The Power, Light and Ice Situation

The light and power situation in Slaton is unchanged. The service is no better than usual, and the rates are not decreasing any.

The Texas Utilities Company acquired the controlling interest in the Slaton Power & Light Co. several weeks ago, and offered to trade stock in some prother company for shares held in the local company by local people. We doubt if they succeeded in making the exchange.

the exchange.

However, it is a fact that a representative of the Texas Utilities Co. is offering 65 cents on the dollar for this stock, has bought some and gave his personal check for same.

It is true that there are no re-

this stock to whom he pleases and for any price that he pleases.

But—it is a fact that the local stockholders paid 100 cents for this stock, have owned it for eighteen months without a divi-dend. Yet during those eighteen months the company made extensions to the service lines and improvements to the generating system that more than doubled its

Therefore, any reasonable per-son would expect the stock to have increased to twice its value by reason of the fact that the holdings had increased to twice their former value, and the busi-ness done had increased in an

even greater percentage.

The Texas Utilities Co. also manufacture ice and supplied Slaton with its ice until a few months ago, shipped here from Lubbock, a distance of sixteen miles, and it was necessary to retail that ice delivered to the residences here at from \$1.00 to

residences here at from \$1.00 to \$1.25 per hundred pounds.

The citizenship of Slaton rebelled at this price and encoured Messrs. W. A. Dykes and R. H. Tudor to build an ice plant, which they did at a control of

H. Tudor to build an ice plant, which they did at a cost of \$30,000.00, and they immediately reduced the price of ice delivered to residences at 80c per hundred pounds, and as low as 60c per hundred pounds at the plant.

The Slaton Ice Co. is not offering to sell ice anywhere but in Slaton. But we are reliably informed that the Texas Utilities Co. has threatened to come into competition with them unless they can buy the plant of the Slaton Ice Co. at a figure named by the Texas Utilities Co.

Are the citizens of Slaton going to let any public service corporation or any set of individuals dictate what they shall do with their own properties?

uals dictate what they shall do with their own properties?

We should say not, and there ar at least 90 per cent of the p. operty taxpayers of Slaton who haben clamoring for a municipal light plant for many months and presented at least one, petition to the city officials asking that they order a bond election for such a plant.

We feel that the time has arrived for the city officials to grant that request.

This committe is thoroughly alive to the potential possibilities of the results from such a movement and will spend quite a good deal of time along these lines. Washington, Mar. 8.—Every news-paper that publishes my work has ex-clusive right to publish within its asclusive right to publish within its assigned territory. But many other newspapers, within territory already assigned, have asked for permission to publish my forecastas. Being refused, some of them have tried to injure my work in order to hold their subscribers. Some have published that I am dead and my daughter doing this work; others that I never was anything but a woman. Then for years they said I was a St. Joseph, Mo., negro, giving his name; that negro did know more about the weather two or three days in advance than gro did know more about the weather two or three days in advance than some white men do; but he was a short-range forecaster, and that is out of my line; the U. S. Weather Bureau people are the principal forecasters of that method. But I object to being dead and if they will let me live seven years longer I will agree to give the world, at the end of that time, free of cost, a perfected system of weather forecasting that will be worth billions of dollars. Local forecasts follow: casts follow:

Sec. 5. Slaton and vicinity:--South of 39, between 90 and Rockies crest; lowest temperatures near Mar. 9 and 17; highest near March 13; average near normal; most severe storms and most moisture near Mar.

April will bring a change in evaporation. Since middle of April, 1922, at least two-thirds of the moisture for this continent has come from the Caribbean Sea north and northeast of Venezuela; next five or six months it will come from the Pacific Ocean. That means a material important change in crop-weather. First half of April weather will be bad for man and beast. It will be much like first half of February. But it will be good crop-weather. The change of evaporation for April will make so many crop-weather changes—some for better, some for bad—that I cannot cover them in a general weather letter. Then about the middle of October another change will occur. A very important change will also occur in 1924. I have not yet severed the data 1924. I have not yet secured the date, but it will probably affect the whole continent east of Rockies' crest.

Whereas, by virtue of power and authority vested in me by Article 2934 of Title 49 of Vernon Sayles' Revised Statutes of the State of Texas, I. H. C. Jones, Mayor of the city of Slaton, Texas, do hereby order that an election be held within the City of Slaton, Texas, at the City Hall of said City of Slaton, Texas, on the 3rd day of April, A. D. 1923, for the purpose of electing two commis-sioners of said city to serve for two years and until their successors shall have been duly elected and qualified, said election to be held in accordance with Chapter Two, Title Twenty-two of the laws of the state of Texas, of 1911, and amendments thereto, and the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas. of Texas.

I hereby appoint A. M. Watson as manager of said election, and he shall select two judges and two clerks to

assist him in holding the same The polls at said election shall be open on said day from eight o'clock a. m. to six o'clock p. m., with the privilege of a recess of one hour from twelve o'clock to one o'clock. Should the polls not be promptly opened for the reception of votes by eight o'clock a. m., the time thus lost shall be ex-tended beyond the hour of six o'clock m., so as to secure the full period

of nine hours for voting purposes.

Every person not disqualified by law who shall have attained the age of twenty-one years and is entitled to vote for members of the legisla-ture of this state, and is duly regis-tered, and shall have resided within the corporate limits of said city for six months next preceeding the elec-

tion, shall be allowed to vote.

The manner of holding said election shall be governed by the general laws of the state regulating general eral elections, except as otherwise provided by the statutes, above refer-

There shall be an official ballot used at said election, and all voters shall write or print on their ballots the names of the candidates voted for

for commissioners. A copy of this shall be sufficient notice in said election, and thirty days notice of the time and place of days notice of the time and place of holding said election shall be given by posting up three written or printed notices of the same at three public placs in said city and by publishing such notice in a newspaper of general circulation published or at least one year previous to the site of this order in the City of Sl. on, Texas.



ators and Representatives to support Senate bill in lieu of House bill.




