Pay Up! Vote! In Year 1951

Wednesday, January 31 is the last day on which you may secure a poll tax. If you wish to do any voting during the year of 1951 you should hurry down to F. A. Drewry's office on the west side of the square and pay up. If you reach your twenty-first or sixtieth year in 1951 you can get your permit to vote without paying the tax.

It is always advisable to have a poll tax receipt for there is no telling what may come up to vote for or against some act or law. Under present conditions there may be occasions when state, city, or national problems may be put up to the voters for consideration.

In past years a number of folks have been greatly embarrassed because some unforeseen problem or contest came up before the public for consideration. Its very embarrassing to have to say "I did not pay my poll tax."

Don't let this happen to you. Get on your horse, bicycle or even run down to the tax office and get paid up today, there's no telling what is going to happen.

Farmers Complain Of Dogs Killing Farm Animals

Mrs. Clem Kitten, who lives on a farm on the Union Road, has reported that dogs belonging to people living in Slaton have been killing chickens and young pigs on the farms west of Slaton. She said that last week she lost nearly a whole flock of chickens and one pig. Several of her neighbors have complained also of chickens being killed.

Several dogs have been killed by the farmers when they were found attacking the farm animals. Though the farmers say they don't want to have to kill pets belonging to other people, they will shoot or poison the dogs if they continue to kill their chickens and pigs.

Mayor L. B. Wootton reports that a lot of complaints have been made to him about the farm animals being killed. In town when complaints are called in about stray dogs, the officers go out and destroy such animals, but with the complaints of farm animals being killed coming from out of the city limits there isn't much that the city officers can do about it, said the mayor.

Again he ran away and joined the Army. He fought in the Spanish-American War, then Philippine insurrection, under General Arthur MacArthur. He lived in the Philippine Island until 1909, then he accepted employment with the Santa Fe.

He lived in Amarillo from 1909 until 1916, when he moved to Slaton. He was retired approximately 10 years ago.

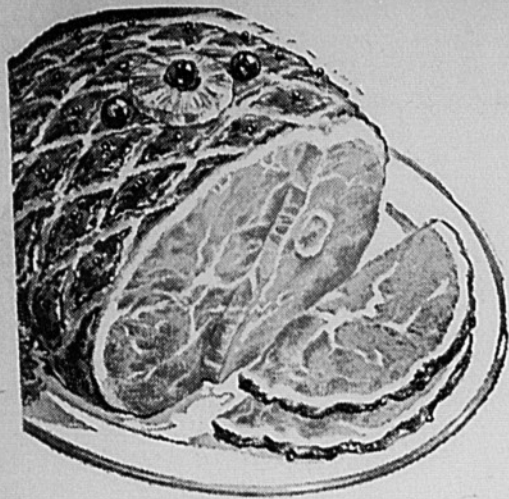
Services will be conducted by Rev. W. F. Ferguson, assisted by Rev. J. T. Bolding and Rev. O. A. McBrayer of Wolforth.

Sherman Lee Jones wants to say "hello" to all his friends in Littlefield and Spade and to let them know that he's looking forward to the day when he can come home and meet them all.

That's the message his mother, Mrs. Eunice V. Jones, brought back with her from Walter Reed army hospital in Washington, D. C., where Jones is recovering from injuries received at the hands of the North Koreans.

Although Jones is in much better spirits and condition than his mother expected, he will remain in the Washington hospital for at least four months, then be transferred to another army hospital, possibly closer to home, his mother reports.

Jones, who was the sole survivor of a North Korean massacre in October, was imprisoned by the Reds for three months. During the time, his weight dropped from 160 pounds to 86. He told his mother that the prisoners' food consisted of a "rice ball and a pickle every three days."

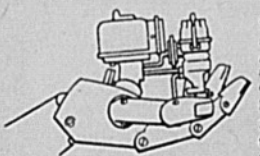

We shudder at what sometimes seems like "needless slaughter" of our boys in Korea, but here at home we go heedlessly about the business of living while more people are killed on our streets and highways than in the combined totals of all the wars the United States ever fought.

Here on the South Plains the entire populace would be up in arms if an enemy force had killed 100 persons in the past year. But traffic accidents accounted for the lives of 107 people—a lot of them right here in Crosby County—and we are unconcerned.

The game was no push over for the Buffs. The boys had to win the hard way against a heavier and rougher team than they had met so far this season. They won by sheer ability, and a little good luck.

Had not the cold damp wind been sweeping the playing field, the game could have been more in favor of the Buffs. Receivers of accurate forward passes failed, not because of fright or lack of experience, but because of cold hands which refused to function at the critical moment.

The Sun Bowl was a cold, dismal spot for both players and spectators, and the better team won. That is a great satisfaction.

Santa Fe Mobilized For War Conditions

Discussing mobilization of railroads as part of the nation's rearmament program, Fred C. Gurley, the Santa Fe president cited widespread installation of diesel-electric locomotives and centralized traffic control to illustrate how railroads have achieved greater efficiency and economy at the same time that they have increased their transportation capacity since the close of World War II. The 9,450 diesel-electric locomotives put into service since then, he said, have enabled railroads to move longer trains and do so faster and at lower cost. At the same time, the 6,000 miles of centralized traffic control installed in the past five years have enabled the railroads to speed up train movement, reduce delays, and so handle more trains in a given time on a given section of track. The manner in which each of the two different types of improvement added to the effectiveness of the other illustrates the cumulative effect of the billion-dollar-a-year improvement program of the railroads, Gurley declared.

The Santa Fe president said that as part of their mobilization program, the carriers are adding to the number of serviceable freight cars both by building new cars and stepping up repair of unserviceable units. The requirements for such a program seem large, he stated, but "nevertheless, on a comparative basis, all the railroads need is a small tonnage of materials and a relatively low number of man hours to fabricate vehicles of transportation.

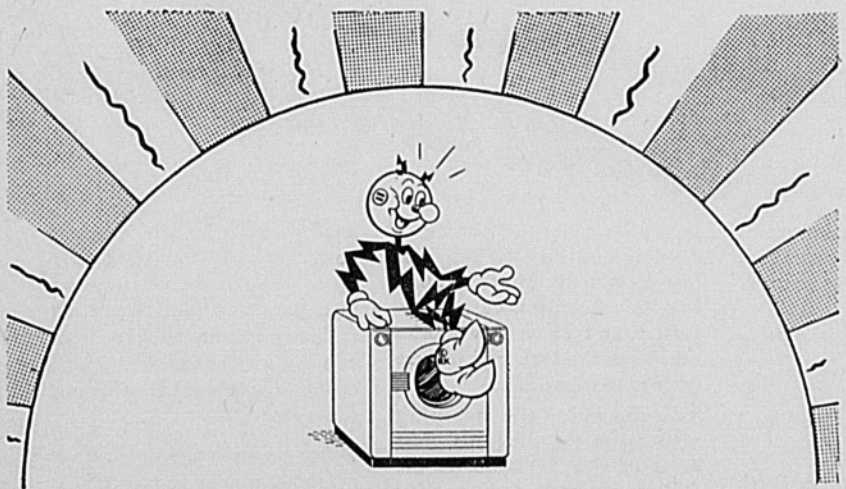

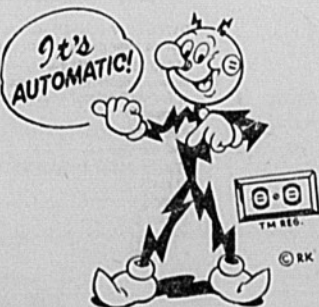

Are Prices And Taxes Too High?

To hear the howls around Slaton concerning Income Tax, price rises and price controls one would think that the majority of folks would prefer to have the good old days of over-supply, low prices, low wages and unemployment back with us and it is just such howling that will eventually bring on such a condition.

Not long ago some one came into the Slatonite and picked up a paper that was published in 1940 and noticed the prices quoted on food items and clothing. He hit the ceiling.

It would do no good to quote the prices that this citizen got his blood pressure to the boiling point over, for such information might cause other folks to lose control of their sanity but this man who almost blew his top had only a few minutes before been telling of having sold twenty bales of cotton at the highest prices that he had ever sold cotton before and he had been farming for nearly forty years.

In fact this man had been a tenant farmer for many years and it was nip and tuck with him until the last few years as to whether he could pay his debts from one year to the next.

His family had little to live upon, his homes had been poor and ill furnished and he had never had ready cash before, but he was ready to have everything back on the old basis, or at least he wanted all food prices put back on the 1940 quotations, but he said that he did not feel that he had been paid too much for his cotton.

He drove off in a high priced automobile loaded down with a lot of good quality furniture and was wearing a pair of hand made cowboy boots and was mumbling something about the country going to the dogs.

Will This Ever Be The State Of West Texas?

In a circular letter sent out to newspapers over the district by Senator Kilmer B. Corbin from Austin the Senator said that he estimates that this section of the country would get double the representation in the Legislature if the redistricting of the State is done as proposed by new bills that are before the House for consideration.

The Senator has it all figured out and seems to feel very optimistic that the redistricting will be done. Even though the older parts of the State are losing population there are still more people and more power in the older parts of Texas than there is out here and as long as the old fuddie duddies can hold onto that power the longer this part of the State will be neglected and out voted on most everything.

Wool prices have broken all records, but clothing made of wool has not made much advance. Customers are not too excited about rushing out to get wool clothing, but it is likely that there are a lot of automobile tires and tubes under the beds, in the basements and in the attics. A lot of folks found out while World War II was in progress that stored canned goods did not last as long as it might seem that it would, and that sugar is not easy to hide or keep, and food hoarding is not evidenced.

To criticize folks that are buying goods now that will likely be scarce does not seem fair, for at present it is open to anyone who has the money to pay for it. So if you feel like making dirty cracks about folks hoarding, better check up on yourself, you may be guilty yourself.

WHAT ABOUT EARLY CHICKS?

In any discussion concerning early chicks—or chicks hatched in January or February—the principal consideration, of course, is the time of year when pullets will mature and begin to lay.

Naturally the best time to have good production is during late summer, fall, and early winter—when egg prices tend to be higher. Since it takes five or six months for pullets to mature, early-hatched chicks frequently prove profitable, mainly because they are ready to lay during a large part of this period.

Increase Efficiency

Many poultrymen find it pays to raise early chicks because they can increase the efficiency of their entire poultry-raising operation. Besides having birds ready to lay at a good time of the year, there are certain other advantages involved.

By starting part of the young stock in January or February, a raiser can often make better use of housing, keeping it at capacity for longer periods of time. A better year-around distribution of labor also results. In addition, birds started now can be well on their way before work in the fields begins. Therefore, during the less-demanding winter months more time and attention can be given to the flock. Early chicks also make it easier for poultry raisers to replace birds that die or are culled during the year. And more efficient use can be made of the brooding equipment, since with early chicks it is put into operation more than once a year.

Economically, early chicks offer you two advantages: (1) they lay in seasons of high egg prices, as mentioned before, and (2) cockerels from the early hatch can be sold at top Easter prices.

Advantages May Vary

Of course, the advantages and disadvantages of early chicks vary greatly with localities and with breeds of poultry. However, since most authorities agree that spring-hatched pullets are slightly superior in many respects to those hatched in other seasons, it is probably not advisable to start the bulk of your chicks right now. But remember, early chicks are profitable, and it may pay you to start a few this year. Many raisers do every year.

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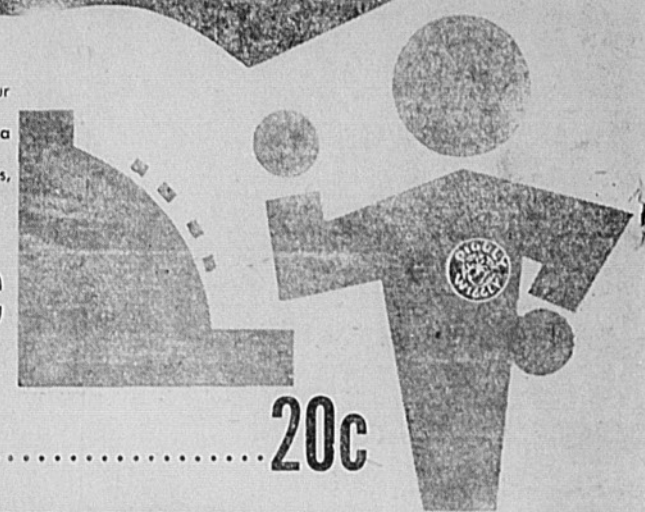
