

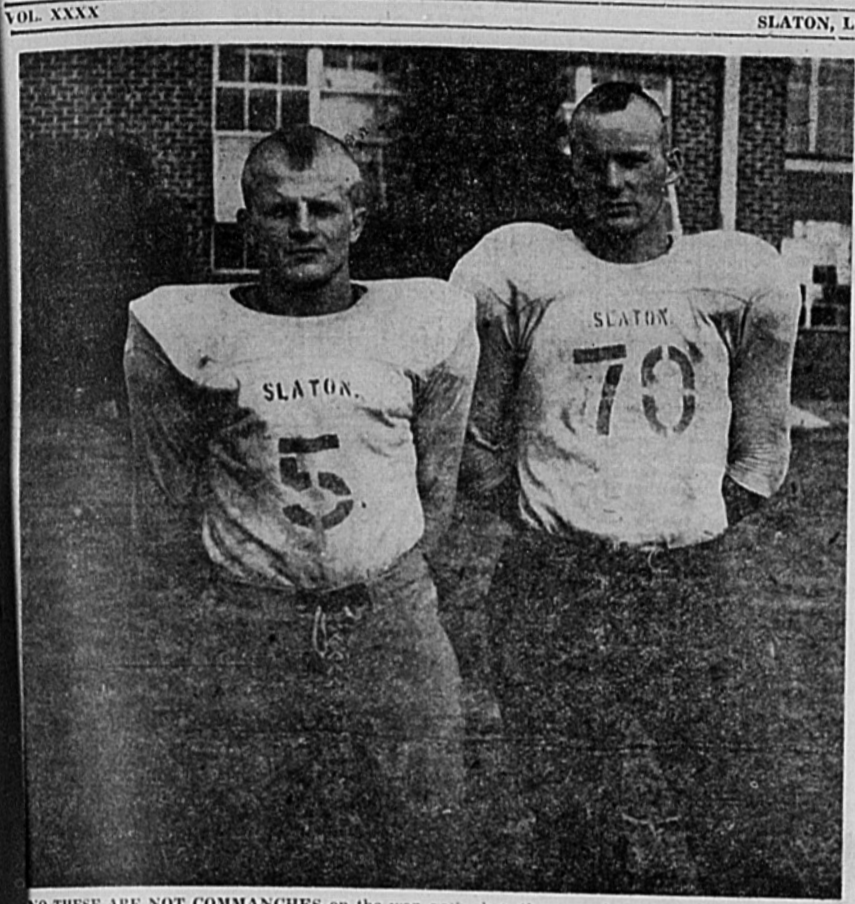

### X-Ray To Be Here October 16 And 17

A great service is being offered the citizens of Slaton October 17 and 18. Through the cooperation of the Slaton Rotary Club and the Chamber of Commerce, the Lubbock County Tuberculosis Association will send its mobile X-ray machine to Slaton to give free chest X-rays to everyone who wants one.

The service is not a charity, it is made available through your contribution to the National Tuberculosis Association, and through the payment of state taxes. You have already paid for this service through the purchase of TB stamps. If you do not take advantage of the opportunity to make sure you do not have TB, you are hurting only yourself.

The process takes only about thirty seconds. When you enter the unit, which is like a bus, you are greeted by a hostess who shows you to a desk where a clerk takes your name, address, and the name of your family physician. You then remove any jewelry which would show in the X-ray, stand in front of the machine, take a deep breath, and it's all over. In about two weeks, you receive a card telling you that you do not have TB, or if you do have signs of the disease, your physician receives notice and he contacts you.

No one will know the outcome of your X-ray except you, your physician, and the National Tuberculosis Association. The unit will be stationed in front of the Southwestern Public Service Co., and will be operated between the hours of 10:00 a. m. and 5:00 p. m.

Nearly every civic and culture club in the city is helping out in the project. Serving as hostesses on October 17, will be members of the Civic and Culture Club, and hostesses on October 18 will be members of the Daughters of the Pioneer Study Club. Other clubs will furnish transportation to those who do not have a way to get to town. Some will serve as clerks and still others will contact Slatonites by mail and by telephone. Be sure one of the many TB deaths each year will not be you—get a free chest X-ray.

### Industry Mishaps A Greater Killer Than Diseases

Believe it or not, injuries and deaths on the job are responsible for more loss of working years than any disease. Among men, only heart disease and cancer take more lives annually than do accidents, according to the Association of Casualty and Surety Companies. Furthermore, fatal disease strikes principally the aged or middle-aged, while accidents take their terrible toll from all ages.

Eighty thousand Americans are permanently disabled every year by occupational accidents. They continue to live, but they are unable to resume their old jobs. Their loss is one of the tragedies of our time.

Contrary to general belief, about three out of every four occupational accident victims are employed in the smaller plants and on farms. Every sixteen seconds one of these workers receives a disabling injury.

Though the occupational accident rate has sharply decreased since 1925, this decrease has not by any means matched the reduction in our annual disease death rate.

Proper safety behavior on the part of the worker is vital to any marked reduction in the national occupational accident toll each year. At the same time, the employer soon learns that a carefully planned and carried out accident prevention program definitely pays dividends from both a humanitarian and a dollars-and-cents point of view.

There are ten safety rules which will prevent occupational accidents. Every worker should:

1. Know his job.
2. Keep his mind on his job.
3. Never allow himself to be tempted to "take a chance."
4. Use guards, protective equipment furnished by employers, and safe ladders when climbing.
5. Receive first-aid treatment for even the slightest cut.
6. Remember that he is boss of his machine only as long as he watches it, guards it, and keeps it under control.
7. Lift with the strong leg muscles and not with the back.
8. Dispose of flammable and explosive materials.
9. Only operate machines when given permission.
10. Make safe thinking and safe acting a 24-hour-a-day job, inasmuch as four times as many accidents happen off-the-job.

### Mules Bidding For Their Second District 4-A Conference Victory

Playing their first home game of the season and their first District 4-A Conference tilt, the hometown Slaton Tigers take on highly regarded Muleshoe tonight at 8:00 o'clock in Tiger Stadium.

It will be the second conference try for the Mules tonight when they invade the "Tigers' den." Previously, they have rolled over Tahoka, 19-0 in a season opener and

last week whipped Portales, N. M. in an intersectional contest, 39-0. As for the Tigers, they have two non-conference victories, winning 19-7 over Floydada and upsetting Abernathy last week, 24-12.

Muleshoe's 1950 edition has 14 returning lettermen from the 1949 squad, seven of whom are patrolling the backfield. Three of the returnees in the balloting department are two-year men. Ramrod of the Mule's offensive eleven is Ed Nickels, 160-pound quarterback. A two-year letterman, Nickels is presently leading the District 4-A scoring parade with five touchdowns in two games.

In the line, the Mules boast two big tackles in Jim Gaede, 180-pound senior, and R. E. Williams, 195-pounder and one of the heaviest men on the squad. At the flanker posts, Coach Durwood Green will throw 160-pound Gerald Byrd and 170-pound Bill Gaede at the Tigers. Guards Dewayne Burkhead and Charles Hornbrook, both lettermen, are Green's starters.

Other backfield assignments of tonight's game will probably go to Ronald Johnson and Ray Kershey, both 145-pound halfbacks, and Aubrey Heathington, 170-pound fullback.

Working from a Tennessee T, Muleshoe's offensive machine will average about 165 pounds per man, with a 175-pound average in the line and a 155 pound average in the backfield. So far this year they have amassed a total of 347 yards on the ground and in the air.

Coach Tony Poulos' Tigers came out of the Abernathy-Slaton fracas with few injuries, none of which will keep any first stringers out of tonight's game. If the hometown team exhibits the same fight today that they did in the latter stages of last week's game and if their fine blocking and tackling continues to hold up, fans will be seeing some good football tonight, and the rest of the season as well.

### Renew Control On Many Steel Items

In a move described as "a step toward protecting domestic supplies of products important to the nation's defense efforts," export controls will be reimposed on 39 classifications of iron and steel products, effective midnight, Sept. 30, T. U. Percell, District Manager for the United States Department of Commerce, announced in El Paso today. The controls apply to Mexico and all other export destinations except Canada.

These items were placed back on the export control "Positive List" from which they were removed last March when domestic supplies of most iron and steel products were adequate and no sudden increase was anticipated in requirements for military purposes. With this reconrol action all important iron and steel commodities will be included on the Positive List.

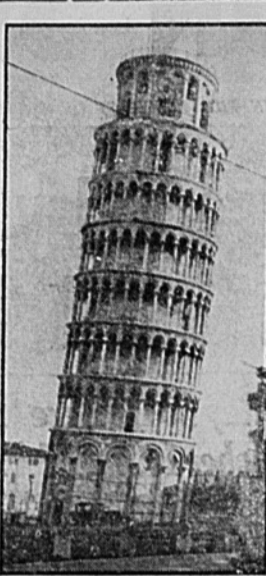
The board made the request for written material following a recent 21-county hearing in Plainview at which it received oral testimony on the ground water supply.

What Will Things Be Like In Ten Years

What will life in the United States be like in ten years? Twenty years? Fifty years? What will Slaton be like ten years from now?

Whether you prosper or remain as you are, or whether you will be in strained circumstances depends upon how well you can guess the answers now.

Is \$5000 too much to pay for a home that could have been bought at \$1500 in 1940? Will farm land that is selling at \$125.00 per acre now be selling at \$500 per acre in 1960 or will it be back down to \$40.00 per acre or even less in 1960?

If you judge the future by the past then it would seem that prices have gone about as high as they can go and that money in the bank now is safer than it would be if invested in property, but the average individual can get little or no returns for money in the bank or in low interest rate bearing bonds and the temptation of taking a flyer in some fast moving investment is a great temptation.

There are many schemes now being promoted such as installing fish raising projects, plans to process frog legs and ideas for propagating fox farms, there is millions in raising hamsters, and it is easy to get rich in the poultry business.

Here are some predictions: property values will be high for years to come, but the men who own farms are going to find it very difficult to keep help and the man who is able to operate his own farm is likely the only one who is going to make any considerable money from farming operations.

Most people who have tried to make money from rental of homes have lost money because of deterioration of home buildings and because of the hard treatment most rental property gets by tenants. Investments in homes for rent has not been a paying proposition except when rentals are very high. It is most likely that rent controls will be invoked in the near future.

Whether the United States gets in a world wide conflict or not, it is likely that the entire nation will be under the strain of mobilization and most goods will go toward supplying the armed forces. That this should be done is probably the opinion of most every loyal citizen, but the future looks far different from the immediate past and the next ten years will likely prove the most trying of any time since the revolution against England.

Whether you make money or not will be of small consequence for the average civilian is going to find little to buy.

Business Is Going To Be Good This Fall

FALL WORMING FOR THE FLOCK

Housing time offers you a good opportunity to perform one of the most essential management chores on a poultry farm—the worming of the laying flock.

Birds coming off range and, in general, readying themselves for a season of heavy production should go into the laying house worm-clean. If such layers are not wormed, there is a good chance production figures later on will run far below expectations. Although raisers do not always realize it, the worm problem is a serious threat to poultry-raising efforts. Today, flock troubles often chalked up to disease or other irregularities may be the result of worm infection.

Individual Treatment

An individual-bird treatment at housing time can be given each of your layers with little extra work. Since you are handling birds anyway, culling them and inspecting for lice and mites, it's an easy matter to give each bird a worm tablet. What work is involved will repay you in a profitable rate of egg production.

You should also plan to continue worm control while birds are confined to the laying house. Today's modern poultry houses, with their excellent insulation and weather-proofing make warm and comfortable quarters for layers, but they also have their shortcomings.

These tighter and dryer houses create warm air and high humidity, highly favorable conditions for the development of worms. With worm eggs incubating in warmer houses, it's natural to expect some worm infections during confinement.

Unsanitary conditions also frequently lead to worm infections. Filth, droppings and other disease-carrying matter accumulate quickly in the laying house. Although regular cleaning and disinfecting will help greatly, there is definitely a need for additional worm treatment.

You may ask, "Will worming hurt birds' egg production?" Naturally, you want to safeguard egg production. But there are commercial wormers that give birds gentle, yet thorough worm removal. Some wormers are in tablet form, others are the flock-type treatment that mix in the mash. ## Tigers Trounce Abernathy, 24-12 In Non-Conference Thriller Friday

Slaton High's Tigers jumped on Abernathy's Antelopes for their second straight non-conference victory of the season last Friday night, winning 24-12 before a capacity crowd at Antelope field in Abernathy.

Pacing the Tiger's attack was Seatback Bob Lambert, who scored two touchdowns on runs of 54 and 59 yards. It was a big night for the 140-pound halfback, as he repeatedly slipped through the big Abernathy line for good yardage.

Abernathy jumped into the lead shortly after the game was under way. Slaton took the opening kickoff, with Co-Capt. Bobby Taylor receiving the ball on his own 15 and returning to the 30 before he was brought down. Three running plays failed, and the Tigers were forced to punt. The Antelopes took the ball at mid-field and in ten plays made their first of two touchdowns, with Quarterback Harold Cunningham going over from the two. Try for extra point was no good.

Minutes later the Tigers stymied another Antelope attack on their own 15 by recovering a fumble. A first down pass from Quarterback R. A. Thompson to Right End Harley Patterson was completed to the mid-field stripe from where the diminutive end raced on to the Abernathy 42-yard line before being hauled down from behind. Three running plays failed to make a first. Big Leon Moore's first running attempt from the fullback slot failed to make a first by about half a yard.

Shortly after the second quarter opened, the Tigers came back with a series of line bucks that moved them to their own 46. Then Lambert uncorked the first of his two long runs of the evening, going all the way to knot the score. Taylor's attempt at conversion was no good. The two teams exchanged punts a couple of times before the half ended, tied at 6-6.

Abernathy came roaring back after the half. Jim Miller returned the kickoff from his own 10 to the 46. Verlon Barron and Miller picked up two quick first downs to the Slaton 31, before a Cunningham fumble was recovered by

Slaton on their own 23. Both teams failed to gain during the remainder of the third quarter until Lambert recovered a Hammond fumble on the Antelope 45. A pass to End Jerry Huckabay carried to the nine. Moore plunged over for the second Slaton score of the night. Taylor's conversion was no good.

In the fourth period, Slaton recovered another Antelope fumble on the home team's 24 yard line. Bill Butler, Taylor and Lambert alternated on short carries with Butler going over from 8 yards out.

With five minutes to go in the final stanza, a hard-charging Antelope line blocked a Thompson punt on Slaton's 23. Hammond skirted his own right end for a first and goal on the Tiger's two. Miller bucked the line for the score, and the game stood at 18-12 after Miller's try for point was blocked.

The final Slaton score came with less than two minutes left to play after Abernathy had recovered an onside kickoff following its touchdown, only to lose possession on a fumble by Barron. On the first play after the fumble recovery, Lambert slipped off tackle and galloped 59 yards for the final tally.

This was also a big night for both offensive and defensive linemen of the Tiger squad. Standouts like Harley Patterson, Charles Norwood, Warren West, Lee Ray Dilard, Jerry Lemon, Leon Moore, Ezra Corley, Jerry Huckabay, and Gene Berkley aided greatly in the Slaton attack and kept the Antelope's offense bogged down much of the time.

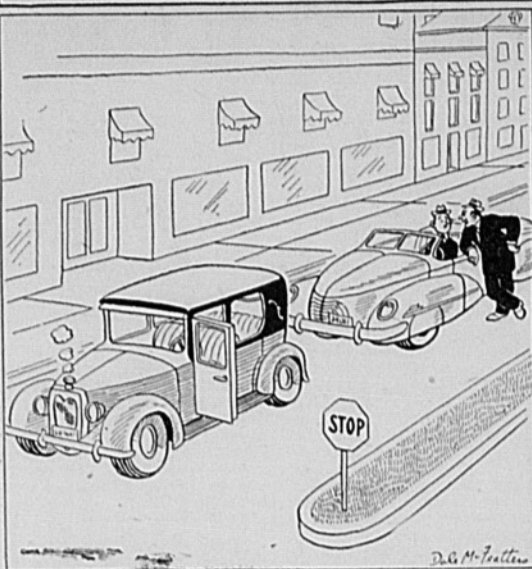

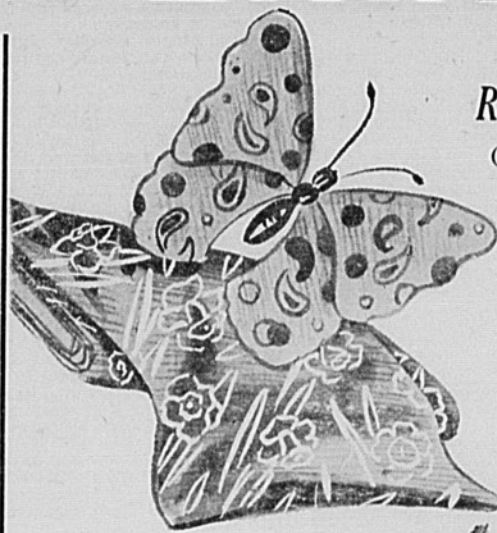

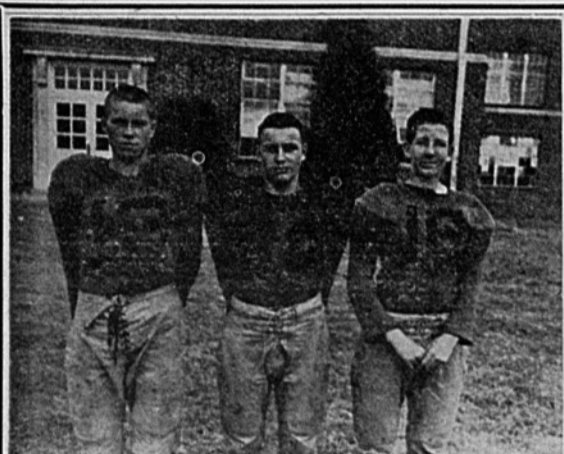

COLLINGDALE, Pa. —A young soldier in Korea took a piece of notepaper from his helmet and wrote a letter to his two small daughters back home.

The letter was delivered yesterday to the home of 6-year-old Rose Marie McCormick and her sister, Joan, 3.

Three days ago, their mother was notified that Pfc. John J. McCormick, 28, paratrooper veteran of World War II and infantryman in Korea, had been killed in action.

This is what Pfc. McCormick wrote to "Dear Joannie and Rose Marie."

"This is Daddy. I want you to listen and pay attention while Mummie reads this to you. Just try and make believe I was there, talking to you.

Joannie, I don't think you'll remember me because you were a little baby when I had to go away, but I used to sit and hold you a lot, and when you were a bad little girl, I used to make you sit in a chair until you were good, but I always loved you a lot and I was very proud of you.

"Rose Marie, you should remember me because I used to take you out with me a lot, and I used to buy you a lot of candy and sodas, and I used to feel so good when people used to say you had eyes like mine. Remember the little puppy I bought you? Your Mummie used to tie a little pink ribbon around its neck and you used to carry it in your arms. You looked awfully cute.

"I want you both to know that I'd be with you if I could, but there are a lot of bad men in the world, and if they were allowed to do what they wanted to do, little girls like you wouldn't be allowed to go to church on Sunday or be able to go to the school you wanted to.

"So I have to help fight these men and keep them from coming where you and Mummie live. It might take a long while, and maybe Daddy will have to go and help God up in Heaven, and if I do, I always want you both to be good for Mummie, because she is the best Mummie in the whole wide world.

"She has always taken care of you while I have been away. You see, kids, I happened to be caught in two wars inside of 10 years, and the reason I am where I am today is because I am fighting for what I think is right.

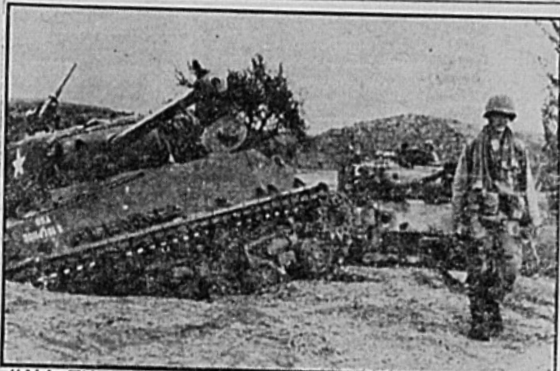
"That's one thing I always want both of you to remember. If your conscience tells you something is right, always stand up for it. You might be ridiculed for doing so, but in the long run you'll always find out that people respect you more for doing so.

"When you grow up to be young ladies, don't ever forget all that Mummie has done for you. She has often gone without clothes for herself so that both of you could have nice things. I want you to do as she says; go to church on Sundays and you can always pray for Daddy.

"So remember, kids, when you grow up, save this letter in case I'm not there to talk to you, and try and remember all I'm saying, for it's for your good, and because I love you and Mummie so much.

"I'll be in a hole, fighting, in a few days, in a place called Korea, so I'm sending you all the love that's in my heart on this sheet of paper. I carry your picture, and Mummie's next to my heart, and if I have to go help God, you'll know that the last thought I had on this earth was for the two of you and Mummie. All my love and kisses. Be good and God bless you, Daddy.

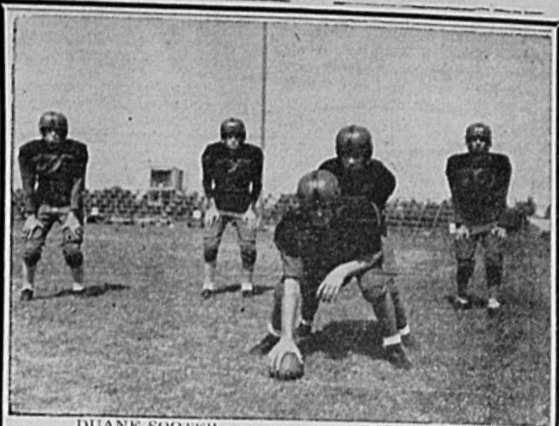

## JUST TALK

There are a lot of organizations that are dedicated to brotherly love and have a list of ideals that each member is supposed to live up to, but there is not a single place in Slaton where a person in distress can go to get emergency help.

While there are fewer reasons for folks to be in distress than in the past there are occasions when an emergency arises and with the present cost of living, such a condition is far worse now than a similar case would have been when living conditions were not so costly.

What brought this to my mind was the fact that there is a woman in Slaton with six small children whose husband deserted her, and she and the children were suffering last week for food, until a member of the V.F.W. found out about it. The Red Cross had donated \$3.00, so I have been told, so in order to meet the emergency the V.F.W. has made arrangements for the family to get \$25.00 in groceries each week until the woman can secure work in the cotton fields.

With all of the high sounding slogans and ideals that are expressed at these organizations there is quite often very little done to make it worth while for the members to attend or for them to spend the time and effort that is required. Individually I am sure each one who goes to the meetings that are held, (on most every night of the week, at the club house), would be glad to enter into activities that would benefit the town or community and I believe that those who are elected as officers want to accomplish things that are worth while for their clubs or organizations, but such things require work and a lot of it. That's where most of us fall down.

The instance mentioned above, about the family in distress, is perhaps an isolated case, but there are a great many things that could be done in Slaton for both the physical as well as the mental health of the citizens, but most folks go to the clubs, shake hands with one another, listen to a program about some nebulous subject, such as, "What should be done about China," or "What about the atom bomb," belch a few times and go home, or, back to work.

Perhaps I expect too much, for such are clubs most everywhere. If some of the ideals that are profusely expressed could be put into concrete form the members would at least feel that some of their time, effort and money had brought forth something to which they could point with pride.

It is probable that this time next year, and the year after that, and the year after that, folks who have misfortune befall them in Slaton will be in the middle of a bad fix. My congratulations to the V.F.W., you should not have

to be the Charity organization in Slaton.

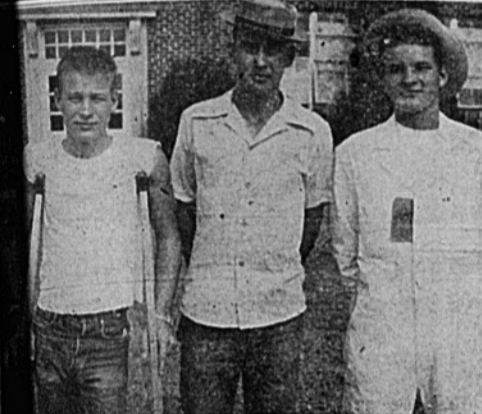

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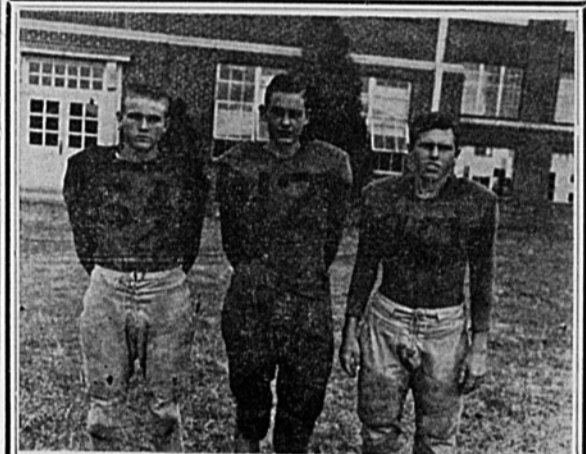
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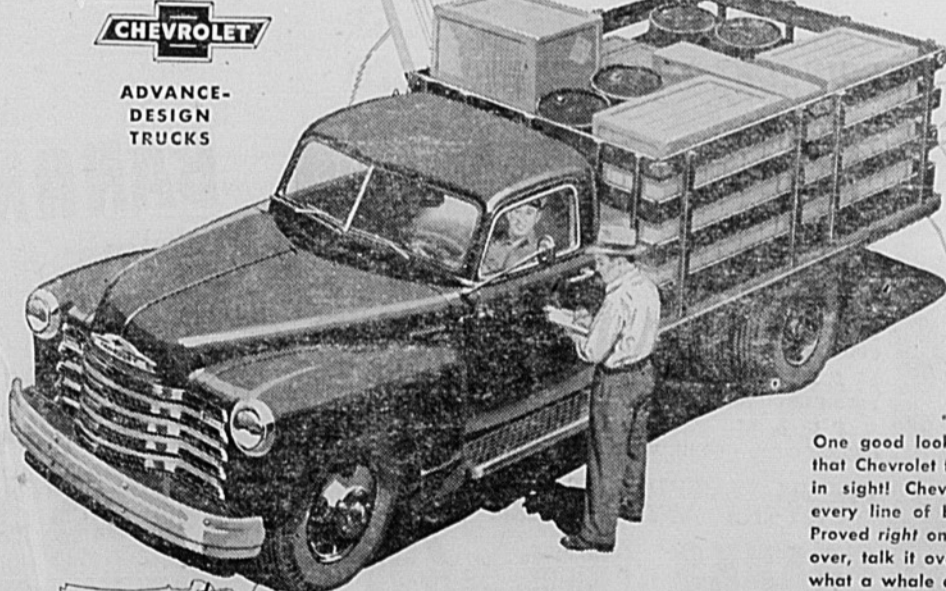
