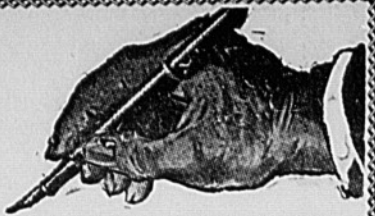

Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Burton visited their son and his family in Hamlin, Texas last Sunday.

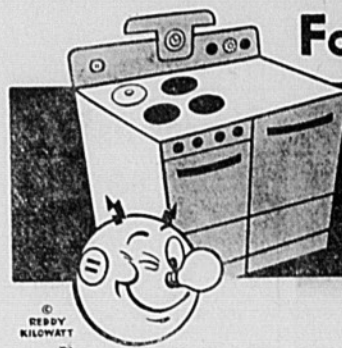

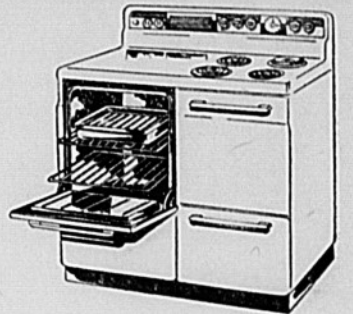

BY CITY OF SLATON TO OWNERS OF PROPERTY ABUTTING CERTAIN STREETS OF INTENTION OF CITY TO PAVE AND IMPROVE SAID STREETS AND TO LEVY ASSESSMENT AGAINST SAID PROPERTY AND THE OWNERS THEREOF IN PART PAYMENT THEREFOR AFTER HEARING: AND TIME OF HEARING.

Whereas, on the 26th day of February, 1951 the City of Slaton by Resolution requested Parkhill, Smith and Cooper, Engineers of said City, to prepare plans and specifications and estimates of costs of paving and improving certain streets in the City of Slaton; and

Whereas, by Resolution passed on the 12th day of March, A.D. 1951 said City Commission approved said plans, specifications and estimates and determined that it is necessary that the hereinafter set out and enumerated portions of streets, avenues, and alleys in the City of Slaton be improved by raising, grading and filling same, by installing standard concrete curb and gutter, and by paving with triple asphalt surface treatment on six inch compacted caliche base;

UNIT NO. 23: Fourteenth Street from 22' South of the North Property Line of Jean Street to 22' South of the North Property Line of Powers Street.

UNIT NO. 24: Fourteenth Street from 22' South of the North Property Line of Powers Street to 22' South of the North Property Line of Edwards Street.

Whereas said Resolution provided that the property abutting said sections of said streets proposed to be improved and the owners thereof should be assessed and pay for not exceeding all the costs of curb and gutter abutting their respective properties plus 9/10ths of the remaining costs of the improvements in the Units on which the respective properties abutt; and

Whereas, the estimated costs for said standard curb and gutter is \$1.45 per front foot and the estimated costs for paving is \$2.61875 per front foot, for each of said Units or Districts, the total estimated costs of improvements designated as Unit or District No. 23 is \$3,270.60, the total estimated costs of improvements for Unit or District No. 24 is \$3,270.60; and

Whereas, said Resolution provided that before the levy of such assessments, hearing be held under provision of Article 1105b of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, after notice given as provided by law;

Now therefore, under provisions of said Article 1105b R.C.S. of Texas, notice is hereby given to all said owners of property abutting upon said streets and alleys, and to all persons interested in said improvements that hearing will be held by the City Commission of the City of Slaton on the 28th day of April, 1951, at the City Hall at Slaton, Texas, beginning at 3:00 o'clock P.M., at which time any of said owners or interested persons who shall desire to contest any such assessments on account of the amount thereof or for any reason will be heard; and such hearing shall be continued from day to day and from time to time as may be necessary to give all said property owners and interested persons a full, complete, fair and impartial hearing upon all matters with respect to such improvements and the levy of assessments in payment therefor.

After all persons have been heard and such hearing has been closed, assessments will be levied by ordinance against the abutting property and the owners thereof, which assessments will be a personal liability of the owners of such property and the first and prior lien upon said property as provided by said Article 1105b R. C. S. Texas.

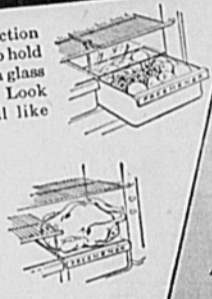

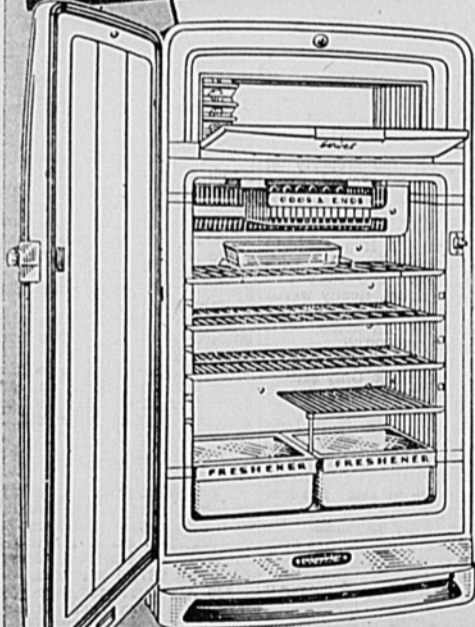

West Texas Roundup

Magnolia Petroleum Company No. 1 Tom Peay, Central-North Andrews County discovery for flowing production from two sections of the Permian lime, is apparently through the oil zone of the Wolfcamp — the second producing formation it has encountered.

The prospector is to make more hole. It is contracted to 14,000 feet to test the Ellenburger. This development had flowed oil at the rate of 1.2 barrels per hour from the Wolfcamp at 9,308-29 feet, and it had a recovery of 1,710 feet of free oil in a test of the upper section of the same horizon at 9,225-51 feet. It flowed 28.7 barrels of oil in one hour and 15 minutes in a drillstem test at 8,170-8,200 feet in a lime section thought by some geologists to likely be the Wichita-Albany.

Fifty Tahoka High School boys started spring training Monday afternoon under Coach Joe Turner, assisted by Coach Jake Jacobs. They will train for 30 calendar days.

"The boys are working pretty hard and appear to be eager," Coach Turner told The News. Ten lettermen of last fall's fifteen will be eligible this coming fall if they pass their work. Most of last year's squadmen are in training as well as a few new boys and this year's eighth grade boys who will be Freshmen next fall.

Dr. James P. Cornette received official notification Tuesday from the Commanding General of the Air Training Command, Scott Field, Illinois, that West Texas State has been offered a contract for the training of a clerk-typist unit of the United States Air Force.

The initial class of twenty-five trainees is slated to arrive during the week of April 17-24. "The contract," Dr. Cornette said, "calls for training the unit during the remainder of this fiscal year. Twenty-five trainees will arrive each week until a maximum group of 250 is attained. Should the contract be extended into the next fiscal year a maximum of 300 trainees will be on the campus."

Dr. Cornette revealed that all academic instruction will be handled by college personnel. Supervision of the unit will be under the controls of a permanent Air Force party due to arrive in Canyon within the next few days.

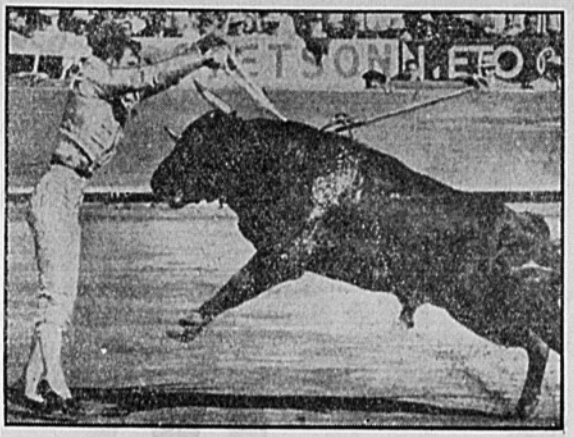

An eight-page booklet listing events, prize list, rules and regulations for the four-day May 23-26, annual Post Stampede rodeo will be ready early next week for distribution to rodeo hands who are contemplating entering events of this season's show.

More than \$3,500 is being offered to contestants in the two go-rounds (2 night shows constitute one go-round) in the six major events of this season's rodeo. In the roping events, calf and ribbon roping, contestants will divide more than \$1100. Winners in each of these contests will draw \$100 for first, \$60 for second, \$40 for third and \$20 for fourth best time. The contestant with the best go-round average in each event will receive \$75 first and \$50 second.

Butler Monument Works Has Modern And Complete Shop

They tell the story of the want ad that appeared in a New England newspaper: "For Sale: Slight-ly used monument, ideal for someone whose name is John Pace."

J. B. Butler, owner of Butler Monument Works, smiled at that one because his is one business where there is absolutely no resale value on the product.

Mr. Butler has been in the monument business since 1926 and since 1943 has had his own monument works here. Together with Sam Pequeno, his helper, they are capable of turning out almost any size, style or shape monument anyone might want.

Most people prefer standard sizes though, says Mr. Butler, and granite is preferred 2-1 over any other type stone.

"When we first started in business," said Butler, "Texas granite was about the only kind of stone we could get, but now we import agate stone from Minnesota, blue granite from the Carolinas, and marble from Tennessee. We also get Italian marble in the stone form and Italian marble vases."

Butler Monument Works, while specializing in monuments, also does concrete work and curbing too, said Mr. Butler. "We now have a fully equipped shop, modern in every respect," he added.

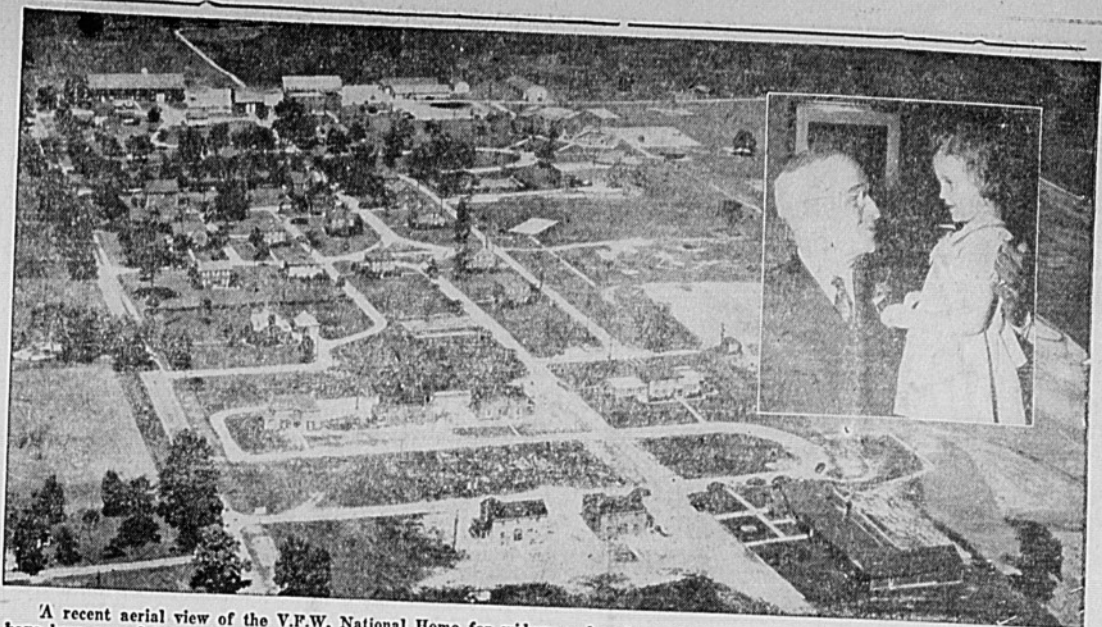

**ORDINANCE NO. 130
PLUMBING CODE**

An ordinance being comprehensive in its terms, defining words and terms including "Plumbing," "Master Plumber," "Journeyman Plumber," "Plumber's Apprentice," "Plumbing Inspector," "Board," and specifying certain work exempt from the provisions of this ordinance; requiring inspections on all plumbing work as defined herein; providing for the administration, intent and purpose of the provisions regulating all construction, erection, installation, alteration, repair, removal and maintenance of all piping, fitting, fixtures, etc., used for the conducting of water sewage or gas within the corporate limits of the City of Slaton or outside the corporate limits of the city of Slaton if any such construction, etc., be connected to the City of Slaton sewer or water systems; providing exemptions in the laying and servicing of water mains and sewer mains and gas distribution mains; providing and creating the office of Chief Plumbing Inspector and assistants, their duties, and licensing of said inspectors and enumerating their powers; providing for a Master Plumber's Bond, its filing and approval, Master Gas Fitter's Bond, Appliance Dealer's Bond, and approval thereof; requiring the filing of applications for permits relating to all work to be done in connection with piping and fitting for gas, water and sewer connections, and repairs; requiring inspections and providing fees; requiring applications and permits for excavations to be made in streets, alleys, parkways, sidewalks or pavements, establishing minimum cost requirements, requiring permits to be issued by the City Water Superintendent, requiring notice of repair, backfills; providing for construction permits affecting water, sewer or gas lines; providing special permits for exceptional construction, requiring inspections to protect the public health; establishing fees for permits; prohibiting backfilling without roughing-in, inspection and test, and providing for final inspection on all construction and repair; establishing minimum material and fixture requirements in accordance with ASTM specifications and method of construction and pipe size and weight specifications and certain piping including waste and vent lines, clean-out plugs, ferrules, gas pipe and fittings, drinking fountains and fixtures, materials, flushing equipment, and installation of the same, and also flushing tanks, groups and fixtures; establishing standards for all water heaters; establishing construction practices and methods and water service and supply to residences and apartment houses, fixture supply pipe, hot water connections, reaming pipe, soil pipe, drainage and waste in apartments, horizontal waste pipe, kitchen sinks, etc.; regulating construction of clean-outs and vents, sewer lines under railroads, fixture connections and traps, relating to all uses whether public or private; providing for discharge of waste from acid sinks and setting out specified prohibited material and connections; requiring connections with sewer system under stated conditions, and restricting use of septic tanks; stating limitations on use of refrigeration and air-conditioning connections and equipment; providing tests for all soil or waste pipes, adopting charts and methods of installing septic tank, water heater and gas appliance vents; providing for venting of commercial appliances and safety valves; prescribing gas pipe, gas bracket locations, and establishing rules for gas piping, and adopting table for openings in gas pipe, length and size of piping, regulating the use and installation of gas meters and floor furnaces and other gas appliances providing penalties for plumbing without a license, for violations of this code, prohibiting advertising by unlicensed plumbers, or the employing of unlicensed plumbers to do plumbing work in violation of the plumbing code; establishing rules for construction; providing a savings clause repealing all ordinances in conflict herewith and directing the manner of publication effective date of this ordinance.

ing, or who shall do any plumbing as that term is herein defined, or who shall perform any function, work or service within the definitions of "Master Plumber" or "Journeyman Plumber," or "Plumber's Apprentice," or "Plumbing Inspector" within the corporate limits of the City of Slaton, or otherwise as provided by this ordinance unless especially exempt by the provisions of this ordinance, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be punished by a fine of not more than Two Hundred (\$200.00) Dollars.

Paragraph 4-1.2. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm, association, corporation or other legal entity in the City of Slaton to advertise or hold himself or itself out to the public as a Master Plumber, Plumber's Apprentice or Chief Plumbing Inspector when such person or other legal entity has not lawfully obtained and does not have an unrevoked license or permit, as provided by the Plumbing License Law of 1947 with amendments, or this ordinance and any person or other legal entity which shall violate this provision of this ordinance shall be fined upon conviction, in any sum not exceeding Two Hundred (\$200.00) Dollars, and that each day that any such violation is committed shall constitute a separate offense.

Paragraph 4-1.3. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm, corporation or other legal entity to knowingly permit any person who is not a lawfully license plumber as herein defined and required, to do any plumbing as defined herein, upon any premises owned or under control of said person, firm, or corporation or other legal entity within the corporate limits of the City of Slaton and whoever shall violate this provision shall be fined in any sum not exceeding Two Hundred (\$200.00) Dollars.

Paragraph 4-1.4. Any person, firm, corporation or other legal entity violating or causing to be violated any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine not exceeding Two Hundred (\$200.00) Dollars.

Paragraph 4-1.5. It shall be unlawful for any person firm, or corporation or other legal entity to employ any person to do "plumbing" as that term is herein defined unless such person possesses a valid and unrevoked license as herein required, or permit as herein required and any violation of this provision shall constitute a separate offense to be punishable upon conviction by a fine not exceeding Two Hundred (\$200.00) Dollars.

Paragraph 4-1.6. This ordinance shall not be construed to relieve from or lessen the responsibility or liability of any person or other legal entity, owning, operating, controlling, or installing any plumbing as that term is herein defined, to persons or property caused by any defect therein nor shall the City of Slaton be held as assuming any such liability by reason of the inspection authorized herein, or by reason of any permit or license herein required or provided for.
