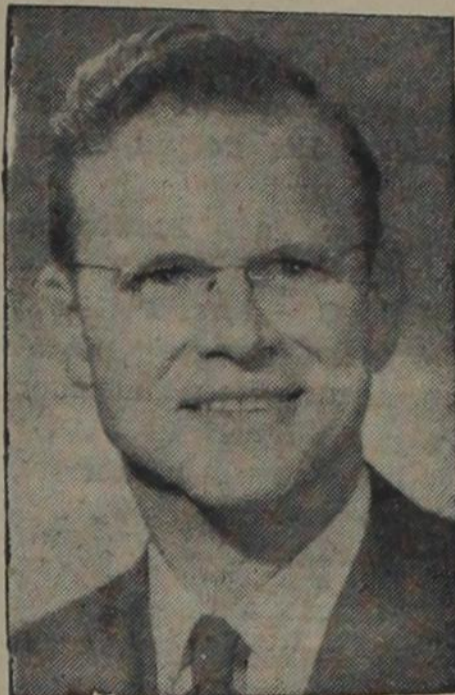

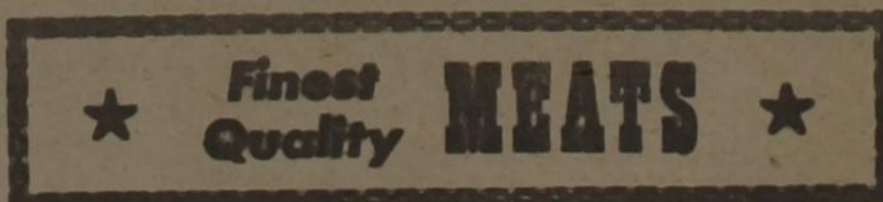

died in sixteen traffic accidents during January and February in the Texas Highway Patrol District 5A, according to Captain E. L. Posey, Commanding Officer. In addition, the Highway Patrol has investigated 135 accidents injuring 237 persons plus 263 property damage accidents amounting to \$294,470 damage.

Captain Posey advised that speed was the number one contributing factor in the 414 accidents investigated by his men. He urged all motorists to observe speed limits and help prevent accidents by voluntary complying with all traffic laws.

Eleven of the accidents investigated occurred in Hockley county with the following breakdown: Property damage 7, personal injury 4,

and fatal accidents 0. Captain Posey stated that this is a 36 per cent increase decrease in total accidents over the same period last year.

During this two month period, Captain Posey advised that the Highway Patrolmen in his district contacted by 9,960 traffic law violators. Speed was the number one violation, followed by stop sign violations, defective lights and drunken drivers.
