

Texas State Secretary John Shepperd To Speak At PTA Conference April 13

John Ben Shepperd, Texas Secretary of State and Government Shivers' right-hand man, will be the principal speaker at the spring conference of the Fourteenth District, Texas Congress of Parents and Teachers, to be held April 13 and 14 in Slaton.

Slaton citizens are invited to attend Mr. Shepperd's speech which will be given Thursday evening, April 13 in the High School Auditorium. No admission will be charged.

Shepperd is known state-wide for his brilliant activity on half a dozen civic and political issues; and it is believed that he will get underway a study which will eventually lead to streamlining the 1876-model State Government, and will also ramrod the revision of the election laws, ordered by the legislature last year.

The state secretary's personal crusade for the past five years has been to encourage Americans to take more responsibility and a healthier and more intelligent participation in the discussion and solution of public issues as a means of preserving our American way of life.

"Local and state governments are still the foundation of Democracy," Shepperd says. "When we inform ourselves about these agencies and through these established institutions solve our own problems, we set an example and give hope and inspiration to America and the World," he remarked in connection with his Democracy Beats Communism plan.

Also in this anti-communistic program, Shepperd sets forth four bases on which Democracy rests: Religion, Education, Civic Responsibility, and Militant Citizenship.

The activities of Shepperd's life can readily be seen by the many organizations to which he belongs. He is president of the Sabins River Watershed Association; past president of the Greeg County Bar Association; Chairman of the Americanism Committee of the Texas American Legion; Chairman of the American Citizenship Committee of the State Bar of Texas; vice president of the Texas Safety Association; National Council Representative of the East Texas Area of Boy Scouts; Director of the Texas Crippled Children's Society; Former member of the State Board of Education; and former Chairman of the Governor's Election Laws Committee.

Slaton Drivers Give Suggestions For Reducing Local Highway Fatalities

Statistics show that there are more fatal automobile accidents in and around the Lubbock County area than in any other section of the state. Exact reasons for these traffic mishaps are not known, but as this week's question we have asked several persons about town who are connected a great deal with traveling and its problems what suggestions they would make to drivers to insure safer traveling on our highways.

Jack Berkley of Berkley Trucking suggested that drivers employ a few common highway courtesies—especially at night such as answering dim signals, dimming lights when driving directly behind another car to keep the lights from glaring in the rear view mirror of the front car, and flickering lights at night to give a passing signal. "And from my own experience in the trucking business," Jack continued, "I would like to caution cars about pulling out slowly in front of loaded trucks because it is sometimes very difficult for these large trucks to stop quickly when they are heavily loaded. All in all, I would say that drivers in general need to do much safer driving and need to be more thoughtful to fellow drivers."

Terms of Commissioners J. B. Huckabay and J. E. Eckert will not terminate until next year, while the terms of O. N. Alcorn and Otis Neill will expire leaving the above vacancies.

Commissioner votes will be cast in the office of Mrs. Lee Green and in the office of the Chamber of Commerce. Today, Friday, March 31 is the last day that absentee votes may be cast; however, until 5 p. m. absentee voting may be done in the office of the City Secretary.

This is the third year that those desiring to run for Commissioner did not have to present petitions before having names placed on the ballot. The only requirement now is that the names must be registered by a certain date—March 4 this year. However, write-in nominations are always possible as has been the practice in the past.

Congressman Mahon Pushes Support Of Grain Sorghum Loan

Congressman George Mahon reported to the Slatonite this week that his mail from the District indicated concern over the failure of the Commodity Credit Corporation to announce a loan support for the 1950 grain sorghum crop. Over a period of months Mahon has urged such support, indicating his belief that a support program would be announced.

In his report this week, which was also sent to the office of the County Agent and the County PMA office, Mahon stated that no one could guarantee that a support program for grain sorghum would be provided but that every indication pointed in that direction. The support program on grain sorghum last year was announced on March 14. In conferring with officials in Washington, Mahon has insisted that it is most important that a support program be announced as soon as possible and at a level not below last year.

On March 23 the House of Representatives passed a measure strengthening the Commodity Credit Corporation and increasing the capital stock. Favorable action by the Senate is anticipated. Mahon said that indications are that after this measure has become the law an early determination on the grain sorghum support program will be made. He is hoping for favorable action.

SS Tax Increases Hold No Bearing On Payer Benefit

Many inquiries have been received from beneficiaries wanting to know if the increase in social security taxes from one to one and one half per cent each on employer and employee automatically increases their benefit, according to John G. Hutton, manager of the Lubbock Social Security Administration office.

"The increase in these taxes effective January 1, 1950 has no bearing on the present benefit payments," Hutton said. "Only an Act of Congress can raise this benefit schedule. A bill which passed the House of Representatives last year and is now pending before the Senate proposes many changes. If and when Congress completes any action raising benefit rates according to the present wording of the bill, those now receiving monthly payments would receive increases automatically," he added.

Hutton pointed out further that the thirty-five million workers covered by the system and almost three million beneficiaries want to know how much monthly benefits will be raised. Under the Bill passed last year by the House, retired workers would receive benefits averaging more than fifty per cent above the present scale.

Another change proposed is to permit an individual receiving benefits to earn as much as \$50 in wages in a month without losing his benefit for that month. At present, he is permitted to earn only up to \$15 a month.

Mr. Alcorn is the only remaining member of the original incorporating board and has served as President since 1944.

CHICK CHATS

Here's Good Advice For Chick Raisers

"Attend to the details." That's mighty good advice around a poultry farm. But attention to details is especially important at the time poultrymen are readying their brooder houses and equipment for the arrival of baby chicks.

There's cleaning and disinfecting to be done. Heaters must be checked. Feeders and waterers have to be set up. And countless other details have to be thoroughly completed before satisfactory arrangements can be made for those chicks.

The best way to clean a brooder house is to remove all roosts, fixtures, and equipment, to sweep down all dust and cobwebs, to wash the windows, and to clean the floor by scraping off all dried material. The floors and walls should be scrubbed, and the entire house should be sprayed with a good disinfectant.

Disinfect Brooder Equipment

Feed troughs, drinking vessels, hovers, and other equipment should be washed with a similar disinfectant. A good time to disinfect is at the time you heat the house, because disinfectants do a better job when temperatures are above 40 degrees.

The heating apparatus should be overhauled and placed in first-class working order. It is best to operate the brooder for a few days before the chickens are received from the hatchery, to give you a chance to repair any faulty parts. By this procedure, houses are made warm, dry and comfortable for the chickens when they arrive.

Shavings, sugar-cane fiber, or finely cut straw usually provide the best litter. These materials are clean, free from dust, easily removed and replaced, and generally cheaper than other litter.

Prevent Overcrowding

Since overcrowding slows up growth, increases chances of disease, and leads to cannibalism and feather picking, see to it there's plenty of floor space in your brooder house. Usually, more chicks are allowed in a pen or brooder house when pullets are to be grown than when chickens are raised for broilers. This is done because it is expected that laying stock will run on hand at an early age. Under such conditions, three chicks may be allowed for each square foot of floor space. But two chicks per square foot is usually preferred.

Ethel Walters Returns To Screen In Zanuck's Production, "Pinky"

Ethel Walters, who 20 years ago was given her first screen part by Darryl F. Zanuck in "On With The Show," has returned to the Zanuck fold with a starring role in his major 1949 production, "Pinky," which begins its engagement at the Slaton Theatre April 2 and 3.

The Twentieth Century-Fox drama of racial intolerance affords the celebrated musical comedy star and singer her first major straight dramatic role since her portrayal of Hagar in "Mamba's Daughters" on Broadway in 1939. Subsequently, Miss Walters starred in the stage and screen versions of "Cabin In The Sky" and in recent years has appeared in night clubs and song recitals throughout the country.

The familiar deep warm voice and compelling sincerity that made her a much loved Broadway figure mark her characterization in "Pinky," which co-stars her with Jeanne Crain, Ethel Barrymore and Bill Lundigan.

Because Miss Walters' singing featured her other films, Zanuck originally planned to have her sing in "Pinky." As the picture developed, however, her role became

a purely dramatic one charged with emotional content.

Working with director Elia Kazan, whose "Gentleman's Agreement" won the 1947 Academy Award, is the latest step in a career that dates back to 1917 when she sang at Baltimore's Lincoln Theatre for nine dollars a day.

Ethel looks back on a childhood in Philadelphia when her folks were so poor they seldom knew where the next meal was coming from. In her teens, she took her first job in a hotel at \$4.75 a week. One night she was singing for friends at a party ("from the time I could talk I was singing"), when two young impresarios heard her and booked her for the Baltimore engagement.

After touring the South, she



eventually worked her way up to Harlem's after-dark spots. The Plantation Club hired her for her first major engagement and she created a sensation with her rendition of "Dinah."

In 1927 she appeared in her first Broadway show, "The Show," in Hollywood, in addition to her

initial film, "On With the Show," and the cinema version of "Cabin in the Sky," she has appeared in "The Cotton Club," "Tales of Manhattan" and "Cario."

that is planted and grown in the Southern states, including Oklahoma, to keep the producer broke and the buyer crazy.

The fiber varies in color and weight and the man who can guess the nearest length is called a cotton man by the public, a swindler by the farmers and a poor business man by his creditors.

The price of cotton is determined in New York and goes up when you have sold and down when you have bought.

A buyer for a group of mills was sent to New York to watch the cotton market and report his findings. After a few days observation, he wired his firm:

"Some think it will go up and some think it will go down. I do, too. Whatever you do will be wrong. Act at once!"

Cotton is planted in the spring, mortgaged in the summer and left in the field in the winter. You can raise it, and you can't. You will and you won't. You go broke if you do, and broke if you don't.

It is said that if a new comer lives in West Texas long enough to wear out a pair of shoes he will never move back to where he came from or to anywhere else. There may be several reasons for this including the fact that he might not ever have enough money to get away, but I prefer to think that most people like the country so well they want to stay.



A Swimming Pool For Slaton

Some of Slaton's civic-minded members of the Chamber of Commerce have struck upon the idea that one thing which our city needs is a swimming pool. Along this same line, several of them made a trip this week to one of our neighboring towns which has recently installed a pool—here they found out how much it cost them to build the construction, how the money was raised, how operational problems were solved, etc.

It is the belief of this group of Chamber of Commerce men that the same thing can be done, and successfully done right here in Slaton; however, it will take the interest and cooperation of the citizens to help put the plan over.

As a town grows, so grow the people living therein; for this reason we should all be eager and willing to back and support any project which has promise of improving the town even though we personally would not benefit. Many people do not care for swimming, therefore they would not be in favor of Slaton's having a pool; however, this is not a progressive attitude.

In many parts of Texas there is a creek running in everyone's back yard or at least within walking distance. Rivers are dammed up and the lakes furnish swimming facilities for youngsters and adults alike. But out here in West Texas where water is liquid gold—and about as hard to get, it should be the responsibility of the citizenship to favor a move to furnish some place where local people could go to swim, finding both a wholesome pastime and a healthful exercise.

A swimming pool in Slaton would soon pay for itself and then start netting a profit for other city improvements. When summer comes, the school children here have few forms of self-entertainment in which to pass the time for three months. No doubt there are many children in town who have never even had the chance to learn to swim purely for lack of desirable swimming facilities. Besides providing a healthful sport, parents should want to see that their children learn to swim, for one never knows when an emergency will arrive and the difference between knowing how to swim would mean the difference between life and death.

And, swimming pools are not necessarily for children alone. Most adults who learned how to swim when youngsters still enjoy the sport and take an active part in it.

When the time comes for us to take part in the drive for a Slaton swimming pool, let's all do our part in making it a success.

Be Proud Of The Plains

A Slaton resident made the statement the other day that as far as the American way of life is concerned, the Plains are more nearly American than any other one section of America. Although this might appear to be a very broad and somewhat unauthentic statement, there may be more truth in it than meets the eye.

For example, take a look at Slaton. In our community there are many, many families of German descent; but their ways of life are American. They speak English both in their business and among themselves. Even these people dress in the conventional informal American manner.

To the Texan these things are taken for granted. They do not stop to realize that in other parts of the country—particularly in the east—there are many immigrants who cleave to the "old country," who continue to speak the old language among themselves and know only enough English to get by.

This situation is found in most of the larger, more concentrated cities such as New York, Chicago, St. Louis, Dallas, and San Francisco. But on the Plains where life has not become congested with great floods of people, everyone lives, plays and works together. Although the older people do not mix profusely, their children have had the opportunity to become real Americans—making friends, going to public schools, and entering business.

Often in the eastern city, you will find the foreign children going to non-American schools where they do not have the chance to learn American ways. Perhaps this is the fault of the American school systems; perhaps it is the fault of the immigrant parents clinging to the past and denying the "new" to their children.

It is rather easy for an alien to become a citizen of the United States, provided he can prove legal entry into the country. Qualifications, briefly outlined, are: 20 years of age or over at the time of filing petition for naturalization, five years of continuous residence, belong to the right race or Chinese race or be a descendant of races which belong to the western hemisphere such as American Indians, Eskimos and Aleutians. He must be able to speak English and write his name in the alphabetical characters of any one language. And that is all there is to it.

It is easy to become an American. And people who have chosen our country as their home should be proud enough of it to want to become a part of it. Indeed we should be proud of the Plains people who not only have taken up American customs as their own—but have infiltrated their own ideas into our country so as to make them a part of a growing nation, a nation ready to take the good from another country and profit by its ingenuity.

How About The Traffic Code?

Slaton will sooner or later be forced to make some regulations on traffic, particularly if the population increases. Granting that the accident rate seems to be lower than it is in many other larger towns the uncertainty and the inconvenience, that only a few drivers cause, is fast becoming a major risk in Slaton.

It would seem that most any motorist would have the courtesy to, at least, park at the curbing when there is room enough to do so, but how many times have you tried to stop in front of the Post Office, at the bank or in front of the business places in Slaton, to find some car parked in the middle of the street blocking the only open place at the curbing. There are always people who, when not forced to do what is right, will go to a lot of trouble to make things inconvenient for every one

else. It was reported about nine months ago that a traffic code was in the process of being outlined but to date little has been heard about it. Admitting that a traffic code for Slaton would be even more complicated to figure out than one for New York City, it would still seem that nine months would be long enough to get it worked out or to come to the conclusion that such a thing is impossible. There are a few simple rules that should be followed here, the code need not be complicated but there at least should

be some regulations as to how the traffic should go on the streets around the square. Most every one who drives a motor vehicle wants to do the right and courteous thing, but the confusion that prevails now makes it so that it is practically impossible to follow any rules, as there are no rules. It is easy enough to understand that one should stop when the light is red and go when it is green, but at the corners where the streets come in at angles what then? The motorist is half way between and confuses every one including himself. It's time to do something about a simple traffic code for Slaton.

Slaton Women Give Their Favorite Tested Recipes

Something new in the line of favorite recipes has been added this week. Mrs. Glen Payne gives us a recipe for cooking potatoes—other than creamed, fried, baked or boiled. Although we did not derive at a fancy title or name for Mary's dish, it sounds delicious—nameless or not.

Ingredients for her potato recipe call for:

- 6 to 8 potatoes
 - ¼ to ½ cup asparagus juice
 - ½ small green onion
 - 2½ tablespoons butter
 - 2½ tablespoons flour
 - ½ teaspoon salt
 - 1 cup milk
 - ½ to ¾ cup grated cheese
- Boil potatoes and break into

fairly large pieces. Brown onion with melted butter and add flour to make a roux—then add milk and mixed with asparagus juice and stir constantly until thick. Stir in grated cheese and salt and cook until cheese is melted. Pour over potatoes in casserole, top with buttered bread crumbs, and brown in hot oven.

Mrs. Payne tells us that the final effect is very good, and that it really is a good change from the same old potato dishes. Asked where she found the recipe, Mary explained that her mother had given it to her and that she has been eating it all her life. "I think it's strictly a Yankee recipe," she added.

ded. Mary is originally an Eastern girl, although Dr. Payne is a native of these parts. Unlike many "Yankees," Mary is very fond of Texas and particularly West Texas as: "Actually I think it is far more progressive than the East," she says, "because children in West aren't expected to do what their parents did before them and then, too, there is room out here to expand."



Loosely translated, the original Indian legend says that "if the wind, at sunrise, is from the east or northeast, there will be bumper crops. The wind was out of the east-northeast at sunrise Wednesday mornning, March 22, according to Hockley County Agent B. Forehand. It was also reported blowing at about the rate of three miles per hour, if that has anything to do with the outcome of the legend.

The observation, which often creates more talk if nothing else, was adopted from the Indian by the Palefaces some 44 years ago when the late J. I. Wilborn, Garza County rancher, made a sunrise reading. After his death, the dawn patrol was taken over by former district judge Clark Mullican in Lubbock. For several years Wilborn had the company of the late W. O. Stevens of Post and Lubbock in checking the wind direction.

But regardless of what may be said in connection with the Indian prophecy, a survey made by the Lubbock Avalanche of forecasts and results for the past six years shows the Redman's legend has not often been too far wrong. —The Hockley County Herald.
