VIEWING:
Your City Government
 by J. J. Maxey, City Secretary

I have chosen for today's discussion the sanitary sewer system of the City of Slaton. The word sewer is repugnant to itself but a sanitary sewer system is an integral part of any city's health program.

In July of 1921, the first part of our sewer system was installed by the expenditure of \$55,000 which enabled us to serve the downtown area and a few blocks into the residential area in either direction. At this time a twelve inch main line was laid to the canyon where the City had previously purchased a quarter section of land. A small treatment plant of the Imhoff type was installed at this location. This plant was designed for less than one thousand people. Sewage was run into this plant where it was given primary treatment and the effluent was drained off into the canyon.

In 1924, Slaton had really begun to grow and this necessitated the expenditure of another \$40,000 to extend sewer service to more of the residential area. These extensions proved to be a number of years. Of course, all of you, that are as old as I am, can remember what happened during the depression years of the early thirties. No extensions or improvements were made in our sewer system from 1924 until 1947. At that time an improvement program was started which culminated in an adequate sanitary system for the city that we now have. For several years we were very concerned with making extensions to serve our residential districts. These extensions increased the size of our plant and outfall lines until they were completely inadequate. In 1952, we were faced with the proposition to spend around \$70,000 for a new Imhoff treatment plant to take care of our needs. We did not have this kind of money and our bond load was already extended to the point where we were having to raise taxes if any more bonds were voted. For four or five years the State Department of Health has been experimenting with the oxidation form of sewer treatment. This consisted of open ponds approximately three feet deep where the sewage was subjected to sunlight and oxygen. Oxygen is assimilated by the sewage slowly flowing by gravity from one pond to another. San Joaquin, Lamesa and Hereford had tried this system and it was satisfactory so we built an oxidation system on the land we already owned at the canyon. This system consists of two settling basins of one half acre each, two ponds of one acre each, a pump basin of a little over an acre and two final ponds of one and one half acres each. These ponds, two centrifugal pumps and 1,585 feet of pipe make up the entire treatment plant which cost a total of \$26,680. This plant is used for a dual purpose, first to treat the sewage from our city and second to make the best use of the effluent from this plant by irrigating the available land owned by the city at this location. There is approximately 50 acres of cultivated land at this location that has a cotton allotment of some 26 acres. Since this system was put in operation early in 1954, the City has collected a little over twelve thousand dollars in rent from this system made possible only through irrigation with effluent from our sewer plant. The next step in our improvement program was to take steps to relieve the overloaded situation of our carrier and outfall lines and to serve some of the low areas that it had never been possible to reach due to their elevation. As all of you know, Slaton is built between four ridges which makes it extremely difficult to serve some areas with sanitary sewer without having service lines fifteen feet deep. In 1957, a \$150,000 bond issue was voted to relieve this situation. The first step was to install a new outfall line parallel to the old outfall line from the treatment plant at the canyon and to extend the carrier lines up through the city. At this time it was necessary to install a large lift station just west of the railroad in order to get sewage into the new lines without having to dig so deep and also to be able to serve our low areas in town for the same reason. When this was done, we extended collector lines into all of the areas that we had previously been unable to serve due to their elevation. When this had been completed we installed two other lift stations of a smaller size, one on North Seventh Street

and one on North Twentieth Street and extended collector lines to serve these areas. Occasionally it has been said that the newer areas have had preferential treatment in this field. Nothing is farther from the truth. Cost of new construction in the southeast area for sewer service alone is more than \$68,000 during the period 1957-1960. The City Commission has always felt that sanitary sewer service is one of the most important of the city's responsibilities. Throughout the last several years of improvement on our system, professional engineers have been used for planning and advice and we now feel that our plant, outfall and carrier lines are adequate for a growing population and that new service lines can be run to new areas wherever it is economically feasible.

Any discussion on this subject would be incomplete without a few words on costs. At the present time, the City of Slaton has capital investment in sanitary sewers in amount of \$353,225.53. This was all financed by general obligation bonds which are paid for out of the annual ad-valorem tax. The operation of our sewer system has always been handled by our Water Department, which is under the direction of George D. Willis. George has two men, a large service truck and various pieces of mechanical equipment to insure that our citizens have the kind of sanitary sewer service that they want. In addition to this, some two thousand dollars annually is spent for chemicals to keep our lines free and to insure proper treatment. The estimated cost of operating your

sanitary sewer system for 1961 will be \$13,879.59 which makes an annual operation cost of \$8.42 for each of our 1,648 homes and businesses that are now connected to the sewer. The great majority of cities make a monthly service charge for the use of the sanitary sewer, in fact Slaton and Lubbock are the only two in this area that do not.

Mr. Willis has men who are accredited by the Texas State Department of Health to operate a sewer system and he, along with these men, are ever alert to protect the health of our community by providing the best sanitary sewer service as is possible. 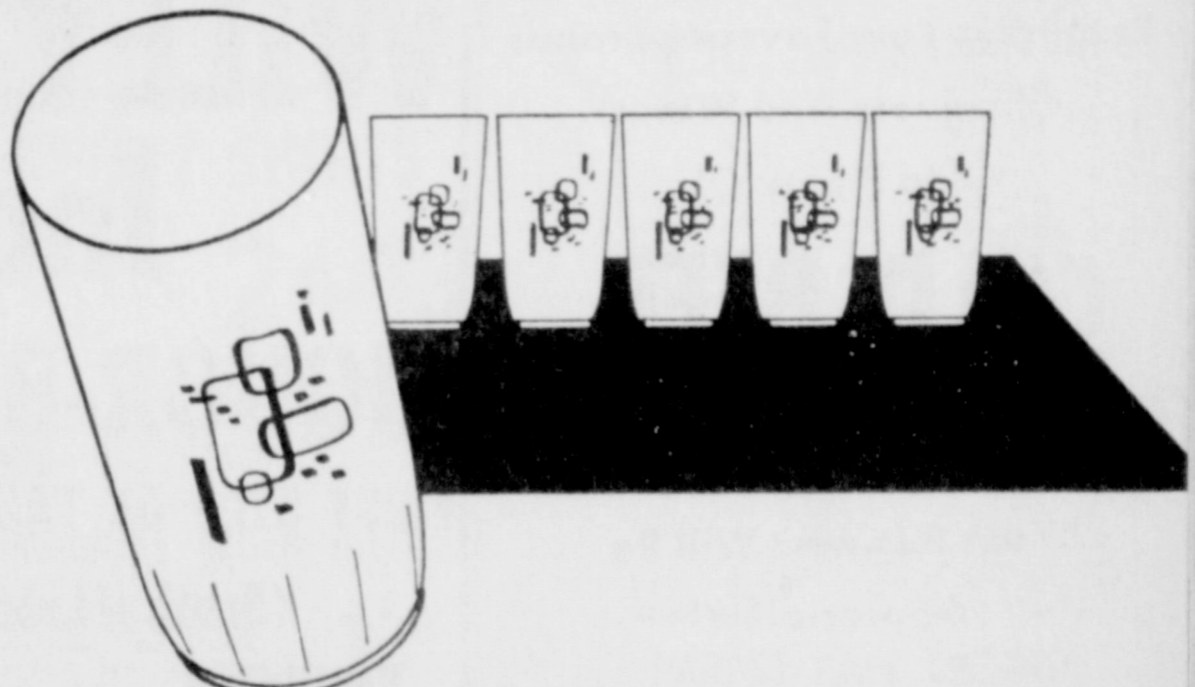

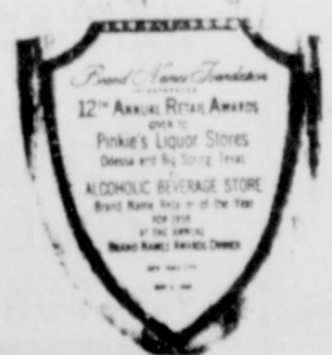

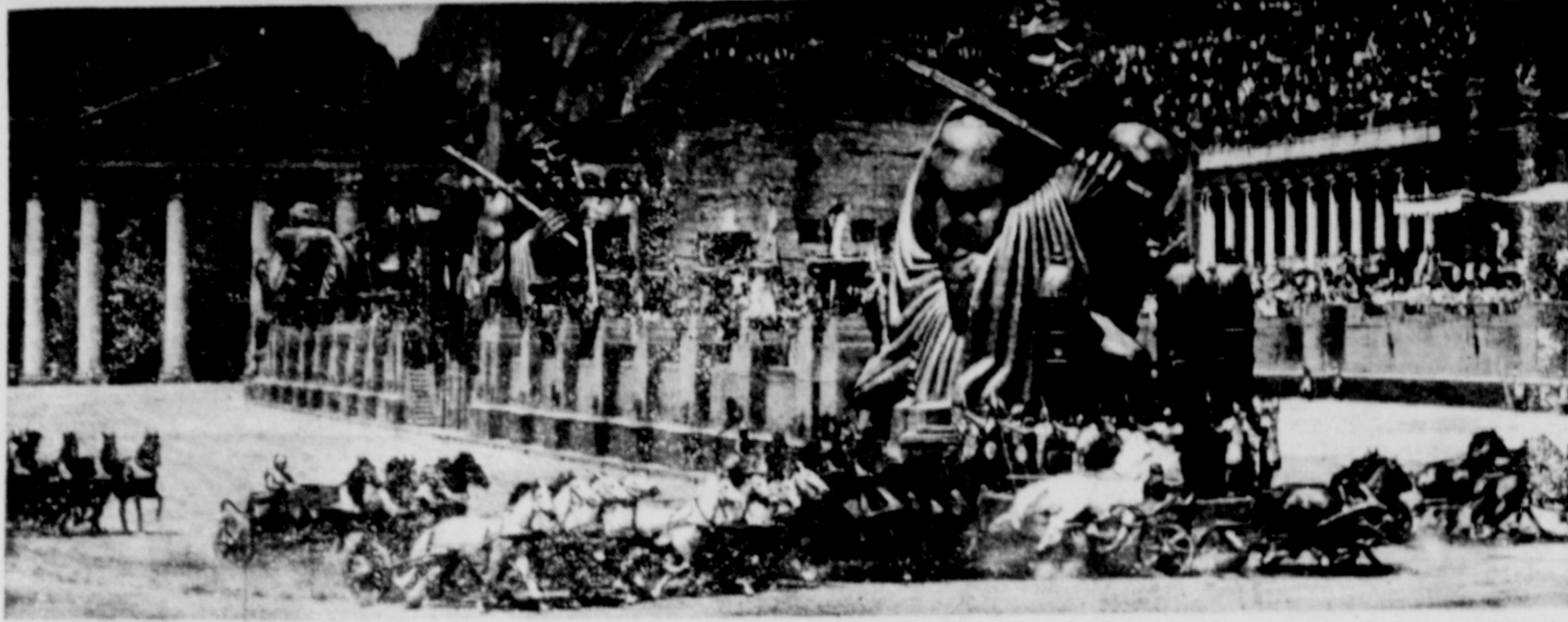

J. O. ROBERTS VICTIM

Farmer Survives Shooting But Dies Of Heart Attack

J. O. Roberts, 75-year-old farmer from the Pleasant Valley Community who was shot and critically wounded by a berserk Negro employe March 20, died this morning at West Texas hospital. Hospital attendants said Roberts had completely recovered from the gunshot wound and was to be discharged this afternoon, but he suffered a heart attack about 9 a.m. and died within a few minutes. Funeral arrangements are pending.

Roberts, a former foreman of the Patton Ranch in King County and a widely-known Garza County farmer for at least 20 years, underwent extensive surgery after he was shot.

He was on the operating table more than two hours. Roberts was shot by a 61-year-old farm worker, Chester Tatum, who later stood off 20 officers during an 85-minute gun battle before being killed himself.

Mrs. Roberts said at the time her husband was taking a tray of food to Tatum, who had been reported "feeling bad," when the longtime family employe shot him in the stomach with a .38 pistol. The gunbattle took place at the Roberts farmhouse in

northwest Garza County about 10 miles north of Post. Roberts began farming in the Pleasant Valley area about 1940.

Physicians at West Texas hospital said this morning Roberts had "recovered completely" from the complicated operation which the gunshot wound caused. Roberts' survivors include his wife; a son, Jack, a student at McMurry College in Abilene.

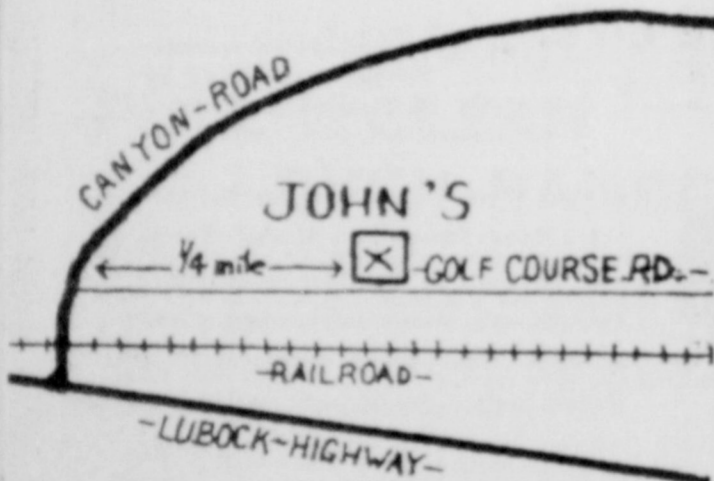

Migrant Worker Bill Approved

—By voice vote, Monday tentatively approved a bill by Rep. Mauro of El Paso to improve the conditions for migrant workers, by a vote of 102-30, refused to suspend the rules for immediate final passage.

Rosas bill would force transporters of migrant workers to pass physical exams and to have their vehicles safety inspected to provide for good brakes, lights, tailgates and covers.

It provides that trucks would have seats and would penalize transporters for overloading. The act would only apply to those persons who transport workers more than 100 miles.

The measure also provides for rest and meal stops for workers and would prevent drivers from making long trips without relief. For every 600 miles traveled, the bill provides an eight-hour rest stop for the workers. Violations would be subject to fines of \$5 to \$50.

Estimate Of U.S. Wheat Crop High

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Agriculture Department has forecast this year's winter wheat production at 1,098,735,000 bushels.

This estimate is 64,735,000 bushels more than 1,034 million bushels indicated by the department as of Dec. 1. Production was 1,117,131,000 bushels last year and 840,244,000 for the 10-year (1950-59) average.

No forecast was given for the spring wheat crop inasmuch as little of it has been seeded. But the department has said a spring crop of 240 million bushels is possible, on the basis of a planting survey.

Thus the combined winter and spring crops would be 1,338,735,000 bushels, compared with 1,963 million bushels last year, the second largest of record.

Walsh said the cotton ginner is in the logical position to exercise leadership in the industry. He said the ginner is the middleman between producer and buyer and successfully meets the demands of both groups. Life

In Our Welfare State

U. S. News & World Report recently devoted a lengthy article to "Life In The Welfare State --- Now and In The Future." The "welfare state" in question is the U. S. Here's its history, as the magazine recounts it: "Federal welfare today is a vast program that grows in leaps. In a few years, welfare has grown from a small program to become the second most expensive in the government. Only national defense costs more....
In less than 30 years, the number of people getting some form of government help has grown to 23 million annually. Cost of the program this year alone will be \$22 billion. This doesn't include cost of veterans' benefits." Next year, the magazine adds, the cost will be \$26 billion if present Administration proposals for more welfare are approved.
We will soon have to draw a firm line between what we want, or think we want, from government --- and what we can afford. The cost of welfare is fast becoming insupportable.

In Advertising

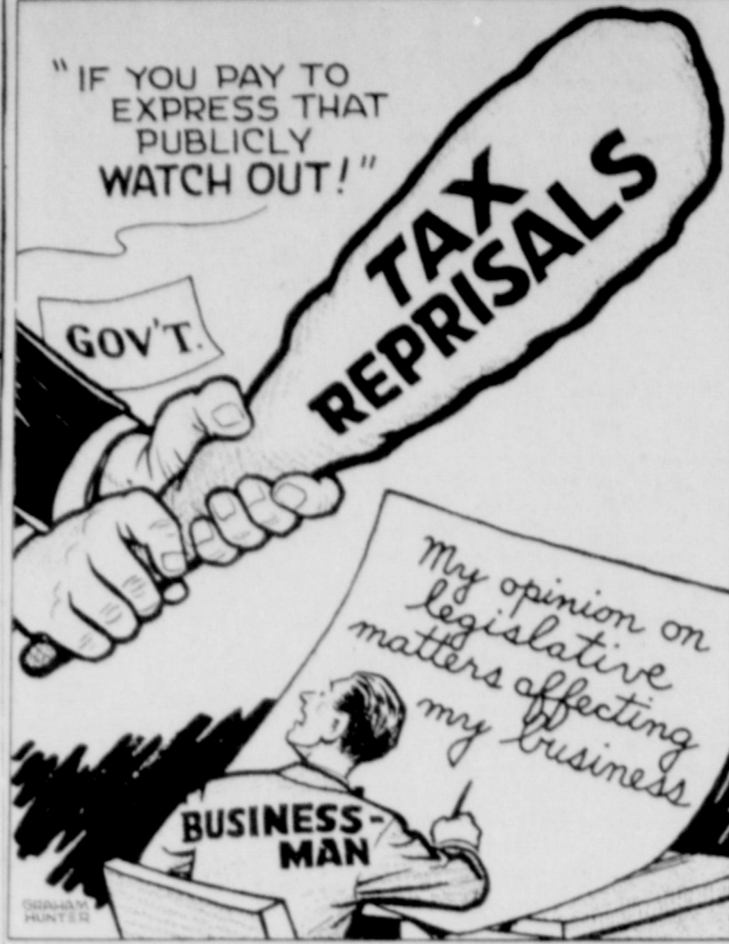
When we discuss patriotism in advertising, we are using an admittedly selfish viewpoint. We selfishly want freedom to be saved in America for ourselves and our children. And we know that American business can help to save it. American businessmen are without any question the most successful salesmen of products that the world has ever known. Through the use of advertising on a widespread scale, urging the merits of their goods and services, American businessmen have played a basically important part in making the American standard of living the highest in the world.
This year approximately eleven billion dollars is being spent to advertise the products of American business. This big advertising program is a sound investment. It pays off. Business as we know it in this country simply would not exist without advertising.
This is an educational force of tremendous strength. Advertising teaches newspaper and magazine readers, radio listeners and television viewers things that make life easier, more pleasant, more comfortable. But unfortunately, this mass education through advertising is not generally used to teach the great buying public the basic and essential concepts of American freedom. This is a condition that should be changed. Let us consider what is really fundamental business of the American Businessman.
It is not --- although it may seem to be --- automobiles or steel or food products, not women's clothing or to household appliances, not soft drinks or office supplies or farm tractors. Not any of these. The real business, the important business, of the American businessman is the preservation of those freedoms guaranteed by the Constitution of the United States. Of course that is your business, too.
If it were not for the Constitution, there would be no private business, no personal enterprise system, in America. There would be no private property. There would be no private employment. Nor would there be any personal rights or any personal privacy. Without the Constitution we would all be the involuntary servants of the government. That is exactly what the anti-freedom powers would have us become.
But who among the big business advertisers is carrying on a campaign to convince the American people of these facts? Who is selling them on the necessity of absolute and constant vigilance to preserve freedom. We can be very grateful to the growing number of American businesses who are adding Patriotism to their advertising.

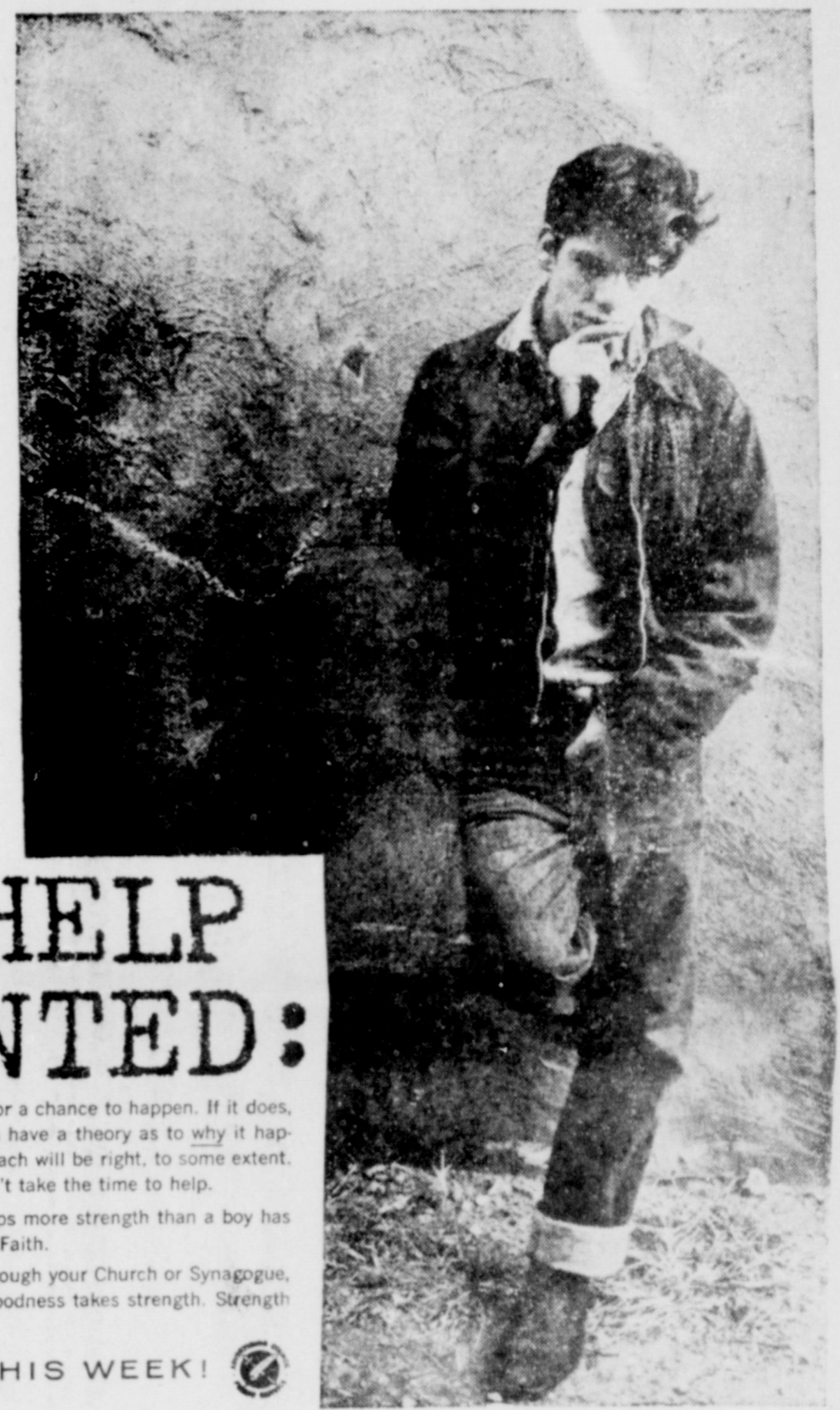

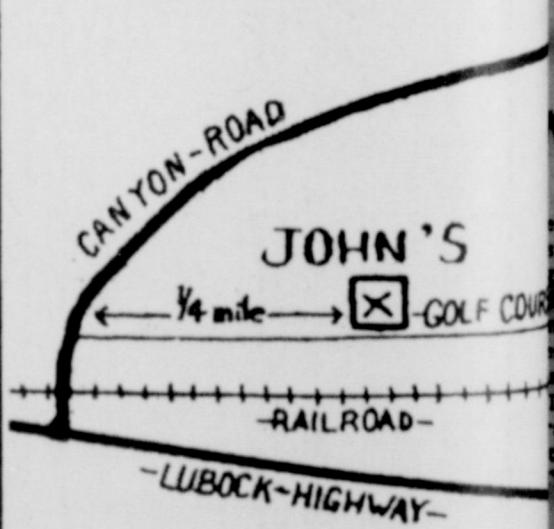
