Happy Day--Rain Pelts South Plains

As this is written Tuesday evening at 6:40 it is raining --it has been raining for several minutes--sluices of water are running down the street, but now it is letting up, the squall line has passed us and moved southeast. As I look out the window of the office I see water--the first water that has been there for months, and there is Jack Ogle sitting in his car listening to the two-way, on the alert to warn the community of approaching

tornados. But luckily, he has not had to do this.

We've been under a tornado alert for hours -- they have been reported all around us. One is said to have hit 15 miles southwest of Denver City; another at Enochs, north of Morton. A phone call to the Denver City Press brought us information that a cloud, whirling in the air, was passing over Denver City. Marsha Snider, of the Press, told us: "It is raining and hail-

ing, and the wind is high. The first cloud has passed over, we now have another overhead."

A bowling alley under construction at Denver City was blown down, and the damage estimated to have been near \$16,000.

Rain in the Ropes community came from the north and was brought in on the wings of a wind traveling from 40 to 60 miles per hour. There was little lightning and no hail. In the city of Ropes 1 1/2 inches fell. At Tom Price's place, 11 miles west, 1/2 inch was reported; at Donald Blackmon's place, west of Ropes, Mrs. Blackman told us there was hardly enough rain to settle the dust. At Foster's Store, 4 miles west, Ray Martin said they received 1/2 inch.

A drive through the country west showed, in some places, over 1/2 inch, while in most places they did not receive over that amount. On the dirt road running from the D. N. Tipps place to the Farm to Market Road 41 it was not even wet. At no place did we see water standing in the fields, and none in the "dry" lakes. In some places there was water in bar ditches. At H. S. Abston's place, 10 miles west, the gauge registered 7/10ths. E. N. Exum failed to get a measurement because he had turned his gauge bottom up to keep it from freezing. At the Bud Rucker place Mrs. Rucker said they had a fair rain, but did not know how much. Other places we tried to contact the phone was out of order or no one home. East of town J. C. Pointer said his gauge showed one and 3-10ths inches of rain.

The rain east of Ropes was heavier. Mrs. Bob Thomas, 2 miles out, reported 1 1/2 inches. Lightning may have knocked out other phones east of town, as we were unable to contact Fletcher's Store, 4 miles out, but from reports we have been able to gather, the rain ranged from an inch to an inch and a half.

This is the first rain of any consequence since last November. The entire South Plains has been in the grip of a drought -- this seems to have broken it. Reports from all over the Plains, or rains are coming in. Brownfield reported an inch and a quarter, Wolforth three quarters of an inch; Lubbock 2 inches; Levelland a half inch; Meadow one inch; Slaton a half inch.

Other parts of the Plains reported a like amount.

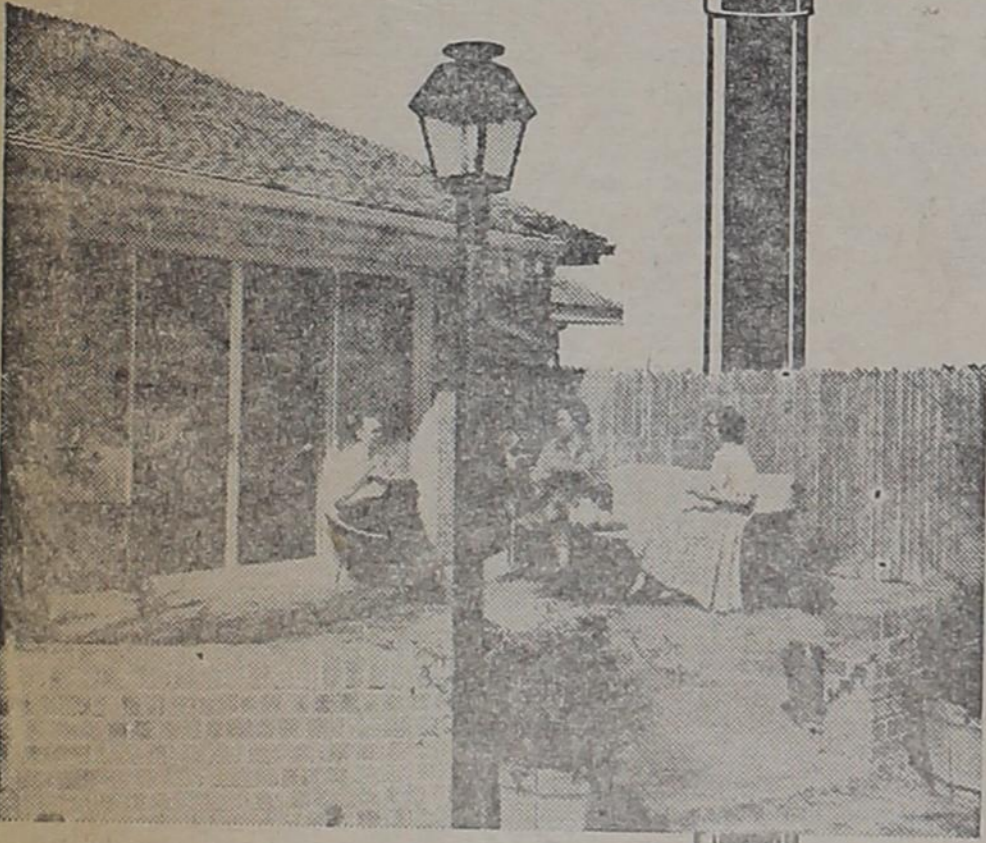
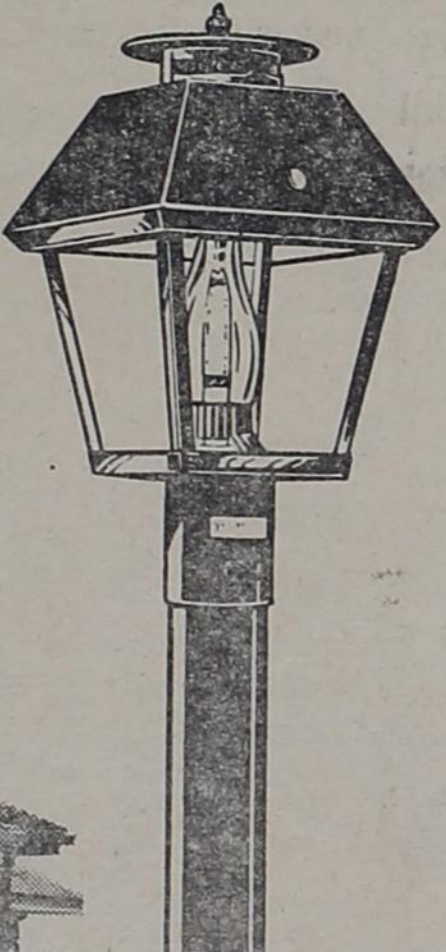

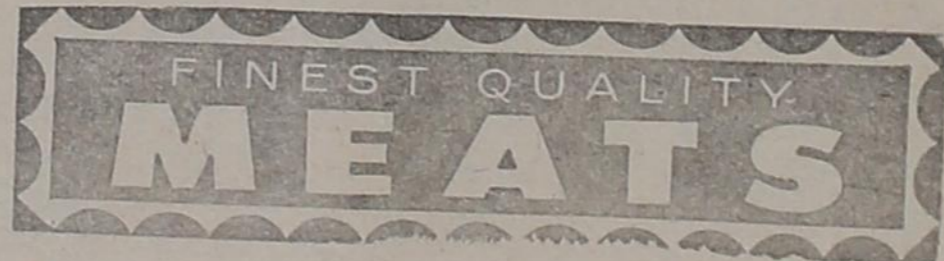

**BOB WRITES
FROM AUSTIN**

**CITY - COUNTRY
FIGHT DEVELOPS**

As reported to you last week the city-country fight erupted on the floor of the House last Tuesday. The country boy coalition was successful in adopting H.J.R. 41 which as amended would limit the larger counties to a maximum of nine members in the House, but would give them an additional member for each additional four-hundred thousand population.

This Constitutional Amendment will, of course, have to be voted on by the people of the state. If it passes such a population vote, then the rural areas will be more fully assured of representation more evenly spread over the entire state.

**TAX COMMITTEE
SLAPS GOVERNOR**

The House Revenue and Tax Committee last week slapped the Governor's tax program by killing his "escheat" tax measure by a vote of ten to six. The Committee reported the bill unfavorable with the recommendation that it do not pass. Then in a surprise move the committee turned around, reconsidered its previous vote, and voted to postpone the measure. This parliamentary strategy would keep this tax bill from get-

ting to the floor of the House in a minority report. This "escheat" bill is the one which would transfer all dormant bank accounts and all dormant accounts with insurance and transmission companies into the State Treasury.

**APPROPRIATION BILL
OUT OF COMMITTEE**

The House Appropriation Committee has read out the giant appropriation measure for the next biennium. This measure, consisting of well over one hundred pages, now comes before the one-hundred fifty man House for debate. It will probably be a week or ten days before the bill is brought up for discussion. In the meantime much study will have to be given this spending bill.

Of course, the less money we spend in the appropriation bill the less taxes we will have to raise. Consequently, it seems to me that we should give equal weight to cutting expenditures where possible before we start levying more taxes on the people of Texas. This is always a hard job, but let's hope we can keep our tax bill as small as possible.
