## Commission, Police To Take Action On Unlicensed Drivers

### CONCERTED DRIVE BY DEPARTMENT TO BEGIN HERE OVER WEEKEND

Slaton's City Commission, at its regular meeting Monday night, conferred with Chief of Police Gene Martin and took action for new rules and procedures which will apply in the future to the growing number of young, unlicensed drivers within the corporate city limit.

Chief Martin reported that periodic checks were made on drivers license, and that an excessive number of persons had been driving without the proper license.

Upon discussion of the problem, the commission instructed Chief Martin to focus special attention on this phase of the enforcement, and to make future reports on all minors driving without a license. Upon each ticket issued to a minor without license, Chief Martin was instructed to write a letter to the parents of the violator, outlining the circumstances of the offense and asking that the parents appear with the minor before the Corporation Court Judge.

The Commission also instructed the judge to assess the minimum fine for the first violation, but should the offenses continue to occur, then maximum fine will be assessed on the third offense.

Making a statement on the reason for this action, a spokesman for the Commission stated that minors driving without license constituted one of the main problems in that accidents were more likely, and damaged insurance, regardless of fault.

As a growing safety problem, the law officers in Slaton will be concentrating on the problem of unlicensed drivers, and notice of this fact is being given well in advance so that both drivers and parents may make the necessary adjustment to comply with the regulations.

### Slaton Student On Honor Roll

Making the scholastic honor roll at Wayland Baptist College in the spring were 116 students, including Miss Katherine Smith, Slaton. Of the 116, some 10 students made an "A" average.

Miss Smith, a sophomore elementary education major at Wayland last semester, is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. K. Smith, 620 South 13th, Slaton. A 1959 graduate of Slaton High School, Miss Smith maintained an average of 2.6 last semester.

When Wayland Baptist College opens its fall semester Sept. 7 for orientation and testing of new students and Sept. 11 for registration of upperclassmen, two new buildings will be open for student occupancy. Owen Hall, a 100-unit women's residence, and Allison-Conkright Hall, an 8-unit married students apartment, are in the final stages of construction. Ground will be broken soon for the construction of the Home Life Building, which will house home economics and family life departments. These new buildings will enable Wayland to take care of the anticipated increase in enrollment.

### Insurance Rates To Go Up August 1st

Slaton citizens can look forward to an approximate 15 per cent increase in automobile insurance rates, effective August 1st, according to local insurance men. The hike is in line with an announcement from the Texas Insurance Board, ordering the increased rates across the state.

Broken down, the Lubbock County (territory 10) rates for private passenger cars in Comprehensive coverage will go up 19.7%. Collision rates will be upped by 11.4%, and Liability rates will undergo the increase in Bodily Injury of 24.9%; and in Property Damage of 3.5%.

The chief reason for the raise appears to be based on miscalculations made when the rate structure was changed more than a year ago. At that time it was estimated that around fifty per cent of the state's drivers would come in for an increase in rates rather than a reduction. It was found out, however, that a much larger number of drivers were eligible for a "zero classification," meaning no penalty was assessed for violations.

Statistics say this has brought about a loss in premium revenue for agents and companies of approximately \$28 million. With the increase in rates, it is estimated that the deficit will be erased, with about \$30 million to be picked up annually. Slaton drivers can look for their rates to be increased on an average of from \$5 to \$37 a year.

One change will be the slight advantage of the insurance purchaser, however, in that the minor moving violations that have previously caused penalties caused penalties will no longer do so. In point, the ticket for passing a stop sign has previously been counted as an insurance penalty but will no longer be considered as such. Other minor infractions along this line will also be dropped from the penalty list, leaving such items as speeding, reckless driving, driving while intoxicated, etc.

# Message Sent To Slaton Citizens From Former Minister Now A Missionary In Florence, Italy

Editor's Note: The following is a letter and message from Harold Mobley, former minister of the Slaton Church of Christ, to the citizens of the area. Along with his family, Mobley is presently a missionary in Florence, Italy. His words describe the pictures shown and some of his experiences in Europe. He left Slaton early this year.

Dear Joel:

Enclosed is a "freshman's viewpoint" of Florence. If you think I have more friends than enemies in Slaton feel free to use any of this material with any comments or deletions you feel necessary.

I started this material a good while ago but just got around to finishing today. This place is really a sight to see; very interesting. I haven't touched the hem of the garment when it comes to seeing. For instance we have here in Florence two reproductions of Michelangelo's David. I have seen both the reproductions; in fact I pass one of them several times a week. But only yesterday did I take time out to read in my guide of the city to learn that the original of this magnificent statue is in a Museum on a back street here.

One thing that impresses me is the number of holidays. Last Saturday when I saw the old style calcio it was John the Baptist's Day. He is the patron saint of the city. Thursday two days ago was the day of Peter and Paul if I haven't gotten them mixed up.

Now we are having lovely summer weather with not too unpleasant temperatures yet. Nights are very cool and pleasant except for the free flow of mosquitos via unscreened windows.

Mona and I have made only one short trip to other parts looking around. We did get a worm's eye view of Milano and spent about four pleasant hours in Venice. The other cities on the route we just passed through. We have no immediate plans to see Rome but probably will do so before next fall. There is a church in Taranto (in the heel of the boot) made up of American servicemen who want me to come down and be guest speaker for them when possible but it may be Sept. or October. On that trip I will naturally go through Rome and Naples.

We are very much pleased

with life except for the loss of so many wonderful friends and members of our families and their companionship. This we expected to give up at least for a few years. I thought while living in West Texas and yet believe that there are no people on earth quite as good-hearted as they. And instead of making big plans to settle closer to our relatives when we return I find dreams sneaking into my mind of being somewhere in West Texas on our return. Don't misunderstand me! I haven't been out of the States long enough yet to get to thinking that the place is free of all knotheds.

I would appreciate hearing from you, if I could serve you and the Slatonite in some small way while we are here let me know, I am a sorry hand, needless to say, when it comes to writing but I might be able to find something interesting now and then. Feel no obligation whatever to use any of what I have mailed but I did make a promise to send you something and did not want to fall on it. Best wishes to you, Bobbie and the little gal. Hope this finds everything going your way in the business.

Florence, Italy  
July 1, 1961

Florence, Italy, July 1 -- Greetings to all our friends in Slaton. Here are some pictures of the city which we now call home. Below is an explanation of each one.

No. 1 - 11 Ponte Vecchio (the old bridge). This was the only bridge left standing during the Second World War. Today it can be crossed only on foot. The shops on this bridge were first occupied by butchers in 1345 but today house shops which cater mostly to tourist trade. Although the original bridge is of earlier origin the present bridge is attributed to Taddeo Gaddi as builder in the fourteenth century.

No. 2 - View of the Bridges. Contrasting with the Ponte Vecchio in the background are three other bridges which also cross the Arno. The newer of the four is the one in the foreground and is named Amerigo Vespucci. Vespucci, incidentally, is the man who gave his name to America. Vespucci was born in Florence in 1451. The bridge is beautified with a row of flowers which runs the entire length of it and is lighted at night.

No. 3 - Panorama of Florence. This picture shows the major part of this beautiful city of nearly half a million people. Florence is called the city of flowers and richly deserves the name. They are plentiful. I bought a dozen carnations a few days ago for about sixty cents for a sick patient. No. 4 - Porta Romana. This

entrance is one of many which once connected a huge wall around the old city. Florence is on the great route from Rome to Northern Italy and all Europe. It is called "the cradle of the Renaissance," and "the Athens of the West." From the 13th to the 16th centuries Flo-

rence was covered with monuments, palaces, and church buildings decorated by the greatest artists of Italy. Most of this work still stands intact. Florence is the city of Dante, Petrarch, Boccaccio and Galileo; the city where Savonarola was burned as a heretic. The old tower from which Galileo used to study the stars is just about a mile from where I am sitting.

With even the slightest appreciation for such a history as Florence has you can well imagine that we appreciate living here. At present we are living in a suburban villa which is used for the Florence Bible School. We will move into a rented apartment in September after the school's administrator, Joe Gibbs, returns from a summer's work in the States.

We have only begun to see the many interesting things available in Florence. Many tourists have asked us about things we never had heard of until they mentioned them. We have probably spent a total of less than two days here really sight-seeing.

Last Saturday evening we did have the pleasure of watching a 16th century type of calcio or rugby. It was funny compared with the precision type calcio

which I saw played when Italy defeated Argentina 4 to 1 here in Florence a few weeks ago. But the costumes of the old game were beautiful. We have never seen richer colors! There were 16th century canons fired to initiate the game and to signal each point. The winning team was awarded a good sized beef

which was also a part of the exhibition.

The house we have contracted to rent will be vacated the 20th of August and is located in the central part of the city. It has three bedrooms and a bath upstairs with the kitchen, living room and dining room down. Unusual is the fact that we will

have a fenced back yard of our own. There is a coal furnace heating with a coal furnace radiator in each room. When a homeowner vacates is unfurnished you can have him. One must provide his own hot-water heater and lights.

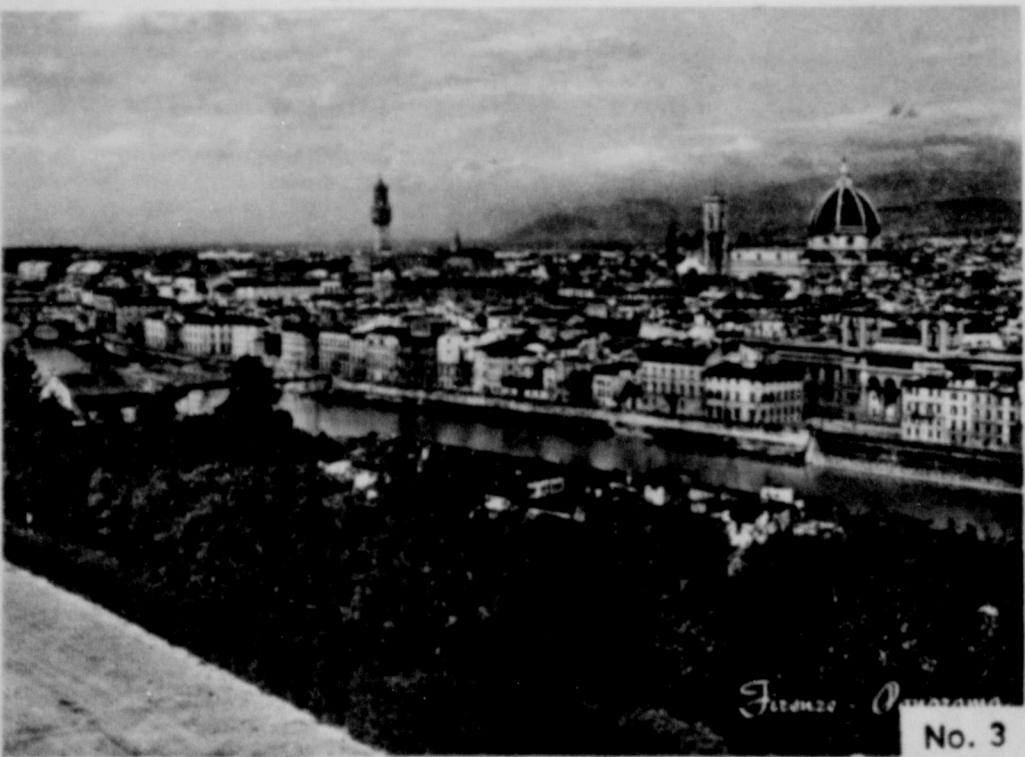

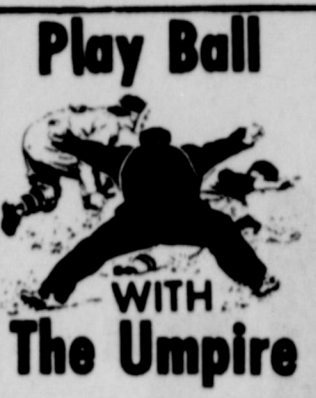

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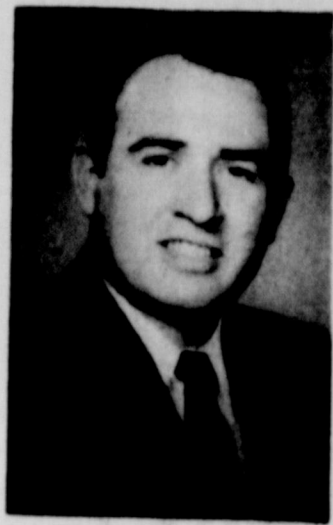

# "The Renewal Time"

In Isaiah 40:31 we find these marvelous words: "But they that wait upon the Lord shall renew their strength; they shall mount up with wings as eagles; they shall run, and not be weary; and they shall walk, and not faint." Isaiah was one of the greatest of Old Testament Prophets, and in this verse he reveals the secret of buoyant, satisfying spiritual growth. None of us are satisfied with our lives as they are. We are weak; we earnestly desire greater strength in our Christian walk of life. We want to possess a full satisfying life. This word from the Lord tells us how we can renew ourselves and become what God wants us to be.

In this verse there are presented four marvelous guarantees. There is first the promise of a renewal of spiritual strength. Each of us experiences periods of becoming weak and of growing weary. Natural strength at its best is soon exhausted. The word "renew" means "to change." We are thus changed men when we wait upon the Lord. Every Christian needs his spiritual batteries charged periodically. As man waits on God every need for the journey of life will be provided.

In the second place there is presented the assurance of soaring into the heights with the victorious abandon of the eagle. This is a description of the new kind of life which comes to him who waits on the Lord; he is born aloft on wings of faith and hope. The qualities of a victorious life are faith and hope. When we wait on the Lord our lives will be filled with faith and hope and thus we will live victorious lives.

There is in the third place the blessing of wearyless running. The Christian life is described as a race which we run. But unlike a natural race we can run the Christian life without becoming weary. Though the journey be such that the strongest, humanly speaking, may be weary and fall, the Lord giveth such power to those that wait upon Him that as they run the Christian race they shall not be weary.

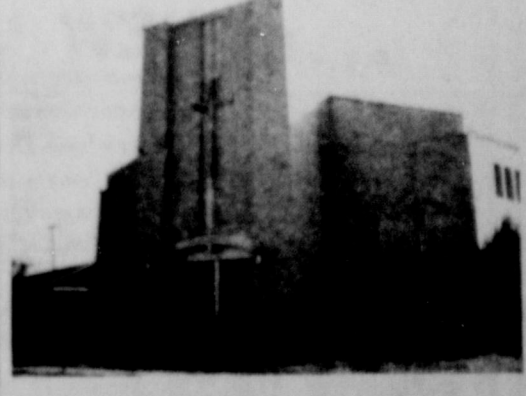
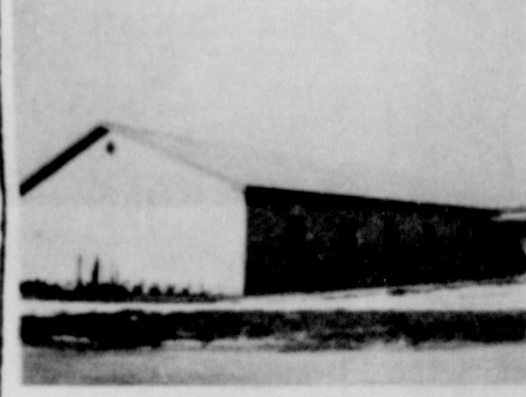
Last of all there is the guarantee of faintless walking. Happy indeed is he who has learned to walk in the midst of life's commonplaces and drudgeries. To walk and not faint is sometimes more difficult than to run and not be weary. It is easier to faint amidst the common things of life than to grow weary by doing the more glamorous and exciting. It is more difficult to keep up our ordinary duties than to soar aloft in seasons of excitement. God will give us the power of steady perseverance and of patient endurance under protracted trials.

The key to the possession of these marvelous blessings of God is "to wait upon the Lord." How much is included in this word "wait"! There is faith, and hope, and endurance, and strength. The word "wait" comes from a word meaning to eagerly look for, or to be bound together. Those that bind themselves to God will acquire new strength for daily living. This is the secret of a buoyant, satisfying spiritual life.

During November 1960 the communist-inspired attacks against the Belgian government in the UN had become so strong that Belgium threatened to withdraw from the UN unless officials of this international monstrosity stopped attacks on their government. Running concurrently with attacks on the Belgian government were attacks on the anti-communist government leaders and provinces in the Congo.  
Boosters of the United Nations claim that it is the world's last hope for peace. They bubble over with what they claim are achievements of the UN. How can anyone call an organization successful under whose guidance the communist slave empire has grown from 200 million people to over 900 million? What kind of success is it to allow 700 million human beings to fall into the satanic clutches of the international communist conspiracy?  
The UN does not stand for freedom despite some vague pious claims that it does. It pretends to stand for peace and plenty through handouts from an all-powerful government. Of course, this is merely an impossible and stupid socialistic utopian idea. The old promise of something for nothing has deceived millions, including many American citizens who should know better. The United Nations is hypocrisy, through and through. Do not be deceived by high sounding phrases. Dig for the facts.

### The Sounding Board

#### How Not to Save Berlin

**B**RIG. Gen. Frank L. Howley, cavalry soldier and scholar, the author of the following article, is qualified by personal experience in combat and in political conflict with the Russians in Berlin to discuss the American and British errors and failures which created the continuing Berlin crisis. Soldiers of his own small command slugged Russian soldiers who tried to stop them on their way into Berlin and left them unconscious at the roadside. General Howley would have used the same direct means on the whole Russian power if the United States had given him the authority.

He has often said that the Russians were a sloppy, incompetent, lawless mob at the time, bent on rape and loot, but easily beaten by a determined opponent. He has many battle awards and other distinctions and is now a vice-president of New York University.



June 28, 1961

Dear Westbrook:

You've asked me what I think about the Berlin situation. Unless we look at the past and see the boners that we've made, we can't understand either where we are or where we are likely to go.

Berlin has been a fiasco and it has not been the fault of us poor working stiff who were in the military government of Berlin up through the blockade.

In the first place, we could have taken Berlin! I went around the Battle of the Bulge to the headquarters of The Ninth Army, at Guetersloh. I was kept waiting an hour for the G-5, whose name was Colonel Craigy. When he came out of conference he said, "Howley, where in hell are you and your military government detachments?"

I replied, "We're back in Namur, Belgium, waiting for orders to come forward."

He said, "I've been trying to get your unit released to us by SHAEF because I have no military government personnel to take care of Berlin and we can be there within two days, at the latest, once we're given clearance to go. However, just now we received orders that we are to hold our position along the Elbe and not move to take Berlin." He continued, "There is nothing between us and Berlin except one regiment of SS at Potsdam. We can run over them without getting out of our tanks. We have three bridgeheads across

...but we only need one. Then he added a wisecrack because I was a colonel in the cavalry assigned to head the military government group for Berlin. He said, "Of course, the regiment at Potsdam chased your cavalry out this afternoon." My "cavalry" consisted of three fellows in a jeep doing reconnaissance.

I left at his headquarters a British lieutenant-colonel and an American lieutenant-colonel and two motorcyclists. That night I drove back to Namur, Belgium, to my detachment having assured Craigy that, if he got hold of me by telephone or by motorcycle, I would have the British and American military government units moving toward Berlin within two hours. We would definitely catch up to him before Berlin and we would be ready to take over military government. Of course, the order never came through.

The American Army was held at the Elbe and Berlin was permitted to be taken by the Soviets, who had a tough fight because the Germans had pulled their best units from in front of the American Army and thrown them around to hold off the Russians on the other side.

Finally, late in April, 1945, my unit was tacked on to the First Airborne and moved up as close as we could get to the Elbe. We established headquarters at Detmold. There, we waited for permission to go to Berlin. Permission finally came. I was designated as commander of the detachment, called the Preliminary Reconnaissance Party for Berlin, and given orders to move to Berlin and do a ground estimate of the situation to support our aerial studies before our main units moved into Berlin.

As I have written in my book, *Berlin Command*, when we got to the Elbe we were kept there seven and a half hours by the Soviets. They had a stick across the road, a guard standing by it who told us that we couldn't go through. We had the same decision to make then that we have been confronted with since then: Do you go through and risk shooting someone or getting shot, or do you do what the Soviets demand?

My orders were that I do what the Soviets demanded. So, at the end of seven and a half hours, I proceeded to Berlin with a small fraction of the force I had been given to reconnoiter Berlin, and was directed and led by the Soviets not to Berlin but to Potsdam to do a housekeeping job for which we were not equipped. The housekeeping job was to get Potsdam ready for the Big Three Conference, which was to be a Roosevelt, Churchill and Stalin affair, but turned out to be Truman, Attlee and Stalin.

FROM that day until this we have been pushed around in Berlin and have taken the pushing about. We are always confronted with the threat of force, a world war, etc. And, almost without fail, we back down and give the Soviets what they want. There are no new lessons anywhere in the world to be learned about the Soviets which we should not have learned in Berlin, but we just do not learn. Each new team comes in with its new hopes and goes over exactly the same ground of persuasion by smiling, of friendship, of making concessions and then getting verbally slapped in the face.

Your City Government by J. J. Maxey, City Secretary

From a two man force in 1944, one day man and one night man, to the modern department with a personnel of eight the Slaton Police Force has come a long way in the past seventeen years. The post war period created problems for many people as many organizations. Slaton's police department was no exception. Money was plentiful which caused considerable petty crime and an increase in felony cases. To cope with the situation the City Commission was forced to expand the department. This was started by the addition of another man at night which proved sufficient for only a short time. During a period of five years, 1944 to 1949, the police personnel was expanded to five men. Up to this time patrolling was done on foot and the officers used their personal cars for emergency calls. Slaton purchased its first patrol car early in 1949 and added a base station radio with mobile unit in the patrol car. This was great help in giving our citizens protection. Over the same five year period police fines had increased from \$841.60 in 1944 to \$5,500.00 in 1949. In 1956 the second patrol car was added and the personnel again increased. At this time the office was moved out of The City Hall into newly constructed quarters at the site of the old jail building. The increase in personnel and equipment was again reflected in the number of arrests and amount of fines assessed by the Corporation Court which amounted to \$24,153.00 in 1956. Throughout this period Slaton had a situation that no other west Texas city had, it being only fifteen miles from one of the fastest growing cities in the nation - Lubbock. A majority of arrests that were made proved to be people from other places in the area. The City Commission has been determined that it would have as clean a town as is possible and has been working continuously toward that goal and we have been able to see some concrete results in the past three or four years. As city will have a certain amount of misdemeanors and even some felonies but it doesn't have to put up with the influx of undesirable that have been run out of larger places. Today Slaton has one of the best organized and one of the most efficient police forces of any city its size in the state. The department is operated by Chief of Police Eugene I. Martin. Chief Martin has a Sergeant, four Patrolmen and Two Radio Dispatchers under his supervision. With this personnel the department is able to help in any emergency that might arise over the immediate area. The Department is equipped with fingerprinting and photographic equipment and a complete record and filing system. Finger prints that are sent to the F. B. I. often results in the suspect being held for some crime committed in other places. Chief Martin says that our police problems have settled down to normal or routine procedures. In the last twelve months there have been eight hundred twenty nine traffic tickets issued and five hundred ninety nine jail arrests made. Chief Martin is a firm believer in preventative measures as well as apprehension of those who break the law. He or one of the patrolmen is prepared and ready to furnish safety films, lecture on law enforcement and safety measures before clubs, schools or an interested organization. Chief Martin says that his department is particularly interested in teenagers and will work with them in their driving and safety programs or in anyway that can be helpful. The department has furnished speakers and films for quite a number of programs in the past two years and reports that our citizens have been very cooperative in preventative measures. The police budget for this fiscal year is \$37,704.15 and we expect police fines to amount to approximately \$20,000.00 which leaves a net cost to the taxpayers of \$17,704.15 or just under \$2.70 per capita. Considering the complex age in which we live and the value of our good American dollars today this seems to be a reasonable price to pay for protection. In passing we would like to pay tribute to a number of men who have served the city of Slaton as police chief or police officers in the past seventeen years. Men like Ernest Ward, E. A. Gentry, A. O. White, Leonard Lott, Bill Daniels and a host of others that worked diligently to keep Slaton the clean and progressive place that it is today. The efficiency of a police department hinges on the confidence and cooperation of the people that it serves.

FOR and AGAINST COMMUNISM BY BILLY JAMES HARGIS, D. FOUNDER CHRISTIAN CRUSADE

"NAME CALLING" Communists, their fellow-travelers, sympathizers and innocent dupes make much use of the name-calling technique. They resort to this type attack because they cannot answer the documented facts presented by informed Americans. One of the terms used in this method of attempting to discredit those who oppose the communist conspiracy is the adjective "self-styled." This is a term of ridicule. A self-styled person is one who pretends to be something he is not. In an article about our memorial services for the late Manning Johnson during our three-day conference in Tulsa last August, a newspaper reporter referred to him as a "self-styled" ex-communist. After finding his way out of the maze of communist propaganda Mr. Johnson turned around, testified before government authorities about the conspiracy. In other words, he started opposing communism and this made him "self-styled." Members of Congress who have dared to expose the communist conspiracy have found that they became "self-styled" to left-wing reporters. A bill to permit the speeded-up purchase of Federal waterfowl refuges was introduced by Congressmen John D. Dingell (D-Mich.) and Henry S. Reuss (D-Wis.), reports Michael Hudoba, Washington Editor, Sports Afield Magazine. Both are mem-

bers of the conservation bloc in Congress. Congress three years ago increased the Federal duck stamp fee from \$2 to \$3, and provided that 100 per cent of the proceeds from the duck stamps be used for acquiring waterfowl refuges. "Because of increasing land costs, the new program is still not producing enough additions to waterfowl refuges," said Representatives Dingell and Reuss. The Congressmen have observed that because waterfowl hunting has grown poorer in recent years, fewer hunters have taken

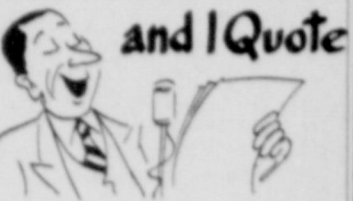
to the field. As a result, duck stamp sales have lagged and the acquisition of new refuges. This in turn has caused poorer hunting, fewer hunters, and a further lag in the acquisition program. The Dingell-Reuss bill is designed to break this "vicious circle." It authorizes as an aid to the duck stamp fund acquisition program, a sum of \$150 million over the next ten years, in order to acquire the land now.

## Cattlemen To Look At New Farm Legislation

The effect of the omnibus farm bill upon the livestock industry will be in the spotlight at the quarterly directors' meeting of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association in San Angelo.

Traditionally, cattlemen have opposed any price supports and production controls on cattle. Discussions at the TSCRA meeting are expected to center on the effect the new bill would have upon those in the cattle business, and to what extent the bill embraces practices which are related to beef production and marketing.

Other action at the meeting will include a review of the present brand laws in Texas, consideration of submitted samples for an official emblem for the Association, an analysis of activities of the National Livestock and Meat Board, and committee reports on a number of other subjects of particular interest to cattlemen.

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## Watch Austin As Well As Washington

The time has passed when a farmer or rancher could remain oblivious to the activities of the State Legislature, according to James D. Gordon, Research Assistant of the Bureau of Business Research at The University of Texas. First, legislation pertaining to agriculture is progressively assuming a greater scope so that at present virtually no participant in agriculture -- owner, laborer, or marketer -- is exempt from the decisions made at the Capitol, says Gordon in an advance release from the forthcoming TEXAS BUSINESS REVIEW.

Second is the inevitable fact that rural representation in the legislature has not maintained its former predominance. This is a natural reflection of the continuing urbanization of Texas and the consequences thereof. A manifestation of the diminishing rural population was the enactment during the last session of House Bill 349 which reapportioned the State into representative districts.

The advocates of this measure testified that urban representation in the House has consistently lagged behind its proportional share. The amended bill provided Harris County four new representatives, Dallas two, one each for Travis, El Paso, Taylor, Lubbock and Amarillo, and one-half each of Nueces, Hidalgo, Ector, and Midland counties. The net effect was the transfer of 13 House votes from rural to urban areas. This adjustment constitutes a substantial loss, taking from primarily pro-agricultural forces while supplementing its opposition.

As a consequence of these two transitions, farmers and ranchers may no longer rest assured that their interests will necessarily be perpetuated by the state legislature. Though it would be inaccurate to surmise that adequate support in the House has been lost, the future will present an abundance of previously unencountered obstacles insofar as the promotion of farm interests is concerned.

Though agricultural representation seems somewhat more secure in the Senate, it is the consensus of most farm proponents that even in this rural stronghold intensified defensive efforts will be required in the following sessions. Emphasis is turning toward the obstruction of legislation contrary to agricultural interests rather than toward initiation or support of favorable enactments.

In the face of the foregoing, agriculture fared surprisingly well with regard to the results of the stormy 57th session concluded May 29. It was by no means a clean sweep, but farm forces exemplified their persistence and tenacity in several crucial showdowns, even in opposition to the Governor.

The Texas Farm Bureau, the state's most active agricultural lobby, assessed its achievements as follows: bills supported and passed, 20; bills opposed and defeated, 20; bills supported and defeated, 17; bills opposed and passed, 3. The more pertinent of these are discussed in the July issue of the TEXAS BUSINESS REVIEW.

The special session, which convenes for thirty days on July 10, could well result in the passage of legislation crucial to the interest of the state's agricultural constituency. Attempts will undoubtedly be made to reduce the funds available for farm-to-market road programs.

**TELEPHONE TALK**

**NEW STATE TELEPHONE LAWS**  
I thought it would be of interest to you to know of 3 new Telephone laws passed in the last session of the Texas Legislature.

People who damage or destroy telephone facilities, obtain telephone service through fraud, or refuse to give up a party line for an emergency call have been branded law-breakers, subject to fine and imprisonment.

Most stringent of the bills in House Bill 921 which makes it a felony punishable by two to five years in the penitentiary or a fine of \$100 to \$2,000 for damaging telephone facilities.

**OFFENSE EXPLAINED**  
Punishable under this law is anyone who intentionally breaks, cuts, pulls or tears down or injures any telephone, telegraph or electrical transmission wire, post, or machinery, or who interferes with transmission of messages or electricity.

Obtaining telecommunications service by fraudulent means is made a misdemeanor by Senate Bill 309. Punishment provided is up to one year in jail or a fine of up to \$1,000, or both.

There are several ways to run afoul this law. It can be done by charging service to a telephone number or a credit card number without the authority of the subscriber or holder of the card.

**FALSE CHARGING**  
Another way is to charge service to a non-existent, false, fictitious or counterfeit telephone number or credit card number, or to a suspended, terminated, expired, cancelled or revoked telephone number or credit card.

Use of a code, prearranged scheme or other similar stratagem, or obtaining service by any other trick, impersonation, false pretense, statement or representation also is made illegal.

Senate Bill 366 makes it a misdemeanor to refuse to relinquish a party line for an emergency call to a fire or police department, or medical aid or ambulance service.

Persons falsely stating that a party line is needed for an emergency call also come under this law, which provides for a fine of \$25 to \$500, or one month in jail, or both.

## Police Bulletin

The major causes of delinquency can be found not only by studying the delinquent himself, but by studying the millions of boys and girls who are not delinquent. What is it in their respective personalities that make the difference between the observance, public acceptance and respect, and delinquency?

We find the greatest factor here to be that of love. Most normal children have this in abundance. Mother and Dad love them, sisters and brothers care for them, and teachers and friends shower them with affection and respect. The delinquent child, or "bad" boy or girl, on the other hand, is shunned.

Another factor, which is leading cause of delinquency, is the absence of ambition on the part of the youth. This is probably another evidence of the lack of parental love, but compare the "bad" boy with the "good" one. In the well adjusted home, children want to amount to something. They want to live up to the expectations their parents have for them. Their effort to achieve a real goal in life keeps them busy and they have little time for any form of delinquency, even if they tended that way.

Nondelinquent children, moreover, see a reason for living in everything they do in life. They have a definite purpose. The church undoubtedly is an important factor in the lives of many of them. They develop a code of ethics which is their guiding light. This code may deviate slightly from the strict teachings of the church but at least it is basically sound; it guides their young lives and keeps them free of seriously evil influences.

The delinquent child, by contrast, lacks this fundamental code of doing the right thing, and having people admire and respect him. He gets attention by doing the "wrong" thing and then, when society labels him as "bad," he decides to live up to the reputation. He is truly "mixed up" at this point; society has lost all meaning to him and he sees no benefit in trying to be a decent citizen.
