Some 1,500 Farm Bureau members from all over Texas are expected to attend the Texas Farm Bureau's 40th Annual Convention to be held at the Civic Center in Abilene, December 2-5, according to the announcement by J.T. (Red) Woodson of Waco, TFB president.

The convention climaxes a "very successful year" which has seen the state farm organization register the largest membership gain in its history, Woodson said.

The farm leader noted that this year's convention comes at a time when farmers and ranchers are enjoying unprecedented prosperity. But they face many crucial problems, he added.

Woodson cited instability of prices, rising costs, shortages of fuel and fertilizer, Constitution revision, and commodity contracts as some of the issues that will be faced by the convention delegate body in its business session.

The annual event gets under way with registration beginning at 2 p.m. on Sunday, Dec. 2. A Vesper Service at 6 p.m. will open the convention. Speaker will be Rev. Josef P. Aalhue, pastor of Faith Lutheran Church at Sagerton. Rev. Aalhue was recently named Texas "Rural Minister of the Year".

A young people's Discussion Meet will be held after the Vesper Service, followed by the annual Talent Find.

The Monday morning program will feature the annual president's address by Woodson, and a guest speaker, yet to be named. A ladies luncheon will be held at noon.

Special conferences and district caucuses will comprise the Monday afternoon program. Conferences will be held on Community Services, Young Farmers and Ranchers, Livestock, Dairy, Rice, Natural Resources, and Wheat and Feed Grains.

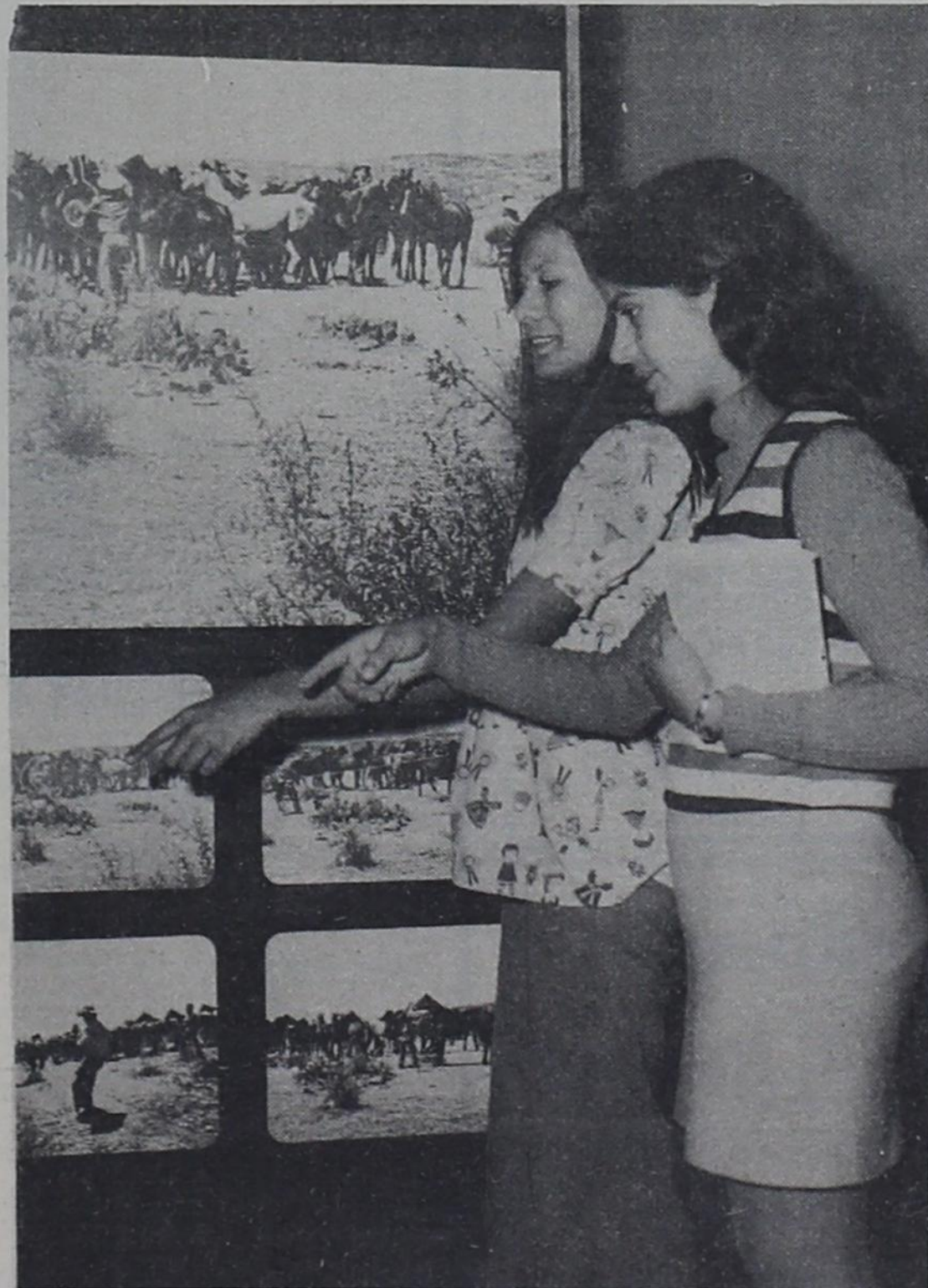
Finals in the TFB annual queen contest will be held Monday evening with 12 district nominees competing.

A voting delegate breakfast is scheduled for Tuesday morning. TFB Executive Director Warren Newberry will make his administrative report to delegates. Bill Reid of Lamesa, TFB secretary treasurer, will present the financial report.

Additional special conferences will begin at 9:30 a.m. Tuesday. These include sessions on Field Crops, Research and Education, Services, Poultry, Farm Labor, and Cotton.

A special entertainment program is scheduled to be held in conjunction with the recognition and awards program on Tuesday evening. The featured entertainer will be announced later.

The convention business session gets under way at 1:30 p.m. Tuesday and will continue Wednesday. The last order of business will be election of directors and the president. The Board of Directors will meet following adjournment to select a vice president and secretary treasurer from among their own number.

Local Judges Attend Seminar

Two justices of the peace from Hockley County were among the 72 judges who participated in a regional 20-hour in-service training school held in Amarillo, Oct. 23-26.

The training school was held under the auspices of the Texas Justice of the Peace Training Center, headquartered at South-west Texas State University in San Marcos. It was the second in a series of 10 which will be held throughout the state.

The justice of the peace training program is part of the State Criminal Justice Plan and is funded by the Governor's Criminal Justice Council.

The in-service training school was designed to help satisfy judicial training requirements set forth by the state legislature. As a result of bills passed by the 62nd and 63rd legislatures, justices of the peace must complete a 40-hour course in the performance of their duties within one year of taking office and then complete one 20-hour course each year thereafter.

The local judges participating in the Amarillo program were Theodore R. Clark of Precinct 2, Sundown; and M.L. Roberts of Precinct 1, Place 1, Ropesville.

Ream, a native of Palestine, came to the Lubbock area in 1939 from Archer City.

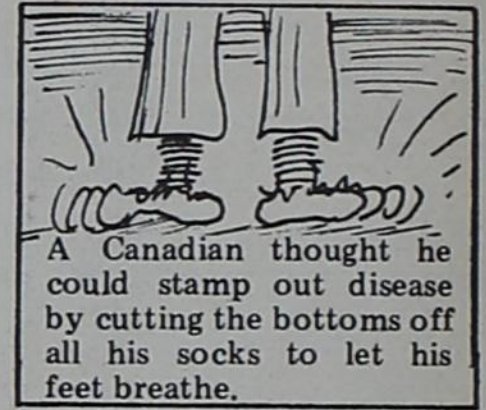
