

## FIRST STEP IN PUBLIC WORKS PROGRAM

# Division Street Project Launched

The first step in a major public works improvements program was initiated in Slaton Tuesday as city crews started moving fire plugs to make way for new curb and gutter on Division Street.

In a special Monday meeting, Slaton City Commission canvassed ballots in the Sept. 1 bond election. Results were declared of-

ficial in approval of the \$350,000 bond proposals, and bids were called for the curb and gutter work between 9th and 20th streets on Division.

Bids are to be opened on the project Sept. 25 at 3 p.m. in City Hall. The project calls for 7,500 linear feet of curbs and gutters. Only a portion of Division, a main artery in the city's traffic system,

now has curbs and gutters.

The county is scheduled to come in and pave the street after right of way has been cleared and the new curb and gutter improvements are made. The street will be widened to a 41-foot paved street. It is now 31 feet wide on one portion and narrower in others.

The entire reworking of Division

Street is estimated at a cost of \$56,000. The city will spend approximately \$16,000 for its portion of the work. Some utilities will have to move lines back off the street for the required amount of right of way.

At the commission meeting Monday, the city approved the sale of \$300,000 worth of bonds to the First Southwest Co. Joe Smith,

representative of the company, reported the city could not issue the full \$350,000 at this time due to charter limitations.

Bennett Reaves, city engineer, indicated that \$50,000 of the bond issue is to be used to construct a pump station could wait until a later date. The \$300,000 in bonds were sold at an average rate of 4.1222 percent.

The commission also signed an engineering contract on the public works project with the firm of Parkhill, Smith & Cooper.

Slaton citizens approved three issues in the bond election by better than a 3-to-1 margin. They included capital improvements on the waterworks, sewer system and streets.

The three youths discovered a broken gas meter Saturday in the alley behind the home of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Kellum, 240 N. 5th St. Gas was escaping from a main line and the youths promptly notified Pioneer Natural Gas Co.

The boys are Jay Dunn, teenage son of Mr. and Mrs. Woodrow Dunn, and Matt and Gordon Becker, 11 and 8-year-old sons of Mr. and Mrs. B. H. (Bo) Becker. The Beckers are next door neighbors to the Kellums.

Mrs. Kellum in reporting the incident, said she thought the boys "should be recognized for their good deed." She and her husband were out of town when the gas line was broken, apparently when a vehicle accidentally backed into the meter.

"The gas was shooting out and that needle on the meter was really whirling around," reported Matt.

## Slaton Santa Fe Men Aid In Dramatic Rescue

Two Santa Fe men from Slaton played vital roles in the dramatic rescue of a snake-bite victim last week near Post.

Engineer R. T. (Red) Farley took his double diesel locomotive to the rescue site, and brakeman C. W. Simmons lifted the victim into the cab.

Joe M. Sustalta, 61, also had other alert crew members and a new medicine to thank for saving his life. He was bitten by a rattlesnake Monday night, Aug. 31, and was not discovered until Tuesday morning.

Sustalta was walking along the tracks northwest of Post when the rattlesnake struck his left leg, just above the shoe top. The snake bit him twice before he grabbed it and tossed it away.

The victim walked about two more miles toward Post before collapsing in some weeds near the tracks. He had been to see a farmer about a job, he told officials at Garza Memorial Hospital.

Sustalta applied a crude tourniquet to his leg after the mishap. The snake also struck through a heavy trouser leg.

Through the night, the victim said he just "laid there and waved." It was eight hours, however, before crewmen on a south-bound freight spotted him in the grass and weeds as the train sped down the track.

The crew radioed to Post as they approached the station of the location of the "waving person" at milepost 793. Sheriff L. E. Claborn and an ambulance were alerted at Post, but he sent word that he couldn't get close enough by car to check.

So it was Santa Fe Railroad to the rescue. A. V. McGinnis, a track supervisor, went to the scene in a railroad motor car and found Sustalta, but he knew he

did not have time to return him to Post before a northwest bound freight came through.

So McGinnis radioed into Post; the freight was stopped at the station, and the double diesel locomotive was disconnected. Then Engineer Farley sped to the motor car to get Sustalta. Simmons picked up the victim and placed him in the cab, and the diesel backed into Post with its horn blaring.

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## Barbecue Draws Record Crowd

One of the largest crowds ever to attend a Farmer-Merchant Barbecue turned out in Slaton's Little League Park Tuesday night to enjoy good food, fellowship and see the annual presentation of cotton awards.

The annual event is sponsored by the Slaton Chamber of Com-

merce with merchants, ginners and professional men serving as hosts to show their appreciation for business from area farmers. An estimated 1,000 men attended the barbecue.

Doug Galassini, C of C president, presented three awards to early cotton producers — handing out \$150, \$100 and \$50 checks for the first three bales of cotton produced in the trade area.

Recipients of the cash awards were Jimmie Davis, first bale from near Acuff; Benito Chappa, second bale from near Posey; and August B. Patenske, third bale from Rt. 2, Slaton.

Bob England served as master of ceremonies, with Galassini making the welcome address and Glen Akin responding for the farmers. Dr. Lee Vardy, Slaton School superintendent, voiced the invocation.

Albert Kuss and his band provided music during the barbecue, and the Slaton Topperettes, a group of young barbers, performed after the meal. A number of prizes, donated by Slaton Merchants were passed out to farmers before the cotton awards were presented.

Jay Gray, ginmer, and Wayne Banks, sugar market manager, served as co-chairmen of the barbecue committee. This was the 7th annual Farmer-Merchant Barbecue.

Slaton merchants and 15 participating ginners distributed tickets to the farmers for the barbecue. A total of more than 200 merchants, professional men and ginners made it possible to honor area farmers.

Attractive programs noted that approximately 100,153 bales of cotton were ginned in the Slaton trade area during the 1963-64 season.

ENROLLMENT PASSES 2,000

George Bush, Republican candidate for the U. S. Senate, brings his campaign tour to Slaton today as local supporters honor him with a coffee and reception from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. at the Red Arrow Cafe on the west side of the square.

Bill Klattenhoff, former GOP district committeeman, Wednesday invited "anyone interested in the Senatorial race" to meet and hear Bush during his brief appearance here.

Free coffee will be served here this morning, and the "bandwagon for Bush" will include musical entertainment by the "Green Mountain Boys" from Abilene. The group will play before and after Bush's talk this morning.

Bush seeks the seat currently occupied by Ralph Yarborough, Democrat. He is scheduled to speak at the coffee about 10:15 a.m. shortly after his campaign bus rills into town.

Bush, 39, is a former resident of Midland, and now lives in Houston, where he is Harris County GOP Chairman. He is president and director of Zapata Off-Shore Co. He and his wife have five children.

Son of a former senior Senator from Connecticut, Prescott S. Bush, a Republican, Bush graduated from Yale and moved to Texas in 1943. A Navy pilot in the South Pacific during World War II, Bush was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross along with three Air Medals.

The visit here is part of a four-day barnstorming tour of the South Plains.

A veteran Slaton farmer, L. J. Strube of Route 2, was presented with a 60-year membership medallion last week from Herman's Sons Lodge No. 216 of Rowena. Strube, who will be 85 on Nov. 1, is the oldest of two charter members still living.

Since he was unable to attend the presentation ceremony, his son, Florence of Slaton, went to Rowena to accept the medal for him, and participated in the 60th birthday celebration of the lodge.

The octogenarian was born Nov. 1, 1879 at Rockdale, Ark., and has lived through the terms of 17 United States presidents—from Rutherford B. Hayes, 1877-1881, to Lyndon B. Johnson. Strube says he has voted the Democratic

ticket all his adult life, and was at one time very active in politics. In a recent interview, he recalled with keen alacrity his coming to Slaton in 1921, at which time he and his wife moved into the same house they still occupy.

His wife, the former Rosa Francis Hoelcher, was born Aug. 26, 1883 at Frelsburg, Tex., and the couple has been married 63 years.

Other than their son, Florence, they have a daughter, Helen (Mrs. August Kitten), also of Slaton; nine living grand-children, and 13 great-grandchildren.

Strube, who considers every-one in and around Slaton a friend, still drives to town occasionally to shop or visit, and stated simply, "That is my dessert!"

### Draft Law Compliance Is Urged

Failure to register, like failure to comply with other provisions of the law, may subject men to prosecution, or induction into the army out of turn and ahead of other men, says Gillon.

Maximum penalty for failure to comply with any provision of the law, upon prosecution and conviction, is \$10,000, or both.

## Slaton Blanked By Petersburg In Opening Football Clash, 18-0

Slaton's slow-starting Tigers spotted the Petersburg Buffaloes two quick first-quarter touchdowns, then rallied to give the defending Class A state champs a real battle the rest of the way in the 1954 football opener Friday night at Petersburg.

The Golden Buffs posted an 18-0 victory, their 16th straight, in the game played before a capacity crowd, but the Tigers never gave up. Coach Neal Chastain's crew stopped the Buffs twice inside the 10-yard-line.

The Tigers couldn't untrack their offensive attack against the quick-charging Petersburg line, with their only real scoring threat being stopped the first time Slaton had the ball.

Two blocked punts and four 15-yard penalties also served to handicap the Tiger offense. Slaton recorded only six first downs in the non-district contest, and only two of them were put back to back.

With little offensive fireworks, the Tigers had no standout performers on the attack. Quarterback Bobby Brake, who shows promise after a season's layoff, broke loose for a 25-yard run. He carried the ball 12 times and gained 38 yards, but he netted only 8 yards after being trapped for 29 yards, but he absorbed a big minus 22 on an attempted pass.

Halfback Billy Gass wound up with the most net yardage for Slaton—16 on four tries. Sparky Stephens and Victor Cristan had 14 each, and Phil Goad had 12.

Good almost went all the way on a kickoff return, dashing 27 yards before the last man in his path tripped him up.

Chastain carried 23 players to Petersburg and he got 21 of them into the fray. He was disappointed after the game, but he was pleased with the manner the team stayed in the battle to the final whistle.

Fud Robertson, hard-running fullback, and quarterback Mike Loyd—two leaders from last year's state championship team—provided the punch for the Buffs. Robertson went 2 and 45 yards for scores, and Loyd dashed 21 for the other.

Except for a few lapses, the Buffs turned in a stout defensive game. Larry Smith, Joe Martin, Leonard Hurst, Billy Martin, Goad, Gamble and Brake were notable for good defensive stops along with several other Tigers.

Petersburg won the opening kickoff and marched down the field as though they were going to roll over the Tigers with ease. It took just seven plays with Robertson and Loyd doing the most damage. Robertson barged over from the 2 to cap a 61-yard drive. Loyd's run for two points was stopped by Smith and Brake, but the Buffs held a 6-0 lead with 8:58 left in the initial period.

Smith took a short Buff kick off on his 30 and returned to the Petersburg 45 as the Tigers got the ball. Gamble, Gass and Stephens hit for short gains, and a 5-yard penalty helped get a first down on the Buff 30.

After three more short gains, Slaton faced a fourth and three

situation on the Buff 24. Gass was a yard shy and that was as close as the Tigers were to come to pay dirt.

Starting from their 21, Petersburg quickly rolled to another score, launching the drive on a sifty 22-yard pass from Loyd to end Jack Scarborough. Moments later Loyd hit left tackle for about 5 yards, then lateraled to Robertson as he was hit by two Tigers. Robertson tucked in the pigskin and dashed the remaining 40 yards for a score. His kick was blocked by Smith and it was 12-0 with 2:36 left in the quarter.

Slaton chalked up two first downs in the second period while holding the Buffs to one, but neither team threatened to score.

A couple of 15-yard penalties stopped Slaton drives early in the third quarter, then Loyd launched the final Buff scoring march with a 25-yard scamper. Robertson clipped in a long gainer in the drive, then Loyd broke loose on a 21-yard scoring jaunt. Steve Harlan rushed through to block Robertson's try for the extra point.

A fumble and two blocked kicks kept the Tigers in trouble in the final period. Another punt was partially blocked, but Slaton turned that rescue into a first down when Gass recovered the free ball. Smith stopped ones Buff drive by intercepting a pass on the Slaton 44-yard line. It was a fourth-down loss from the 11.

The Buffs threatened again late in the game when Brake attempted a punt on the run and it was blocked and recovered on the Tiger 21. The snogback sailed over Brake's head and he tried to

### Safety Check On Vehicles Starts Again

AUSTIN—Col. Homer Garrison Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, announced today that the time has arrived for Texas motorists to have their vehicles inspected again.

Garrison said Sept. 1 marked the beginning of the 1954 vehicle inspection period as prescribed by the Public Safety Commission. As in previous years, the period will end on April 15, 1955.

"This means that between now and April 15, 1955, more than 5,000,000 Texas registered vehicles will have to be inspected at the 5,300 official inspection stations in Texas," he said.

Garrison urged motorists to have their vehicles inspected in the routine visits to garages for ordinary maintenance and repairs and thereby eliminate the necessity of having to wait in line at a later date for an inspection sticker. He further pointed out that with the ever increasing number of vehicles registered in Texas, it is becoming ever more difficult for the motorist to get an inspection sticker without some delay.

"With the hard summer driving coming to an end, fall is an excellent time to have vehicles safety checked for the winter months ahead," Garrison said.

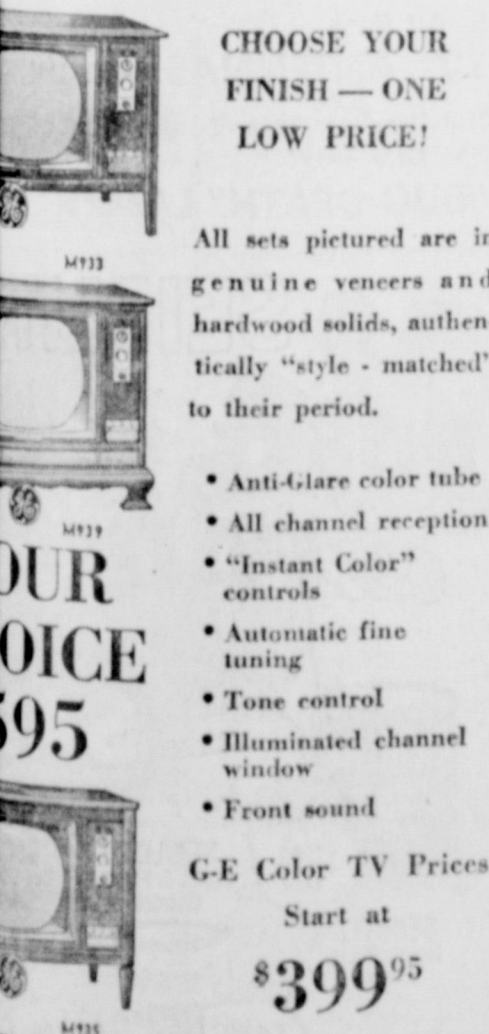

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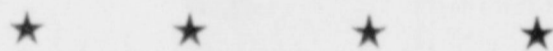
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
