Plans for Slaton's Frontier Birthday, which will be held here Saturday June 17, are progressing rapidly, according to local Chamber of Commerce directors.

With six more weeks to go, many Slaton "menfolk" have already begun to sprout beards. Some are believed to have started as early as four weeks ago. Chamber members started their beards last Monday, with other Slaton men expected to have a growth started by May 15. A shaving license for those desiring to shave will be issued for a five dollar fee.

Wild Cat Is Going Down

Considerable oil excitement was caused last week at the corner meeting places over town by the fact that a group of oil drillers have moved an oil derrick onto the property of Charlie Holland located about six and one half miles southeast of Slaton. J. A. Willingham is living on the place.

Little information concerning the wildcat was available but it is understood that the well will be drilled to the 3500 foot level, if oil is not discovered in paying quantities at this level the well will go to 6500 feet.

Practically all of the land around Slaton has been leased and there are rumors of several deep tests on both the south and north of Slaton. While some people seem to believe an oil field near Slaton would be of great benefit to the section, others feel that it would bring an element to the town that would not be good. One prominent business man said that he believes that if oil should be brought in on land near Slaton that Lubbock would get more actual dollars and cents benefit from it than Slaton would.

Most real estate men look with faint confidence on the prospect of oil development in Slaton but a considerable amount of the leased land is held by major oil companies and it is pointed out that most of them do not take much chance when they put their money into leases.

Just to think of whiskers gives me an itchy feeling and if I let my pinkish, mauve gray ones, grow for the proposed Slaton Frontier Day, it will be under protest.

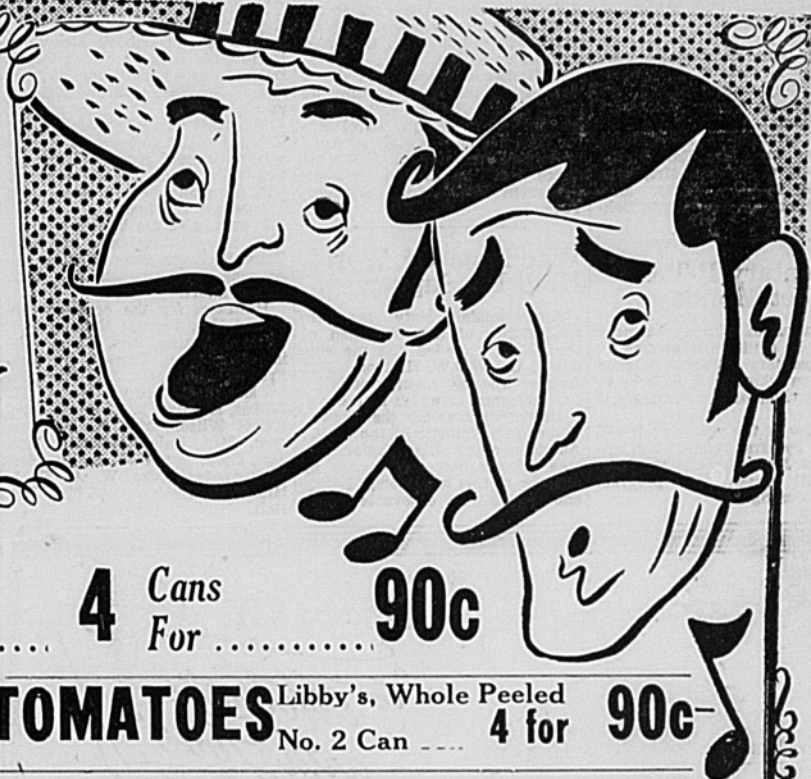
betterment of the world at heart.

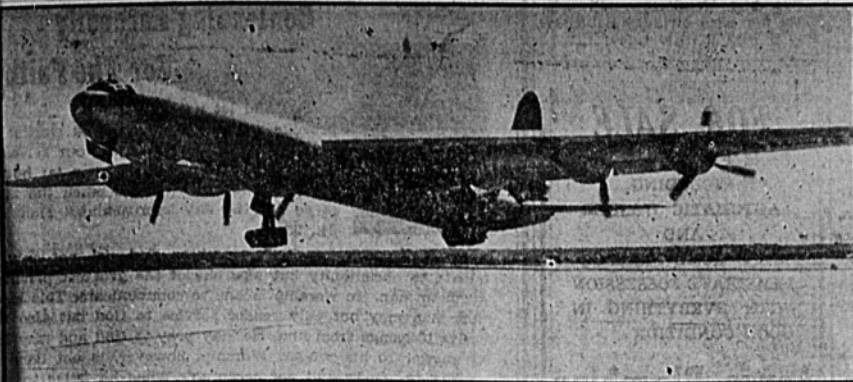

VA To Terminate Mortgage Loans

The veterans administration yesterday announced new rules on "combination" or second mortgage loans. Congress has ordered a halt on these loans. The administration has issued instructions covering combination loans of two classes: (1) where prior approval of the VA has been required for a guaranty and (2) supervised loans, where no prior approval is required. After July 20, prior approval of second mortgage loans will be withheld unless the first mortgage loan is at a rate of 4 1/2 per cent or less. After August 20, guaranty will be refused generally on supervised loans except when the first mortgage loan is at less than 4 1/2 per cent. After September 20, certificates of approval will not be

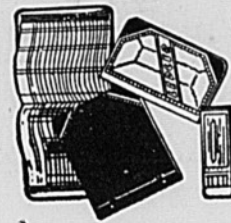

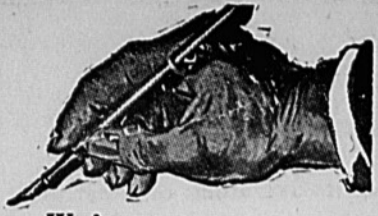

What They Write



Dear Mr. Jackson:
At your request I shall give some of the facts as set out in our Postal Bulletin regarding the cut in service, mainly on the frequency of delivery on City Delivery routes at many points. Since Slaton has already cut its delivery to one delivery a day due to the arrival of trains, we will not be affected, except that under the new economy program we have our auxiliary time allowance cut by about 20 per cent in the office. Our office hours will be the same and delivery the same as before, we will just work a little harder to get the work out.

The following is quoted from the bulletin referred to relating to facts which brought the changes about:

"In 1939 the population of the country was 123 million and the revenues of the Post Office Department was 705 million. In 1950 the population increased to 150 million and the revenues to one billion six hundred million. The Department is exerting every effort to provide for the public the best possible postal service at the least possible cost. Mechanical equipment in all terminals has been installed to speed up the handling of mail, probably more than in any other commercial enterprise. This is shown in that, comparing 1939 with 1949 the revenue increased 110 per cent, number of pieces handled by 65 per cent, the weight of mail by 105 per cent, while the increase in the number of employees was less than 48 per cent.

"About 96 per cent of all expenditures is for salaries and transportation both of which rates are fixed by Congress, and the Interstate Commerce Commission. The remaining 4 per cent concerns rentals, equipment, supplies, etc. Rentals have advanced sharply. For example the Slaton post office rental advanced from \$50 per month to \$115 per month during that time. The increase in all postal salaries during that period was 740 million and for transportation 125 million, also as in all other enterprise supplies and equipment have taken their proportional uptrend. This has resulted in an operating deficit of more than 500 million dollars for the fiscal year 1950. The revenues derived from first class mail have been sufficient to pay the cost of handling. On all other classes of mail it has fallen far short of the actual cost of handling."

"There have been a great increase in the mailing of newspapers and magazines, also advertising matter and a very heavy increase in Parcel Post due to the increase in express rates. All of these classes reflect a heavy loss." I have repeatedly recommended an upward revision of the rate, structure, and such recommendation is now before Congress, however the increases now recommended will still fall far short of making up the entire deficit. This half billion dollars makes up its part of the overall National Budget deficit." Quoted from Post

master general.
The Post Office Department has made some progress in the past year in handling the additional work load with fewer employees. This is shown in that the 1950 year the work will be done with 504,755 employees as compared with 517,690 at the close of the 1949 fiscal year. The appropriations committee of Congress has recommended the cut in delivery service but as shown it will only cover a small portion of the deficit.

"Postmasters should give immediate notice to the public that steps will be taken to readjust the delivery service and should explain fully that the Department would like to make early deliveries to their homes, the necessity to make only one delivery a day makes it impossible to grant this convenience."

These are the condensed facts then there follows orders to the postmasters to bring about the changes, etc.

There are being statements made in the press protesting any cut in the Postal Service which are very misleading to the public. If they will study the forgoing statements of the facts which bring about the changes, it is obvious to say that no business can pay operating expenses when it renders service on a less than cost basis. The press will state to the advertisers that Advertising Pays and the advertiser does pay a pretty sum for his ads, so why should the publisher who carries the advertising matter suppose that the Post Office Department transport and deliver his wares at a fraction of the actual cost of this service.

If a Congressman votes such a rate that would pay the actual cost of handling this mail, he knows well where he would stand with the press at next election time. So, the result is that Mr. John Q. Public will have to pay the deficit with his taxes and at the same time the Post Office Department will be hailed by the public who does not know the facts as just another extravagant government agency.

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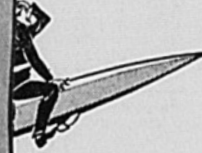
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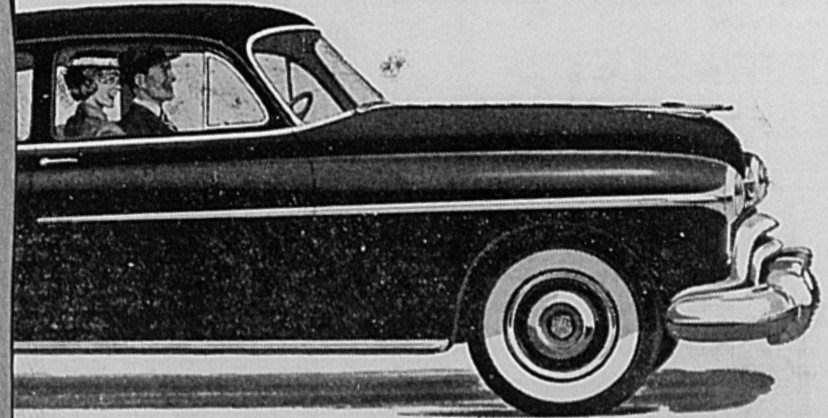
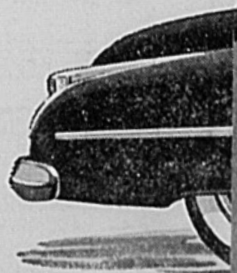
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West Texas Roundup

Not As Big A Pumpkin As We Thought

Like most other towns and communities Slaton census takers are not going to show it as large as most of us have been expecting it would be.

Three of the six enumerating districts within the city limits have been practically completed and they show a total of approximately 3500 people and the estimate is for Slaton to have over 4000, however it is not likely to run over 5000 and probably will fall some short of that.

Lubbock has dropped its sights down to 65,000 and that may be high.

Is a mass of people cramped together in a limited area to be desired. Are immense cities better places in which to live than smaller communities. There are many things that can be said for and against the big communities. The greater nerve tension that is caused on the people who live in big cities by the constant strain of noise, and lack of close contact with neighbors and the traffic dangers in the cities are drawbacks that about such conditions that should be considered.

Should Slaton strive to become bigger or should the folks here stress the point of making this a better small town. Slaton offers its residents more conveniences than most any small town, more paving, good water and good power and gas service. It is a good town in which to live and one that makes folks want to keep on living here. It could be improved upon, especially in providing more entertainment. A lot of new homes have been built and more should be constructed, Slaton has a lot of things that could be made better outside of being made larger.

Are We In A Great Big Mess

Will history repeat itself with the United States playing the part of England and Acheson taking the leading role of the Chamberlain and Stalin that of Hitler. The pattern seems very familiar and the world in about the same situation now that it was in 1937. However as the European nations are all familiar with the routine the tempo may be some faster and the outcome may be changed. Stalin has probably learned some lessons from Hitler and may avoid some of his mistakes.

If the Germans had not stopped at the English channel after conquering France the last world war would have had to been fought between the United States and Germany. If another war breaks out the Russians would likely take Berlin in two or three days, all of Germany in a week and be able to conquer England within a month. France would be easier to take over now than it was when Hitler invaded and if the United States does not have some mighty improvements on war techniques we will be on the defensive instead of the offensive.

Most of the arms we are now sending to foreign countries are just as likely to be used against us as they are to fight our enemies and if the world situation is not in better condition than it seems on the surface then the United States and the world is a mess.

Tiger Town, A Working Town

The future of the Slaton Youth Center looks good. Tiger Town was opened three nights last week, Thursday, Friday and Saturday, and everyone attending not only seemed to be having a good time, but every single person conducted himself in a most genteel and well-bred fashion.

However, the building was far from quiet; but it was the wholesome noise of a group of youngsters having a good time. In the game room you could hear the shuffle board getting a hearty work-out, and there was no rest for the ping pong balls. The juke box nonchalantly played the latest bobby-sox hits, on one side of the room you could hear the eager shuffling of dominoes, and from the other side came the happy shout from a young man who just picked up an inch-high stack of canasta cards.

Activity was literally buzzing, but everything remained under control. The four adult custodians sat up front at a card table drinking cokes and gossiping about the past week's occurrences. Politeness was the prevailing element. When a youngster asked for a deck of cards or box of dominoes he smiled, paid his deposit, and quietly went about his business.

According to the Youth Center ruling, the custodians are there not to over-supervise, but to be there in case any help is needed. From all appearances there will not be a great deal of necessity on the part of custodians to enforce rules, as the youngsters so far have shown no apparent desire to break rules. When closing hours came, one of the custodians quietly walked into the game room and asked, "Are you fellows ready to go home?" No argument was given; in fact, they stopped what they were doing and helped put up coke bottles and close the windows.

Indeed, Tiger Town has a good start; and the very first week of its regular opening has proved that our teen age youngsters do not have to have adult-manufactured entertainment, and that it does not take a lot of money to keep them happy.

If any Slaton parents feel that Tiger Town is not a fit place for their children to frequent, they should be there some evening to observe for themselves. Although there is a ruling that there shall not be more than four adult custodians in the building at one time, any doubting parent is welcomed to become a custodian. Anyone interested in this work can obtain more information by contacting Bud Englund or the Slatonite.

One evening after the center closed, one of the custodians carried two of the boys home. He asked the young men, "What do you think of Tiger Town?" The reply from one—and the second approval from the other—was, "I like it, I really do. And it will keep a lot of kids off the street and out of trouble." These were the exact words, and this mature answer from one who is as susceptible to worldly danger as any other teen ager. And the fact that the youths themselves see that Tiger Town can play a moral role as well as providing a place of recreation is evidence enough to make parents want to help make it a success, help by giving it their sanction and allowing the patronage of their youngsters.

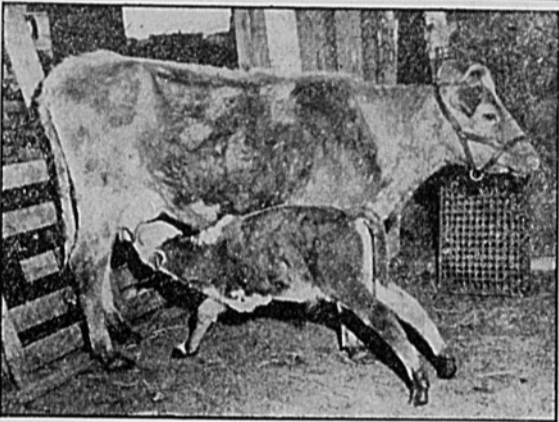

Heat Stroke

First aid for heat stroke is immediate cold water baths or spray and cold compresses. Bed rest is indicated for the other conditions. Water and salt or salt tablets are given for heat cramps.

Slaton Women Give Their Favorite Tested Recipes

With one or two more ice box desserts from this column, we're going to have the Slatonite reading public all fixed up with a grand dessert repertoire for every day of those hot months which are just ahead of us. Anyway, we're especially fond of them and we are sure you are too.

This week Mrs. Lewis Hollingsworth (Robbie) has given us instructions for making Chilled Lemon Custard.

Ingredients are as follows:

- 1 1/2 cups sugar
- 6 eggs
- 4 lemons
- 1 lemon rind (grated)
- 1/2 pint whipped cream
- 1 box (about) vanilla wafers

Mix sugar, eggs, and lemons together and cook until thick. Cool thoroughly. Whip cream and fold into above lemon mixture. Crush wafers with rolling pin. Into large square pan or casserole place layer of finely crushed wafers, then layer of filling, and continue alternately until filling is used up. Chill for several hours and slice into squares.

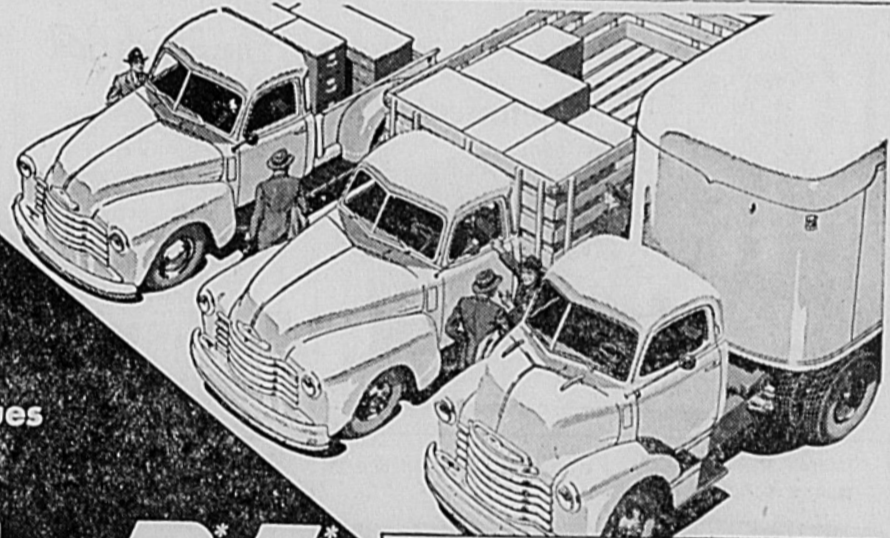
