# Candidates Announce For Different Offices

## Ledbetter For District Judge

Judge M. C. Ledbetter of Morton this week authorized the Ropes Plainsman to announce his candidacy for district judge of the 121st Judicial District which includes Hockley County.

Judge Ledbetter, who is seeking his first elective term as judge of the 121st Judicial District, was appointed to that office last year by Governor Price Daniel following creation of the district by the Texas Legislature.

The district includes Yoakum, Terry, Hockley, and Cochran Counties.

A native of Wellington, Judge Ledbetter has practiced law in Cochran County for the past twenty years.

Judge and Mrs. Ledbetter have five daughters and one son, all are enrolled in the Morton schools.

Mrs. Ledbetter is the former Miss Mary Lois Goudy of Olton, a native of Archer City.

Judge Ledbetter was graduated from Olton High School in 1933. In 1938 he received his law degree from Baylor University.

The Ledbetters were wed in 1938, moving to Morton the next spring where he opened law offices and an abstract firm.

When appointed judge of the 121st Judicial District, Judge Ledbetter was serving in his seventh term as county attorney of Cochran County.

He was serving as Cochran County attorney when he entered the U. S. Army in 1945.

The Ledbetters are members of the First Methodist Church, Morton, where he is charge lay leader and a member of the official board of the church.

Among other civic organizations, Judge Ledbetter is a member of the Morton Lions Club, and has been an active Lion for the past twenty years. He is also a member of the Morton Legion Post.

Judge Ledbetter was active in helping found the Morton Little League and served as executive secretary for a number of years.

In making his announcement to the Ropes Plainsman, Judge Ledbetter said, "Due to the amount of judicial work facing the court between now and the Democratic primary, May 7, it will be impossible for me to contact each and every person in the 121st Judicial District, but I wish to express to each of you my appreciation for every consideration in the primary. I will continue to strive to conduct the 121st Court with the judicial dignity it deserves."

## George Mahon For Re-election

The 19th Congressional District's Representative, George Mahon, has submitted his name to the voters for re-election to another two-year term.

Representative Mahon has officially filed for a place on the ticket in all the counties of his District, and he has asked The Plainsman to make known his candidacy to the public.

The Congressman has no opposition. He has had the endorsement of the voters—without an opponent—for several years.

"It goes without saying," Representative Mahon said, "that I remain deeply grateful to the people of the 19th District for the confidence they have placed in me. It will always be my earnest desire to serve the nation and West Texas in ways that are right. I continue to be at your service and I will try to be of assistance in requests which come to my office and in legislative matters in the House of Representatives."

Mahon is ranked as one of the most influential members of the House of Representatives, with tenure in office dating back to 1935. His seniority, as well as his forthright approach to public affairs, has earned him high prestige in Washington.

He is Chairman of the Subcommittee on Defense Appropriations. In that role he receives national attention for his views on the nation's defense situation. He is the second ranking Democrat on the House Appropriations Committee and is especially active in fiscal and agricultural matters.
