VISION

Homer Henderson

"Where there is no vision, the people perish..." These words from the ancient wisdom of Proverbs accent an important truth even when they are removed from the context of the entire thought of Proverbs. It has always been true that the person or church or community without a vision for the future is in grave danger of perishing spiritually. Such death has three symptoms:

First, routine replaces risk. The person without a vision for life feels secure in the endless hall of daily routine and refuses to enter a single room of risk. His philosophy may be summed up by two well known cliches: "Better not take a chance..." A bird in the hand is worth two in the bush." Conclusion: Don't risk anything trying to get the two birds in the bush. The spirit of the person with a vision is much more vital and alive. His philosophy may also be summed up in a cliché: "Nothing ventured, nothing gained." A certain amount of routine is necessary, but it will lead to a living death unless a certain amount of risk is added to it.

Second, resignation replaces reform. The person who has no vision for his life is more or less resigned to his fate. "Things will never be different around here. Ropeville will probably get smaller and smaller..." Most people in the church don't care so why should I knock my brains out... I've tried a thousand times to break that habit and I know I can't..." Lack of vision leads to such pessimism and resignation to the status quo. The person who has a vision for himself or his church or his community is never resigned to failure or to anything less than his vision demands. He is willing to work for reform, to make some changes, changes in himself, changes in his church or community. He is alive.

Third, reaction replaces response. Have you ever known people who spend their lives reacting to people and to situations and never responding to anything? Reaction is negative. Response is positive. A reaction to a medication means that your body is offering resistance to treatment. People without vision are like that. They react to the future negatively. They yearn for the "good old days" or for the "way we've always done it." Suggest a new idea or a difficult challenge and their reaction will be, "We can't do it... It won't work..." A response to medication means that your body has accepted the medicine and that healing will take place. People with vision are like that. They respond to the demands of the future positively. They will accept a challenge, try a new idea, tread an untraveled path. They are open to the present and to the future. They have a vision. They are alive.

"Where there is no vision, the people perish..." (Proverb 29:18, KJV) We ought to have a vision for life which bridges the difference between what we are and what we ought to be and which makes all the difference between people who perish and people who live fully.

ZIP Code Will Speed Your Mail

ZIP Code will help Santa and his helpers deliver Christmas presents this year.

Postmaster Martin today emphasized that the proper ZIP Code in the address will help assure on-time delivery of Christmas presents sent through the mail.

"Every Christmas several million of Santa's presents travel through the mails. In a great many instances, ZIP Coded parcels travel by shorter routes and are handled fewer times because the five digits help postal clerks choose more direct transportation routes," the Postmaster said. "This means there is less chance for damage to the gifts because they are handled fewer times."

ZIP Codes often help deliver a package that otherwise would be sent to the dead parcel office because the address can't be read.

"There is nothing more unpleasant for postal employees than not being able to deliver a Christmas package and knowing that some youngster won't receive the gift because the address was illegible," Postmaster Martin said.

"The key to the best possible postal service is ZIP Code. If you don't have the ZIP Codes for any addresses on your mailing list, they can be obtained through the Post Office."

You can help the Post Office and speed delivery by separating greeting cards into groups, local boxes, local route, and out of town bundles, (group all for one town together). It will be appreciated by the postal employees.

He had suffered a fractured

The special holiday stamp is a replica of a painting by Hans Memling, Flemish master of the Renaissance Era, now ranging in the National Gallery of Art in Washington, D. C.

The stamp, which is now on sale at the Ropesville post office was designed from the

central portion of Memling's oil, "Madonna and Child with Angels" which was painted on wood about 1480.

Postmaster Martin noted that use of the stamp for the sending of greeting cards assures first-class handling. That means the cards will be forwarded if the addressee has moved or will be returned if there is a return address.

This is the fifth in a series of holiday stamps and the Postal Service expects it to be another best seller. The initial print order was for one billion, two hundred million stamps.

The Postmaster estimated that 2400 of the stamps will be sold locally.

The stamp design was unanimously recommended to Postmaster General Lawrence F. O'Brien by the Citizens' Stamp Advisory Committee which passes on all stamps.
