### REV. J. E. YOUNG PREACHES FUNERAL

Rev. Jesse Young, of the Methodist Church, was in Brownfield Wednesday where he officiated at the funeral of Jesse Gunter. Rev. Young and Mr. Gunter were long time friends, he being converted in 1938 under the ministry of Bro. Young.

Dedication services were held Sunday afternoon, January 26, 1964, for the new post office building in Ropesville, Texas, with a large number of both local and out of town folks present.

The ceremony was opened by flag raising by Boy Scouts, with Dwight Hardin having charge, and the school orchestra played the national anthem, "The Star Spangled Banner".

Rev. Jesse Young, of the Methodist Church, gave the invocation.

Mrs. Hattie Sims, postmaster, gave the welcoming address, and said in part:

"It is with pleasure that I welcome you to the Dedication of the Ropesville Post Office. This is a time to which we have long looked forward.

"This building is really a dream come true. We had

outgrown our post office quarters and had needed more room, and more modern facilities, for years.

"Some four years ago we started contacting and corresponding with our Congressman and Senator in Washington, and presented our needs to the Post Office Department in Dallas and Washington. After several months passed, the Post Office sent inspectors and

maintenance men to investigate our needs.

"In May of 1953 Mr. Morris, our editor, received a telegram from Washington stating that permission for a post office building for Ropesville had been granted.

"Today we are very proud of our building and new equipment. It is an asset to our town and community. It provides much improved and more pleasant working conditions, and will enable us to serve the people more efficiently."

Mrs. Sims recognized letters of congratulations from Honorable George Mahon, Senator Ralph Yarborough, and Postmaster General John A. Gronoushi.

She also thanked the Ropes Lions Club for sponsoring the dedication, and all others who had a part in making the event possible.

Mrs. Sims then introduced Mayor T. J. Redman who acted as master of ceremonies.

T. J. thanked the orchestra for taking part in the ceremonies, saying that "the requirements of the Post Office Department were met, by efforts put forth by many in bringing about the erection of this modern building and facilities, making it a proud addition to our community.

He then introduced some of our own people: Roy Carpenter, local rural route carrier; Flora Martin, post office clerk; O. V. Fuller, school superintendent; Troy Morris, Plainsman editor; Ronnie Jones, Lions Club president.

Out of town guests were then introduced: Harry Mann, Levelland postmaster; David Sears, representative of Fed-

### 'DOC' BLANCHARD SEEKS POST

State Senator H. J. "Doc" Blanchard, of Lubbock, of the 28th Senatorial District, has announced that he will seek re-election to the post of State Senator from the 28th District. Blanchard, because of Senatorial reorganization in 1962, has served only two years, the regulation term being four years.

He has filed for a place on the ballot in the May 2nd Democratic Primary. Blanchard's announcement had been expected.

In his freshman term, Blanchard was named to thirteen committees, the most any Senator has ever served on, and was also named chairman of one.

It was the first time in the history of the Texas Senate that a first term Senator had served as a committee chairman.

The 28th District is comprised of Andrews, Cochran, Crosby, Dawson, Gaines, Lubbock, Hockley, Lynn, Martin, Terry and Yoakum Counties.

In 1962 Blanchard won the Democratic nomination against three opponents without a run-off, and then beat the Republican nominee in the general election.

The Senator and his wife Mary reside at 4905 West 17th Place in Lubbock, and have five children.

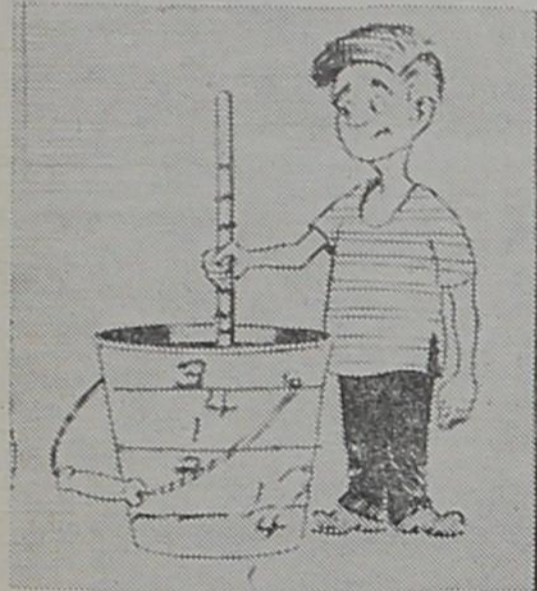

partment in leasing instead of erecting buildings to house post offices, pointing out that when the building was owned by an individual it remained on the tax rolls, while if it was owned by the Federal Government it would pay no taxes.

He was big in his praise of the personnel of the Ropes post office, Mrs. Hattie Sims, postmaster; Flora Martin, post office clerk; and Roy Carpenter, rural carrier.

Mr. Watson continued: "The new facilities will be a link with the postal system that today has over 45,000 postal installations. This system serves over 180 million Americans and handles over two-thirds of the world's mail. Our 580,000 postal employees are handling about 65 billion pieces of mail a year, including over a billion parcels.

"Some writers and speakers have stated that the British mail service is superior to ours. This is not true. The entire British Isles handles less mail than New York City alone, and in New York we have only half the number of employees as Great Britain."

It was also pointed out the mail business during the past ten years has had a phenomenal growth, with postal receipts in 1953 being \$5,282,222, compared with \$8,573,544 today.

The benediction was given by Rev. W. O. Johnson.

"Ladies and gentlemen,"

then said T. J., "this concludes the dedication ceremonies. We greatly appreciate you coming today. You are now invited to inspect the new post office and enjoy the open house and refreshments inside. Thank you."
