

Diphtheria is an infectious disease caused by a bacteria, spreading princially through nasal drippings or cough. It can also be spread via hand, hand-kerchief, etc., and surprisingly, smptoms begin to show up in from one to four days after exposure.

Diphtheria attacks the upper espiratory tract, forming a psuedo membrance and causing swelling, literally choking some victims to death. It also poduces a toxin asbobed by the body which can affect the heart or nervous system.

Diphtheria shots are not unually given when a patient is bothered with a cold or any of several other ailments. Parents are urged to see their family phsician.


