### Holland Well Is Closed; Believed To Be Dry Hole

The steadily growing and active interest in prospects for oil in this area constitutes a large variety of information coming from the near-by wells—and little of the information is actually authentic.

Perhaps the greatest interest recently has been centered on the well drilled on the Holland place located some six and a half miles southeast of Slaton. However, the well has been a great disappointment to many people.

Drilling contract for the Holland well called for 4,100 feet, a distance which was reached the latter part of last week. Unconfirmed reports say that there was some showing of oil, but not enough for any satisfaction or encouragement to the company handling the job.

One report said that the rig was moved away Monday, leaving the well as a dry hole; while another report stated that the equipment had been left in place with the hopes that the contract could be extended in order that deeper drilling could be continued.

There was also some talk this week concerning a deep test which is to go in soon near Wilson.

All these reports are unconfirmed, although received from relatively reliable sources.

### Driver's License Renewal Method Has Alteration

Many Texas car operators are still not aware of the new procedure of renewing drivers' licenses.

In an announcement made about March 15, the Texas State Department of Public Safety stated that the past practice of filling out a specially prepared form has been changed to merely sending in the top part of the license which contains all the needed information. This includes all forms of driver's licenses—the ordinary operators, commercial, and chauffeur.

Fees will remain the same, fifty cents for operators, one dollar for commercial, and three dollars for chauffeurs. The operator's license is good for two years, and the other two are good for one year only. It is suggested that a money order be purchased and sent along with the stub when renewing the permits.

Only change that should be made on the old license before sending it in to be renewed is in case of address change. One license should be drawn across the old address and the new one printed above the old.

The new license should be sent out hereafter in a small card printed the same as the old license. About the time the license is issued, the operator should be notified of the change.

### Saturday Will Be Buddy Poppy Day

Saturday, May 27 will be "Buddy Poppy Day" in Slaton at which time Poppies will be sold by young ladies and school girls from booths which will be set up in the business section of the town. ### Spur Wins Region 1-A Championship From Slaton, 6-0

After winning twelve straight games without a loss in the regular season, Slaton bowed out last Saturday afternoon at Lions Park to Spur's powerful Bulldogs, 6-0, in the Region 1-A baseball finals.

A healthy turnout of local and visiting baseball fans saw the Bulldogs, paced by Pitcher Joe King, subdue the Tigers. The lanky righthander gave up only two hits and struck out seven batsmen without issuing a walk. Seven previous Spur triumphs had been credited to King, and in the first 1-A tournament game he beat Dalhart, 11-3, with a three-hit performance.

For Coach Clarence Tillery's club, the loss was the only smear of a perfect season in which the Tigers had marched to the District 4-A title with little difficulty. They drew a bye in the first round of the playoff.

Carl Lewis and Ed Willis teamed to pitch four-hit ball for the Tigers, but that just wasn't good enough. Moreover, five errors hurt the 4-A champs' cause. Lewis fanned five men and gave up three walks in his five innings on the mound. Willis, pitching the last two stanzas, struck out three without issuing a pass.

The big blow of the Spur attack was a bases-loaded triple to right centerfield in the fifth inning by "Beanie" Durham, six-foot-eight Bulldog first baseman. The drive climaxed a four-run scoring effort which iced the decision for the champs. They had collected two runs in the first frame.

### Dr. D. E. Nelson To Conduct 5-Day Presb. Meet Here

Dr. Douglas E. Nelson of Pampa, Texas will conduct a five-day preaching mission in Slaton at the First Presbyterian Church from May 29 through June 2. Services will begin each evening of the above dates at 7:45.

Dr. Nelson was born in 1913 in Pittsburg, Pennsylvania, and he is a 1934 graduate of Princeton University. Following his graduation he took a year of seminary work in Edinburg, Scotland after which he returned to Princeton for the remaining two years at Princeton Seminary. With two years of post-graduate work at Edinburg, Dr. Nelson's degree was completed.

For six years Dr. Nelson was pastor of a small church near Pittsburg, coming to the Texas Panhandle in 1945.

Dr. Nelson is noted by those who have heard him speak for his serious outlook toward the problems of life, yet for his capability to understand human nature which he often portrays with a quick and brilliant sense of humor.

Dr. Nelson's wife, a native of Scotland, died several years ago, leaving him with two daughters. About his children, Dr. Nelson proudly but modestly says, "My children, both female, have enlivened my life—and retarded my work."

In regard to Dr. Nelson, Rev. George Hodges of Slaton says, "Modesty is one of his greatest characteristics, for he seldom takes credit for the many fine things which he has accomplished in his ministry."

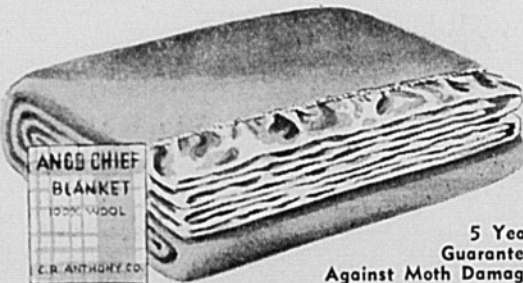

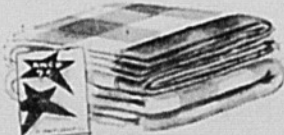

**We Could Co-Operate Better . . .**

Is Slaton a town of too many individualists. Most any cause or movement for civic betterment will get the backing of the business men and of the residents of the town, but most of us do not wish to be leaders nor to follow the leader in such movements.

It is easy enough to get monetary backing for ball parks, youth centers, trades days, clean-up campaigns and other activities but that is about as far as such movements go. To date the Lions Ball park has had slim pickings and all of the money that was invested in the place is to say the best for it, is slowly being lost. The youth center has fared some better but needs the backing of the parents as well as that of the young folks if it is to serve the purpose for which a considerable amount of money was raised. This venture could mean a great deal for the town if it could be fostered to do the things that are being done in other towns. In Amarillo the Youth Center has grown to be one of the most popular places in the area for the young folks and new attractions are being added to its activities almost every month.

The young folks of Slaton and this area have an excellent youth center building, they have many amusements provided for them and the attendance is improving. The civic clubs of Slaton have undertaken to help sponsor the youth center and it is possible that this venture will prove more than worth while. The folks of Slaton need to know each other better and to learn how to work together more.

**Opportunity Is Tapping . . .**

There is a possibility that Slaton could secure an adequate if not a bountiful supply of water and if such an opportunity comes this way it should be investigated fully.

The present source of water for Slaton is of the best quality and for the time it seems ample but if the town could get a source of supply that would insure water for years and years to come with advantage of supplying enough to make this a place to attract some manufacturing concerns then it would give Slaton an advantage over nearly every town in West Texas.

Not only would this source of water be an advantage in so far as the water itself is concerned but it would bring an excellent resort place near to Slaton and that means a lot in West Texas. A good water supply, a few oil wells in this area, if not right on the city hall lawn, and the richest farm land in the nation could make Slaton a much more prosperous place than Lubbock, Amarillo or any other locality in this part of the Southwest. We have the land, there is a possibility for the water and a lot of folks who claim to be oil experts, have prophesied that there is an ocean of oil beneath the surface in this part of the state.

Feverish activity does not mean that the folks who live in such towns are particularly happy and should any or all of the things mentioned above come to Slaton it would not mean that Slaton would be a better place in which to live, but there are a few people who live here who would not want to get their talons into the extra money that could come this way. Money makes the mare go, but where she is going no one knows.

**We're Lucky Whether We Know It Or Not**

It is hard to realize in a part of the country like West Texas, just what conditions are in other sections of the nation.

Most of the people who live in this part of Texas are of the second generation, many have parents who have lived here for most of a life time and some are the third generation. All of us have enjoyed freedom in its widest sense of the word, having been unfettered by the laws of big cities and of closely populated areas, and the people of West Texas are probably the freest of free Americans.

The longer this spirit can be kept burning the better West Texas will be and the longer we as individuals can enjoy our status of being friendly, vigorously alive and perhaps a little naive.

Slaton is ideally situated to be a part of any progress that will be made in the future and the timid who live among us will likely be wishing they had invested more in Slaton when a few years have passed.

**RAISE PULLETS THE RIGHT WAY**

Rate of growth, or physical development, of growing pullets is governed to a great extent by the care and management given to the birds. Management details during the first three months are particularly important, since it is during this period that chickens get off to a good—or a bad—start. A good start largely determines the degree of physical development.

Management duties are numerous, but the successful poultryman sees to it that no details are overlooked. On the other hand, he is alert for shortcuts in poultry-raising, pointers that will make his job easier and his birds more profitable. Some practical methods highly recommended for raising growing pullets are included here.

**Early Roosting**  
Before chickens are a month old it is advisable to train them how to roost. Place one or two poles across the back part of the brooder house or pen, and one or two feet from the floor. Such an arrangement makes it easier for the chickens to jump up on the poles and keeps them from crowding into the corners. Early roosting spreads birds out so that they have extra breathing room and more space to move around in. As a result, birds grow better.

During warm weather, clean sand, shavings, peat moss, or straw make the best covering for the brooder house. Unless it gets extremely dirty or wet, it is unnecessary to clean such a building more than several times a season.

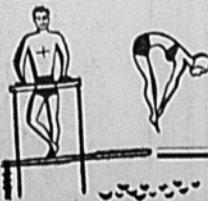
To prevent possible infestation from red mites—and other poultry pests—the perches should be painted with a good roost application.

**Space Between Houses**  
Sometimes, when more than one colony house is in use, too many pullets will roost in one house. To prevent this happening, the buildings should be placed at least 100 feet apart. This helps keep the birds evenly distributed. It is not advisable to house more than 125 growing pullets in a colony house or range shelter. And always maintain good ventilation, because hot nights make it even more important for birds to have fresh air.

It is usually desirable to move range shelters several times during the season. This is necessary because many times accumulations of droppings make the area unsanitary, or wide areas of grass around the shelter are destroyed. The droppings should be cleaned up after the shelter is removed.

# Slaton Women Give Their Favorite Tested Recipes

If you ever feel sad and lonely and feel that what you need most in the world is a good laugh, then all means call Carol O'Loughlin, Mrs. Richard O'Loughlin that is, and ask her to give you one of her favorite recipes. Almost all of her ingredients can be supplemented with something else, and her cooking explanations which accompany the instructions are worth anyone's time.

Anyway, Carol's recipe which we decided upon is one for Meat Loaf, and it sounds really grand.

**Ingredients call for:**  
 1 1/2 lbs. ground beef  
 1 small onion chopped  
 1/2 can tomato sauce  
 —OR—  
 1/3 can tomato soup  
 1 cup bread crumbs or corn flakes or cracker crumbs  
 1 egg  
 1 1/2 teaspoon salt  
 1/4 teaspoon pepper

Asked if there was a special way to mix the ingredients, Mrs. O'Loughlin laughed and said, "Oh, no, just stir all this mess up together and mold it into the size of your loaf." Place in moderate oven, about 350 degrees, and begin cooking. While loaf is in oven, make the following sauce.

1/2 can tomato sauce (the remainder)  
 2 tablespoons prepared mustard  
 1 cup water  
 2 tablespoons vinegar  
 2 tablespoons brown sugar or molasses or Karo

Mix sauce ingredients thoroughly and pour (uncooked) over the meat loaf and continue cooking

loaf for about an hour, or until done. Baste at least once during the hour.

Carol said that originally she had a meat loaf recipe, but over a period of years she has had to add to it and subtract from it greatly as she never managed to have all the needed ingredients at once. "This point sometimes irritates my husband," she explains. "I'll mix up one of my concoctions and he'll say, 'This is very good; why don't you make it again?' So I do. But I can never remember what I put in it that made it so good."

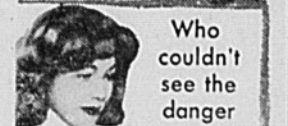

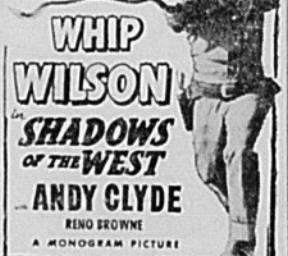
