SLATON COUNTY PARK HAS BEEN CHRISTENED

Will Hereafter Be Known as Slaton Santa Fe Park.

At a meeting of the park board Wednesday afternoon "Slaton Santa Fe Park" was selected as the name for the county park and tourist camping grounds located within the city limits of Slaton. The site for this park was donated by the Santa Fe Railway System, principally through the efforts of R. J. Murray, their townsite representative in this city.

A large and commodious ladies' rest room will soon be built for the convenience of tourist and other ladies visiting the park.

A concrete curb will also be built around the club house and flower beds prepared which will be beautified by the ladies of the Civic and Culture Club.

Plans are under way to finance the building of a "hut" for the Slaton Boy Scouts, to be located in the park. The Boy Scouts of this city will be the future men to guide the destinies of the community, and every patriotic and public spirited citizen will surely contribute something to the building of this "hut" for the boys.

Preparations are being made to set out more trees this spring. A. I. Kuykendall, president of the park board, has secured some very fine pecan seed which he will plant there, and next season proposes to set out a large number of pecan trees that he has arranged to get from South Texas.

The board also authorized the purchase of a piano for the club house.

The natatorium will be put in first class condition for bathing when suitable weather arrives. Water mains will be laid to the city's system for irrigation purposes.

The board passed a resolution prohibiting gatherings of young people at the club house when not properly chaperoned, and the keeper was instructed to refuse admission to any such parties hereafter. This club house is public property and any individual, society or organization shall have the free use of it for social entertainments, when permission is received from one in authority, but dancing is prohibited.

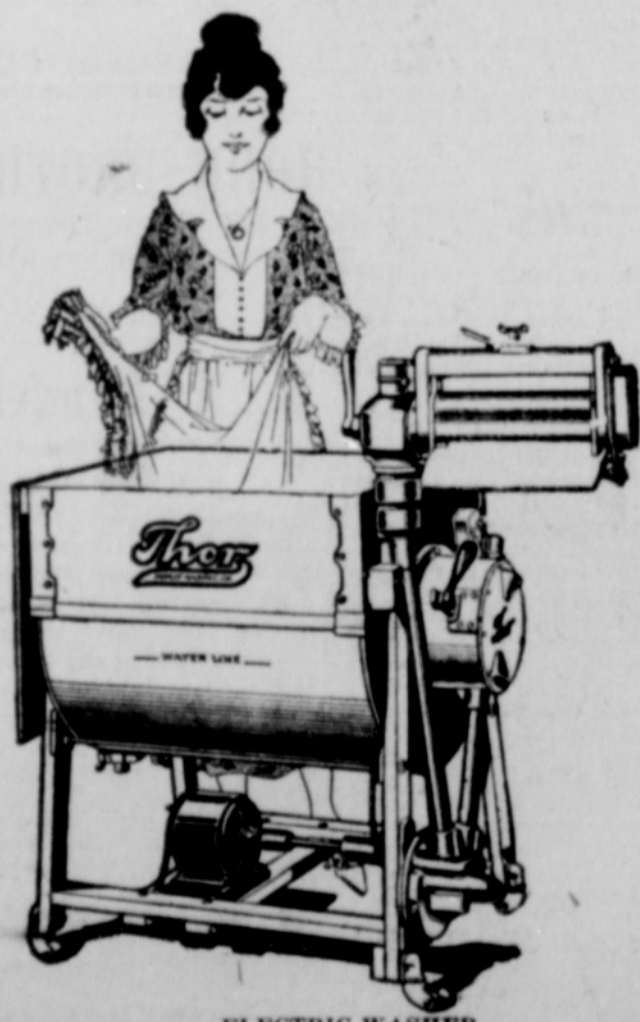

FOSTER'S WEATHER BULLETIN.

(Copyrighted)

Washington, Mar. 27.—The week centering on April 1 will average below normal temperatures on meridian 90 from Gulf of Mexico to the far north. The high temperature of that disturbance will be in northwestern Canada about April 3, on and all along meridian 90 April 5, and in eastern sections April 7. A cool wave will be in northwestern Canada near April 6, on meridian 90 April 8, eastern sections April 10.

Most severe storms of the month and most rain are expected during the week centering on 1 and these will be followed by killing frosts where they sometimes occur at this season. This will be a good cropweather month, except not so much rain as in March in the hard Winter wheat section.

Readers must necessarily carefully study the storm paths that cross the continent from westward to eastward and I am preparing valuable and necessary improvements. Heretofore I have had only a mid-latitude storm path. I am now arranging a northern, a middle and a southern. On my chart for each month will be three temperature lines. The middle line will run near latitude 40 and will be the solid line now used. The northern will be a broken line near latitude 50. The southern a line of small circles near 30. The forecasts of temperatures are not in degree but for above and below normal and you must learn to know about what the average daily temperatures are for your locality. Then the up and down movement of the temperature line will suggest, for each day, how much above or below the usual or normal daily temperature averages will be for your immediate vicinity.

Quite a number of my readers have got themselves all tangled up on my assurance that the general average of 1922 crops for North America will be good and that a great drouth will strike North America within two years. Those readers failed to notice that the assured good crops are only for 1922, while the great North American drouth will strike between April 1, 1922 and April 1, 1924. My predictions of great and de-

structive drouths in fifteen great countries within two years of April 1, 1922 has caused a profound sensation and is a very serious matter any way you look at it. I have not the least doubt that every one of those drouths, in the fifteen countries, will occur as predicted. The forecasts were made on a scientific basis and there is no guessing in it. If the whole truth could be given to the world, and if the world would accept that truth, a vast amount of suffering might be avoided and the governments of some countries, at least, might be saved from bankruptcy, anarchy and ruin. But

the world would not accept my warnings and therefore it would do no good for me to publish the details. It would temporarily injure me and I cannot afford to be injured in that way. I can make it a great benefit to myself and to those that have faith in my work. The list of those who have the complete details is rapidly growing. The evidences of these great drouths will begin to materialize between April 1 and May 1.

Washington, April 5.—The week

 wave will be in northwestern Canada

 12, eastern sections April 14.

First ten days of April was expect-
 ed to average cooler than usual and
 second ten near normal. Storm forces
 will be moderate and rain less than
 usual up to April 15. A great hot
 wave is expected during last week in
 this month. A great change in the
 world's cropweather will begin to
 take effect near middle of April in-
 cluding North America. No drouth
 in North America during 1922 crop-
 season, but about one-third of the
 country will get a shortage of rain,
 somewhat similar to the moisture
 shortage in the American hard wheat
 section the past winter. But, two-
 thirds of North America will get bet-
 ter cropweather and better crops this
 year than usual, making near the 10-
 year average. This assures an abun-
 dance of all crops for this continent.
 Those who are fortunate enough to
 plant and sow in accord with coming
 cropweather have a promising season
 ahead.

Weatherology has been so far per-
 fected that future cropweather con-
 ditions can be given for each county;
 but on account of the great labor and
 expense I have not been able to find
 a method of putting that valuable in-
 formation into the local newspapers.
 It would cost an average of \$100 per
 county. I will work out these crop-
 weather details three, six or twelve
 months in advance and publish them
 in any local newspaper if the expense
 can be arranged for.

Of course every farmer will do his
 best this year to produce big crops
 and America will have vastly more
 than it can consume. This will inter-
 est dealers as well as producers be-
 cause if other countries produce as
 good crops as are assured for North
 America we will not be able to sell
 our products. I have worked out
 these problems for all the continents,
 in a general way but not in such ex-
 tensive details as for North America.
 During the coming cropseason weath-
 erology will so completely demonstrate
 its vast value that all the world will
 be compelled to take notice and I am
 more than willing that the people of
 North America shall receive the first
 benefits. I am not making local de-
 tailed forecast for any other country.

I expect a large failure of sea-is-
 land cotton the coming season in the
 West Indies north of the equator. Of
 course this will make the cotton of
 our southern states more valuable.
 But don't let this mislead you. There
 are other important influences bear-
 ing on the cotton market.
 Last days of March brought an an-
 nular eclipse of the sun not visible in
 America except in Southern Florida.
 Scientists have not found any prac-
 tical value in these eclipses which
 were the "scare crows" of past ages.
 I have several pamphlets dealing
 with weatherology that will be sent
 to subscribers of the Slatonite on re-

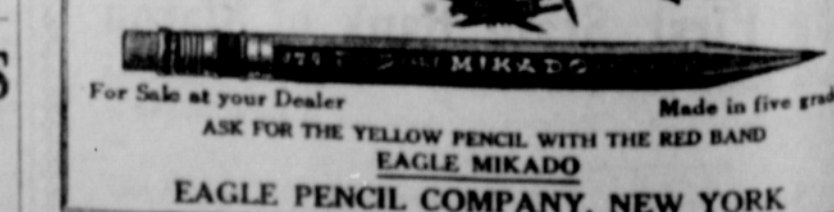

Value of Workers' Sacrifices. The railroad employes patriotically gave up privileges and concessions which their organizations had obtained through many years of negotiation and controversy." These sacrifices, Mr. McAdoo added, in the cost of making locomotive repairs alone, resulted in an annual saving of \$50,000,000.

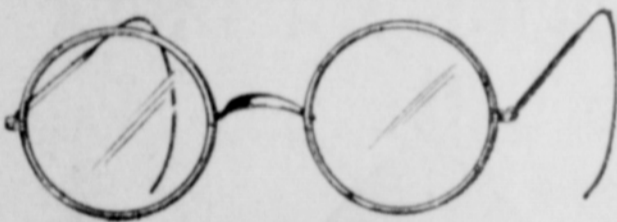

Order for School Bond Election.

The State of Texas,
County of Lubbock,
Slaton Independent School District.

On this, the 22nd day of March, 1922, the Board of Trustees of Slaton Independent School District convened in called session with the following members present: A. J. Payne, T. J. Abel, P. M. Prine, W. H. McKirahan, Mrs. Lee Green, Mrs. R. L. Smith, Mrs. Lydia Whipple, and among other proceedings had by said Board of Trustees was the following:

There came on to be considered the petition of Robert E. Leech and forty-two other persons asking that an election be ordered upon the question of issuing bonds of said school District for the purpose of constructing and equipping a public free school building of brick and concrete materials and purchasing a site therefor in Southeast Slaton, and constructing and general repairing and equipping an addition of brick and concrete material to the present or old school buildings of brick and concrete material in said District and purchasing and installing heating plants in the two brick public free school buildings in said District, and

It appearing to the satisfaction of the Board of Trustees that said petition is signed by at least twenty qualified property tax paying voters of said school district and is otherwise in conformity with the law the Board is of the opinion that said petition should be granted and said election as prayed for should be ordered.

Therefore be it ordered by the Board of Trustees of Slaton Independent School District that an election be held in said Slaton Independent School District on the 29th day of April, 1922, which is not less than thirty days from the date of this order at which election in accordance with said petition, the following proposition shall be submitted to the resident qualified property tax paying voters of said School District for their action thereupon:

Shall the Board of Trustees of Slaton Independent School District be authorized to issue the bonds of said School District and for the levy of a tax in payment thereof to the amount of \$50,000.00 to become due and payable serially \$1000.00 one year from their date and \$1000.00 each year thereafter up to and including the year 1952, and \$2000.00 each year thereafter during the years 1953 to 1962, both inclusive, and bearing interest at the rate of six per centum per annum, payable semi-annually, for the purpose of constructing and equipping a public free school building of brick and concrete material and purchasing a site therefor in Southeast Slaton and constructing and general repairing and equipping an addition of brick and concrete material to the present or old school buildings of brick and concrete material in said District and purchasing and installing heating plants in the two brick public free school buildings in said School District and if there shall be annually levied and collected on all the taxable property in said School District for the current year and annually thereafter while said bonds or any of them are outstanding a tax sufficient to pay the current interest on said bonds and to pay the principal thereof as the same becomes due. The said election shall be held at the Mayor's office in the town of Slaton in said Independent School District and the following named persons are hereby appointed officers of said election: J. W. Short, judge of said election and Ray Stephenson and J. T. Overby are clerks.

The ballots for said election shall have written or printed thereon the following: "For the issuance of the bonds and the levying of the tax in payment thereof." "Against the issuance of the bonds and the levying of the tax in payment thereof."

Each voter shall mark out with black ink or black pencil one of the above expressions, thus leaving the other, as indicating his vote. None but resident qualified property tax paying voters, of said Slaton Independent School District shall be allowed to vote at said election. The secretary of this Board of Trustees shall forthwith issue a notice of said election stating in substance the contents of this election order, and the time and place of said election and said secretary shall post a copy of such notice at three different places within the boundaries of said Slaton Independent School District which posting shall be done not less than three weeks prior to the date fixed for said election.

Immediately after said election has been held the officers holding the same shall make returns of the result thereof to the Board of Trustees of said school District and return the ballot box to the secretary of said board for safe keeping.

The manner of holding said election shall be governed as near as may be by the general election laws of this State, except as modified by Chapter 24 of the General Laws passed by the 37th Legislature at its regular session 1921, and this Board of Trustees will furnish all necessary ballots and other election supplies requisite to said election.

The above order being read it was moved by T. J. Abel and seconded by Mrs. R. L. Smith that the same do pass, thereupon the question being called for the following members of the Board voted Aye: A. J. Payne, P. M. Prine, W. H. McKirahan, Mrs. Lee Green, T. J. Abel, Mrs. R. L. Smith, and Mrs. Lydia Whipple, and none voting no.
