WE TRAVEL

AUSTIN XI

Tuesday night we drove in to Austin, the state capitol—Austin, as Rome, seemingly is built on a series of hills and when you are not going uphill you are going down hill.

We especially wanted to see the lights over the city which formed a star, but we were disappointed in that part of the lights were out and the points of the star were not there.

On Wednesday morning we visited the Capitol building. This building cost the state of Texas three million acres of public domain, which at one time formed the XIT ranch. There is a myth which says the ranch belonged to Englishmen who financed the building of the Capitol. It is a myth, the money was borrowed in England, and a mortgage given on the ranch.

The building is of Texas granite, and five hundred convicts were used to build a railroad for transporting the stone to Austin.

The building teems with items of historical interest. In the south foyer is a copy of the Declaration of Independence; an ordinance of secession signed February 1, 1861; a marble statue of Stephen F. Austin, "The Father of Texas"; also, Sam Houston, commander in chief of the Texas revolution is there carved from stone; a bronze plaque in memory of the enlisted men in World War II; a bronze plaque in memory of the owners of Granite Mountain, who donated 15,000 carloads of granite to build the Capitol, and the floor has inlays commemorating many of the historic battles fought on Texas soil.

On the walls are paintings depicting the surrender of Santana; a portrait of David Crockett and Morris Sheppard.

At the intersection of the main corridors is a huge, white circular chamber rising to the dome. Four wings project in four general directions. The wings extending east and west are three stories high, those extending north and south are four stories. Portraits of the provisional governor, presidents of the Republic, and governors of the State hang in their respective panels on the first, second and third floors, and standing as a tribute to a great woman is a marble statue of Miriam A. Ferguson.

Those living at the time of turmoil brought about by Jim Ferguson and the Ku Klux Klan will hardly forget the events leading up to the election of Mrs. Ferguson. Jim Ferguson was a controversial figure, and through hook and crook he was impeached as governor of the state. To vindicate his name Mrs. Ferguson made the race for governor and the people of Texas elected her twice to the governor's chair. Ferguson was a fire eater when it came to politics and blated his way across the pages of history in a way that he will never be forgotten.

On the terazzo floor the history of Texas is depicted under six flags—colorful

"SOUTHERN CROSS CRUSADE" AT BAPTIST CHURCH

Evangelist Billy Graham's unprecedented Crusade in Australia and New Zealand is graphically documented on the motion picture screen in the remarkable feature-length film, "SOUTHERN CROSS CRUSADE", which comes to this City Tuesday, November 17th, in a premiere showing at First Baptist Church at 7:30 p.m.

The spiritual conquest of a Continent saw three and a half million persons attend 114 meetings in Cities spanning 3,350 miles from Perth, on Australia's West Coast, to the three principle cities of New Zealand to the Southeast. In addition, the rest of the Nation shared in the event through television, radio and a system of land-line relays which penetrated the heart of Australia's "Out back".

"Southern Cross Crusade" captures the impact of the citywide meetings as camera crews recorded the Message in sermon and song. Scenes of Dr. Graham preaching to vast crowds in stadiums, halls and on the turf of great Cricket Grounds, are augmented by a montage of platform activity featuring George Beverly Shea, the Graham Team soloist; Cliff Barrows, song leader and conductor of the many-thousand voice choirs; and a Team of Associate Evangelists including Grady Wilson, Leighton Ford and Joe Blinco.

Highlights of the film include the climatic service of the Melbourne Crusade as 140,000 persons jammed the Cricket Grounds to provide the largest single crowd ever to attend a Billy Graham meeting. The closing service of the Sydney Crusade is documented, an event which saw two adjoining Grounds crowded to capacity as 150,000 persons gathered, 5,643 of them responding to Dr. Graham's invitation to commit their lives to Christ.

Interwoven throughout the Crusade scenes are glimpses of Australia and New Zealand and countryside and animal life, giving the viewer a warm introduction to the Land Down Under.

Members of Lions Clubs throughout Texas this month are pausing to pay recognition to their camp for crippled children which has given 4,284 handicapped youngsters a new dimension of

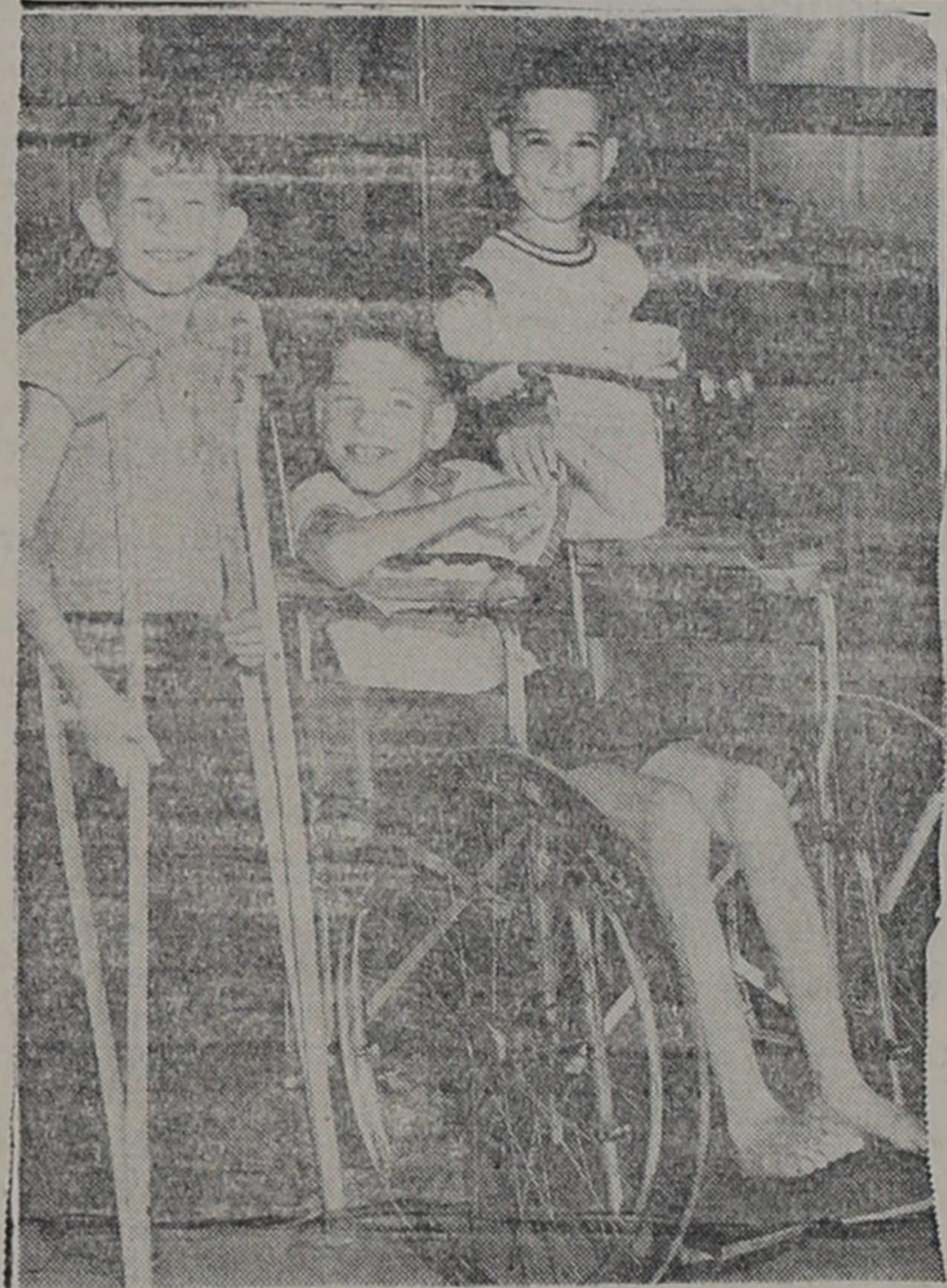
freedom since it was opened in 1953.

The camp, located at Kerrville in the Hill Country of Central Texas, is free to any crippled, blind, deaf or mute child between the

ages of 7 and 16. The 16 permanent buildings dotting the 504 hillside acres represent an investment of more than \$600,000.

At the camp, the youngsters who have been denied a normal childhood through no fault of their own, learn to shed their shyness imposed by their handicaps. By mutual association with other handicapped children and by skillful and gentle counseling, these youngsters have found the freedom to grow, mentally and spiritually, into useful citizens of tomorrow.

While the Lions are paying tribute to their camp, we would like to pay tribute to the Lions and their friends who have supported this great venture of the heart. We know a man never stands so straight as when he stoops to help a crippled child.

seals of the nations symbolized here are those of Spain, France, Mexico, the Republic of Texas, and the Confederate States of America.

On the second floor is the governor's office, the Senate Chamber, and hanging on the walls of this room are many historical paintings, including Dawn at the Alamo, Battle of San Jacinto, Stephen F. Austin, the Lary of Goliad, and others.

Also, here is found the House Chamber. The original San Jacinto battle flag hangs behind the speaker's rostrum.

Of greater interest is the State Library, located in the west basement of the State Highway building and contains Texas' most precious documents, such as the letter written by Col. Travis from the Alamo, Texas Declaration of Independence, Treaties between Texas and Great Britain, France and the Netherlands, and the Friendship Treaty between the Indian tribes.

There is more there than can be seen on one short visit, and one could spend a week prowling through the building. We were standing on the steps of the west entrance when an old gentleman came up and we asked, "What time does the Legislature go into session?" And he replied, "At 11:00 o'clock, and they adjourn after three hours. Now, ain't that a day's work for the pay they draw."

While in Austin we visited in the office of a very old friend, J. D. Freeman, recognized as one of the outstanding civil engineers of the state.

Shades of the past.
We thought how years ago our paths had met, mingled and then parted again—with in this vision was Ross Buckner, and the office of the Crystal Theatre in Ralls—the ghost of Uncle Green Harrison, and characters we had not thought of in years.

Ross was teaching his first term of school; J. D. was just starting to entertain the idea of being an engineer, and we were dreaming of a great career as a journalist. In a manner of speaking, I suppose most of us reached the goal we were seeking to attain.

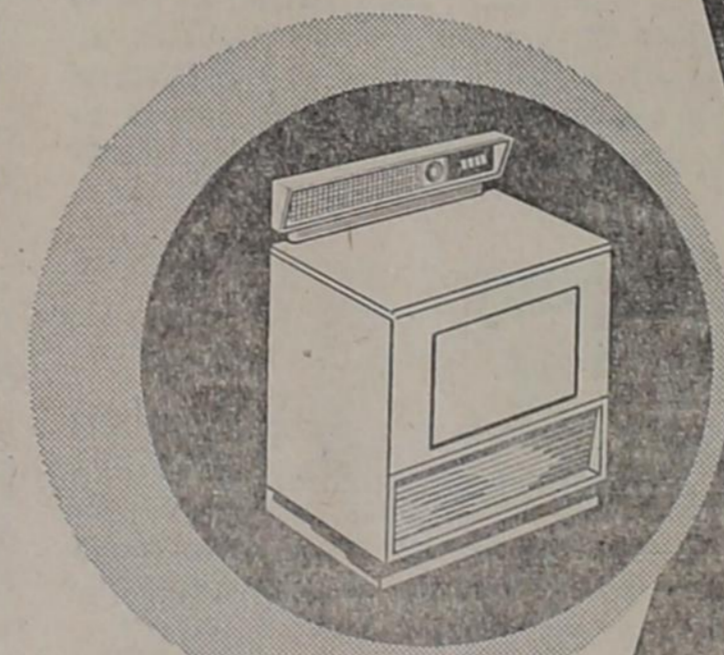

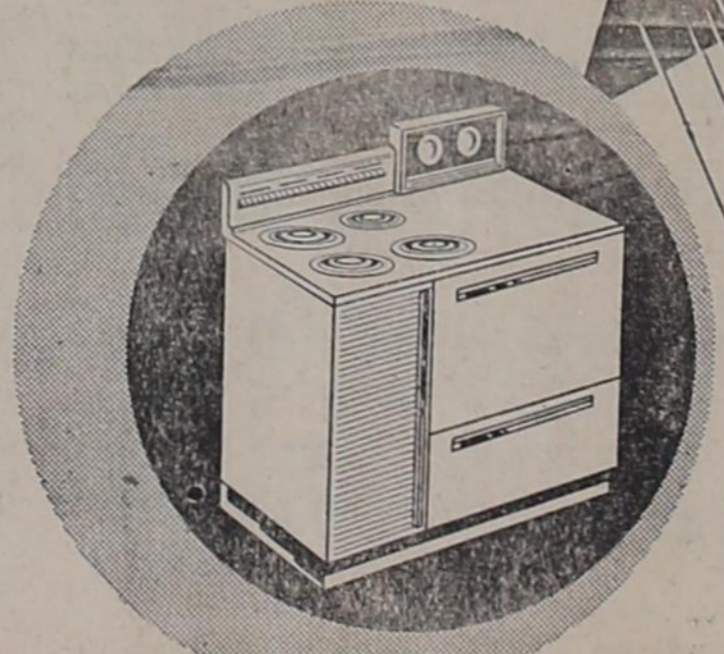

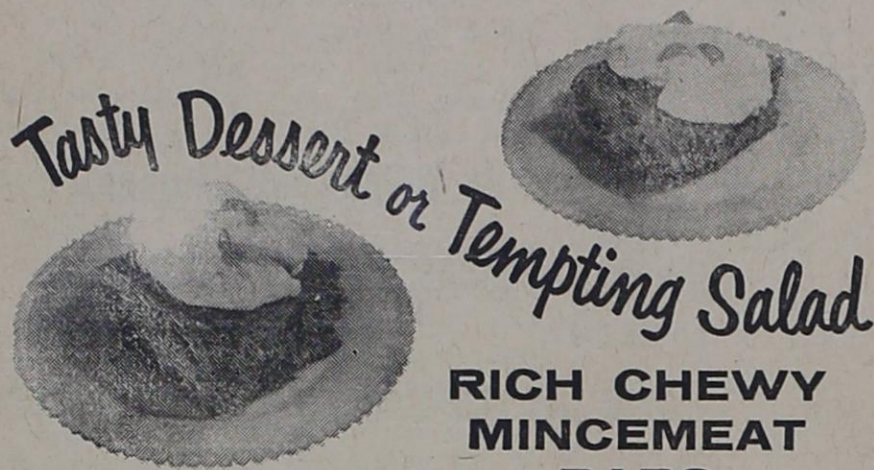
