A. WATSON IS INJURED

STORM WARNING . . .

First, we want to commend City Marshal Dub Riney for his alertness at the time of approaching storms.

Second, when Dub blows his siren when a cloud is approaching he has either located a tornado or alerted by the Sheriff Department at Levelland, or the Highway Patrol to give the alarm.

Third, the sounding of the alarm does not mean the town is going to be wiped out by a tornado, but that there is a possibility of a tornado. The warning in most cases is given in time for folks to seek shelter in storm cellars — if you do not want to go to a

cellar you are at liberty not to—that is your privilege.

Fourth, while no tornado has hit Ropes in recent years it is not immune, and these storm warnings given by Dub may be the means of saving lives and injuries some time in the future. Those who criticize the sounding of a warning might think this over. YOU may not want to seek shelter, but there are many who do. If the weather does not develop into danger, you should be thankful.

Fifth, Dub Riney rates a vote of thanks, for he risks his own well being if a tornado should hit.

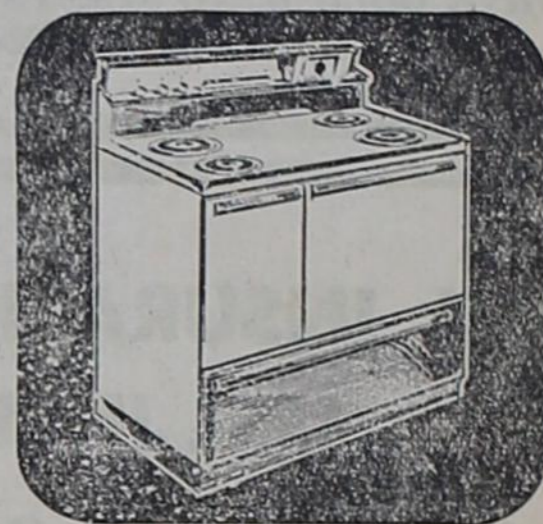
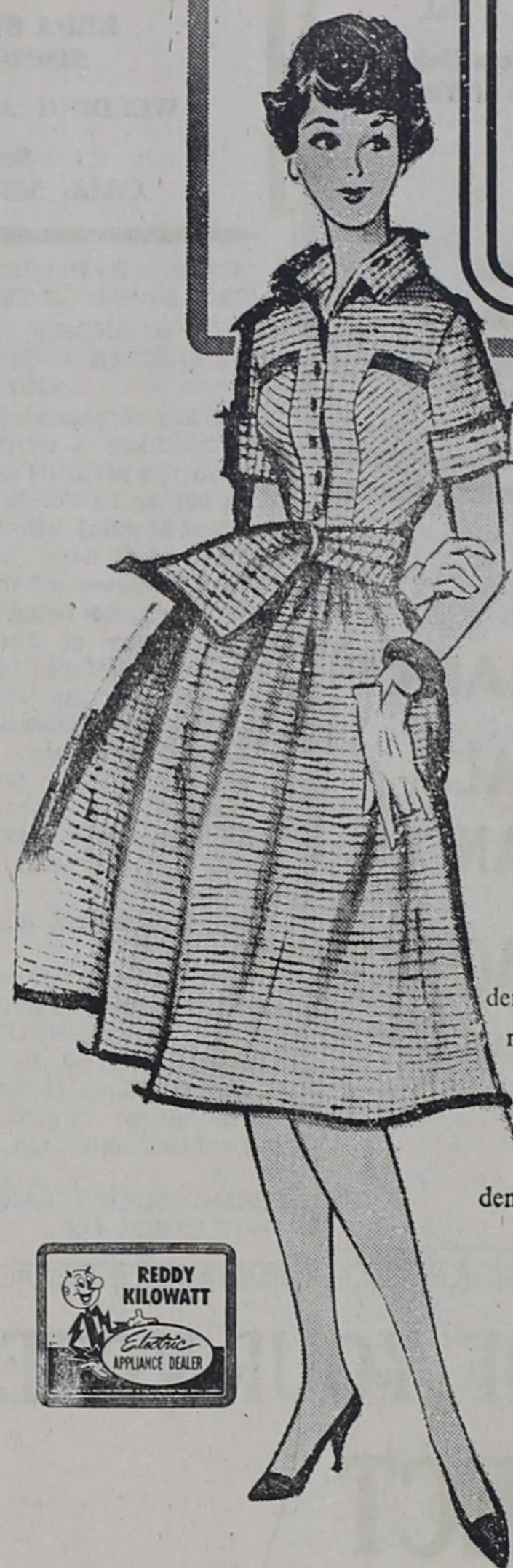
Mrs. Clyde Lovelless accompanied her daughter, Mr. and Mrs. Lynn D. Patman of Lovington, to Galveston this week.
