Funeral Services Held For Elbert Cavitt

Funeral services were held Monday at 3 p.m. for Elbert (Cotton) W. Cavitt from the Ropes Church of the Nazarene with Rev. Bill Johnson, pastor, officiating, assisted by Rev. Dan Jones of Lubbock.

Perhaps on no similar occasion has such a concourse of friends and neighbors passed through the portals of this church to pay a last tribute to a loved one. Sunday schools were opened and the number attending overflowed onto the church grounds.

Within the casket was placed in a bower of flowers, forming an arch way, with crosses and other frames of flowers at each end. They were multicolored, and the greenness spoke of life in the midst of death.

Burial was in Ropes cemetery with Franklin-Bartley Funeral Home in charge.

Elbert had lived in Ropes fifteen years, and that he was well and favorably known was attested by the funeral procession which stretched for more than a mile as it rolled toward the cemetery. Out there they laid his mortal remains to rest—to rest among friends—while the spirit winged its way into Paradise.

Mr. and Mrs. Cavitt were married November 1, 1945, in Comanche County, and to this union was born two children, Royce and Charles of the home. They moved to the Ropes community in 1947 and have lived here since. He was employed by Wilburn Chambers at the Farm Center Gin.

Mr. Cavitt was converted and joined the Nazarene Church a short time before his death.

And so, another of our citizens has laid aside the overcoat of clay and passed across the river to rest under the trees—to listen to the angels sing and to know that death is not death after all but only going from one life into another—another which is tranquil and beautiful—to wander among the ever-living flowers, to be warmed by a sun which never sets, and be with friends who never part, in the land promised by the Christ—in a land where there is neither sorrow nor sickness. Christ conquered death and the grave and said, O death, where is thy sting, oh grave, where is thy victory. The hope of the human being, born to live only a short time, looks to eternity—looks to God—for the fulfillment of existence. It has ever been thus—man from the very beginning has sought God and that after-life—that real life—for the existence here, but prepares you for the things God has

to offer in the great beyond.

We can well realize the sorrow of loved ones looking on the face of one who will never speak again—we've been there—and we know that death seems so final, yet it but opens the door to the Christian's promised land—have we not been told the day of a man's death is better than that of his birth; have we not been told there is a time appointed to die? Did Christ not say, "I go to prepare a place for you... in my Father's house are many mansions."

In this dark hour, for it cannot be other than dark when a loved one is called home, there is little that can be said to assuage the grief of those left behind. It is a time when one stands alone with God—within the covers of the Book of Books lays the answers to all questions of life and death. Within the Book of Books is comfort which cannot come from a worldly source.

So, here we pause to mingle our tears with the tears of the bereaved, and say, Cotton is not dead—he has just commenced to live.

Survivors include his wife, Ann; two sons, Royce Lee and Charles Ray, of the home; his mother, Mrs. L. T. Cavitt of DeLeon; two sisters, Mrs. Ennis Moore of Ropesville, Mrs. Claude Stephens of Stamford; two brothers, Edward Cavitt of Pecos, T. P. Cavitt of DeLeon and two nieces, Mrs. Leon Young of Ropes and Mrs. Ardis Pace of O'Donnell.

Candidate for Congress Says People do not Rule

Few candidates making the race for Congress, deem it necessary to make the smaller communities. In fact, some think it is a waste of time. However, this is not true of Dennis Taylor who is making the race for Congress on the Republican ticket. This past week he was in Ropes meeting the people, going from businesshouse to businesshouse, and talking to folks on the street.

"During the past month," Mr. Taylor told us, "I have visited many of the smaller towns in this district. I am interested in these people. I want to know what they think and I want them to know what I think. I feel we all are working for a better living condition in the United States and, if I am elected to Congress, I want to go there with first hand information of what the people of my district want and expect."

Mr. Taylor told the Plainsman that dissatisfaction with the Kennedy administration was almost universal in this district. "There was a lot of dissatisfaction before the trouble in Mississippi," he said, "and now there is more. First off I find the farmers do not like the farm pro-

gram they are having thrust down their throats, and second, they do not approve of the actions and Federal Marshal who clamped a censorship on the news coming out of Mississippi—the reporters being forced to get their dispatches okayed before they could be sent to their newspapers. I find the people do not approve of soldiers with fixed bayonets pushing people around."

And, he told us: "I believe in State's rights. And right now, if we don't do something about it, it will soon be too late. As it now is, there is no such thing as state's rights—the Federal government has taken over, and if the rights of states interfere with the wishes and desires of the President, Federal Marshals and troops are sent in to show the states they have no rights."

"President Kennedy, backed by his billions of money, seemingly is trying to create a dynasty—the Kennedy dynasty. If people act now they might be able to stop it—if they wait it may be too late."

"You may not know it but we are being sold out." Anyway, he gave us something to think about.

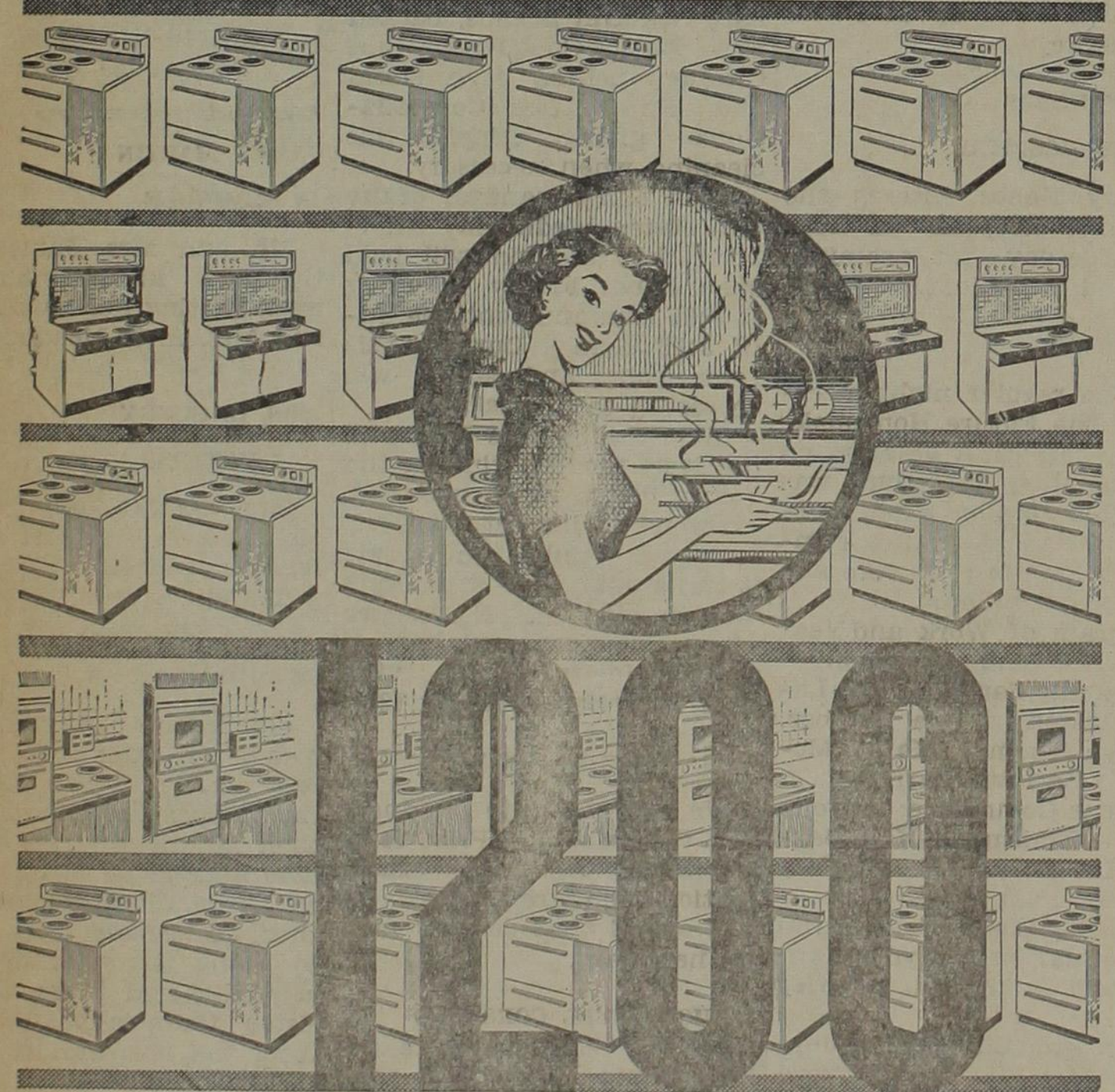
