VOTERS ARE ASKING QUESTIONS

According to a series of articles running in the Levelland Sun-News, voters over the county are asking questions as voting time approaches.

Some of the questions the Sun-News says they are asking is:

1. Levelland and surrounding communities are predominantly oil and agriculture towns. The large majority of the folks find it hard to leave their jobs and travel out of the way to Levelland to transact county business. The most logical day for many would be Saturday.

But—from 5:00 p.m. Friday to 8:00 a.m. Monday the court house is locked up "lock, stock and barrel". No business can be transacted. The tax payer, who needs the services and provides the money necessary for the pay checks of county officials, seem to be of little concern.

Many potential deciding voters are asking, "Why is the court house closed on Saturday?"—Signs.

2. Others ask, especially up around Anton — why can't elected officials work for the benefit of the county in harmony? Many Antonites are concerned over the slugfest recently witnessed in the Commissioners Court over the appointment of a county attorney. When there is a tie vote — why doesn't the presiding judge cast his vote, thereby breaking the tie?

Judge Louis Owens told the commissioners he would lock the door and all of them would stay until 6:00 a.m. in the morning, if necessary, but that he would not vote. However, Owens spoke out as to his belief but refused to vote.

After the session Owens told the commissioners they could have asked the district judge to order him to cast the tie-breaking vote.

3. Is the law for everyone without partiality?

4. How many cases have been dismissed in county court and why?

5. Whether Democrats or Republicans, are not county officials public servants of all the citizens of Hockley County and should therefore show respect to all by serving fairly and efficiently.

These are the questions the Sun-News says are being asked by the voters of Levelland, Sundown, Ropesville, Anton, and other communities in the county. The Sun-News also says that salaries are being discussed. The Plainsman was aware of the fact that there was some dissatisfaction about the closing of the court house on Saturday. We were also aware of the fact that there had been a number of cases dismissed in county court; also that many people in this section felt that Judge Owens should have broken the tie vote and knew that these things would come up as the campaign progresses.

At this point we want to extend to the county officials free space to answer any of the questions asked in this article — we think they should be heard and the people should be informed. If the people know why, they won't be asking why and getting distorted answers from several different sources. We think it should come out in black and white.

The Fire Department Needs You To Meet Required Attendance

Want Lower Insurance Join the Fire Department

Tommy Littlefield, secretary of the Ropes Volunteer Fire Department received the following letter from the Commissioner of Insurance, giving reasons why the fire department was not considered when insurance rates were set for Ropes:

"Dear Mr. Littlefield, "We have your letter of February 14 concerning the increase in fire insurance rate in your city.

"The primary reason for this rate increase was due to the lack of drill activity and the small attendance at the drills that were held. Numerous letters were sent to the Fire Chief warning him of the result if drill work was

not carried out on a regular basis with sufficient attendance.

"Keep in mind that drill must be held twice monthly for two hours each with an attendance of 17 men. Efforts should be made to increase the membership to 20 or 25 men in order to have sufficient attendance at each drill."

So, there is one of the reasons that insurance rates have skyrocketed. This can be remedied if folks in town will join the fire department and bring the attendance up to 17 at each meeting—as a matter of fact, this is going to have to be met before the rate will be lowered.

BLOOD TO BE TYPED SUNDAY

Next Sunday afternoon two Laboratory Technicians will at the church of Christ meeting house to type everyone's blood that have not been typed.

They will type all adults from 2:00 until 4:00. Then they will type all High School students from 4:00 to 5:00. Seldom are High School students required to donate blood, so all adults will be typed first, that records may be made of their types. There will be no charges so everyone in the Community is urged to have this typing done. It could mean much to you and be very helpful to some one else in the future.

Freedom In Truth

"Ye shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free" Jno. 8:32

As we continue to study the Love chapter in the New Testament, the 13th chapter of First Corinthians, we will study the seventh characteristic of Love, today. Paul said, "Love is not easily provoked." Love is GOOD TEMPER. Nothing could be more striking than to find this here. We are inclined to look upon bad temper as a very harmless weakness. And yet, right in the heart of this analysis of Love, it finds a place; and the Bible again and again returns to condemn it as one of the most destructive elements in human nature. Look at the Elder Brother, moral, hard-working, patient, dutiful... we will give him credit for all these virtues... but then

we find him sluking outside his father's door. Lk. 15. "He was angry and would not go in". So many times we stress the brother that was a waster of his possessions but seldom do we mention this brother that was so easily provoked. Paul said, "Love is not easily provoked". Anger and wrath will not work the righteousness of God, therefore Love throttles anger to the proper time and amount. There is a time for anger. Jesus demonstrated this on occasions, but he controlled it to the right time and amount. The apostle Peter tells us to "add... self control and also to add love". Love then controls anger, so that one is angry and sins not, neither does he let the sun go down on his wrath.
