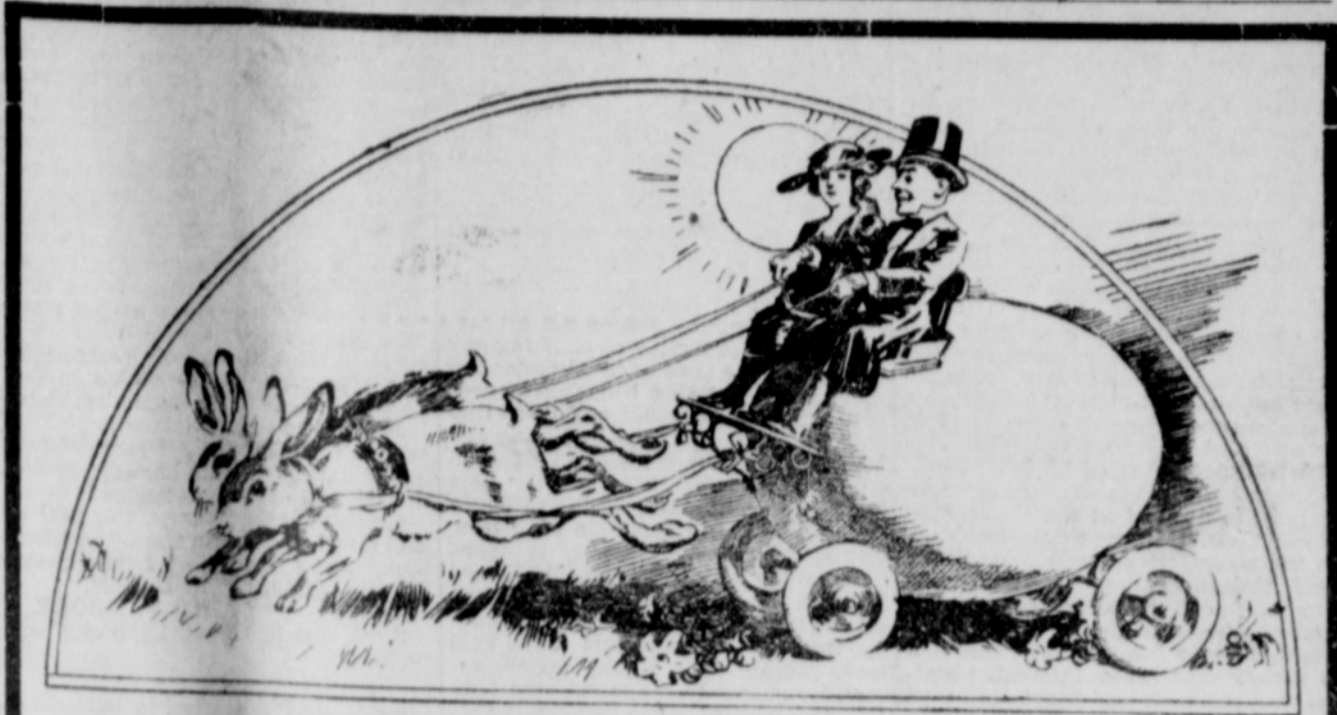

H. L. (Bud) Johnston authorizes the Slatonite to announce him as a candidate for the office of Sheriff of Lubbock County, subject to the action of July primary election.

He has lived in Lubbock County for twenty-one years, and has never asked for any office before and would not have been a candidate this time had it not been for the strong solicitation from many people who knew that he would make a good sheriff and was peculiarly qualified to fill the office. SCHOOL BOND ELECTION.

The election to be held April 29th to vote on bond issue for the schools of Slaton does not seem to be fully understood by some of the voters, they being under the impression that should the issue of \$50,000 fail to carry that an election can be immediately ordered for a lesser amount of bonds. Section 218 of the School Law of Texas reads as follows:

"The election provided in the preceding article may be ordered by the trustees on written petition of at least twenty of the tax-paying voters of said town or village at any time not less than thirty days from date of the order, which shall state the date when said election shall be held, the amount of tax to be levied, or the amount of bonds to be issued, as the case may be; and the trustees shall also name and appoint therein the manager or managers of said election, which shall be held as nearly as possible in conformity with the general election law of the State; provided, that when a proposition to levy such a tax shall be defeated, no election for that purpose shall be ordered until after the expiration of one year." (Art. 2858, R. S. 1911).

It is imperative that something be done at this time to remedy the condition of our schools. We cannot attempt to go into the fall term with only our present facilities, as they are badly crowded now, and with a large increase in the scholastic census just taken it is evident we will have about 1,000 pupils to take care of next winter, and unless the citizens of the district provide adequate buildings to comfortably house the pupils, the only course that seems available will be to depart from an Independent school district and become a city school. This will mean cutting off all those outside the city limits, and I am sure no one wants to take this method of correcting our school trouble, but something must be done this summer, and as we can not call another school bond election for one year should this one fail, it is incumbent on the citizens to see that the bonds carry on April 29th.

Order for School Bond Election.

The State of Texas,
County of Lubbock,
Slaton Independent School District.

On this, the 22nd day of March, 1922, the Board of Trustees of Slaton Independent School District convened in called session with the following members present: A. J. Payne, T. J. Abel, P. M. Prine, W. H. McKirahan, Mrs. Lee Green, Mrs. R. L. Smith, Mrs. Lydia Whipple, and among other proceedings had by said Board of Trustees was the following:

There came on to be considered the petition of Robert E. Leech and forty-two other persons asking that an election be ordered upon the question of issuing bonds of said school District for the purpose of constructing and equipping a public free school building of brick and concrete materials and purchasing a site therefor in Southeast Slaton, and constructing and general repairing and equipping an addition of brick and concrete material to the present or old school buildings of brick and concrete material in said District and purchasing and installing heating plants in the two brick public free school buildings in said District, and

it appearing to the satisfaction of the Board of Trustees that said petition is signed by at least twenty qualified property tax paying voters of said school district and is otherwise in conformity with the law the Board is of the opinion that said petition should be granted and said election as prayed for should be ordered.

Therefore be it ordered by the Board of Trustees of Slaton Independent School District that an election be held in said Slaton Independent School District on the 29th day of April, 1922, which is not less than thirty days from the date of this order at which election in accordance with said petition, the following proposition shall be submitted to the resident qualified property tax paying voters of said School District for their action thereupon:

Shall the Board of Trustees of Slaton Independent School District be authorized to issue the bonds of said School District and for the levy of a tax in payment thereof to the amount of \$50,000.00 to become due and payable serially \$1000.00 one year from their date and \$1000.00 each year thereafter up to and including the year 1952, and \$2000.00 each year thereafter during the years 1953 to 1962, both inclusive, and bearing interest at the rate of six percentum per annum, payable semi-annually, for the purpose of constructing and equipping a public free school building of brick and concrete material and purchasing a site therefor in Southeast Slaton and constructing and general repairing and equipping an addition of brick and concrete material to the present or old school buildings of brick and concrete material in said District and purchasing and installing heating plants in the two brick public free school buildings in said School District and if there shall be annually levied and collected on all the taxable property in said School District for the current year and annually thereafter while said bonds or any of them are outstanding a tax sufficient to pay the current interest on said bonds and to pay the principal thereof as the same becomes due. The said election shall be held at the Mayor's office in the town of Slaton in said Independent School District and the following named persons are hereby appointed officers of said election: J. W. Short, judge of said election and Ray Stephenson and J. T. Overby are clerks.

The ballots for said election shall have written or printed thereon the following: "For the issuance of the bonds and the levying of the tax in payment thereof." "Against the issuance of the bonds and the levying of the tax in payment thereof."

Each voter shall mark out with black ink or black pencil one of the above expressions, thus leaving the other, as indicating his vote. None but resident qualified property tax paying voters, of said Slaton Independent School District shall be allowed to vote at said election. The secretary of this Board of Trustees shall forthwith issue a notice of said election stating in substance the contents of this election order, and the time and place of said election and said secretary shall post a copy of such notice at three different places within the boundaries of said Slaton Independent School District which posting shall be done not less than three weeks prior to the date fixed for said election.

Immediately after said election has been held the officers holding the same shall make returns of the result thereof to the Board of Trustees of said school District and return the ballot box to the secretary of said board for safe keeping.

The manner of holding said election shall be governed as near as may be by the general election laws of this State, except as modified by Chapter 24 of the General Laws passed by the 37th Legislature at its regular session 1921, and this Board of Trustees will furnish all necessary ballots and other election supplies requisite to said election.

The above order being read it was moved by T. J. Abel and seconded by Mrs. R. L. Smith that the same do pass, thereupon the question being called for the following members of the Board voted Aye: A. J. Payne, P. M. Prine, W. H. McKirahan, Mrs. Lee Green, T. J. Abel, Mrs. R. L. Smith, and Mrs. Lydia Whipple, and none voting no.

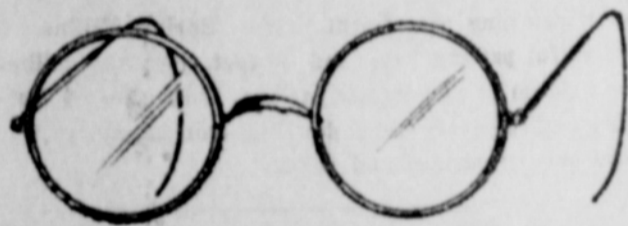

FOSTER'S WEATHER BULLETIN.

Washington, April 12.—Near April 16 a warm wave will cover northwestern Canada and April 18 it will be on and all along meridian 90 from Gulf of Mexico to far north, in middle sections 20, near Atlantic coast 22. Cool wave was expected to cover northwestern Canada near April 13, on meridian 90, 15, near Atlantic coast 17. Temperatures of last ten days of April are expected to average near normal; rising temperatures from April 16 to May 1. Great hot wave will cross continent from April 28 to May 3.

A great change in cropweather will begin in May for North America; a change for better cropweather in two-thirds of all cultivated lands. Most important world cropweather, that will have occurred within a century, will come within the next few months, beginning first part of May. The changes will be very great and the conditions brought on our race by the great world war are such that big crops in other countries would bring peace, plenty and happiness, particularly to Europe, but would ruin the markets for the good crops of North America. I assert that the world crops, outside of this continent, will be extremely good or extremely bad. If the latter, the conditions of all Europe will be fully as bad financially, and in matters of government, as they have been in central Russia.

Temperature of Canada for May will average above normal with higher than usual during the weeks centering on 10 and 25 and lowest on 20. Temperatures of northern and southern states will average near normal with highest temperatures during weeks centering on 7 and 24, lowest during weeks centering on 17 and 30. Rainfall generally will increase during May in sections that have been too dry and will decrease where it has been too wet.

I am of opinion that newspapers should publish complete cropweather forecasts one or two years in advance. I believe that it is practical for them to do so. Such forecasts require great labor and expense, but these can be met on reasonable terms if the subscribers of the newspapers will take hold of the work earnestly. If 20 subscribers will pay to this newspaper \$5.00 each, I will send to the newspaper complete cropweather forecasts for one year, all in advance, for this county and if 40 subscribers, I will make it for two years in advance. This will not change the weather bulletins. These long range cropweather forecasts will be made in such a way that every farmer can easily apply them to his farm or farms.

These forecasts will be for temperatures, rain, snow, hail, warm waves, cold waves, floods, drouth, severe storms, tornadoes, hurricanes, cold and warm winters, cool and hot summers, freezes, frosts, hot winds, early and late Spring and Fall; whether these will be above or below, greater or less, better or worse than usual.

I am receiving an immense number of inquiries about these long range cropweather forecasts and above suggests the only practical method by which they can be published in the newspapers. Only one paper in a county will be permitted to publish such forecasts. I will not furnish them for less than one year. I will not furnish them to individuals for \$5.
