A Bond Election for the issuance of \$50,000.00 in Street Improvement Bonds was called for Tuesday, November 21st, at a special meeting Thursday night of the City Commission and the Financial Planning Commission. The bonds will pay the city's part of a proposed Assessment Paving Program for 1962.

It was agreed that the need existed for the street improvement, and that with the sixteen or seventeen blocks of paving that had been petitioned for along with the blocks that would come in when the program started, there was a need to finance the city's part for a total of approximately forty to fifty blocks.

Bennet Reaves, City Engineer of Parkhill, Smith and Cooper, was present and advised that it would take approximately

\$50,000 to pay the city's portion. M. A. Hagberg of Walker, Austin and Waggoner of Dallas, fiscal agents for the City of Slaton had previously studied the bonded indebtedness and stated that the City could vote a \$50,000 issue and not raise taxes if the repayment of the principal was postponed to 1974 with only the interest payments being made up to that time. The interest payments would approximate \$2,500.00 per year and it is thought that this could be raised by the increase in valuation each year.



AUSTIN. Tex .-- Aware of the fact that more money soon may be available for trunk-highway construction, 15 delegations of civil leaders descended on Aus-

They asked the Texas Highway Commission for a record number of dollars for highway work. Specifically, \$171,056,-

Houston and Harris County, presenting a plan of freeway development designed to carry Houston's traffic in 1980, asked for approval of an \$89,400,000 program. That was the big one. But all of the 14 other projects were equally as pressing to the homefolks, even though less money was involved.

State Highway Engineer D.C. Greer feels that 22,000 of the 25,000 miles in the trunk-highway system are inadequate. He says that less attention has been paid to these "town-to-city" roads during the years in which as. urban freeways and farm-to-

A big gain in construction in 1961 has helped the business picture. Not even Carls's September blow could head off a new nine-month record in the construction field in Texas. The UT Bureau found \$1,047,-625,000 in construction authorized the first nine months of 1961, five per cent above 1960's first three quarters.

Recovery of the home building business was the major factor. Third quarter saw \$169,127,000 worth of one-family homes authorized. This was 23 per cent above the same quarter of 1960. Apartment construction is nearly double the rate of the previous year.

MORE TAXES? -- James W. Mc-Grew, research director of the Texas Research League, told the group's annual meeting that additional state spending of about \$50,000,000 a year is in sight for the two years starting September 1, 1963.

New sales tax will provide part of the added money, Mc-Grew predicted. Other taxes will just about produce the extra money. But it will require some economizing to make ends meet in the 1963 session of the Legislature, in spite of the huge new tax.

Growth of Texas is the reason for the added spending. Growth means more children, more schools, more patients in mental hospitals, more college students, more cars and more highways to hold them.

fore the deficit is erased. CATTLE RULES-New rules invoked by the Texas Animal Health Commission are designed to protect areas where brucellosis control programs

are under way. Under the new brucellosis control law, 78 counties, mainly in West and South Texas, have set up programs for testing herds. Purpose is to see if they have brucellosis, and to dispose of cows having the dis-

ease. So the commission has notified truckers, livestock auctions and commission merchants that movements of cows into the certified control areas is restricted. They must have been tested and shown free of brucellosis before they can be moved from an uncertified county into a certified county.

Then the new owner must keep them quarantined. He must have them retested in 30 to 60 days before he can put them with his herd.

Restrictions do not apply to steers, spayed heifers, calves; under eight months of age, and calves under 30 months which have been officially vaccinated against brucellosis.

TEXAS MONUMENT -- A delegation of Texans headed by Governor Daniel will journey to Vicksburg, Mississippi, on November 4, to dedicate a \$100,-000 monument to 35 Texans who played heroic roles in the defense of Vicksburg.

Ceremony will be a part of the Texas Civil War Centennial observance.

Monument was authorized by the voters of Texas in the 1953 constitutional amendment which switched revenue from the Confederate pension tax to a state building program.

Movement to build such monument was started by Confederate veterans and was carried on for more than SD years by the United Daughters of the Confederacy.



Shoot With Your Eyes!

The hunting season is back, and some 10 million Americans are readying for the oldest of outdoor sports. Most avid hunters are all set for the opening day - well oiled gear, warm clothes and comfortable boots. They're all set - almost, but not quite. They may be missing a very important piece of hunting equipment—good vision. Hunting is a very serious business especially when you consider that no hunting season is complete without an estimated 500 hunters being killed and 3,000 injured. In a great percentage of the cases where a tragedy has taken place, the man behind the trigger cried, "I didn't see him." That's not much consolation to the victim's bereaved family. The American Optometric Association suggests you check these visual skills before hunting. First . the ability to distinguish fine details under all weather conditions. Second . . . the ability to recognize colors and to distinguish one from another accurately. Third hunting requires the ability to see objects or movement to the right and left of a target, while keeping eyes fixed on the target. If you ordinarily wear glasses wear them when you hunt. Give your fellow hunter the safety courtesy that you want him to give you . . . have your vision professionally examined before the season opens. Hunting is a deadly business. Let's keep it a "live" sport. "Shoot with your eyes, not your imagination!" -American Optometric Association

NACCA's Safety Campaign

Too few people realize that the same lawyers who sue for accident claims are leading a relentless fight to reduce America's staggering accident toll.

The annual meeting of the National Safety Council Congress this month (October 16 to 20) is a fitting time to honor the fight for safety waged every week in the year by The National Association of Claimants' Counsel of America (NACCA). Appalled by accidents which kill somebody every six minutes-and injure somebody every six secondsthe 10,000 NACCA members fill the need for a trained specialized group of private attorneys to protect the public's rights. They fulfill a need as necessary for the public's protection as a trained adjuster for the insurance companies' benefit.

At this moment, in every state, NACCA's members are helping to push through legislation requiring immediate seat belt installations in all cars. This measure alone would cut by half the extent of injuries suffered in automobile accidents, according to safety authorities.

Federal-State hog cholera eradication program has been passed by Congress and signed y President Kennedy. In making the announcement, the USDA said this law will enable them to initiate a program sought for with States that wish to many years by meat and swine producing groups and state agricultural and livestock health authorities.

The new law permits the Secretary of Agriculture to establish a 12-member advisory committee to helpdevelop plans for an eradication program. An ARS official will head the committee, which will have representatives from the swine consumer groups. state and local governments, and professional and scientific organizations.

Under the new law, the USDA is authorized to prohibit or restrict interstate movement of virulent hog cholera virus, which is sometimes used to innoculate animals. Innoculation with the virulent virus is considered dangerous, because it can become a factor in the disease's spread. Safe vaccines that confer immunization more effectively are available, and many states already ban or restrict the use of live viruses for immunization.

In addition to controlling use of virulent hog cholera virus, ARS amimal disease officials want to institute such measures as heat treatment of garbage fed to hogs, and destruction of infected and exposed animals with payment of indemnities to owners to compensate for these losses. They also listed as essential such practices as control of animal shipments within and across state lines. prompt reporting of new hog cholera outbreaks, increased vaccination in areas with high disease incidence, keeping the swine industry informed on pro-






