DOUG HENDERSON TELLS OF TRIP TO RUSSIA

Continued From Last Week

After three days in Leningrad we were on our way to Moscow. We had to leave one of our party in the hospital in Leningrad as she had a severe cold and maybe pneumonia. Two women doctors came to the hotel in an ambulance for her. They were dressed in long white gowns and white caps and looked as though they were ready to operate. We notified the American Embassy and that was all we could do.

It was a three day drive to Moscow—about six or seven hundred miles, I think. They say kilometers when talking about distance. There was nothing to see on the road except a few small towns and a whole lot of nothing. There was no farming to speak of—we saw a little wheat and a few peasants were cutting hay and raking by hand along the side of the road. Men, women and the kids all work. They live mostly in old log cabins on farms. One water well serves a whole community. They are about seventy-five years behind our country in the way they do things.

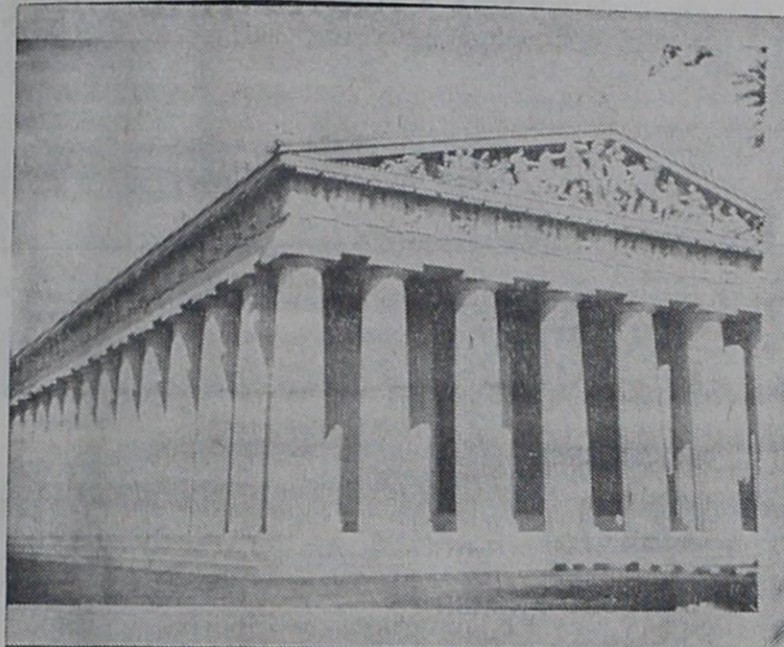
We arrived in Moscow on June 19th, which is my birthday. We stayed at the Metropole Hotel, which was built in 1890. It is about two blocks from Red Square. The Ukraine and the National are supposed to be better hotels.

The next day it was raining a little but we drove out to see the Moscow University. I can say it is the finest building I have ever seen anywhere. It is thirty-two stories high and is the tallest building in all of Europe. The landscaping is simply beautiful. There are seventy miles of hall and corridors in the building and twenty-five thousand students are enrolled. They only teach science at this school—no medicine or dentistry. It was beautiful inside except for the floors. The floors in the halls are made of wood—parkay layout—and they are worn out and look awful. The building of the university was started in 1949 and completed in 1953.

Next we went to Red Square to go through Lenin's tomb. There is a line-up every day almost one-half mile long. However, they take tourists up very close and cut them in on the line so we only waited about ten minutes. It is something I will never forget. Lenin has been dead thirty-nine years and there he is in a glass enclosure. He looks just like his picture. On top of the tomb is where they have the reviewing stand for Red Square. There must be room for about thirty people to stand.

We next took a tour of the Kremlin, which was not too much. There are sixty-five acres walled in, three or four old churches, a museum and two or three big office buildings. We only went through the museum and one church about five hundred years old. In Russian churches there is no place to sit down—everyone stands. I think most of the churches are closed. We asked our guide about that and she said that they are all atheists.

After the Kremlin we went to the subways and rode to Turn to Page 2

We Travel Down in Tennessee

Continued From Last Week
Memphis, Tennessee, is the Negro capital of the world—it must be! In three hours time we saw more Negroes than one would see in a lifetime on the South Plains.

As we neared the Mississippi River Bridge which leads into Memphis we were in a traffic jam. It was then we saw the Negroes—cars loaded with them, busses loaded with them—all headed for Memphis. Many of them had pulled over to the side of the road—many, we say, there were thousands of them in the line of traffic and parked beside the road.

The traffic came to a complete halt, stood still for almost a half hour, then moved a car's length—this kept up until we drove into Memphis. When we were able to get out of the line of traffic we discovered we were in the very center of the Negro district.

We were a little uneasy for a while for we thought, perhaps, we were about to be in the middle of a demonstration. Pulling into a service station, operated by a Negro, we asked where all the Negroes were going. He told us, "This is Saturday night—they come here for entertainment—dances and the like." Then he gave directions on how to get back on the highway leading to Nashville, telling us there were plenty of tourist courts along the way.

There were, but it was quite by accident we found one with a vacancy.

Nashville, Tennessee, is not only a beautiful city, but is often referred to as "The Athens of the South", because of its many schools and culture—taking the name from Athens, Greece which, when at its pinnacle, was called the educational and cultural center of the world.

Nashville is proud of the comparison, and in its pride replaced in that city The Parthenon, a replica of the Parthenon in Greece. It is the only building of its kind in the United States, and we found it in Centennial Park. It took more than a dozen years to complete at an expenditure of a million dollars.

While the building is constructed of reinforced concrete, it has the appearance of marble. Mighty pillars march around the building, and the inside is dotted with them.

We approached the building from the west and noted the sculptured figures over the entrance. These figures tell of the struggle between Poseidon, the powerful god of the sea, and his niece Athena, the goddess of wisdom, for

the possession of Attica, or ancient Greece.

In the center of the pediment, to the right, is the heroic figure of Poseidon with his three pronged weapon, or trident in his hand, his friends and supporters to the right. Opposing him, and to the left, is the equally heroic figure of Athena with a spear in her hand, her supporters to the left. Both of these gods covet the fair land of Attica and desired the worship of its people. They were unable to agree and appealed to the gods for a decision. The gods held their convocation on the Acropolis, the sight of the Parthenon, and this assembly is shown by the west pediment.

As a result the gods decreed that the one who should most bless Greece would be given control of Athens—it was to be a battle of blessings rather than a battle of blood.

Poseidon, in granting his blessing, struck the solid rock of the Acropolis with his trident, and as he was god of the sea, it obeyed him and came up in a rushing, gushing spring of salt water, symbolic of his promise that if the Greeks would make him their god he would make them a mighty maritime nation—their glory should be on the sea.

When it became Athena's turn to grant her blessing, she stuck her great spear in the ground and withdrew it, and from the place sprang an olive tree, the parents of all those which blessed Greece from that day to this.

The gods, acting wisely, decreed Athena's gift was of far greater value to Greece than any promise of glory on the sea.

Next week we will tell you of the inside of the building, which, once seen, will not soon be forgotten.

County Budget Set this Week

THIS WEEK IS YOUNG HOMEMAKERS OF TEXAS WEEK

This week has been officially proclaimed by Governor John Connally as Young Homemakers of Texas Week. Statewide, the program is about three years old. The organization is sponsored by the Division of Home and Family Life Education, Texas Education Agency. Homemaking teachers serve as chapter advisors.

The Ropes Young Homemakers chapter was organized in December, 1962, under the direction of Mrs. Joe Don Gamble.

Membership in the chapter is open to women under thirty-six years of age, who are interested in homemaking and are not enrolled in high school. It has been pointed out that the Young Homemaker chapters are not auxiliaries of the Young Farmer chapters, although many farm couples are members of these organizations.

The over-all goal of Young Homemakers of Texas is to provide creative opportunities for young women in maintaining effective personal, family and community life.

The Ropes chapter is one of the approximately eighteen Young Homemaker units in Area 1, which takes in 38 counties from Lubbock to the Panhandle.

We would like to invite all those who are interested in joining the Young Homemakers to our next meeting October 14. Our program will be on fabrics, their care, etc.

95-CENT TAX RATE CONTINUED

Hockley County commissioners have given approval to a \$753,048.30 budget for 1964, and set the tax rate at 95 cents per \$100 assessed valuation.

The tax rate is the same as it has been for the past several years, while the total '64 budget is \$13,470 below the 1960 fiscal guide.

In the 1964 budget, the disputed road and bridge funds are lumped in one sum, awaiting district court action on a pending suit over the re-allocation of the monies for each precinct.

The new budget is based on an estimated assessed valuation of \$43 million, an increase of about \$500,000.

At the 95 cent rate, county tax income will be approximately \$693,348.14, with a beginning balance of about \$59,700.15, boosting the budget to its final figure.

Apportionment of the tax rate includes 56.9 cents for the general fund, 25 cents for road and bridge fund, 8.85 cents for interest and sinking funds, 2.6 cents for library fund, and 1.65 cents for the jury fund.

Court expenses of \$10,826.92 — which includes \$8,500 for keep of prisoners — is down about \$100, while the charity portion of the budget is down about \$400. However, the \$26,579.60 figure for the latter fund includes \$10,000 for medical fees and hospitalization, \$5,500 for the surplus commodity distribution and \$4,000 for cash allowances.

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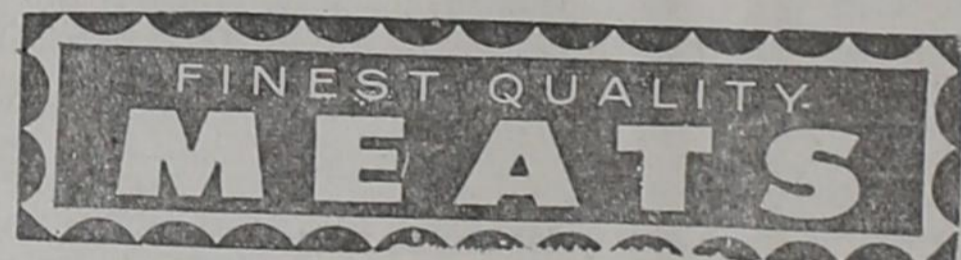

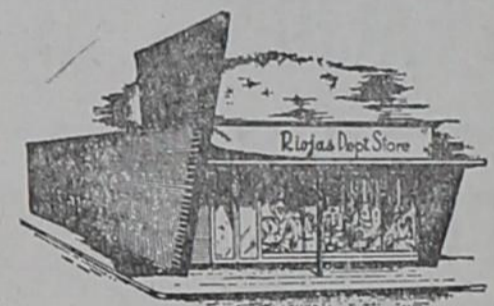
