Redman Elected Mayor; Thomas and Rasberry Elected Aldermen Largest Vote In History of Ropesville Cast Tuesday

The largest vote in the history of the City of Ropes was cast last Tuesday in the City election.

Election Judge Mrs. Bob Whitlock told the Plainsman that 79 ballots were cast. The largest vote ever recorded that we could find in the Plainsman files was 52 votes. In the past few years there have usually been less than 25 citizens take the time and interest to vote.

Mrs. Wilburn Burks and Gertrude Brown assisted with the election.

Offices expiring were those of Mayor, and Alderman, places 1 and 5. T. J. Redman Jr. was elected Mayor by a write-in vote. E. J. Thomas and Dennis Rasberry will continue as Aldermen.

To outgoing Mayor Buford Moore, we would like to commend him for a job well done. He has given more of his time to the duties of this office than should be expected. He has served our City well.


