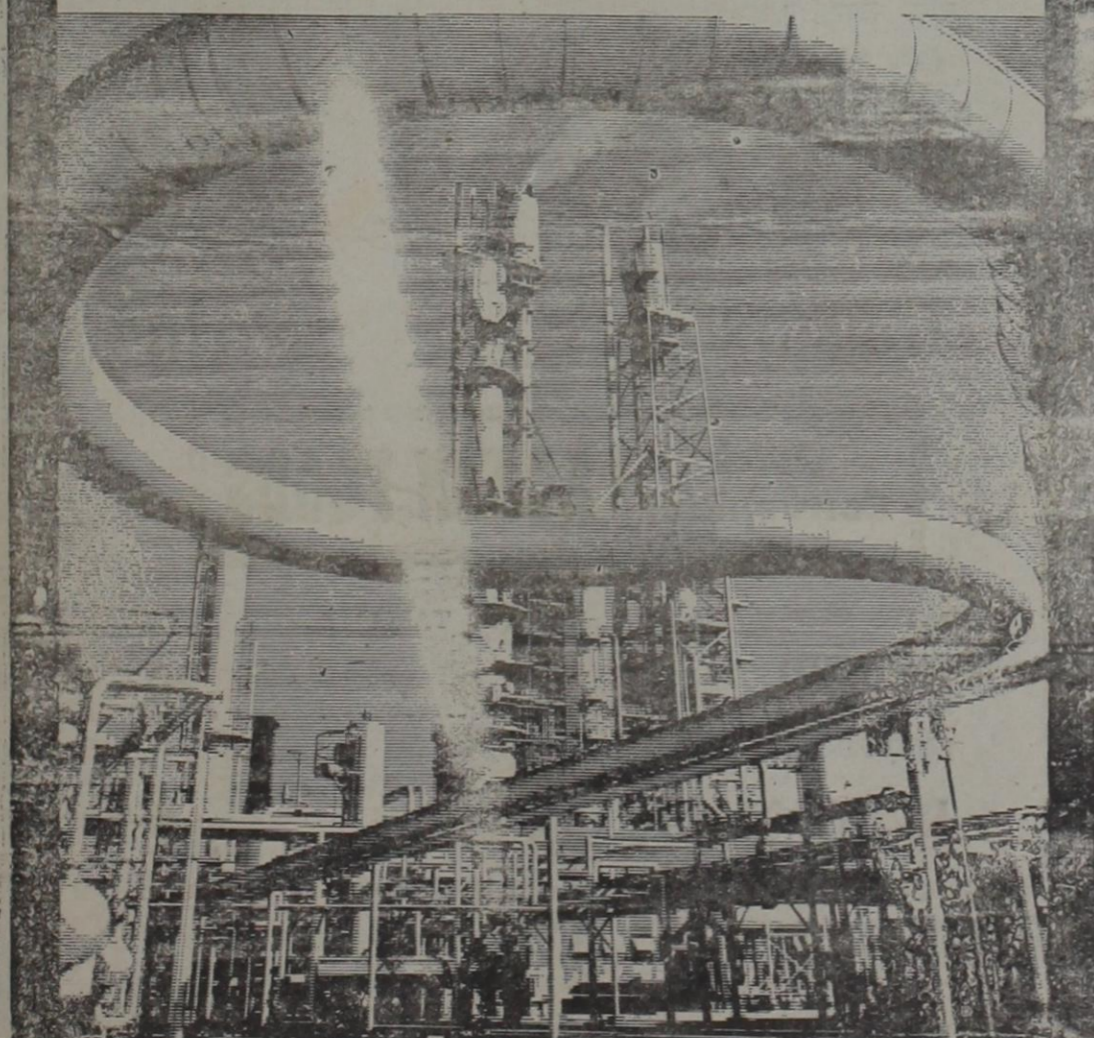
