The report on Mr. Davidson's work in the countf over the past year shows that he visits more than one hundred different places each month; shows that he put out more than 10,000 pounds of Pival dry bait mix, 24 quarts of Pivalyn water soluble bait, 64 pounds of Cynogas A dust and 1160 pounds of DDT 10 per cent dust.

This is a service furnished to the folks of the county free of charge and there is, perhaps, no other project that is more important. Reports show that rats are responsible for thousands of dollars in damage each year, as well as being the carriers of contagious diseases, including typhus fever. Lincoln, Nebraska, this week




