GREETINGS:

Public Schools Week in Texas is a special time set aside each year in which to place increased emphasis on our public schools. Parent visitation is encouraged, and the citizens of our communities are urged to take an active interest in the school systems and to cooperate with the respective school boards, superintendents, principals and teachers in an effort to make Texas public schools the finest in the Nation.

Today, more than ever before, the importance of our schools is being realized by an awakened Nation. Education, both in scientific and liberal arts fields, has taken on a new perspective. However, with all the rush to train scientists and place satellites in outer space, it is important to remember that our public schools will furnish our leaders of tomorrow with the basic human, moral and spiritual foundations necessary for more advanced training and knowledge.

THEREFORE, I, as Governor of Texas, do hereby designate the week of March 3 - 7, 1958, as

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SEWER SYSTEM AND PAVING FOR ROPESVILLE

Preliminary steps have been taken in securing a sewer system for the City of Ropesville.

Through the assistance of Congressman George Mahon, city officials have been put in touch with agencies that will, possibly, make the installation of a sewer system a sure thing. Papers from the agency were received by city officials on Friday of last week. On Monday they were turned over to the law firm of Boedeker & McCann, in Levelland. Monday, also, the Lubbock Engineering Co. was contacted, and on Tuesday engineers were conferring with Boedeker & McCann to see what preliminary steps should be taken.

As soon as the necessary information is available the engineers will meet with the City Council to tell them what steps are necessary to get actual work underway.

It is the plan of the City to see that the sewer system serves the entire town, and not just a part of it. Right at the present we have rather bright prospects for obtaining it.

Also, at the time the survey is made for the sewer, a survey will be made to determine the cost of the paving of all the unpaved streets in Ropes.

The feature speaker was Carlton Grant, Assistant Superintendent of the Midland schools. He gave a historical review of the establishment of schools in Texas, telling of the first school to be established in the State at Fort Davis.

The total of the above, including 21-year-old exemptions, is 4,742. This falls far below the estimated voting strength of the county, believed to be 6500 and over.

We are requested to state that the third polio shots will be given to Ropes school children on the afternoon of March 6th. Dr. Moss, of Lubbock, will give the shots and will be assisted by the County Health Nurse.

These are third shots only. It is also stated that the shots will cost \$2.50 to those who are able to pay, but will be given free to those who are not.

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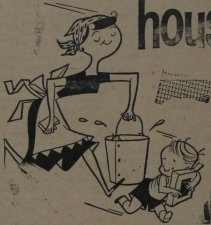
